Dialysis facility to start soon in Bonaigarh SDH

BJP's 12-hour Kalahandi dist bandh passes off peacefully

Sundargarh(KCN): In a sigh of relief for residents of Bonai block and adjacent areas in this district, haemodialysis facility will be available soon in the Bonaigarh Sub-Divisional Hospital, sources said Thursday. Preparations for this have already been completed and the facility will be operational within next few days. Patients suffering from kidney ailments who require dialysis support would be able to avail of the services from this facility. This will come as a big relief to the people with renal challenges in the area, who were earlier forced to visit either Rourkela or Sundargarh headquarters town for availing this essential service. This involved huge pocket expenditure to be incurred by the patients or their relatives and also life risk for the patients during emergencies. Notably, a large number of people with renal challenges require



dialysis support regularly two to three times a week. In those cases taking patients to the hospitals of Sundargarh and Rourkela for regular dialysis was very challenging and the relatives often discontinue the necessary procedure leaving the patients resigned to their fate. This was one of the demands presented before the then 5T Secretary and current 5T Chairman Kartik Pandian by the local community members during his visit to Sundargarh in March 2023. Later, Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik

directed to set up the dialysis unit immediately at the sub-divisional hospital in Bonaigarh. Now, with dialysis system in place at Bonai SDH, the patients can easily access the services without undertaking frequent long-distance travels. The new dialysis center at Bonai SDH is equipped with cutting-edge technology and operated by a team of seasoned professionals dedicated to providing top-notch healthcare to individuals grappling with renal challenges. The CDMO and PHO, Sundargarh, Dr Dharani Ranjan Satapathy expressed enthusiasm

about the imminent launch. “The establishment of this dialysis center represents a pivotal step in our mission to offer comprehensive healthcare solutions to our community. Our focus has always been on providing accessible, high-quality care, and this new facility reinforces our dedication to that cause”, he said. The centre boasts of a range of modern dialysis equipment, ensuring optimal treatment for patients requiring renal support. More than 400 dialysis cases can be attended through this

setup every month. The setup has four dialysis machines for haemodialysis services, which will be available round the clock. The centre will ensure that that no patient has to wait for more than 24 hours from the scheduled dialysis session. All the services here would be offered free of cost to all patients referred by the district and sub-district hospitals. Over five lakh population of Bonaigarh, Lahunipada, Gurundia and Koira blocks would be benefited from this initiative, the report added.

Bhawanipatna(KCN): The 12-hour bandh called by the BJP in Kalahandi district in support of farmers hit normal life Thursday, with markets and educational institutions remaining shut and vehicles off the roads, police said. Emergency services were exempt from the bandh, which was mostly peaceful, police said. The bandh was called by the opposition BJP demanding justice for farmers who allegedly face problems at different government paddy procurement centres. The saffron party demanded relief from



‘katni chatni’ (deduction of certain amount of paddy) by millers during paddy procurement. They also claimed that farmers were forced to go for distress sale of cotton and demanded lowering of electricity tariff and removal of country liquor manufacturing units in

the district. BJP district unit president Artatran Mohapatra said the party called the bandh against the government’s anti-farmer policies. The bandh was aimed at awakening the government from slumber as millers looted the farmers, he said.

Teen kingpin, older associates arrested for operating narco syndicate spanning from Delhi to Odisha

New Delhi/Nayagarh(KCN): A 19-year-old kingpin of a narco syndicate, was arrested along with four others for supplying drugs in the national capital and its peripheries, a Delhi Police official said Friday, adding that the chain of the syndicate ran from Delhi to Odisha. The gang leader was identified as Harsh Vardhan, a resident of Gopalpur, Delhi, and his associates Ramesh

Kumar Sharma alias Sonu (45), a resident of Tilak Nagar, Amit Kumar Tiwari alias Jam (29), a resident of Raghunagar, and Arul Pandian (25), Jal Vihar, Lajpat Nagar while the source of cannabis was identified as Bishwajeet Mahapatra alias DJ (23), a resident of district Nayagarh, Odisha. The Special Commissioner of Police (Crime Branch) Ravindra Singh Yadav said that a specific input

was received that a member of the drug syndicate would come to deliver a huge consignment of high quality of cannabis from Odisha to Delhi in the area of Gandhi Vihar. A trap was laid and Vardhan was apprehended along with the 22.786 kg of cannabis. On interrogation, it is revealed that Vardhan has recently raised a network of drug supply in the area of Delhi-NCR to earn

easy money. “He makes his customers in different parts of Delhi who can purchase cannabis from him on a regular basis. To expand the illegal business, he visited Odisha to check the source and supply of cannabis. Thereafter, he started visiting Bhuvneshwar, Odisha regularly (twice or thrice in a month) for purchasing cannabis and has been supplying the same in Delhi since the last five to six months,” said Yadav.

OREDA Floats Solar Boats



Bhubaneswar(KCN): With an aim to make Chilika Lake a zero emission zone, the State Government has decided to introduce solar powered boats in Chilika Lake soon. For this purpose, Odisha Renewable Energy Development Agency (OREDA) invited e-tender for design, engineering, manufacturing, supply, transportation, deployment of 20 seater solar electric boats, with zero emission including comprehensive maintenance for two years at various places

of the Chilika Lake. Chilika Lake, situated in the eastern part of India, is a biodiversity site and is blessed with a distinct assemblage of oceanic and fresh water. Being a blue lake lagoon, it is house to many migratory birds during the winter season and house of some endangered species of Dolphins. The lake has extremely rich fishery resources and helps in generating instant employment and livelihoods to many fishers and non-fishers (dependent on tourism) residing in and around it. Therefore, boat

motorization has resulted in climate vulnerability. To address the climate challenge and reduce the noise, water, and air pollution the Government of Odisha, wants to transit the water mobility sector in Chilika to clean mobility solutions, they said. The Government decided to replace the mechanised boats in use in rivers, lakes, sea and water bodies with solar powered boats for transportation of passengers as well as goods. It aims at reducing environmental

pollution and transport cost of water communication, sources said. It is expected to bring down the transport cost of mechanised boats by Rs 7 lakh per annum. If the pilot project becomes successful, it will be extended to other waterways in the state, sources informed. The successful bidder will have to provide the shore charging station/ infrastructure for charging of boats near the jetty (fishing boats) and harbours (OTDC and CDA’s tourism boats) as per norms set for the EV charging. Further, the Successful bidder will have to ensure that the module mounting structures must be designed to be completely non-invasive (without any grouting/ chipping) on the rooftop space. The boats will have an adequate protection system as per the requirement of the site by taking lightning, wind speed, rainy season, other climatic conditions, sudden surges in voltage and current, etc.

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The contribution of agriculture is vital in making Viksit Bharat@2047



Agriculture being a State subject, the State Government is primarily responsible for the growth and development of agriculture sector and developing perspective plans for their respective States and ensuring effective implementation of the programmes/schemes. However, Government of India supplements the efforts of the State Governments through various Schemes / Programmes / reforms and policies, such as - Unprecedented enhancement in budget allocation; Fixing of MSP at one-and-a half times the cost of production; Increase in procurement from farmers; Income support to farmers through PM KISAN; Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana (P M F B Y) ; Institutional credit for agriculture sector; Providing Soil Health Cards to farmers; Promotion of organic farming in the country; Neem Coating of Urea; Agri Infrastructure Fund; Promotion of

FPOs Scheme; National Bee and Honey Mission (NBHM); Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchai Yojana (PMKSY); Micro Irrigation Fund; Agricultural Mechanization; Changes in Disaster Relief Standards; Setting up of E-NAM extension Platform; Improvement in farm produce logistics; Introduction of Kisan Rail; Creation of a Start-up Eco system in agriculture and allied sector, etc. Government has taken several steps for increasing investment in agriculture sector such as enhanced institutional credit to farmers; promotion of scientific warehousing infrastructure for increasing shelf life of agricultural produce; setting up of Agri-tech Infrastructure Fund for making farming competitive and profitable; developing commercial organic farming etc. Government is implementing various schemes for supply of farm inputs, like seeds, fertilizers, agricultural machinery and equipment, irrigation facilities, institutional credit, etc., at subsidized rates to the farmers in the country. Government has recently taken several

steps for increasing investment and growth in agriculture sector which include creation of Long-Term Irrigation Fund (LTIF), Micro Irrigation Fund for water use efficiency, promotion of commercial organic farming, etc. Government of India has launched the Central Sector Scheme of financing facility under Agriculture Infrastructure Fund (AIF) to boost Agriculture Infrastructure relating to post harvest management and community farming assets. Under this scheme entities such as farmers, agri entrepreneurs, starts up, Central/ State agency or local body sponsored public private partnership projects etc. can take benefit for setting up eligible infrastructure projects. Under Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana (RKVY) Scheme of Ministry of Agriculture, grants-in-aid is given to state governments on the basis of the projects approved in State Level Sanctioning Committee Meeting (SLSC). States can take up projects for the development of Agriculture and allied sector in Public

Private Partnership (PPP) for Integrated Agriculture Component. Under Mission for Integrated Development of Horticulture (MIDH) of this Ministry financial assistance in the range of 35% to 55% of eligible projects cost is available in the form of credit linked back ended for creation of post-harvest management infrastructure like Pack Houses, Pre-cooling units, Integrated pack houses, Refrigerator van, Primary/mobile Processing unit, cold storage etc. farm gate level to consumption level. The post-harvest component is demand / entrepreneurs-driven from among entrepreneurs, private companies, cooperatives, farmers groups etc. through commercial ventures for which assistance is available through respective State Horticulture Mission. The Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi (P M - K I S A N) Scheme is being implemented with a view to provide income support to all landholding farmer families across the

country, to enable them to take care of expenses related to agriculture and allied activities as well as domestic needs. The Scheme, aims to provide a payment of Rs.6000/- per year for the farmers' families with cultivable land holding, subject to certain exclusions. The financial benefit of Rs.6000/- is being released by the Central Government in three 4-monthly instalments of Rs.2000/- over the year directly into the bank accounts of the eligible farmers under Direct Benefit Transfer mode. Further, Government of India has launched the Aatmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyan (ABA) to strengthen Infrastructure, Logistics, Capacity Building, Governance and Administrative Reforms for Agriculture. For ages, India's economy under colonial rule remained basically agrarian and about 85 percent of the country's population earns their livelihood from agriculture. In those days, the French traveller, Bernier, described seventeenth-century Bengal as richer than Egypt because of its abundance of cotton,

silk, rice, sugar and butter. Butnow, declining contribution of the agricultural sector to the economy has always been a challenge for every Indian government. In a recent research study, conducted under the guidance of Prof. Sunil Goyal, Dean, School of Agriculture and Rural Development, Dr. B. R. Ambedkar University of Social Sciences, Dr. Ambedkar Nagar (MHOW), Madhya Pradesh, it was revealed that the biggest challenge before the country at this time is to increase the GDP contribution of agriculture sector to 22 percent. The contribution of the agricultural sector was 55.4 per cent to GDP in the financial year 1950-51, but declined due to less emphasis on modernisation and the steady rise of other sectors. As per the estimate released by the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI), the Gross Value Added (GVA) of agriculture and allied sectors was 20.1 per cent in 2020-21, it was 19 per cent in 2021-22 and it declined again to 18.3 per cent in 2022-23. Simultaneously, the

Gross Value Added (GVA) growth of agriculture and allied sectors was 4.1 per cent in 2020-21, 3.5 per cent in 2021-22 and it again declined to 3.3 per cent in 2022-23. India is an agriculturally rich country with millions of acres of fertile land and abundant natural resources. There are many factors affecting agriculture in India including soil, terrain and geographical location. Agricultural production mainly depends on the climatic conditions as each crop requires a different temperature/ environment to grow. Infrastructure is quite important in agricultural production as it compensates for the basic requirements of the region. Agriculture provides most of the livelihood opportunities in India and contributes a lot to the GDP. It employs more than 60 per cent of the labour force. Agriculture has a significant impact on the Indian economy and society. The average annual growth rate is 4.6 per cent. In the last six years, India's agriculture sector has expanded rapidly. The research study further suggested that the

contribution of agriculture to GDP can be increased by encouraging expansion of crop land, changing the production mix, and implementing technological advancements such as the use of HYV seeds. Moreover, the government should encourage more mechanization and the use of modern technologies. Investment in post-harvest infrastructure is needed to improve the earning capacity of farmers. Farmers should use innovative technologies like drone spraying to increase yield. This will also reduce expenses and labour time. Rural development should be broad-based and should include small/ medium scale rural industries. Adequate industrial policy is needed today for the development of such industries.

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Preventing Gender-based Violence: A Fear Free World

The strengthening of global commitment to counterpart this plague is a movement whose time has come." -Asha Rose Migiro Sexism leading to gender-based violence remains a pervasive issue that affects individuals worldwide, transcending gender, age, ethnicity, and socio-economic backgrounds. This problem takes numerous forms, including domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, coercive control, and harmful cultural practices, hindering the achievement of gender equality and endangering human rights. Nevertheless, the world is uniting to confront this challenge head-on and create a

safer, fairer, and more inclusive global society. Gender-based violence is deeply ingrained, as evident in staggering statistics that emphasize its urgency. These crimes are not only confined to a specific region, culture, or economic background but also permeate across borders, affecting individuals in both developed and developing nations. The World Health Organization (WHO) reports that one in three women worldwide experiences physical or sexual violence during their lifetime. The impact of gender crimes is far-reaching, affecting victims physically, mentally, and emotionally. Survivors often suffer from long-lasting physical injuries, sexually transmitted infections, unwanted pregnancies, and psychological trauma such as depression, anxiety, and post-traumatic stress disorder. Beyond the immediate consequences, gender crimes inflict deep scars on the fabric of society, perpetuating a cycle of fear, silence, and inequality. Victims may

be silenced due to cultural stigma, fear of backlash, lack of support networks, or weak judicial systems that fail to protect or provide justice. It is crucial to acknowledge that men, as well as individuals identifying as non-binary or gender non-conforming, can also become victims of gender-based violence, highlighting the complex nature of this issue. Furthermore, as awareness surrounding gender identities and sexual orientations expands, it becomes evident that gender-based crimes extend beyond a binary understanding. Individuals belonging to the LGBTQ+ community also face an increased risk of victimization, often due to societal prejudice and discrimination. Numerous international initiatives and agreements have been enacted to address gender-based violence worldwide. In 1979, the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women

(CEDAW), providing a comprehensive framework to combat gender-based violence. The Convention calls for legal measures, awareness-raising campaigns, and support services for survivors as key strategies. Governments and organizations globally are implementing national strategies and enacting legislative reforms to battle gender-based violence. Such efforts range from criminalizing violence against women to establishing specialized police units and helplines. For example, India's landmark 2013 Criminal Amendment Act criminalized various forms of violence against women, including rape, acid attacks, stalking, and domestic violence. The act also improved the definition of sexual assault and introduced stricter penalties for offenders. Similarly, in New Zealand, the 2020 Domestic Violence Amendment Act prioritizes the safety and well-being of victims by granting them 10 days of paid leave and expanding

their leave provisions. #16 days Challenge in South Africa and many more in this direction to make women aware about their human rights and give strength to stand against violence are appreciable acts. The #MeToo movement, founded in 2006 by Tarana Burke and popularized globally in 2017, brought worldwide attention to sexual harassment and assault, empowering survivors and pushing for accountability among perpetrators. Non-profit organizations like Human Rights Watch and Amnesty International also tirelessly work to document and expose gender crimes while providing victim support. Preventing gender-based violence necessitates addressing systemic factors and cultivating a cultural shift that challenges harmful gender norms and stereotypes. Global campaigns, such as UN Women's "HeForShe," encourage men and boys to become allies in transforming societal attitudes and promoting positive behavioral changes. Emma Watson says in the regard- "Gender equality not

only liberates women but also men from prescribed gender stereotypes." Equally important is the development of comprehensive support services for survivors. Many organizations offer helplines, shelters, counseling, and legal aid. The UN Secretary-General's UNiTE to End Violence against Women campaign supports interventions that provide survivors with crucial support while also championing prevention and empowerment programs. There are many leaders, authors, entrepreneurs, and social activists like Michelle Obama, Malala Yousafzai, Warren Buffett, Indra Nooyi, Eleanor Roosevelt, Margaret Atwood, Sheryl Sandberg who have become symbolic voices for many to eradicate such mal-practices and to awaken the humanity as everyone has a role and responsibility to play and fulfill in creating gender-balanced and violence free world. However, despite progress, challenges remain. Many countries

still lack comprehensive legislation or effective enforcement mechanisms to address gender crimes adequately. There is an urgent need for stronger legal frameworks and improved norms, societal attitudes, and educational programs to challenge the root causes of these crimes. Countries like Afghanistan where justice system is yet not updated in context of women, women are suffering a lot. Award winning author like Nadia Hashimi highlights and portrays the real picture of females' struggle through literary works. In such countries lot of awareness campaigns need to be initiated for empowering women and providing justice to them. Furthermore, the United Nations' 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, ratified in 2015, includes Goal 5: Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls. This goal recognizes the importance of eradicating gender-based violence in constructing inclusive societies. But it states

that progress in the arena of gaining equality is too slow and it may take 300 years to end child marriage, 286 years to close gaps in legal protection and remove discriminatory laws, 140 years for women to be represented equally in position of power and leadership in the workplace and 47 years to achieve equal representation in national parliaments. Thus, gender inequality and violence based on it remains one of the most pressing challenges globally, jeopardizing the well-being and dignity of countless individuals. Recognizing the urgency of the issue, international initiatives, national laws, and societal campaigns continue to address the problem through prevention, support, and legislative reforms. While progress is being made, concerted efforts from all stakeholders are imperative to eradicate gender-based violence and build a future where individuals can live free from fear and violence, regardless of their gender.

3-day Training Workshop for Indian Forest Service Officials Organised by BSI

Kolkata, (KCN): A three-day training workshop on "Plant Identification and Nomenclature" for the Indian Forest Service (IFS) officers nominated by the Ministry of Environment, Forest, and Climate Change, Govt. of India, New Delhi, is being organised in the Botanical Survey of India from January 3-5, 2024, at the Central National Herbarium. The objectives of the training programme include: understanding the basics of plant identification and biodiversity in a taxonomic context; learning tools and techniques for naming a plant; understanding biodiversity, policies, challenges, and future prospects; a field-based interactive session; and a walk-through nature trail in AJCBIBG and Plants in Human Well Being. The workshop is going to include an interactive panel discussion on "Improvement in the working of forest departments: Need for career development through training and improvement of skills" also. In the inaugural session, Dr. A. A. Mao, Director,



BSI, and Course Director of the programme, welcomed all the participants and reflected on the importance of data-

basing biodiversity components for sustainable utilization of bio-resources. Dr. S. S. Dash, Scientist-F and Course Coordinator and In-Charge, Technical Section, BSI HQ, while briefing about the workshop, said that knowledge of plant taxonomy and

identification is essential to any research on plant science. The science of plant taxonomy not only bestows descriptions and classifications of species but also plays a fundamental role in assessing and conserving biodiversity. Shri Niraj Singhal, PCCF and Head of the Forest Force, West Bengal, who graced the occasion as Chief Guest, addressed the gathering and emphasised the importance of plant identification and nomenclature in biodiversity conservation. He called upon the forest officers to actively engage in the technical sessions as guardians of the forests and provide feedback and ideas for better monitoring, evaluation, and assessment of forest flora during the interactive sessions. "Myanmar Refugees Won't Be Sent Back Until...": Amit Shah

Aizawl(KCN): Union Home Minister Amit Shah has informed Mizoram Chief Minister Lalduhoma that the Centre won't deport Myanmar nationals who sought refuge in the state since February 2021 until normalcy is restored in the neighboring country, according to an official statement on Friday. During their meeting in Delhi on Thursday, Mr Shah discussed with Lalduhoma the importance of collecting biometric data of foreigners, which the previous state government had refused to do, the statement added. "I want the people of Mizoram to know that the Centre will not deport the Myanmar nationals seeking shelter in the state until normalcy returns there," Mr Shah was quoted as saying in the official statement. According to officials, more than 31,000 individuals from Myanmar have sought



shelter in Mizoram since February 2021, following a military coup in their home country. The majority of these nationals belong to the Chin community, which shares ethnic ties with the Mizos. of them reside in relief camps, while others are accommodated by their relatives or live in rented houses. 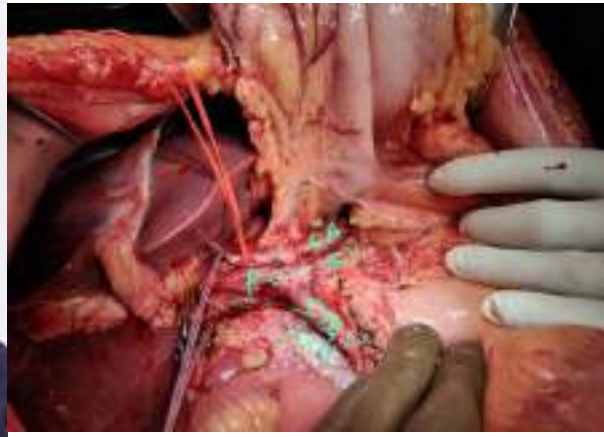

However, preserving the spleen during this surgery is an innovative approach, that aims to enhance patient outcomes and quality of life post-surgery, when the same was done previously; the spleen had to be sacrificed on both occasions. Dr. Ajay Mandal, a skilled surgeon, led the team, that removed the whole pancreas but saved the spleen in these 2 operations. Both patients are doing well after the surgeries, the doctors are happy with how things went, the



Anaesthesia Department for their seamlessness, and the team of nurses at CMRI for being instrumental throughout. These back-to-back surgeries are a big deal for CMRI and is the first of its kind in Kolkata, which shows that the doctors are finding better ways to help people with pancreatic cancer. Chilika Hosts 11.37L Birds



Bhubaneswar(KCN): Asia's largest brackish water lagoon, Chilika Lake has welcomed a record number of 11.37 lakh migratory birds this winter, according to a census conducted by the Department of Forest, Environment and Climate Change. "Chilika lagoon is proud to host 11.37 lakh birds as per today's census

results. It's the largest wintering ground for migratory birds in the Indian Subcontinent. Now for the second consecutive year, it is hosting more than one Million birds," said Principal Chief Conservator of Forests (PCCF) Wildlife, Susanta Nanda in his social media handle, X. According to official

sources, a total of 11,37,759 birds were recorded in the lake this year. This is around 5,830 more than the previous year, when 11.31 lakh avian guests had visited the lake. A total of 187 species of birds were found during the census while last year 184 species visited the lake. In Nalabana Bird

Sanctuary in the lake, enumerators found a total of 3,47,280 birds against the count of 3,42,897 birds during last year's census. In Nalabana, 4383 more birds visited this year in comparison to previous year. Among the counts, Northern Pintail (2,18,650), Gadwall (1,56,636), Eurasia

wigeon(1,40,322) have been sighted this year. During the census, the officials found one Pallas fish eagle after a long gap of about 10 years. The bird count was carried out for all water bird species and wetland-dependent birds. Ornithologists said they spotted 'River Lapwing', a migratory bird, which visited the lake after almost a decade. Although the exact reason behind the rise in the number of migratory birds in the 1,100 sq km lake is yet to be ascertained, forest officials attributed it to the availability of food and no disturbance in the area.

The winged guests from far-off places, including the Caspian Sea, Lake Baikal, remote parts of Russia, central and southeast Asia, Ladakh and Himalayas, descend to the lake every winter for feeding and roosting. They start their homeward journey with the onset of summer.

Tension, blockade over student's death in Sambalpur

Sambalpur(KCN): Traffic on Mudipada-Samaleswari temple route here was severely hit Thursday after residents of Ambedkar Nagar staged a road blockade over the death of a Class-IX student in a road accident at Pattnaikpada in Sambalpur the previous day.

Dishant Nayak, a resident of Ambedkar Nagar, died after a tourist bus hit his scooter near a club at Pattnaikpada in the town, Wednesday night. Tension continues to brew over the death of the boy as irate residents staged the road blockade Thursday demanding compensation of `50 lakh to the bereaved family and calling for a ban on entry of heavy vehicles to the town.

The agitators put up the deceased's body at the protest site and demanded action against the concerned officials for allowing illegal entry of the bus inside the town during the no entry



period and release of all family members of the deceased and other persons from police custody. Police had seized the bus and arrested the driver.

However, irate locals vandalised the vehicle and tried to set it ablaze. Police foiled agitators' bid to torch the bus and detained some youths. However, some protesters gheraoed the police station demanding compensation to the bereaved family and release of the detained people. Police resorted to lathi charge to quell the protest and detained 12 persons in this connection. They relented after administrative officials promised to ban entry of heavy vehicles on Mudipada-Samaleswari temple route and the

police agreed to release all the people from custody except for those involved in vandalising the bus after the death of the boy in mishap. Later, the body of the deceased boy was cremated at Rajghat Thursday evening.

When contacted, ASP Harish Pandey said that compensation will be given to the bereaved family as per law while the SP has asked the Traffic DSP to probe the entry of the bus inside the town during the no-entry period. He said that action will be taken against the accused persons after completion of the probe. Later, the passengers of the bus involved in the accident were sent back in a special vehicle arranged by the district administration.

Some farmers count blessings, many distressed over crop loss

BARGARH: While some farmers of Bargarh district are gearing up for the procurement of the rabi paddy which is scheduled to begin from May 6, several others who suffered crop loss due to hailstorm and pest attack are now in distress. The procurement of paddy for the rabi season in Attabira block of the district will begin from May 6 while in other blocks including Bargarh, Bheden, Barpali, Bhatli and Ambhabona, the process is slated to commence from May 12. Considering the summer heat, necessary arrangements like drinking water and tarpaulin sheds have been ensured for the farmers who will be participating in the procurement process. This season, paddy will be procured from as many

as 85,000 registered farmers in the district across 62 market yards and 100 Paddy Procurement Centres (PPC). Around 84 Primary Agricultural Cooperative Societies (PACS) and Women SHGs will be engaged to ensure the process is completed smoothly. On the other hand, due to unforeseen calamities, hundreds of farmers who suffered complete loss of their standing paddy crops are in a bad state. Unseasonal heavy rainfall between the end of March and first week of April shattered their hopes of reaping a bounty. Subsequently, due to fluctuation in temperature, the paddy crops were infested with pests later identified as neck blast. To add to the woes, the recent hailstorm on April 22 ravaged crops over large

tracts of land. As per the eye estimation report, Bargarh has recorded crop damage of over 6050 hectares of land in 52 villages. This includes the maximum damage in Bargarh block at 2631 hectares, followed by 2314 hectares in Attabira, 885 hectares in Bheden and 220 hectares in Barpali. The farmers of Attabira and Bheden have already submitted a memorandum to the Chief Minister through Attabira MLA Snehangini Chhuria, demanding to take appropriate action towards compensation considering the hailstorm related damage. Farmer leader, Ramesh Nahapatra said, "While the eye estimation report was sent on April 26, several other land on

which crops were damaged due to hailstorm were identified much later. The actual figures could be ascertained only from the joint verification report." However, on the basis of field visit and observation, crops over at least 10,000 hectares of land has been damaged this season, he said. "Considering the massive damage, input subsidy and crop insurance compensation to the farmers should be disbursed at the earliest," he added. Paddy procurement centres will be opened in Koraput district from June 3 and about 12.42 lakh quintal paddy has been targeted to be lifted by Odisha State Civil Supplies Corporation through 20 LAMPS, 15 SHGs and three pani panchayats.

New Delhi: On a challenging Newlands surface which saw hosts South Africa skittled out for 55 in the first session of the Test, Rohit Sharma knew that this wasn't going to be a high-scoring match. And his message to his batters was clear; that the team needs 'small contributions' from them and that they have to be prepared to 'take a blow'. "When we saw how the pitch was in the first session, we knew it was not going to be a high scoring game," the Indian captain said following his team's series-leveling seven-wicket win at Newlands, on Thursday. "So we wanted to stay disciplined in how we bowled, not get ahead of ourselves and try and do too many things. Bumrah, Siraj spearheaded our bowling attack. They put the balls in the right areas and let the pitch do the rest.



Africa's misery early on Day 2 with a wicket in the opening over, but Aiden Markram's counter-punching century helped the hosts wipe off the deficit. Nonetheless, Bumrah's six-wicket haul ensured that India's final target was limited to only 79 runs.

"When we went out to bat to get 79 runs, we knew we were slightly

ahead, but we knew we had to go there and apply yourself and be a little fearless," Rohit admitted. "To get any score on that pitch, we knew it was going to be challenging. Anything can happen in a game of cricket. Luckily, we got off to a good start, got 40-odd runs in no time. [Yashasvi] Jaiswal actually played quite freely. It's something that

we had discussed. We wanted to take the bowlers on if the balls were in the areas where we wanted.

"[In the morning] we knew that if we didn't show up properly, there was a good chance that they would get enough runs on the board but luckily we started off really well, getting the first wicket in the first over. We had some plans

to get Markram out but he played a superb innings to get that hundred. Again, with Bumrah we know his class and quality. Got six wickets and put us ahead in the game." After a 44-run opening stand, India stuttered briefly, losing three wickets in pursuit of the target. Nonetheless, they capped off what proved to be the shortest completed Test in history by overhauling the target in merely 12 overs, with Rohit remaining unbeaten till the end, to level the two-match series.

It wasn't the best of the series for the batters from either teams. Virat Kohli topped the run-charts for India with 172 runs, followed by KL Rahul who scored 113 runs in four innings. The younger lot had more disappointing returns with the bat: Shubman Gill (74), Yashasvi Jaiswal (50) and Shreyas

Iyer (41). However, Rohit isn't too fussed about their performances in the series, and believes this experience will hold them in good stead in the future.

"They didn't get big runs, but that's okay," Rohit said. "We know batting is difficult, especially in conditions like this is tough. But you have to show a lot of faith and trust, especially in those guys who are coming here for the first time - Gill, Jaiswal, Iyer. It's important to give them that confidence to play Test cricket. That is something we discussed that we want to allow them to play the way they want to play. While doing that, it may not always come off because they are all naturally aggressive in how they want to play. But obviously they can learn a lot from these two games that they played here. It is quite challenging, it swings,

there is a lot of lateral movement, especially from guys bowling from that height. Obviously, they must have learnt a lot from the series and can take a fair bit of confidence as well. "When you come here, you know it is tough for batters. But the new boys will learn with such experiences, will make gameplans. There is no dearth of talent in our batting, they are quite versatile. If you have to win Test matches in India and abroad, it's important to have different kinds of batters. My own job is to back them, give them confidence and give them match time. All of us - Me, Virat, KL - have all learnt by traveling. It's the same for them as well; what to do in such countries, what not to do. When you play in India, the scenario is different. When you do well in challenging conditions, your confidence goes sky high."

Dhananjaya de Silva named Sri Lanka's new Test captain



New Delhi: Sri Lanka will begin 2024 with a new captain for each format after Dhananjaya de Silva was named the new skipper of the Test side. The announcement from SLC follows the recent appointments of Kusal Mendis and Wanindu Hasaranga as leaders of the ODI and T20I sides respectively. De Silva, 32, will be the 18th different player to captain Sri Lanka in men's Tests when he leads the side out for the one-off Test against Afghanistan. He takes

over the reins of the side from Dimuth Karunaratne, who captained in 30 Tests between 2019 and 2023, finishing with a 12-12-6 win-loss-draw record. Karunaratne's tenure as captain began with a historic, against-all-odds series win in South Africa and while results thereafter were less dramatic in nature, he brought a sense of calm to the team during what was a period of churn in the country's cricket. Leadership brought the best out of Karunaratne

the batter as he averaged nearly 50 with the bat, considerably higher than his career average of 40.93. His successor, de Silva, has been a regular member of the squad. His 51 Tests so far have fetched 3301 runs at an average shade under 40. "I would have preferred to have the same captain for all three formats," said chief selector Upul Tharanga, "but we are unable to do that at the moment with the players we have."

Markram's magic in the madness

New Delhi: In a match that hurtled to a conclusion in 642 deliveries, it seems strange to focus on only two. But the Newlands Test wasn't a common or garden type of match. Ball one, the first of the sixth over of Thursday's play, was bowled by Mukesh Kumar from the Kelvin Grove End. It arrived on a fullish length at the Wynberg End, where Aiden Markram might - in another life, on another pitch - have expected the ball to connect halfway up his defensively offered bat. Instead it booted all but upright, screamed past his nose, and needed all of KL Rahul's athleticism to be intercepted lest it continue to the boundary. Ball two, 38 deliveries later, came from Prasidh Krishna. It was a neither here nor there effort, a hope rather than a firm idea. It landed full outside off stump, and Markram leapt onto the front foot to hammer it over long-on and out of



the ground for six. Given the circumstances, how do you explain that? "You have to remain as positive as you can be, always looking to score," Markram said. "And if the odd one goes past your edge, just laugh it off." That's easier to say when you've scored 106 off 103 - with two sixes and 17 fours, or more than 75% of your runs in boundaries - in an innings of 176 in which no-one else made more than a dozen runs. Markram made magic

amid the madness. "On a wicket like that, you need good fortune," Markram said. "I played and missed a lot and I was dropped as well [on 73]. It got easier for me when they spread the field. When a bowler's tail is up and he's bowling to a new batter, there's a lot more energy on the ball. When you're on the other side of that, they're almost bowling to get you off strike. That makes sense, but it could make for easier batting." Makes sense? Little did

Thanks to fine fast bowling by Mohammed Siraj and Jasprit Bumrah - who took six wickets each - on a pitch of chronically inconsistent bounce, India won the shortest ever Test by seven wickets five minutes short of an hour after lunch on the second day.

"It makes it challenging when the ball is going up and down," Markram said. "If it's just one of those you can try and find a plan to cover that. Sometimes when it's

important to understand it won't get much tougher," Markram, who was playing his 37th, said. "That's the positive note for those players. If you experience this and move to venues where it is slightly easier, you'd rather have it that way around than be shocked and caught with your pants down." Maybe, when Stubbs has played 37 Tests, we can ask him to look back on this match. To do so now would be cruel and inhuman.

Rohit wants match referees to 'keep eyes and ears open' while rating pitches

NewDelhi: India captain Rohit Sharma 'doesn't mind' playing on pitches like the one in Cape Town, where the fastest ever Test result was achieved, but there's a caveat. He wants the critics of Indian pitches to just 'shut up' after what transpired at Newlands.

"We all saw what happened in this Test match and how the pitch played. I honestly don't mind playing on pitches like these as long as everyone keeps their mouth shut in India and don't talk about Indian

pitches," said Rohit after India's seven-wicket win at Newlands, where all it took the visitors were 107 overs and a little over four sessions to level the series.

"You come here to challenge yourself. Yes, it is dangerous but it is challenging. When people come to India, it is challenging as well. When you're here to play Test cricket, we talk about Test cricket being the ultimate prize, Test cricket being the pinnacle and all. We also stand by it. When you're put up against a

challenge like that, you come and face it. That's what happens in India, but when the pitch starts turning on Day 1 in India, people start talking 'puff of dust, puff of dust, there are so many cracks on the pitch'. It's important that we stay neutral wherever we go." Rohit spoke of how different and uncomfortable the narrative is when the pitch starts taking turn from Day 1 in India, and called upon the ICC to stay 'neutral' when it comes to rating pitches.



"Honestly, I would like to see how the pitches are rated. Mumbai, Bangalore, Cape Town, Centurion are all quite different. The overhead conditions are different. The pitches deteriorate

fast when the sun is beating down that hard on the pitch. The conditions in India also - we know the pitch will spin. But people don't like it because the pitch spins from Day 1," Rohit

pointed out. "If the ball seams from ball 1, it's fine for everyone. That's not fair. If the ball starts spinning from ball 1, it should be okay. Otherwise, you stay neutral and start rating these pitches also as bad. If you want the ball only to seam and not to turn, in my opinion that's absolutely wrong. That's my judgement, my opinion and I'll stick by it. I've seen enough cricket and enough of how these match referees and ICC look into these ratings. I

don't have an issue on how you rate, but stay neutral."

Rohit expressed surprise at the World Cup final pitch in Ahmedabad being rated 'below average' and urged the match referees to keep their 'eyes and ears open' when making their assessment.

"Some of these match referees need to keep their eye on how they rate pitches. I still can't believe the World Cup final pitch was rated 'below average'. A batsman got a hundred

there. How can that be a poor pitch? The ICC, the match referees need to start rating pitches based on what they see, not based on countries. That's very important. I hope they keep their ears open, they keep their eyes open and look into those aspects of the game.

"I'm all for pitches like these, we want to challenge ourselves playing on pitches like these, we pride ourselves playing on pitches like these. But all I want to say is, be neutral."
