Max Temp Soars Above 40°C At 32 Odisha Towns, Baripada Boils At 44.8°C

**Bhubaneswar(KCN):**

There seems to be no respite from the severe heatwave prevailing across the state as about 32 towns in Odisha recorded maximum day temperatures above 40°C on Monday.

Baripada was the hottest place in the state today at 44.8°C, while Angul and Boudh recorded 44.3°C and 44.1°C respectively.

The mercury also soared to 44°C in Talcher and

Bhawanipatna.

The maximum temperatures at the twin cities of Cuttack and Bhubaneswar were 42.5°C and 41.3°C respectively.

Heatwave to severe heat wave conditions are likely to prevail over several districts of Odisha during the next 4 – 5 days.

The weather agency has advised people to take precautionary measures while going outside during peak hours of the day time between 11 AM – 3 PM.

The Bhubaneswar Meteorological Centre has predicted that due to

prevailing mainly Northwesterly/Westerly dry air and high solar insolation maximum temperature (Day Temperature) likely to be above normal by 3 to 6°C over some districts of Odisha during the next 4 to 5 days.

Delhi Police asks Telangana CM Reddy to join probe in Amit Shah's doctored video case: Sources

New Delhi(KCN): Delhi Police has asked Telangana Chief Minister Revanth Reddy to join its probe May 1 in connection with Union Home Minister Amit Shah's doctored video being circulated on social media, official sources said Monday. According to the sources, the police have issued notices to five members of the Telangana Congress, including its chief Reddy, who posted the video on X. Reddy has been asked to appear with his mobile phone allegedly used for posting the fake video on X, the sources said.

The Special Cell of the Delhi Police had Sunday registered an FIR after the Indian Cybercrime Coordination Centre (I4C), which is under the Ministry of Home Affairs, filed a complaint about the doctored video of Shah

Amid blazing heat, forest fires in Odisha's Similipal make life miserable for locals

Bhubaneswar(KCN): For the last eight days, forest fires have been raging in various parts of the eco-sensitive Similipal Sanctuary in the Mayurbhanj district amid a severe heat wave. This has made life miserable for the people living in the surrounding areas.

Worryingly, the fires have been spreading from one hill to another

with the blaze reported from three points in the Podadiha area. Columns of smoke billowing out from the fire points have enveloped many parts of the sanctuary.

Though the Forest Department has been carrying out fire-fighting exercises, it has not been able to contain the blaze.

Kolkata (PARTHA ROY): Inaugural edition of Bengal Pro T20 League will start from 11th June, immediately after IPL 2024.

Bengal Pro T20 League organised by Cricket Association of Bengal (CAB) and exclusively managed by Arivaa Sports, will take place after the conclusion of this season of the Indian Premier League (IPL). Each Franchise will be fielding both men's and women's team. While all men's matches shall take place at the historic Eden Gardens, women's matches will be played at the Jadavpur University, Salt Lake Campus Ground.



The tournament will take place over a 21-day window in June, with ten teams in both the men's and women's events. Indian apiculture industry under serious stress



Agricultural biodiversity is an important global natural resource that is slowly undergoing depletion and degradation due to various natural and predominantly anthropogenic causes. Unless we take appropriate steps for food conservation today, we may be hit hard by global agricultural biodiversity depletion to an alarming and irreversible level negative for the entire planet and human society. Unorganized and unskilled cheap labour force is the cornerstone of the agro-industry around the globe with special emphasis to developing and under developed nations across the globe. Apiculture both commercial, non-commercial as well as legal and illegal hunter gatherer type operations as seen in the mangrove forests of the Sunderbans in India (West Bengal) and Bangladesh is a perfect example of this ecological as well as economic erosion in particular.

the flowers of different mangrove species and their comb sizes are very big. Although some of the commercial beekeepers keep their bee boxes near the mangrove forest to facilitate collection of nectaries by commercial honey bees from the local mangrove plants. However, this effort has not been very commercially viable and successful compared to placing bee boxes in the conventional crop fields with standing crop in full bloom.

However, direct harvest of honey from the mangrove forest still remains the preferred choice of many in the Suburban region. Most of this hill type variety is exploited by extremely poor and marginal communities for their basic livelihood as mangrove honey has a high market price and demand in local, regional and international markets. But the damage to the bee populations due to crude unscientific method of honey collection as well as the vulnerability and high risk of human life deep inside the mangrove forest is a double edged sword. The honey collected is also contaminated with various impurities, dead insects, excretory materials, eggs, larvae due to crude collection process and lack of proper honey processing facilities

available to such marginal communities. Overall both the ecological cost and the human cost surpasses the small economic benefits made. Proper commercial apiculture practices are yet not quite common for people living in this region. Their attitude is still like that of short time hunting abs gathering g, both legally and illegally. The accidents that happen here due to tiger and crocodile attacks, snake bites, piracy, harassment by forest guards, money lenders and rural politicians have been negatively impacting their life and livelihood and rapidly destroying their local ecosystems. There is very little or zero support from the local government and related agencies.

Commercial apiculture is practiced successfully in many places across mainland China, South and South East Asia. The practice of culturing honey bees in bee boxes, collecting honey without damaging honey combs by simple hand operated machine by centrifugal force, filtering by musline cloths is known to many growers and you may find it in many villages. This has been an important livelihood for many marginal rural and aboriginal communities, forest fringe residents. The Indian Khadi Gramodyog provided training and sell bee

boxes to interested farmers. But the difficulty of Sunderban region is a well established fact especially due to various natural and anthropogenic factors. This is a highly sensitive subject that is in need of immediate attention for scientific culture by generating awareness and by providing proper training and support. But the ground realities are however extremely

stealing the money and not paying back making the banking industry sick. Then there is no problem for the government, administration as well as judiciary; the problems are negated. failure of payments of few thousand rupees if marginal farmers. Honey producers live at the mercy of these eminent socialites who are exploited at every stage. The honey

adulterate them with cheap sugar, synthetic colour and flavour and bottle them abs they land on your breakfast table at a reasonably high price. The best quality honey is imported to international markets to get our beneficiaries a massive profit and tax benefits. India and China are two big giant producers, consumers and distributors of adulterated honey.

Fairly recently the Center of Science at New Delhi demonstrated that all major honey samples from sealed bottles of reputed commercial manufacturers across India are openly selling adulterated honey using cheap sugar syrup indiscriminately. There is very little or no monitoring done knowingly or unknowingly by our regulatory agencies. China has taken honey adulteration to almost an artistic level of international excellence and repute.

M Kharge To Decide Amethi, Raebareli Candidates, Says Congress

New Delhi (KCN): Amid speculation over whether Gandhi family members would contest the Lok Sabha polls from Uttar Pradesh and Raebareli, the Congress on Monday said its Central Election Committee (CEC) has authorised party chief Mallikarjun Kharge to decide the candidates for the two constituencies.

The Uttar Pradesh Congress has urged the top party leadership to field Rahul Gandhi and Priyanka Gandhi Vadra from the two seats. Asked when the candidates for the two seats would be decided, she said.

Rahul Gandhi contested the Lok Sabha elections from Kerala's Wayanad, where polling took place on Friday in the second phase of the polls. He had said earlier that he will follow "whatever order" he gets from his party. Speculation has been rife that Rahul Gandhi might contest the Lok Sabha polls from Amethi, a seat he represented for three straight terms earlier, and Priyanka Gandhi from Raebareli, a seat that was previously held by her mother Sonia Gandhi.

Both seats are considered bastions of the Gandhi family and the local units of the Congress have demanded that the two scions of the family contest from there. Mr Gandhi won the Amethi seat in three consecutive Lok Sabha elections from 2004. BJP leader Smriti Irani wrested the seat in 2019. Mr Gandhi, who contested from both Amethi and Wayanad in 2019, had won the elections from Wayanad. Polling in Amethi and Raebareli will be held on May 20, in the fifth phase of the Lok Sabha polls. The Congress has forged an alliance with the Samajwadi Party in Uttar Pradesh and is contesting 17 Lok Sabha seats in the state.

Tapped Water For 73% Rural

Bhubaneswar(KCN): As severe heat wave prevails in the entire State, Department of Panchayatiraj and Drinking Water has been actively trying hard to provide drinking water across the State.

Sushil Kumar Lohani, Principal Secretary Panchayatiraj and Drinking Water is continuously monitoring the Drinking Water Supply Program. According to data reflected in the Jal Jeevan Mission dashboard, 73.12 percent of total rural households in the State provided with tapped drinking water

supply connection so far.

Out of total 88.68 lakh households in the State, 64.85 lakh households have functional tap connection which is 73.12 percent. Till now, 23.84 lakh (26.88%) rural households are yet to be provided with tap water supply connection.

Similarly, more than 38,213 villages out of 46,422 villages have been connected with piped water supply connections till now, with an achievement of 82.32 percent. Odisha has performed better than a few major States like

Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Jharkhand, West Bengal and Kerala.

As many as 18,668 villages in the State have been provided with 100 percent tap water supply coverage, which means all households in these villages have functional tap water supply.

As per the data, mineral-rich Keonjhar district tops in the list in the State where over 99.59 percent of households have a tap water supply, followed by Nuapada (98.83 percent), Bhadrak (95.20 percent), Deogarh



(89.73), Boudh (88.50), and Jharsuguda (85.75). Similarly, 82.96

percent of total households in Dhenkanal district have been provided with tap water connection while it was 80.90 percent in Kendrapara, 79.86

percent in Balasore, 78.29 percent in Sundergarh and 77.36 percent in Rayagada. Malkangiri district was at the bottom of the list where only 52.56 percent of total rural houses have tap water connection. It was preceded by Bolangir (53.94 percent) Gajapati (57.85%), Jagatsinghpur (58.15%), Samalpur (58.53%), and Nayagarh (60.76%). A total of Rs 4,869.07 crore has been utilized with 50:50 sharing by both State and Centre in Odisha during the last

financial year while an expenditure of Rs 4316.43 crore was made during 2022-23.

The Government of India had launched the Jal Jeevan Mission (JJM), being implemented in partnership with States, in August 2019. Drinking Water is a state subject, and hence, the responsibility of planning, approval, implementation, operation, and maintenance of drinking water supply schemes, including those under the Mission, lies with State Governments.

Odisha's Pride & Language Under Threat: PM Narendra Modi

Bhubaneswar(KCN): Before coming to Odisha for electioneering, Prime Minister Narendra Modi reiterated the issues raised by the BJP on Odisha's pride (Asmita) and Odia language to fight the general elections in the state.

Center Allows Onion Export



New Delhi(KCN): Director General Foreign Trade (DGFT) Santosh Sarangi has allowed export of 99,150 MT of onion to six neighbouring countries of Bangladesh, UAE, Bhutan, Bahrain, Mauritius and Sri Lanka. Onion export prohibition has been imposed to ensure adequate domestic availability against the backdrop of estimated lower Kharif and Rabi crops in 2023-24 as compared to previous year and increase demand in international market.

DGFT is the agency of the Ministry of Commerce and Industry of the Government of India responsible for administering laws regarding foreign trade. The National Cooperative Exports Limited (NCEL), the

agency for export of onion to these countries, sourced the domestic onions to be exported through e-platform at L1 prices and supplied to the agency or agencies nominated by the government of the destination country at the negotiated rate on 100% advance payment basis. The offer rate of NCEL to the buyers takes into account the prevailing prices in the destination market and also international and domestic markets. The quota allocated for export to the six countries are being supplied as per requisition made by the destination country. As the largest producer of onion in the country, Maharashtra is the major supplier of onions sourced by NCEL for export. The Government had also

allowed export of 2000 MT of white onion cultivated specially for export markets in Middle-East and some European countries. Being purely export oriented, production cost of the white onion is higher than other onions due to higher seed cost, adoption of good agricultural practice (GAP) and compliance to strict maximum residue limits (MRL) requirements. The procurement target for onion buffer out of Rabi-2024 under the Price Stabilisation Fund (PSF) of Department of Consumer Affairs has been fixed at 5 Lakh tons this year. The Central Agencies, viz., NCCF and NAFED are tying up local agencies such as FPOs/FPCs/PACs to support the procurement, storage and farmers

Rabeya rues continuous top order failures

Dhaka: Rabeya Khan, the Bangladesh all-rounder, blamed the failure of her team's top-order batting for their 44-run loss to India in the opening game of the five-match T20I series at the Sylhet International Cricket Stadium, on Sunday.

Chasing a target of 146 runs, Bangladesh skipper Nigar Sultana Joty struck 51 off 48 balls but she failed to get any support from the other end as the hosts could only manage 101 for 8 in their stipulated overs.

"The bowlers have been doing their job for the last six to seven months but unfortunately the top order... If a couple of them could've stayed for a while, we could have ended the game on a better note or at least taken it close," Rabeya told reporters following the game at SICS.

"Joty (Nigar) Apu is a responsible batter and in these kinds of situations, she plays till the end but we are unable to give her support and that is the



reason we are in this situation.

"If the top-order batter is scoring runs, it gets easy for other batters to score runs. Joty Apu is getting runs every day but there is no partnership from the top and that is why we are suffering.

"The target was chaseable but unfortunately we could not do it. The plan was to play one ball at a time, and there would be boundary-scoring opportunities. If we could

punish the bad balls, we should have chased down the score," she added. Meanwhile, India batter Yastika Bhatia said that they were learning to adapt to the conditions in Bangladesh, where they are set to play the T20 World Cup later this year. Despite getting a good start courtesy of Yastika, Shafali Verma and Harmanpreet Kaur, India struggled to accelerate in the death over and were restricted to 145 for 7. "I think compared to

India, there is a little bit of help on the wicket for the bowlers here," she said after top-scoring for India with a 36. "But still I think if we apply ourselves to the conditions and.. we also have come here two-three times in the last two years. So I think we have played a lot over here. So we are also adjusting and adapting. Indian cricket is always about adapting to the conditions and playing according to the conditions. So we don't

blame any condition, we have to play well, bat well.

"This series is very crucial for us. As a unit, we have to gel together and make the most of this series in terms of our plans, whether it is bowling, batting or fielding, we have to get used to the conditions. There might be changes in these six months but still I think it's very good practice for us," she said adding that she is finding it easy after her good run in the WPL.



Ruturaj surfs smoothly amidst choppy waves

Chennai: About a few weeks before the start of IPL 2024, when Ruturaj Gaikwad was yet to be officially announced as Chennai Super Kings' new captain, he was partaking on another challenge. In the team hotel that overlooked the Bay of Bengal on one side, he had some swimming lessons on a quiet evening, and the attention on him a far cry from what his erstwhile predecessor would command.

In many ways, CSK had 'soft-launched' his takeover of the side, keeping things under wraps and almost keeping him under a bubble wrap given the attention that the position has garnered. A little past the halfway stage, CSK have had mixed results so far, winning as many as they have lost, but over the last couple of games they have discovered their captain coming into his own in leading by way of example.

His hundred against Lucknow Super Giants had been pushed to second seat by Marcus Stoinis' match-winning effort. However, Ruturaj managed to draw the attention back on himself with an innings of similar quality against SRH. In each match, he had stuck to his methods, and not gone on to out-muscle the opposition as has been in vogue. His proficiency lay in finding the boundaries, and some degree of successful anticipation resulting in boundaries. It was one of the reasons why Michael Hussey,



his batting coach at CSK and a batter who was once in a similar mould, called him 'my favourite'.

The innings was peppered with delectable shot-making; at one point he was driving Shahbaz Ahmed inside out and then toying with Bhuvneshwar Kumar's lengths by punishing him for going short with a six and then lofting the fuller ball that followed for a boundary. All the while, it helped him score at a healthy strike-rate keeping up with the demands of what a pitch with a bit of grip demanded.

What he lacked as a power-hitter had been compensated to a large extent by other batting smarts working in top gear. And there was plenty of that as Hussey listed out.

"He's a great talent,

[has] great timing, [has] great placement, smart batsman as well. He knows when to attack, when to maybe soak up a bit of pressure. He plays spin bowling so well, plays fast bowling well, he can score all around the ground. He's almost one step ahead of the bowler most of the times," he said and added, "He's wonderful to watch."

The methods are seeped in an old-fashioned T20 batting wisdom where the onus is on length of an innings as much as the speed of it. Some of the good work done there, though, risks being masked by the exploits of explosiveness in the public eye, but Hussey insists that he's intent on transferring this knowledge to the next in line.

And in fact a lot of our younger players sitting in the sidelines, [I] sit with them and talk to them about what we're seeing with Ruturaj. Why has he been playing so good, how does he construct an innings. So they are great learning experiences for our younger players to see how he goes about it. Because it was another masterclass tonight, it really was."

Hussey chose to highlight Ruturaj's game-reading ability as a point to underline his thoughts on Ruturaj. "I think he is one of the smartest players going

around and he assesses the conditions so well. He even said to me 'It's a shame we're not playing in Kolkata or it's a shame we're not playing in Delhi.' Maybe in those particular grounds if he assesses the conditions, he might think about going aerial early. But perhaps here, when he takes a little bit of time to get settled on the pitch - it has certainly shown a few times here that with the brand new ball it has stuck a little bit on the pitch and then as the dew comes, that's when the seam becomes softer and it can skid on - that's when he can increase his strike-rate after.

"But initially, you need to sometimes take a bit of care, play some good shots along the ground. And that's where his placement has been so good and his strike-rate is so good as well. He knows his game so well, and that's a message to our younger guys as well, figuring out what your game. There's no point Shaik Rasheed trying to bat like MS Dhoni. He's got to figure out how best he bats, he's more a Ruturaj style of player. And we can try to fast-track some of these guys as well by watching Rutu play," said Hussey.

The lavish praise might come with a healthy dose of bias as Hussey was game to admit, but there'd be few contesting otherwise as Ruturaj swims against the tide and still keep moving his team forward.

New Delhi: 2022 semi-finalists New Zealand have named their T20 World Cup 2024 squad on Monday, 29 April, 3 days ahead of the ICC deadline. This marks the first time that an ICC World Cup tournament will feature matches played in the United States. 55 matches will be played across 9 venues in the tournament. The 2024 edition of the T20 World Cup will see an expansion in the number of participating teams, with 20 national teams competing, up from 16 in the previous tournament. The teams will initially be divided into four groups of five, with the top two teams from each group advancing to the Super 8 stage.
