BJP releases second list of 21 Assembly candidates for Odisha; Dilip Ray to contest from Rourkela



Bhubaneswar (KCN):

The BJP Tuesday released the names of 21 candidates for the Odisha Assembly elections, including that of former Union Coal Minister Dilip Ray. While releasing the second list of candidates for the Odisha Assembly elections, the party nominated Ray from the Rourkela assembly seat. At least five turncoats who recently joined the BJP after quitting the BJD also got BJP tickets. They are Amarndra Dash (Jagatsinghpur), Dambaru Sisa (Chitrakonda), Kalilash Kulesika (Laxmipur), Bhadav Hansdah (Saraskana) and Jagannath Nudruka (Bissam Cuttack).

Ray will fight against Odisha's Labour Minister

and BJD candidate

Sarada Nayak from the Rourkela seat.

The party also changed

two candidates who were named in the previous list. Surama Padhi was replaced by Tapas Ranjan Martha in the Ranpur assembly segment while the party nominated Chaitanya Nandibali in place of Chaitanya Hantal in the Pottangi assembly segment. Two women candidates – Surama Padhi and Sanjali Murmu (Bangirposi) – also figure in the list of 21 candidates released by the BJP.

With this, the BJP has so far announced the names of 131 candidates out of 147 assembly segments in Odisha. The party had earlier released the names of candidates for all the 21 Lok Sabha seats in the state.

Odisha Assembly and Lok Sabha polls in the state will be held simultaneously in four

phases May 13, 20, 25 and June 1.

UPSC Civil Services 2023 results declared, Aditya Srivastava secures top rank

New Delhi (KCN):

Institute of Technology (IIT), Kanpur, according to the results of the civil services examination 2023, with Animesh Pradhan and Donuru Ananya Reddy getting the second and third ranks respectively, the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC) announced Tuesday. He has done his graduation (Bachelor of Technology) in electrical engineering from Indian

Ananya Reddy, who possesses Bachelor of Arts (Hons) geography, from Miranda House, Delhi University, stood third in the rank with anthropology as her optional subject. A total of 1,016 candidates (664 men and 352 women) have qualified the examination and have been recommended by the Commission for appointment to various services.

29 Naxalites killed in encounter with security personnel in Chhattisgarh

Kanker (Chhattisgarh) (KCN): At least 29 Naxalites were killed in an encounter with security personnel in Chhattisgarh's Kanker district Tuesday, police officials said. Three security personnel suffered injuries in the fierce gunbattle and a large quantity of weapons was also recovered from the spot, they said. The gunfight took place at around 2 pm

in Hapatola forest between Binagunda and Koronar villages under Chhotebethiya police station limits, when a joint team of the Border Security Force (BSF) and the state police's District Reserve Guard (DRG) was out on an anti-Naxal operation, Inspector General of Police (Bastar Range) Sundarraj P said. The operation was launched based on inputs about the presence of senior cadres of north Bastar division of

the outlawed CPI (Maoist) Shankar, Lalita, Raju and others, he said. During patrolling in the area, a fierce gun-battle broke out between the two sides, the senior IPS officer said. "Bodies of 29 Maoists along with a huge cache of weapons, including AK-47, SLR, Insas and .303 rifles, were recovered from the spot," the IG said. Polling in the Naxalite-hit Bastar Lok Sabha seat will take

place April 19 in the first phase, while the Kanker constituency, part of the Bastar region, will vote in the second round of general elections April 26. The search operation was still underway in the area amid intermittent firing between security personnel and Naxalites, said Sundarraj. "Three security personnel sustained injuries in the gunfight and their condition was stated

to be out of danger," he said, adding they were referred to hospital for treatment. After the latest encounter, 79 Naxalites have been killed in separate gunbattles with security forces in the Bastar region, comprising seven districts, including Kanker, so far this year. On April 2, as many as 13 Naxalites were killed in an encounter with security forces in Bijapur district.

"Don't Try To Bring Down System": Supreme Court In Vote Cross-Check Case

New Delhi (KCN): Hearing petitions seeking cross-verification of votes cast on Electronic Voting Machines (EVM) with paper slips generated through the VVPAT system, the Supreme Court today pointed to problems with the secret ballot voting method.

"We are in our 60s. We all know what happened when there were ballot papers, you may have, but we have not forgotten," Justice Sanjiv Khanna told Prashant Bhushan, counsel for one of the petitioners, Association for Democratic Reforms. Mr Bhushan was arguing how most European countries that had opted for voting through EVMs have returned to the paper ballots.

"We can go back to paper ballots. Another option is to give VVPAT slip to the voters in hand. Otherwise, the slips fall into the machine and the

slip can be then given to the voter and it can be put into the ballot box. Then the VVPAT design was changed, it had to be transparent glass, but it was changed to dark opaque mirror glass where it is only visible when the light is on for second seconds," he said.

When Mr Bhushan cited Germany's example, Justice Dipankar Datta asked what's Germany's population. Mr Bhushan replied that it is around 6 crore, while India has 50-60 crore voters.

"Ninety-seven crore is the total number of registered voters. We all know what happened when there were ballot papers," Justice Khanna said.

When Senior Advocate Sanjay Hegde, counsel for one of the petitioners, said votes cast on EVMs should be tallied with VVPAT slips, Justice Khanna replied, "Yes, 60 crore VVPAT slips should be counted. Right?" The judge said human

interventions "lead to problems and human weakness can be there, which includes biases as well". "Machine normally without human intervention will give you accurate results. Yes, the problem arises when there is human intervention or (a human) makes unauthorised changes when they are around the software or machine, if you have any suggestion to avert this, then you can give us that," he said.

Mr Bhushan then read out a research paper on the possibility of EVMs being tampered. "They are only counting 5 VVPAT machines per assembly when there are 200 such machines, this is five per cent only and there can be no justification in this. The seven-second light can also lead to manipulation. The voter can be allowed to take the VVPAT slip and put

it into the ballot box," he said.

Senior Advocate Gopal Sankaranarayanan, appearing for one of the petitioners, said, "I adopt everything that Mr Bhushan says. We are not saying that there is any malice. Only issue is that of the confidence of the voter in the vote he has cast."

The court then asked the Election Commission of India about the process of voting, the storage of EVMs and counting of votes. Justice Khanna noted that there is no provision for strict punishment for tampering

with EVMs. "This is serious. There should be fear of punishment," he said.

Mr Sankaranarayanan said voters need physical interface and verification. "Allow me to pick up the slip and put it in the box," he said.

The court responded that even if 10 per cent of voters raise objections, the whole process will stop. "Is this rational?" it asked.

Mr Sankaranarayanan replied, "Yes it must, I am entitled to ask. I am a voter, what do I gain by deliberately stopping

the process?" Justice Dipankar Datta asked the petitioners' counsel not to compare the Indian election with voting in foreign countries. "My home state West Bengal's population is more than that of Germany. We need to trust someone. Don't try to bring down the system like this. Don't cite such examples. European examples don't work here," he said.

Justice Datta asked Mr Bhushan if there is data backing his contention that people don't trust EVMs. When Mr Bhushan cited a survey, the court said, "Let us not believe in private polls. Let us go by data.

The problem with data is that it must be authentic, not based on opinion but actual performance. We will get the data from the Election Commission." When a counsel for the petitioners said public

sector companies are making EVMs, the court asked if he will be happy if the private sector does it. The matter will be heard next on Thursday.

The VVPAT -- Voter Verified Paper Audit Trail -- enables a voter to see if the vote was cast properly and went to the candidate he/she supports. The VVPAT generates a paper slip that is kept in a sealed cover and can be opened if there is a dispute. Amid the

Opposition's questions and apprehensions regarding the EVM system of voting, the petitioners call for cross-verification of every poll. Let us go by data. direction to the Election Commission and the Centre to ensure that voters are able to verify through VVPATs that their vote has been "counted as recorded".

The petition says that the requirement of voters verifying that their votes have been "recorded as cast" is somewhat met when the VVPAT slip is displayed for about seven seconds after pressing the button on the EVM through a transparent window.

"However, there is a complete vacuum in law as the ECI has provided no procedure for the voter to verify that her vote has been 'counted as recorded' which is an indispensable part of voter verifiability. The failure of the ECI to provide for the same is in the teeth of the directions issued by this Court in... Subramanian Swamy versus Election Commission of India (2013 verdict)," the plea said.

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Independents are not hot favourites any more



The country is witnessing a new trend-- gradual decline of number of Independents seeking election and the victory achieved by them. Whether it is good or not is another matter and needs a separate debate. Two reasons immediately come to mind for it: one, rising cost of campaigning and two, voters' preference to candidates attached to one political party or the other.

Whatever may be the reason, we are certainly into a different time. The first Lok Sabha results will tell you the difference. It will offer a study in contrasts. Against three in the outgoing, as many as 36 Independents had won the first Lok Sabha election. Some

of them had earned name and fame before in different fields. The list is long. It includes veterans like V. K. Krishna Menon, Acharya Kripalani, S. M. Banerjee, Meenu Masani, L. M. Singhvi, Inderjit Singh Namdhari and Karni Singh.

In addition to other things, their credentials might be playing in the minds of voters. There was a time, of course, in the past, when mafia dons who were seeking elections as Independents were reaching state Assemblies and parliament with ease. Uttar Pradesh is notable in this connection. What is more surprising, they were later backed by political parties. Two parties, SP and BSP, have done most of the favours for them. However, both the dons are dead. However, there are yet to keep totally away from such elements. Bihar has not acted differently. There too RJD had backed at least one

noted criminal. Pakistan, unbelievably, has rejected son of Hafiz Sayeed, mastermind of Mumbai terror attack. But that might be an exception.

The story in early years was completely different. Youngsters might be unaware but in the first Lok Sabha, Independents were the second largest group after the Congress. No non-Congress party had matched their performance. Cut to 2019 and the change becomes crystal clear. In the outgoing Lok Sabha the number had dropped to three. A total of 202 independent candidates have so far reached the Lok Sabha.

Cost escalation is not something new. Prices of materials have gone up everywhere. Labour and other costs have also shot up. Contesting Lok Sabha elections on one's own strength has become far too difficult now.

Keeping all this in

mind, it appears that if any one wins a Lok Sabha seat as an independent now he is different. He must be popular for some reason or the other and must have done something different from rivals.

To keep the record straight, after the first Lok Sabha elections, the number of Independent winners in the second, came down to 34. Elections were held in 1977 after emergency was imposed in the country. Then only seven independent candidates were successful. The number was reduced further to four in 1980. In 1984 and 1989 for different reasons nine and eight independent candidates were successful in the Lok Sabha elections.

Besides muscle, money power plays a role in elections not only in Assembly but in Lok Sabha polls. But not in every case. Personal influence and perception also matters. Kripalani, for

example, was the President of the Indian National Congress in 1947. He was one of the most enthusiastic and faithful disciples of Gandhi. He also served as the General Secretary of the Congress for almost a decade. Men like Laxmi Mall Singhvi are also born in centuries. He was a renowned jurist, constitutional expert, poet, linguist and writer. He used to write a lot on legal matters in a popular Hindi weekly, "Dharmyug", when I used to write other stories, lead stories. He was born in Jodhpur. He was a member of the third Lok Sabha from 1952 to 1967.

Whether he was an MP or not, he had never taken more than one rupee as salary.

S.M. Banerjee was another such person in Kanpur. People will tell you all about him there. He was a famous labor leader. He had

come to Kanpur from West Bengal to work. He had made Kanpur his workplace. Banerjee won the election by contesting as an independent candidate in 1957 and repeated the feat in 1962, 1967 and 1971. Kanpur may be the only city which has elected an independent as an MP four times.

He was not alone. You will find several others in the past who did not hail from the place but was successful and had reached the lower House. It was made possible by connecting with the people there and becoming a part of their joys and sorrows. Kripalani came from Sindh (now Pakistan). He became MP from Bihar. Inderjit Singh Namdhari's family had come to Bihar from Pakistan during the partition of the country. He was also the Transport Minister of Bihar for many years. After the division of

Bihar, he became active in Jharkhand. Namdhari became the first Speaker of Jharkhand Assembly.

Karni Singh also deserves mention in this connection though the present generation may have little knowledge about him and some others. He was the top shooter of the country. A stadium was named after him in the capital which may be the first of its kind. Usually this does not happen. Dr. Karni Singh Range was constructed in 1982 for the shooting events of the 9th Asian Games. Singh belonged to the royal family of Bikaner. He was the first shooter in the country to be honored with the 'Arjuna Award' in 1961. It is said that although he came from a royal family, he easily mixed with common people and shared their joys and sorrow. He was MP for five consecutive terms from 1952 to 1977. With 70 to 71

UPHOLD VALUES OF INCLUSIVENESS AND VOTE FOR DEVELOPMENT

Whenever I found a reason for me to rejoice at the festivities of elections and being witness to the jubilation of political parties dominating the social ambiance completely, there has always been a sense of remorse originating in my memory from the uproar of animosity between two groups who fought and wounded each other in the name of their candidates and in another instance, to my horror, I still remember having been approached by a candidate offering a handsome amount for my vote, which he said, if I was ready to cast in favor of him. Again, in another situation I realized how challenging it could be when you find a particular section of the society is shooed away from casting its votes and some people by exercising their muscular dominance forcefully cast the votes of those who they managed to drive and keep away from reaching the polling booths. This indiscriminate monopoly by parties and groups that belong

to prominent caste fractions and disruptive elements is still active in areas where even the media fail to expose them and the officials are forced to derail the procedure. This year, from April 19 to June 1, we will participate under the scorching sun of the Indian peninsula, the exercise I mentioned in the beginning and its festivities. There is everywhere an enthusiasm for change or there is of course a demand emanating from the desperation of unfulfilled desire of people that asks the government to go through a profound polishing impact. Always seeking something better from the government is the usual norm. Those who failed to improve their position were discarded and this was the principal reason that forced us to test new parties and their new governance methods. Post independence India had a particular regime under Nehru that went for more than a decade. But there was this incense of dissatisfaction seeking change and people

were soon to look for alternatives and new political parties were formed to topple the hegemony of the ruling class. Every election brings this opportunity or gives liberty to people to decide as to what their requirements are. It is a period that forces the warhorses on the fray to stop and listen to the people. You will find politicians walking the extra mile in implementing tactics to convince and console voters and fling offers of prospects in case of their being voted to power. From framing impactful narratives to field popular candidates with winning strike rate to the preparations to attract votes into their kitty, all parties are busy in defining democracy in their own way. Election season holds the voters responsible for their decisions. They can decide as to what should be the deciding factors that they would elect a particular candidate for.

National Elections 2024 decisively is a straight fight between the most prominent Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the rest of his opposition which has directly or indirectly chosen to stand under the I.N.D.I.A umbrella. This time, the government under Modi is well aware of the fact that the main plank it can fight the elections is its performance. Its usual anti-Congress stance may not fructify in winning elections. Congress has been out of power for a decade and the corruption scenario that it was held responsible for before 2014 is slowly fading. The new voters and the first timers need new narratives and new hopes. While jubilation on the winning side is always justified, there is an important aspect that frequently goes sidelined. In the case of the 2019 National Elections, almost 33 percent of the genuine voters preferred not to vote. Which means, despite being jubilant about India's success as a democracy, there is a chunk of population that identifies the emerging scenario as meaningless and decides to stay away from it. Every election

brings with it social, economic, political and religious consequences. Interestingly, India's electoral democracy is not a holistic exercise for development alone. It is bound to bend its head to family, society, caste, religion, region, language and many more factors. An ideal study truly reveals the fact that development has never been the main reason that we chose a particular candidate for. A candidate is chosen to jump into the fray for various reasons. This could be his family prominence in that locality or the caste dynamics that would go in his favor or it can also be due to his radical ideological stance that shoots him to popularity. There is again a factor that counts important these days, a person's social media reach. The subjects he handles in the social media and the acceptance and sometimes the quantum of opposition he receives makes him a favorite pick for candidature. In such cases development

always takes a back seat. But naturally the candidate chosen by a particular party fits in the narrative it sets and he is mounted on shoulders with fictitious and spontaneous glory he is deliberately adorned with. In order to make fortunes from the Sandeshkhali horror, the BJP decided to field Rekha Patra, a survivor of the violence, someone who dared to question the TMC hooligans. She was one among those the Prime Minister called over the phone. Describing her "Shakti Swaroopa" the Prime Minister was setting a distinctive trend helping her shoot to popularity and giving a big blow to his opponent the TMC. Every vote really is a communication that a voter makes to his country. He communicates his aspirations and conveys his concerns. Irrespective of the electoral hysteria and pomp on the streets, in the polling booths a voter is silent. He needs to make a decision not for him but for his country. He understands the intensity of

"Underscores Congress' Pechant For Deceit": Smriti Irani On Ex RBI Governor's Book

New Delhi(KCN): Union Minister Smriti Irani on Tuesday attacked the Congress over former RBI Governor Duvvuri Subbarao's claim that the finance ministry under Pranab Mukherjee and P Chidambaram used to pressure the RBI, saying it underscored the grand-old party's "pechant for deceit" over national interest.

In his recent book 'Just A Mercenary? Notes from My Life and Career', Mr Subbarao has said that the finance ministry under Mukherjee and Mr Chidambaram used to pressure the RBI to soften interest rates and present a rosier picture of growth to shore up sentiments.

The former RBI governor in his memoir also wrote that there was 'little understanding and sensitivity' in the erstwhile government of the Congress-led United



Progressive Alliance (UPA) on the importance of the central bank's autonomy. "When the grand-old Congress party wanted Reserve Bank as the government's cheerleader to hoodwink people of India," Ms Irani said in a post on X, sharing a media report published on Subbarao's claim in his memoir.

"The revelations from former RBI Governor Subbarao's memoir provide a glaring instance of the institutional abuse perpetrated by the Congress. The misconduct

not only endangered our institutions but also underscores Congress's penchant for deceit over national interest," she said. "Instead of fostering a robust Indian economy, they chose to mislead our citizens, betraying their aspirations for a prosperous country. No wonder India plummeted into the fragile five economies during the UPA's decade-long misrule and mismanagement," she added.

Mr Subbarao was the finance secretary (2007-08) before taking over as the governor of the RBI for

five years on September 5, 2008, a few days before the breakout of the Lehman Brothers crisis.

Lehman Brothers crashed into bankruptcy on September 16, making it the biggest corporate failure in history.

In a chapter in his book titled 'Reserve Bank as the Government's Cheerleader?', Mr Subbarao recalled that pressure by the erstwhile UPA government was not confined to the Reserve Bank's interest rate stance.

On occasion, it extended to pressuring the RBI to present rosier estimates of growth and inflation at variance with the bank's objective assessment.

"I remember one such occasion when Pranab Mukherjee was the finance minister. Arvind Mayaram, the finance secretary, and Kaushik Basu, the chief economic adviser, contested our estimates with their assumptions and

estimates, which I thought was par for the course," he wrote.

What upset him, Mr Subbarao said, was that, almost seamlessly, the discussion moved from objective arguments to subjective considerations, with suggestions that the Reserve Bank must project a higher growth rate and a lower inflation rate in order to share responsibility with the government for 'shoring up sentiment'.

"Mr Mayaram went to the extent of saying in one meeting that 'whereas everywhere else in the world, governments and central banks are cooperating, here in India, the Reserve Bank is being very recalcitrant', he recalled.

Mr Subbarao said that he was invariably discomfited and annoyed by this demand that the RBI should be a cheerleader for the government.

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Odisha records highest tree cover loss due to fires from 2001 to 2022

Bhubaneswar/ New Delhi(KCN): From 2001 to 2022, Odisha had the highest rate of tree cover loss due to fires with an average of 238 hectares lost per year, according to the latest data from the Global Forest Watch monitoring project. Other states that follow Odisha are Arunachal Pradesh (198 hectares), Nagaland (195 hectares), Assam (116 hectares), and Meghalaya (97 hectares). The data showed India lost 35,900 hectares of tree cover due to fires from

2002 to 2022, with 2008 recording the maximum tree cover loss due to fires (3,000 hectares). The findings acquire importance at a time when forest fires have been raging in the state's forests owing to the rising mercury and dry weather conditions. Odisha has been experiencing the country's worst forest fires for many years. The data further suggested that India has lost 2.33 million hectares of tree cover since 2000, equivalent to a six per cent decrease in tree cover during this period.

regrowing and emitting it when cleared or degraded. The loss of forests, thus, accelerates climate change. Tree cover loss is not always deforestation, which typically refers to human-caused, permanent removal of natural forest cover. It includes both human-caused loss and natural disturbances, and loss that is permanent or temporary.

Examples of tree cover loss that may not meet the definition of deforestation include loss from logging, fire, disease or storm damage. The data showed that 95 per cent of the tree cover loss in India from 2013 to 2023 occurred within natural forests. The maximum tree cover loss of 1,89,000 hectares occurred in 2017. The country lost 1,75,000 hectares of tree cover in 2016 and 1,44,000 hectares in 2023, the highest in the last six years. The GFW data showed that five states accounted for 60 per cent of all tree cover loss between 2001 and 2023.

2-month marine fishing ban comes into force

Paradip(KCN): As many as 12 lakh fishermen will be affected as a 61-day fishing ban announced by the state government owing to the fish breeding season in the sea came into force, Monday. No fishermen will be allowed to venture into the sea for fishing during these two months from April 15 to June 14.

This was stated in a circular (Letter No3987) issued by the Directorate of Fisheries at Cuttack. With the restrictions coming into force, over 12 lakh fishermen will be affected as all the fishing harbours will remain closed for two months. Reports said such restrictions have been implemented since 2007. Earlier, the curbs were imposed only for a period of 45 days it has been increased to 61 days from 2017. The restrictions are being imposed to facilitate the smooth breeding of fish in the sea. Meanwhile, all the fishing boats as well as fishermen



returned to the fishing harbours Sunday evening before the restrictions came into force. Sources said that over 600 big boats and 200 small boats regularly venture into the sea for fishing from the Paradip fishing harbour. Around 50,000 people are dependent on the marine fishing industry, Srikant Parida, president of Odisha Marine Fish Producers Association (OMFPA) said. The Paradip fishing harbour always witnesses the gathering of thousands of fishermen but will remain deserted for two months during the ban period. In absence of any work

after the imposition of the fishing ban, the fishermen will stop their mainstay for two months and return to the sea only after the lifting of the restrictions, he said. Earlier, fishermen used to visit the sea 20 to 22 times a year to catch fish in 2005. However, things have changed and fishermen now venture into the sea 10 to 12 times a year, a boat owner Narendra Biswal said. The drop in sea visits by the fishermen is attributed to a decline in the fish population in the sea, irregular weather conditions, a sharp increase in the cost of fuel, a six-month

fishing ban for mass nesting of Olive Ridley turtles and turbulent conditions at the river mouth, he said. When contacted, Marine Fishery Officer Bijay Kumar Kar said the restrictions have been welcomed by the fishermen as this is the season for fish breeding. The female fish come near the shore for breeding and laying eggs. The mother fish and fingerlings will be destroyed if fishermen catch fish during this. All fishermen will be highly benefitted if the fish population increases in the sea, he said.

The union leader further said the Andhra Pradesh government has announced to provide Rs 10,000 to each eligible fishermen's family under the YSR Matsya Bharosa scheme during the fishing ban period. A fishery officer said the government would provide Rs 4,500 per active family as livelihood support during the ban period under the "livelihood nutritional support for socio-economical background of active traditional fisheries families for conservation of fisheries resources during the ban period".

As many as 3,638 fishermen would benefit under the scheme in Ganjam district, he said.

Berhampur(KCN): Fishermen under the banner of Odisha Traditional Fish Workers Union (OTFWU) demanded compensation of Rs 15,000 per month during the two-month marine fishing ban, imposed from Monday. The fishing ban in the sea will be in force from April 15 to June 14 in the entire coastline of Odisha by the government for conservation and effective management of fishery resources. The fishing ban spans 61

days and fishing by mechanised boats, big vessels and trawlers will not be allowed in the sea during the period. The traditional fishing crafts (up to 8.5 metres length) will be allowed for fishing in the sea, officials said. Awareness was conducted by engaging 'Samudra Mitra' in the coastal fisherman-dominated villages in Ganjam district for effective implementation of the ban order, a marine fishery officer said.

General secretary of OTFWU K Alleya said around 1.50 lakh traditional fishermen in the state, who were depending on fishery activities for their livelihood, would be affected due to the prohibition on fishing activities in the sea. "We demand the government should provide at least Rs 15,000 per family per month during the ban period", said Alleya.

They also demanded to include the fisherwomen in the beneficiary list as

'I felt it was time we tried someone else': Maxwell on asking to be left out of RCB's XI

NEW DELHI: Glenn Maxwell revealed after Royal Challengers Bengaluru's game against Sunrisers Hyderabad that he asked to be left out of the XI in order to refresh himself mentally and physically after a forgettable start to the season. Self-admittedly, the maverick Australia all-rounder entered IPL 2024 on the back of his best six month phase in international cricket but has been unable to translate that into runs for RCB, aggregating just 32 runs from six innings at an average of 5.33. "For me, personally, it was a pretty easy decision," Maxwell said on Monday (April 16) addressing the press conference after RCB's sixth defeat in seven games. "I went to Faf [du Plessis] and the coaches after the last game and said I felt it was

probably time we tried someone else. I have been in this situation in the past where you can keep playing and get yourself deeper into a hole. I think now is actually a good time for me to give myself a bit of a mental and physical break, get my body right. If I'm required to get in during the tournament, I can hopefully get back into a really solid mental and physical space where I can still have an impact. "We have had a pretty big deficiency straight after the powerplay, which has been my area of strength over the last couple of seasons. I felt like I wasn't contributing in a positive way with the bat, and with the results and the position we find ourselves on the table, I think it's a good time to give someone else an opportunity to show their

wares, and hopefully, someone can make that spot their own." Maxwell reflected on the season opener against Chennai Super Kings to illustrate the fickle nature of the format and his dramatic downturn in form. He was dismissed for a first-ball duck in that game, caught behind trying to run a Mustafizur Rahman delivery to third man. The 35-year-old had entered the season on a high, having hit two spectacular T20I hundreds, in Guwahati (vs India) and in Adelaide (vs West Indies), inside three months, right after an ODI World Cup campaign during which he scored a scarcely believable double hundred in a chase against Afghanistan. In between, Maxwell also enjoyed a decent BBL season for the Melbourne Stars, scoring 244 runs

from nine innings at a strike-rate of 173.57, producing quick, if not big runs. "T20 cricket can be like that sometimes - it's a pretty fickle game," he reflected. "Even if you look at the first game, I ran one off the middle of the bat to the keeper. I picked up the length really

well, saw a scoring opportunity, but opened the face a little bit too much. When you are going well, that goes wide of the gloves, you get a boundary, you are 4 off 1, and you are away for the tournament. "I probably just haven't got away - it's as simple as that. In the first few games, I feel I made reasonably good decisions, but I was still finding ways to get out. It can happen in T20 cricket and when it snowballs like that, you can go searching and try too hard and forget the basics of the game." Maxwell copped a blow to his hand while fielding in RCB's previous game away against Mumbai Indians and while scans cleared him of any serious injury, it may have accentuated the need for a physical and mental reboot. As it turned out, the clash against SRH saw the highest aggregate of runs - 549 - in a T20 match. He was asked if, in hindsight, he wished he had played one more game before this decision to rest. "I did notice during the powerplay that the pitch was not as slow and two-paced as it has been in the first few games," Maxwell replied. "And I realised it was probably a bad game to miss; it would have been nice to be out there batting.

"But as I said, I wanted to give myself not just the physical break but also the mental break to give myself the right to play professional cricket. I take a lot of pride in my performance, and I put in a lot of hard work behind the scenes to get my body right for every game. And it has been a pretty tough struggle, given my body is on the wrong side of 30. I think that physical and mental toll probably just wore me down a little bit." Maxwell has had three excellent seasons with RCB, aggregating 513 runs at 144.10, 301 runs at 169.1 and 400 runs at 183.49 between 2021 and 2023 respectively. In fact, the franchise's signing of Maxwell ahead for a whopping INR 14.25 crores had been fraught with risk. For it had been seven years since he turned heads and dropped jaws in IPL 2014 and subsequent gigs were either earned on that memory as well as periodic reminders of his ability in the Australian yellow.

Day Cups, three National Leagues and three Benson & Hedges Cups as a Kent cricketer. He was named President of Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC) in 2008, after serving as Kent Cricket's Club President in 2006, and was inducted into the ICC's Cricket Hall of Fame in 2009.

Simon Philip, said: "The Kent Cricket family is in mourning following the passing of one of its greatest ever players.

"Derek was an outstanding contributor to both Kent and England, winning trophies for Club and country and etching his name in the history books forevermore.

"Watching Derek weave his unique magic on a wet wicket was a privilege for all who were able to witness it. His induction into the ICC Hall of Fame shows the esteem in which he was held in world cricket.

"An advocate for growing our game worldwide whilst protecting our sport's rich heritage, Derek also made substantial contributions off the field as well as on it, and he will be sorely missed by everyone at Kent Cricket."

Sunrisers Hyderabad scale new heights in another hit-a-thon

Cummins would also get Mahipal Lomror to chop one onto his stumps, leaving RCB severely

dented. But that didn't matter much to Dinesh Karthik.

Even as the game appeared to be slipping away from RCB at 122/5 at the halfway stage, Karthik did not let go. He continued the hitting exhibition that had been on offer all night, using deft footwork and smart angles to smash five fours and seven sixes in his 35-ball 83. It was still not enough to prevent loss, but saved RCB a few blushes at the end.
