The Untold Story of Displaced People! Lower Suktel Project

Sambalpur(KCN):Briffing media at Sambadik Bhawan NAPM office bearers said that, The Lower Suktel Irrigation Project on Suktel River, a major tributary of the river Mahanadi, has been started to irrigate parts of Odisha's Balangir and Sonpur districts and provide drinking water to Balangir city. The estimated cost of the project has increased from 217.13 crores in 1998 to about 4500 corers in 2018. Due to this project, more than twelve thousand five hundred families of about 56 villages have been displaced so far and 583 hectares of forest has been submerged in the dam. Before the last general election the state

government hastily filled the dam with water which has been compelled the residents to leave the village to save their life and in that shameful situation the district administration has launched the project. Though the government has offered compensation and rehabilitation, the resettlement packages have been inadequate and unfair. Protesters are continuing their struggle. local people were fighting against the displacement. Though the state government was constructing the project, the people who lost their land and houses have been given different types of compensation. Lower Suktel project is a strong example of forest and environmental



destruction, so noted environmental activist and Green Nobel winner of Odisha Mr. Prafulla Samantara has been associated with the anti-project movement since the beginning. By the initiation of National Alliances of People's Movements(NAPM) headed by Prafulla Samantarai, Lingaraj Pradhan and Saroj Mohanty, a team has been formed taking five members from different categories with the

objective to know the ground reality and status of displaced people after the inauguration of project, comprising with Saroj Mohanty, a prominent writer and Secretary of Pashim Odisha KSSS, Biswajit from GPF, Mahendra Parida GS- AICCTU, Narendra Mohanty, Convener,INSAF, Hara Bania and Mr. Satya Banchhor. The Committee Recommend for the Right to Fair Compensation and

Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013 (Land Acquisition Act 2013) and in addition in the case of Scheduled Tribe community, the Forest Right Act-2006 must be followed. Allocating land and houses to the people in

temporary camps in such areas which must be conducive to human settlements with communication facilities, and with schools, colleges and employment opportunities. Landless displaced families should be given compensation as land and housing. Administration should stop forcing people to become beneficiaries of Vasundhara scheme. Arrangements should be made for the admission/ education of all dropout students by the cost of government in various educational institutions. It is unconstitutional to

deprive families and villagers from the basic amenities who have not yet left the village. The facilities like Anganwadi, schools, Janani Surakshya, providing job through MGNREGA, drinking water should be made available unconditionally. The state and national human rights commission should pay attention to this type of human rights violation and take proper remedies. Brick and concrete houses should be given instead of tin houses and deduction of Rs.1 lakh for providing of tin made house from their compensation money

should be returned. All eligible people of all families should get Labour Card, Ration Card and Health Card as soon as possible. The administration must provide and create opportunity for employment for their livelihood. Re-survey should be done for unsurveyed village like Kuniapali as to respect the order of Orissa High Court and Proper and fair compensation to all displaced families and especially for landless families must be reviewed further and concrete action should be taken as soon.

Three groups in fray for key to Ferozshah Kotla Stadium

It was early wintery morning of November 10, 1948, a 10 year-old cricket-crazy kid purchased a 5 season ticket to watch 1948-49 India West Indies series first Test at Ferozshah Kotla. The decennary enthusiast reached the ground early to occupy a vintage seat at the Fort end and watched closely the swinging balls of Dattu Phadkar, C o m m a n d u r Rangachari, Prior Jones and Gerry Gomez while guiles of Vinoo Mankad, Jimmy Cameron and Robert Christiani mesmerized the young cricket enthusiast. The brilliant strokes of Clyde Walcott, Everton Weekes, KC Ibrahim, Lala Amarnath were breath-taking while match-saving knocks of Hemu Adhikari (unbeaten 114 & 29) and Chandu Sarwate

(37 & 35 n.o.) left a lasting impression. The most exciting moment came while the teenager had just started feeling at home at Kotla when pacer C o m m a n d u r Rangachari bowled neck and crop George Headley for paltry 2 runs with the visitor's on mat at 27 for 3. Sadly, it was the end of the road for the illustrious career of batsman baptised as "Black Bradman". Since then much water has flown down the holy (now dangerously polluted) River Yamuna. It will be pertinent to point out that Firoz Shah Tughlaq was the 19th Sultan of Delhi from 1351 to 1388. He was a sports-lover who built a Polo ground adjacent to present Willingdon Pavilion where he used play Chaugan (mini Polo). The serene Yamuna River flowing nearby added another meaning to the relaxation as polo did to the ruler of his kingdom. Willingdon Pavion owes its origin to the rivalry between Maharaja Bhupinder Singh of Patiala and

Benaras cricket-loving ruler Maharajkumar of Vizianagram popularly known as (Vizzy). Patiala outplayed his rival in pleasing the Viceroy Lord Willingdon by donating a gold cup Ranji Trophy national championship to honour cricket wizard KS Ranjitsinhji of Nawanagar state of Gujarat who played for England. Vizzy restored the parity with the British ruler by building Willingdon Pavilion at Kotla. Actually, during the British Raj, the Englishmen built this ground in 1883 to play cricket. Since the Delhi & District Cricket Association (DDCA) elections are round the corner, Kotla has become a hub for the members who are converging in large numbers to assess the ground realities. This year election has become a close contest with the entry of Kirti Azad MP, ex Test Cricketer and member of the 1983 World Cup wining Indian team in fray as Presidential candidate against the outgoing Rohan Jaitley, a legal luminary and a

Raj Kapoor: ‘Ab Dilli Door Nahin’

For Dr. J.P. Sharma ‘Trikhha’, well-known author and Vaastu expert, passing from Regal theatre at Connaught Place in capital bring back memories of yesteryears when used to watch films made by Raj Kapoor like Ram Teri Ganga Meli, Sri 420, Boot Polish Awaara and many more with his parents. Raj Kapoor always preferred his films to open at Regal or Moti picture halls. Regal held a special place in his heart. Many of his most beloved classics, including Sangam, Mera Naam Joker, Satyam Shivam Sundaram, Boot Polish, and Jis Desh Mein Ganga Behti Hai, premiered at Regal and Moti, enjoying significant box-office success. Sadly, Regal shuttered its doors in 2017, followed by Moti a little later. As film historian Dr. Manish Chaudhary of

Daulat Ram college points out, “He (Raj Kapoor) considered Delhi his second home. This affection stemmed not only from the fact that his eldest daughter, Ritu Kapoor Nanda, was married here, but also from his frequent visits for the premieres of his RK Banner films.” Tragically, Delhi also became the city where Raj Kapoor breathed his last in 1988. Just days before his demise, he received the prestigious Dadasaheb Phalke Award from then President R. Venkataraman at the Siri Fort Auditorium. His health took a sudden downturn soon after. Grappling with severe breathing difficulties, he was rushed to the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS). Despite the best efforts of doctors, led by Dr. J.N. Pandey, he succumbed to complications from his asthma. Raj Kapoor’s death in Delhi added a bittersweet layer to his relationship with the city. Raj Kapoor’s connection with Delhi arguably began when he produced ‘Ab Dilli Door Nahin’ in 1957. Penned

by renowned author Rajendra Singh Bedi, this film featured actor Motilal, a relative of singer Mukesh, both of whom hailed from Nai Sarak. Interestingly, a young Amjad Khan,

Kapoor had a significant presence in Delhi. He resided in Princes Park during his term as a nominated Rajya Sabha member (1952-1960). Prime Minister

The ties between Raj Kapoor and Delhi deepened further when his daughter, Ritu, married Rajan Nanda of the Escorts Group in 1970. The Nanda family, originally from Lahore, had established a

Trikhha, who knows the Raj Kapoor family, says Rajan Nanda’s family would later be linked to the Bachchans when his son, Nikhil Nanda, married Shweta Bachchan. Today, Nikhil heads the Escorts Group. Moreover, Rajan Nanda’s father, H.S. Nanda, also founded the Escorts Hospital, further intertwining the two families and their legacies with the city. Even before Raj Kapoor, Prithviraj

Jawaharlal Nehru, seeking his advice on art and culture, had reportedly requested him to take the position. Their discussions on the role of art in the newly independent nation were crucial, and Prithviraj Kapoor is credited with suggesting the establishment of the prestigious National School of Drama (NSD) in 1959. Avid film buff Dr. J.P. Sharma ‘Trikhha’ says that Prithviraj Kapoor often resided in Delhi during Parliament

term, Prithviraj Kapoor visited the Golcha cinema in Daryaganj to personally witness the audience reception of his magnum opus, Mughal-e-Azam, which he was delighted with. The Kapoor family’s connection with Delhi continued through subsequent generations. Karishma Kapoor, Raj K a p o o r ’ s granddaughter, also married into a prominent Delhi family. Her husband, Sanjay Kapur, was part of the

Pindi Jewellers family in Connaught Place. Although that marriage was short-lived, it further solidified the Kapoor family’s connections to the city. Similarly, another g r a n d d a u g h t e r , Riddhima Kapoor, wed Bharat Sahni, a businessman from South Delhi. Shashi Kapoor’s daughter, Sanjana Kapoor, married author and wildlife expert Valmiki Thapar, with the couple now residing in Delhi on Malcha Marg. His aunt is the famous historian, Dr Romila Thapar. While Raj Kapoor was strongly associated with Regal, his brother Shammi Kapoor had his own cinematic connection with Delhi – Plaza cinema. He was a partner in Plaza in the mid-1960s alongside film producer F.C. Mehra. Shammi Kapoor was perhaps the only member of the Kapoor clan to have owned a stake in a cinema hall. Shashi Kapoor also found himself intertwined with Delhi through his work. One of his early films, "Householder," was filmed primarily in a large house near Times

House in Daryaganj owned by Jaidev Trivedi, a prominent theatre artist and Hindi newsreader. Trivedi recounted that Prithviraj Kapoor visited the house with Shashi Kapoor. Is alcoholism classified as a brain disease or a brain disorder?

Alcoholism is a complex condition that affects both mental and physical health. Individuals with alcoholism are those who have lost the capacity to manage their alcohol consumption. An individual struggling with alcoholism is unlikely to regain control over their drinking habits. Over an extended duration, the situation deteriorates rather than improves. Consequently, the sole r e c o m m e n d a t i o n proposed is complete abstinence. A medical detox typically serves as the initial step in this process. Medical professionals knowledgeable about alcoholism concur that it is not possible to transform an alcoholic into a normal drinker. While science holds the potential to achieve this in the future, it has not yet reached that point. In 1956, the American Medical Association classified alcoholism as a disease, primarily to enable physicians to bill both patients and insurers for the treatment of this condition. I was involved in the alcohol and drug

treatment industry from 1985 to 1992, with short stints as a consultant in 2009 and 2014. Alcoholism does not align with the disease model, although there are indeed biochemical and biogenetic factors that may predispose individuals to develop a drinking problem. Currently, medical researchers are unable to identify a single gene on a specific chromosome as the definitive cause of alcoholism; however, there are four or five genetic markers that suggest a predisposition to the condition. Alcoholism leads to cellular damage in the brain as well as in other major organ systems of the body. Although alcohol can cause damage to brain cells, the human brain possesses millions of unused cells that can compensate for this loss. This cellular damage represents the physiological basis of addiction. The destruction of sufficient cells in the human body results in a craving for additional alcohol, simply to achieve a sense of feeling "normal" or acceptable. For example, physical dependency. Excessive dead cells ultimately lead to brain damage in individuals with chronic alcoholism. The liver, responsible for metabolizing alcohol, starts to encounter difficulties in performing its function due to cellular damage. The pancreas

e x p e r i e n c e s inflammation. Stomach ulcers can occur. The kidneys' function decreases. The ability to filter toxins from the body diminishes. For the chronic alcoholic, the body can suffer damage in various degrees as a direct consequence of alcohol consumption. The three main parts of the patient's brain, the prefrontal cortex (the part of understanding), the hippocampus (the part of thinking), and the amygdala (the part of anxiety), which alcohol numbs, are the main and real cause of the disease of alcoholism. As a result, the patient loses his intelligence and does not understand even when family members explain it to him. His mind constantly replays a series of thoughts about alcohol consumption. This series of thoughts prevents him from quitting alcohol, and he consistently experiences anxiety. Alcohol causes a physical disease, disorder, or problem known as liver damage. Take a look at alcohol from this perspective: do you know how rubbing alcohol is painful to your skin when you have a cut? In order to eliminate microorganisms, it is used as a disinfectant. Although they have distinct molecular structures, beverage alcohol and isopropyl alcohol are essentially the same chemical and share characteristics. One is taken by mouth, while the

other is applied topically to wounds and cuts in order to alleviate pain and promote healing. When they come into touch with cells, both types of alcohols have the same effect: they destroy those cells. Hard liquor is a poison, which means that it causes your throat to burn and dry up. One reason why people use alcohol is because it has the ability to change their mood by attaching itself to certain receptors in the brain. You could experience feelings of euphoria, relaxation, and so forth. The fermentation of hops, which gives beer its distinctive flavour, is the process by which beer is formed. Beer includes the same kind of alcohol as wine. Grapes are fermented to produce wine. Therefore, the effects of hard liquor, wine, and beer on cells are same; the only differences are in the technique of manufacturing and the amount of alcohol ingested. In other words, the only difference between a shot glass of bourbon and a can of beer that is 12 ounces is that the bigger volume of beer causes an increase in the amount of urine that is produced while drinking it. Why do individuals develop alcoholism? To begin, both addiction and mental diseases have a hereditary component, which means that environment is not the

only factor in these conditions. Regardless of how well life has been going up to that point, a person who comes from a family that has been in and out of rehabilitation and chooses to drink one day to celebrate or hang out with friends is a lot more likely to have problems with alcohol in the future. It is also impossible to know for certain that "everything in their lives is going well." I have met a great number of people who seemed to have everything and were well-liked by a great number of people. As long as they did not discuss what was going on, I would have been completely unaware of the following: Substance misuse in the household a relationship that is abusive Having a gang of pals sexually assault you Having one's family turn their backs on one following a death in the family They were being told by their own perfectionism that they were not talented enough. Having to deal with a significant medical problem Every night, parents argue with each other at home. An abortion or miscarriage Having a fiancé in a conflict zone Growing up with the experience of surviving a school shooting It is impossible for

anyone's life to be flawless, even if it seems to be so from the outside. Some individuals are very secretive and keep their negative traits hidden from everyone save a select few. As a means of covering up their suffering, some people become achievers. Certain individuals just do not want to discuss it. Why is the treatment of the brain more important than the liver? When the patient suffers from any physical disease/disorder/problem due to alcohol, the family members' direct attention goes towards the treatment of the patient's liver. The family members are not to blame for this. In fact, they do not understand the disease of alcoholism. Innocent family members keep wasting their valuable time and money by treating the patient's liver. When the patient's liver partially recovers, the family members experience a false sense of comfort, unaware that the liver treatment has not cured the patient's alcoholism, but rather exacerbates it. When the patient comes home from the hospital, he starts drinking alcohol again. The patient's family members can learn valuable lessons from this situation. The family members should learn that treating the patient's alcoholism, which includes brain damage or numbness, instead of treating the liver from the outset

prevents the patient's disease from worsening and avoids wasting their time and money. Sometimes, delaying treatment can incur significant costs. Also, it's a request to many doctors and clinics treating alcoholic liver patients to advise the family members as a matter of humanity that the patient cannot give up alcohol by treating the liver alone. Alcoholism, the primary cause of liver damage, requires more intensive treatment. Scientific treatment of the brain They detoxify the patient's body and brain. Later, through special medicines and special therapies such as R. T. M. S. therapy (repetitive transcranial magnetic stimulation), they treat the parts of the brain that have become numb due to the disease, the hippocampus (part of thinking), the prefrontal cortex (part of understanding), and the amygdala (part of anxiety) and the cells formed in the brain due to alcohol addiction. Once the disease heals these parts of the brain and destroys the cells, the patient begins to comprehend everything; his personality transforms, and he begins to understand and fulfill his responsibilities towards himself and his family. The thoughts and restlessness about alcohol disappear from his mind, and he gives them up forever.

The bottom line is, there is no cure for alcoholism since it is a chronic illness; nevertheless, it can be handled in the same way that chronic diabetes may be maintained successfully. If not treated or controlled properly, both disorders have the potential to cause early mortality. First and foremost, cease all alcohol consumption. It is noted that the brain is the final major organ to achieve “full” functioning after an individual has consumed alcohol excessively. Consume highly nutritious foods not only for your brain but for your entire body as well. Aim to minimize your consumption of junk food. I knew someone whose struggle with alcoholism was so severe that when she finally achieved sobriety, it took her a considerable amount of time to even read the Big Book. However, she persevered and ultimately found her way back to her “normal.” Every day, you might observe variations in your thought processes and information processing, yet it can take up to three years (and sometimes longer) for the brain to revert to its previous state.

Chilika: A fragile ecosystem at risk of collapse



Chilika,(KCN): famous for its rich natural heritage and beautiful ecosystem, is Asia's largest brackish water lagoon, a Ramsar site, and one of the biodiversity hotspots in the country. It's a unique habitat that supports 24 species of mammals, 221 species of birds, 61 species of reptiles, 30 species of decapoda, and 136 species of mollusca. Some critically endangered and endangered species such as Pallas' fish eagle, spoon-billed sandpiper, bar-tailed godwit, Barkudia insularis, finless porpoise, Irrawaddy, bottlenose, humpback dolphins, fishing cats and many more are found here. Chilika is also home to over 700 species of plants including seven rare and 11 endemic ones. Almost 80-90 per cent of Irrawaddy dolphin population resides here because they prefer water less than 20m deep,

abundant food supply, better water quality, isolation and to stay close to fresh water and sea mouth. It's a diverse habitat of fresh and salt water, shoreline, rocky islands, salt marshes and spits, sandbars and rivers like Daya, Bhargavi, Ratnachira, Luna, Kusumi, Bada, Rushikulya meet the sea here. The ecosystem provides livelihood to more than two lakh fishermen in various ways. Already climate change, habitat destruction, illegal prawn culture, pesticide contamination and poaching are going on for decades, causing serious damage to this fragile ecosystem. Any further pressure on it will affect the health of the lagoon and ultimately lead to its disappearance. The majority of residents of this region belong to vulnerable communities, primarily comprising poor fishermen who rely

entirely on Chilika for their livelihood. Their dependence spans various activities including fishing, boating for transportation and tourism like bird and dolphin watching. A large-scale project such as the proposed two-lane coastal highway (NH-516A) over Chilika, connecting Gopalpur and Satapada, in such a sensitive region will undoubtedly impact its ecological health. The construction of concrete structures, vehicular pollution (noise, artificial light, plastic waste) and 24*7 activities will introduce significant environmental stress. Additionally, activities such as drilling, risk of oil spill, smoke emissions could cause irreparable damage to Chilika's fragile ecosystem over time. Like other cetaceans, Irrawaddy dolphins are highly sensitive to noise and artificial light.

In Chilika lagoon, they are geographically isolated and are accustomed to this area. Habitat fragmentation and various forms of pollution are likely to have a significant impact on their behaviour, migration, communication, hunting and resting periods. Likewise, migratory and residential birds will experience stress, particularly at night during their feeding, resting and perching time. Same will happen with nocturnal mammals and other species. The potential consequences of such a project include a decline of diversity due to reduced bird activity, drop in fish population and possible endangerment of dolphins, which are vital to the lake's biodiversity. This proposed project could severely impact the livelihood of residents. Tourism could also partly impact as some visitors may opt to explore this Ramsar site on vehicle. Just like the pollution in the areas surrounding the Mahanadi, Kathajodi, Daya and other bridges, the peripheral zones of this bridge too will become polluted with polythene, cigarette butts, alcohol and water bottles, wrappers and remnants from worship rituals.

108 Ambulance staffers shut down GPS in protest

Chhatrapur(KCN): Staffers of the government's 108 Ambulance service have launched a protest raising several demands at the Sub-divisional Hospital here Wednesday. They have demanded wage revision, reduction in

duty hours, and most importantly, reinstatement of the sacked 100 employees. The staffers have shut down GPS facility in the ambulances, resulting in complete disconnection of contact with the control centre. The agitating

108 Ambulance employees said that they are prepared to provide the services without GPS till their demands are conceded. However, it is not possible for general public to establish contact with ambulance without

active GPS facility. Due to the disruption in the free emergency health services, patients are forced to look for alternative arrangements to get their patients to the hospital, which could be life-threatening for critical patients.
