

PM Modi meets Macron, Sunak, Zelenskyy on sidelines of G7 Summit in Italy



Bari (Italy)(KCN): Prime Minister Narendra Modi Friday met French President Emmanuel Macron and discussed ways to further strengthen the strategic partnership including in areas of defence, nuclear and space, and exchanged views on key global and regional issues. PM Modi also met his British counterpart Rishi

Sunak and is believed to have discussed bilateral relations and issues of common interests. He held talks with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy as well. It is learnt that Zelenskyy briefed Modi on various aspects of the Russia-Ukraine conflict. Modi met the three leaders on the sidelines of the G7 summit here in the southern resort town

of Italy. "Taking Strategic Partnership to new levels! PM @narendramodi met P r e s i d e n t @EmmanuelMacron of France on the sidelines of the 50th G7 Summit in Apulia, Italy," Ministry of External Affairs spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal posted on X. "The two leaders discussed ways to

further strengthen the partnership including in areas of defence, nuclear, space, education, climate action, digital public infrastructure, critical technologies, connectivity and culture. They also exchanged views on key global and regional issues," he wrote. It is Prime Minister Modi's first foreign trip

after assuming office for a third time this month. The two leaders last met in January when the French President visited India to attend the 75th Republic Day of India. During their last meeting, the two leaders reaffirmed their shared vision for bilateral cooperation and international partnership, outlined in Horizon 2047 and other documents from the July 2023 Summit. Horizon 2047 Roadmap sets an ambitious and broad-ranging course for the bilateral relationship for 2047, the centenary year of India's independence. Modi is attending the 50th G7 Summit on the invitation of Italian President Georgia Meloni and will address an Outreach session on Artificial Intelligence, Energy, Africa and the Mediterranean alongside leaders of other invited countries and Pope Francis.

Won't tolerate malpractice, accountability in NTA to be fixed if lapses found: Edu Minister Pradhan on NEET



New Delhi(KCN): The government will not tolerate any malpractice or irregularities in the conduct of exams and accountability of the National Testing Agency will be fixed if lapses are found, Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan said Friday amid a row over medical entrance exam NEET. The National Testing Agency (NTA) has come under criticism amid allegations of irregularities and inflation of marks in the medical entrance exam. About action taken against six centres where the exam paper was wrongly distributed and candidates had to be compensated with grace marks to make up for the loss of time, he said, "Every aspect is being looked into. Accountability will be fixed and depending on the nature of lapse, action will be taken." "There is no scope for any malpractice or irregularities in the conduct of any exam. We will not tolerate that. The accountability of the National Testing Agency (NTA) will also be fixed if lapses are found," Pradhan said in response to a question by PTL. "The government is committed to protecting the interests of NEET examinees. Concerns of students will be addressed with fairness and equity. Facts related to NEET are in cognisance of the Supreme Court. The counselling process will be underway soon and it is of utmost importance to move ahead in this direction without any confusion," he added. The minister's comments came on a day when the Congress stepped up its attack on the government over the National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (NEET)-

UG exam issue and questioned Prime Minister Narendra Modi's "silence" on the matter. The opposition party asserted that only a Supreme Court-monitored forensic probe can safeguard the future of lakhs of young students. Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge claimed the Modi government has started "covering up the NEET scam" through the Union education minister and NTA. "They have just lost the elections and are now looking for a new issue. We have the facts and misleading students and the public based on lies is not right," he added. Explaining the rationale behind the rise in the number of toppers and cut-off marks this year, Pradhan said the syllabus for NEET was reduced as per the syllabus rationalised by NCERT. "In previous years, the NEET syllabus wasn't cut down. This year we also aligned the questions with the state boards' syllabus. Less syllabus and more number of candidates also led to the rise in competition and ultimately increase in the number of top scorers," the Union education minister said. Pradhan reiterated that there is no concrete proof to establish the allegations of paper leaks in this year's NEET-UG exam. He met some NEET aspirants and their parents on Friday and

addressed their issues. The Union minister said NEET-UG was held at over 4,500 centres and incorrect question distribution was reported from just six of them. "Just because of the six centres, we can't question the sanctity and credibility of the entire system." Asked if the government will take steps to bring some reforms in the way NTA conducts entrance exam, Pradhan said, "NTA is a competent agency. However, no institution is perfect and we work on bringing reforms continuously". "I will reply with facts in Parliament," the Union education minister said responding to Congress' assertion that the NEET issue would "reverberate inside Parliament as well". Earlier in the day, Pradhan met two students and a parent, who had come to the Education Ministry to raise their grievances about NEET. The NTA on Thursday told the Supreme Court that the decision to award grace marks to 1,563 candidates in NEET-UG for admission to MBBS, BDS and other courses was cancelled and they would be given the option to take a retest on June 23. The education ministry last week set up a four-member panel to review the grace marks awarded to 1,563 students to compensate them for "loss of time" due to a delay in starting the examination at certain centres.

Ranendra Pratap Swain takes oath as Pro-tem Speaker of Odisha Assembly



Bhubaneswar(KCN): Odisha's eight-time MLA Ranendra Pratap Swain was Friday administered oath as the Pro-tem Speaker of the Assembly by Governor Raghuraj Das. Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi was also present at the Raj Bhavan in Bhubaneswar when Swain took oath.

"I was appointed as the Pro-tem Speaker on the recommendation of the CM," Swain said. Swain, a former minister and lawmaker from the Athagarh Assembly segment in Cuttack district, will also conduct the election for appointment of a regular Speaker of the Odisha Legislative Assembly

June 20. The newly elected members of the Assembly will be administered oath by the Pro-tem Speaker for two days June 18 and June 19, Swain said. Sources said senior BJP leader Surama Padhy is tipped to be the next Speaker of the Odisha Assembly.

President, CM greet Odisha people on Raja festival

Bhubaneswar(KCN): President Droupadi Murmu and Odisha Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Friday greeted the people of Odisha on the occasion of Raja, an agrarian festival celebrated in the state. The President said the people of Odisha celebrate the festival by showing their respect to soil and clouds. "On the occasion of this agrarian festival, I wish happiness, peace and prosperity to the people of the state and country," Murmu said. The Chief Minister said, "May this unique festival of Odisha culture and tradition bring joy and happiness to everyone's life." The Raja festival is being celebrated in the state for three days from Friday. The very first day of the festival is termed 'Pahili Raja' which is also considered to be the last day of the month Jetha (summers). The second day of Raja festival signifies the beginning of the solar month of "Mithuna", marking the arrival of monsoon. The third is Bhumi Dahana or 'Sesa'. During this period, it is believed that mother earth menstruates and prepares herself for future agricultural activities with the arrival of monsoon. The Odisha Tourism Development Corporation (OTDC) has made special arrangements to provide 'Pithas' (types of sweetmeat) during the festival.

Odisha CM expresses grief over death of two Odias in Kuwait fire

Bhubaneswar(KCN): Odisha Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Friday expressed grief over the death of two persons from the state in a massive fire in Kuwait. "Many people lost their lives in the terrible fire in Kuwait. The news of the death of two Odia sons Muhammad Jahur and Santosh Kumar Gouda is very sad. I offer my condolences to the bereaved family and pray to Lord Jagannath to give peace to the departed souls," Majhi said in an X post. Gouda hailed from



Ranajhalli village in Purosottampur block of Ganjam district, while Jahur was a native of Karadapalli village in Tigiria police limits in Cuttack district. They were working for a private company and residing in the seven-storey apartment

building in Mangaf in southern Kuwait where the fire broke out early Wednesday morning. Their mortal remains would be brought to Odisha from Delhi by Friday evening, officials said. Jahur's family members said he was married for only two years and his wife was seven-months pregnant. He had been working in Kuwait since 2017 and had visited his village only a month ago. Similarly, Gouda had visited his village in March and had returned to Kuwait in April.

New Delhi(KCN): The Union law ministry plans to place before the Union Cabinet the report of the high-level committee on 'one nation, one election', sources said Friday. They said placing the report before the Cabinet "at the earliest" is part of the 100-day agenda of the Legislative Department in the law ministry. Ahead of Lok Sabha elections, Prime Minister Narendra Modi had directed all union ministries and departments to draw up a 100-day agenda for the next government. The high-level committee on 'one

nation, one election' headed by former president Ram Nath Kovind had submitted its report to President Droupadi Murmu March 15, recommended simultaneous elections for Lok Sabha and state assemblies as the first step followed by synchronised local body polls within 100 days. The panel had also proposed setting up of an 'Implementation Group to look into the execution of the recommendations made by the committee. Simultaneous polls will help save resources, spur development and social cohesion, deepen "foundations of



democratic rubric" and help realise the aspirations of "India, that is Bharat", the panel had said. The panel also recommended preparation of a common electoral roll and voter ID cards by the Election Commission of India in

consultation with state election authorities. At present, the ECI is responsible for Lok Sabha and assembly polls, while local body polls for municipalities and panchayats are managed by state election commissions. The panel recommended


as many as 18 constitutional amendments, most of which will not need ratification by state assemblies. However, these would require certain Constitution amendment bills that would need to be passed by Parliament. Some proposed changes regarding the single electoral roll and single voter ID card would need ratification by at least half of the states. Separately, the Law Commission is also likely to come up soon with its own report on simultaneous polls, of which Prime Minister Narendra Modi has been a strong votary.

State On Raja Mode

Bhubaneswar(KCN): Odia people residing in Odisha and outside the State have started celebrating the three-day long annual Raja Festival, a festival to celebrate womanhood. The pleasant weather in Bhubaneswar added more favour to the celebration. Raja Parba or Mithuna Sankranti is a three-day-long festival and the second day signifies the beginning of the solar month of Mithuna from which the season of rains starts. Swinging on wooden planks hung from trees, eating traditional cakes and dishes, wearing new dresses, styling

themselves, and a series of cultural events have been lined up by young girls to celebrate the festival. During this period, it is believed that Mother Earth menstruates and prepares herself for future agricultural activities with the arrival of monsoon. Different kinds of pithas such as Poda Pitha, Manda, Kakara, Arisha, Chakuli and Chandrakala have been made in every household. The social media like Twitter, Facebook and Instagram flooded with Raja Parba wishes. Personalities like President of India Droupadi Murmu, Chief Minister Mohan Majhi, Governor Raghubar Das, Union Minister

PM to 7 PM, OTDC officials said. These vans will provide an option for take away of Raja Pithas and other delicacies. The Pitha on Wheels is also stationed at Sambalpur. Raja Pitha counters have been set up at Silver city Boatclub, Cuttack, ISBT Café and Nimantran Restaurant Bhubaneswar for sale to the public during the three days. People are thronging various shops to buy meetha paans in cities like Cuttack, Bhubaneswar and Kendrapara. It is said that the Raja parba is incomplete without a paan. The traders have also come up with new ideas to attract customers.

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Fortifying Democracy : The Urgent Need for Stronger Anti-Defection Laws to Curb Political Opportunism



In recent years, the political landscape has been marred by a surge in defections where politicians switch parties, often seeking personal gain at the expense of voters' trust. This phenomenon undermines the very essence of democracy as elected representatives betray the mandate given to them leading to political instability and eroding public faith in democratic institutions. A robust legal framework is imperative to deter such opportunistic activities and safeguard the sanctity of the electoral process. Political defections are not a new phenomenon but their frequency and impact have grown alarmingly. Politicians

often switch parties for promises of better positions, financial incentives or to align with the ruling party for political leverage. This not only disrupts governance but also makes a mockery of the voters' mandate. For instance, in India a significant number of legislators have switched parties post-elections causing political turmoil and necessitating re-elections at the taxpayers' expense. A notable example is the 2019 Karnataka political crisis, where a series of defections led to the collapse of the state government. Similarly, in 2020, Madhya Pradesh witnessed a dramatic shift in power when several MLAs defected from the Congress to the BJP resulting in the fall of the Kamal Nath government. Such instances highlight the urgent need for stringent anti-defection laws. Many countries have attempted to address this issue through anti-defection laws. For example, India's Tenth

Schedule, added to the Constitution in 1985, aims to curb the evil of political defections. This law stipulates that a member of parliament or a state legislature who defects to another party is disqualified from continuing in office. However, the law has loopholes. It allows for defections if a substantial number of legislators (at least two-thirds) from a party decide to join another, thereby encouraging mass defections. Similarly, in the United Kingdom, the Recall of MPs Act 2015 allows constituents to recall their Member of Parliament if they believe the MP has acted against their interests including switching parties. However, this process is lengthy and rarely results in actual recall, limiting its effectiveness as a deterrent. To effectively address political defections, it is essential to fortify existing laws and introduce new measures. Here are some proposed reforms:

1. Mandatory Resignation and Re-Election : Legislators who switch parties should be mandated to resign and seek re-election. This ensures that the decision to defect is scrutinized and approved by the electorate, maintaining democratic accountability.

2. Stricter Disqualification Norms: The anti-defection laws should eliminate the provision that allows mass defections. Any member defecting, regardless of the number, should face disqualification.

3. Financial Penalties and Loss of Perks: Defectors should face financial penalties and lose benefits such as pensions, government housing and other perks associated with their position.

4. Transparency in Political Funding: To discourage defections driven by financial incentives, there should be greater transparency in political funding and stricter regulations to curb illicit financial inducements.

5. Strengthening Internal Party Democracy: Political parties should foster internal democracy ensuring that members' grievances are addressed within the party framework reducing the impetus to defect. Political defections undermine the democratic process, disrupt governance and betray voters' trust. Strengthening anti-defection laws is crucial to curbing this opportunistic behavior. Legislators must be held accountable to the electorate ensuring that the mandate given by the people is respected. By introducing stringent measures we can restore faith in the democratic process and ensure stable governance. It is high time that lawmakers rise above partisan interests and enact reforms that fortify the integrity of our political system.

Kolkata and gangetic West Bengal are going to experience another cyclonic hit called Remal. In recent years Kolkata has witnessed many devastating cyclonic hits like Amphan, Yash, Ayela, Bulbul, Fani etc. But do you know the term 'cyclone' was coined by a British man residing in Calcutta? He was Henry Piddington. He was born in England and had interest in sailing. He took a training and became Commander in Marine Service in East India and China. During 1840s, he settled in Calcutta. He had experienced many storms while sailing through sea and in Calcutta, he pursued a career in Science mainly focusing in Science of Weather. He was



particularly interested in storm wave or storm surge and wrote the detailed account of storm waves and their effects. During those days, British Government had a plan to build a port on the bank of Matla River. But Piddington was totally against it and warned the government that the river would be exposed to heavy cyclonic hazards. But everybody ignored him and he became "madman" to the general public. In 1864, it was inaugurated and the port was named

as Port Canning after the then Governor-General Lord Canning. But after three years of its inauguration, the port was struck by a cyclonic hit and it was destroyed. He wrote a book "a horn - book for the Law of storm for the Indian and Chinese Seas." in 1884. 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Raja Festival & Mother Earth

Raja is primarily observed for three days. The very first day of this three day long festival is termed as Pahili Raja which is also considered to be the last day of the month Jestha (summers). The second day is named as Raja Sankranti; first day of the month Asadha (monsoons). The concluding day is named in local dialect as Bhuin Dahana popularly known as Sesa Raja (last day).

However, the festival in some parts of the regions actually ranges for a period of four days with inclusion of the fourth day termed as Basumata Puja or Basumata Gadhua (Bathing & praying of mother earth). Odisha, the eastern coastal state of India, is known for its rich heritage and culture. Apart from the world-famous Ratha Yatra, which takes place in June, Odia people also celebrate a unique festival called Raja. This is a three-day-long festival dedicated to Mother Earth (Bhuma Devi) and womanhood at large. The festivities begin a day before Mithuna Sankranti and conclude two days after



matrimony. They follow various customs related to the festival by consuming nutritious food like Podapitha, not walking barefoot, taking a bath on the first day, and merrily swinging on ropes attached to a tree. There's a story associated with this festival. Goddess Earth (Bhuma Devi), the

consort of Lord Vishnu, undergoes her menstrual cycle during this period. Interestingly, the word 'Raja' in Odia means menstruation, and it is derived from Rajaswala, meaning a menstruating woman. Surprisingly, it is a festival that celebrates this aspect of womanhood which makes the feminine entity unique. Menstruation is considered as a sign of fertility, and therefore, it celebrates femininity and her ability to give birth to another life. During the Parba, Odia people do no undertake any construction works or tilling that requires the earth to be dug. And by not doing such activities, they pay ode to the Mother Earth who needs

a break from routine work. The festival concludes with a custom called Vasumati Snana or the bathing of Bhuma Devi. Women worship a stone that symbolises the Mother Earth. They give her a bath with turmeric paste and offer her flowers and smear her with Sindoor. This festival is also associated with the end of the summer season and the arrival of the monsoon. Odisha, the land of Lord Jagannath, celebrates 13 festivals in 12 months (a popular proverb among the locals) meaning Odisha celebrates endless festivals throughout the year. Among all this one important festival is Raja Parba which is celebrated for three days during the mid of June, preferably starts from 14th June and ends in 16th. During this period, the state remains in a state of jubilation and

celebration. The scorching rays of Summer of April and May calm down by the advent of South- West Monsoon in the first week of June through its tender drops. The sky that was blue during Summers turns out to be dark and white with patches of rain-bearing cloud moving here and there. It is in this occasion of soothing weather, relief from the heat and the new hope for next agricultural season Raja Parba is celebrated. Hence, it is a festival that is of great importance for the people who depend upon agriculture for their livelihood. Further, the word Raja itself in Odia means menstruation and it's a conjecture that

mother Earth goes for three days long menstrual cycle during this period. So, in this occasion no activities like tilling, construction or any other that hurts mother Earth are done. These three days of the menstrual cycle of earth ends in the fourth day with Basumati Gaadhua which means the bathing of mother Earth. In this eve people worship mother Earth by bathing pieces of stone as it's a replica and pray for a prosperous agricultural year in the days to come. Give Blood, Save Lives, Be a Hero



World Blood Donor Day, celebrated annually on June 14th, emphasizes the critical importance of blood donation and honours the selfless contributions of voluntary donors. Established by the World Health Organization (WHO) in 2004, this day serves to raise awareness about the need for safe blood and blood products and to express gratitude to those who donate. As we approach World Blood Donor Day 2024, it is essential to reflect on the significance of blood donation, explore national and international statistics, and highlight the ongoing need for donor participation. Blood donation is a fundamental aspect of modern healthcare, crucial for saving lives during emergencies, surgeries, and for patients with chronic illnesses. Blood and blood products are indispensable for treating severe trauma, supporting major surgeries, managing childbirth complications, and treating conditions such as anemia, cancer, and thalassemia. The

universal nature of blood donation means that a single donation can potentially save multiple lives, as blood can be separated into its various components: red cells, plasma, platelets, and cryoprecipitate. According to the WHO, approximately 118.5 million blood donations are collected globally each year. Despite this seemingly large number, there is a significant imbalance in the availability and distribution of safe blood. High-income countries, which comprise 16% of the world's population, account for 40% of the total blood donations. In contrast, low- and middle-income countries often struggle with shortages, impacting their ability to provide adequate healthcare. In high-income countries, blood donation systems are well-established, with most donations coming from voluntary, unpaid donors. These systems benefit from advanced infrastructure, robust regulatory frameworks, and widespread public awareness campaigns. For instance, in the United States, approximately 13.6 million units of whole blood and red blood cells are collected annually, with a donor rate of about 37.8 donations per 1,000 population. Similarly, European

countries like Germany and France maintain high donation rates, with well-organized blood services ensuring a steady supply. In low- and middle-income countries, the scenario is often starkly different. These nations face numerous challenges, including limited infrastructure, inadequate funding, and cultural barriers that impede the growth of voluntary blood donation. In many cases, family replacement donors or paid donors fill the gap, posing significant risks to blood safety due to higher rates of transfusion-transmissible infections (TTIs) such as HIV, hepatitis B and C, and syphilis. For example, in India, the world's second-most populous country, the demand for blood far outstrips supply. The country requires an estimated 12 million units of blood annually but collects only around 9-10 million units. Despite growing awareness campaigns and increasing participation from voluntary donors, the reliance on family replacement donors remains substantial. Efforts to bridge this gap include initiatives by the National Blood Transfusion Council (NBTC) and various non-governmental organizations that organize blood drives and educational programs to

encourage voluntary donation. In sub-Saharan Africa, the situation is even more dire. The WHO reports that this region has some of the lowest donation rates, with an average of 4.4 donations per 1,000 population. Countries like Nigeria and Kenya face chronic shortages, exacerbated by high prevalence rates of TTIs. In response, international aid organizations and local health ministries are working to improve blood safety and increase the number of voluntary donors. Programs such as the Safe Blood for Africa Foundation and WHO's regional initiatives are crucial in these efforts. Globally, numerous initiatives aim to enhance blood donation systems and ensure a safe and sufficient blood supply. The WHO's Blood Safety and Availability program provides technical support to countries to strengthen their national blood systems. Key components include improving donor recruitment and retention, enhancing blood screening processes, and developing robust regulatory frameworks. One notable success story is the progress made in Thailand. Over the past few decades,

Thailand has transformed its blood donation landscape through a combination of government support, public awareness campaigns, and collaboration with organizations like the Thai Red Cross Society. As a result, the country has achieved a donor rate of 23.6 donations per 1,000 population, with 100% of donations coming from voluntary, unpaid donors. Another exemplary model is found in Brazil. The country has developed a comprehensive national blood program, which includes mobile blood collection units, extensive public education efforts, and partnerships with community organizations. Brazil's integrated approach has resulted in a steady increase in blood donations, with a donor rate of approximately 16.2 donations per 1,000 population. Advancements in technology and innovation are playing a pivotal role in improving blood donation systems worldwide. Digital platforms and mobile applications are increasingly being used to streamline the donation process, enhance donor recruitment, and improve communication between blood banks and donors. For instance, in India, the e-RaktKosh initiative, a comprehensive IT

solution, has been implemented to manage the country's blood supply chain. This platform facilitates real-time tracking of blood availability, donor databases, and distribution networks, thereby improving efficiency and transparency. Similarly, in the United States, the American Red Cross has developed a mobile app that allows donors to schedule appointments, track their donation history, and receive notifications about urgent blood needs. This user-friendly approach has significantly enhanced donor engagement and retention. Despite the progress made, several challenges continue to impede the global effort to ensure a safe and sufficient blood supply. One of the primary challenges is the disparity in blood donation rates between high-income and low- and middle-income countries. Addressing this gap requires a multifaceted approach, including strengthening healthcare infrastructure, increasing public awareness, and fostering a culture of voluntary donation. Ensuring the safety of blood remains a critical concern. Rigorous screening and testing protocols are essential to prevent the transmission of TTIs.

Developing countries, in particular, need support to implement and maintain high standards of blood safety. The COVID-19 pandemic has also highlighted vulnerabilities in blood donation systems. Lockdowns and social distancing measures have led to a significant decline in blood donations worldwide. To mitigate these impacts, innovative approaches such as mobile blood drives, appointment-based donations, and extended operating hours for blood banks have been adopted. These strategies have proven effective and should be continued to ensure resilience in the face of future challenges. Looking ahead, the global community must continue to prioritize blood donation as a critical component of healthcare. Governments, healthcare providers, non-governmental organizations, and individuals all have roles to play. National policies should focus on creating enabling environments for voluntary donation, investing in healthcare infrastructure, and ensuring equitable access to safe blood. Public awareness campaigns must be sustained and intensified to educate communities about the importance of blood donation and to dispel myths and misconceptions. Schools,

workplaces, and community organizations can serve as platforms for promoting blood donation and organizing regular blood drives. World Blood Donor Day 2024 is an opportunity to celebrate the selfless contributions of blood donors worldwide and to reaffirm our commitment to ensuring a safe and sufficient blood supply for all. While significant progress has been made, much work remains to be done, particularly in addressing the disparities between high-income and low- and middle-income countries. By leveraging technology, fostering international collaboration, and promoting a culture of voluntary donation, we can build resilient blood donation systems that save lives and improve health outcomes globally. As we commemorate this important day, let us pledge to support and participate in blood donation efforts, recognizing that each donation is a lifeline of hope for those in need.

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Sharp increase in tainted leaders - a matter of concern

The 18th Lok Sabha has been elected in the country. The world's largest democracy and record number of voters are to be proud of, but there are also disturbing trends in this democracy. The news is that out of the 543 members of Lok Sabha elected recently, no less than 46 percent have criminal records, which is three percent more than the last time. In Indian politics, people with criminal image or facing criminal charges are the potential threat to the government and the nation both, in every conceivable way, which is a matter of worry for every citizen. Will the democratic purity and sanctity of the country be protected in this situation? Will these tainted people not criminalize our system over time? The latest report by the Association of Democratic Reforms, an advisory body that analyses issues related to the criminals in Indian politics, shows that while 233 (43%) of the MPs elected in 2019 had accepted criminal cases

registered against them, 251 MPs elected for the 18th Lok Sabha have accepted criminal cases registered against them, which is 46% of the total number. Today, a big question is how to make Indian politics crime-free. It is not without reason that the increasing interference by criminals in Indian politics has created such a problem that instead of appearing in court, an MP who is accused of kidnapping reaches Rashtrapati Bhawan to take oath as a minister. Leaders like Arvind Kejriwal say in the general elections that the people should vote for Aam Aadmi Party in large numbers, so that he can be saved from going to jail. Here the most important question is how will we establish a good governance and honest system by giving responsible positions to such characterless and criminal elements? How will he live up to the trust of the general public? How will the doors be closed for the tainted persons to reach the Parliament? In fact, on the alert initiative by the Supreme Court, all political parties have started publishing the criminal records of Lok Sabha and Assembly candidates since the year 2020. Certainly, the purpose of this order was to free the country's politics from the crooks

tainted with criminal image. But in reality this did not happen, because the priority of all political parties was to gamble on the winning candidates, even if they had a criminal record. The big question is who will present the ideal in politics then? What happened to those people who always presented the ideal picture by making every sacrifice possible? They became exemplary for millions, became ideals-- whether it was the freedom struggle, security of the country, security of religion, protection of their word or the question of protection of their culture and identity, they sacrificed everything to fulfil their duty and promise. Heroes like Maharana Pratap, Bhagat Singh, Durgadas, Chhatrasal, Shivaji made big sacrifices by abandoning all comforts of life. Guru Govind Singh got both his sons bricked into the wall and Panna Dhay sacrificed her son for her devotion to her master. Temples should be built for such people. If their temples are not built, people bow their heads in reverence, as soon as their names are mentioned. But the way our national life and thinking have been distorted today, our politics has become selfish and narrow-minded, our behaviour has become false, we have worn more masks



than faces, it has destroyed all our values. With the rise of criminals in politics, citizens of the nation are worried and confused about the future of the country. The time has come when some top people will have to make Herculean efforts to protect the country's culture, glorious heritage. A new standard will have to be set before the directionless leadership class. If a person is accused in any murder, kidnapping, murder or any other serious crime, then the attempt to protect him by calling him a political person, or the evil attempt to take political advantage will have to be stopped. Prime Minister Narendra Modi has always given priority to corruption and crime free politics, but in the battle to win elections, he has also been seen giving shelter

to criminal politicians. All political parties have given tickets to tainted candidates. This highlights the huge difference between the words and actions of political parties. The question is-- what will be our future if such tainted people who formulate policies for the country continue to be the makers of our destiny? Will people with criminal backgrounds not affect our law and order after being elected as public representatives? What will be the future of our society and system? Why don't the leaders who talk about all the ideals and question the actions of the leaders of other parties take honest initiative to free politics from the dominance of criminals? Why don't all political parties agree for purity and sanctity in Indian democracy?

Certainly, if no serious initiative is taken in this direction in time, then this percentage of tainted people will continue to increase in the coming years. Along with this, the big crisis is that the dominance of leaders who have become millionaires by hook or crook is increasing in the lower house of the country. This time, there are 504 millionaires among the MPs elected to the Parliament. In such a situation, can it be expected that a common man who lives off his hard-earned money can ever think of becoming an MP? Tainted and criminal politicians are becoming a big irony and anomaly of democracy. It is not just about the Lok Sabha, there is such a contradiction and anomaly in the governments of various states that a leader with

a criminal image becomes the Law Minister, an illiterate or less educated representative is made the Education Minister. The same happens with other important ministries. What kind of helplessness is this of political parties? Often the reality of the claim of making politics crime-free comes to the fore when the opportunity comes to form a coalition government in a state or at the Centre. It is a matter of happiness that such helplessness has been controlled to a great extent in the cabinet of the coalition government formed at the Centre. Only one demand is heard from those who protect the nation on the borders that after death our dead body should be sent to our home. When we read such things, our head salutes those soldiers; it seems that the spirit of patriotism and sacrifice has not died yet. But when will such an ideal be present in politics? The light of the lamp of character and morality in politics has become dim; oil will have to be poured. Whether it is the CBI raids and prison bars on the houses of ministers in the Delhi government or the coronation of criminal elements in the formation of the Bihar Council of Ministers, these are serious issues on which there should be an intense debate in politics, there should be a meaningful

effort to purify politics, this should be the priorities of new India - strong India. Everyone is running and shouting for their identity and self-interest. Some try to establish their independent identity with money, some with their beauty, some with their scholarship, some with their behaviour. The condition of politics is even worse that here leaders resort to crime, corruption and immorality to rule the hearts of the people. There are attempts to divide the people on the basis of caste, regional, and communalism. But how much illusion do we nurture? Identity is not built without character. Everything else is temporary. Character is a sadhana, austerity. Just as the belly of ego is big, it needs something or the other every day. Similarly, political character needs daily protection and all this can be achieved only with strong morale, clean image, honesty and freedom from crime. In politics, only a leader with character and morality is respectable and acceptable.

FSSAI-ER Issues Prohibition of Sale against Bhikharam Chandmal Snacks & Savouries for using Synthetic Food Colour- Tartrazine (INS 102), not Permitted under FSS Act, 2006

Kolkata, (KCN): An enforcement sampling was conducted at the premises of a Food Business Operator (FBO) at Howrah, West Bengal by the Central Food Safety Officers, FSSAI-Eastern Region as a part of the monitoring and vigil during the festive season wherein samples of Bhikharam Chandmal Snacks & Savouries were drawn and sent to lab for analysis. The reports of the lab indicated that samples are 'Unsafe' due to the presence of Tartrazine (INS 102) which is not permitted for the said products. The above findings indicate violation of provisions of FSS Act, 2006 and the product regulations made there under. Acting swiftly in the matter, the Designated Officer, FSSAI-Eastern Region issued a Notice of Prohibition of Sale for all

such products manufactured at the premises in violation of the mentioned provisions. Further the enforcement and legal action including initiation of recall of the implicated products is being undertaken by this office. FSSAI, along with States/UTs Food Authorities, is continuously monitoring the quality and safety of food products for consumers in the country by drawing and testing samples. FBOs found to be in violation of the rules are liable to face fine and legal action under the Food Safety and Standards Act, 2006. FSSAI seeks to prevent non-compliant practices and ensure that consumers across the nation have access to safe and high-quality food products through stringent inspections,

monitoring, and enforcement campaigns. FSSAI has strongly advised all FBOs to follow the standards of food products prescribed by FSSAI and ensure safe and hygienic practices for the manufacturing of food products. Any noncompliance may result in strict action against the violating FBOs. FSSAI encourages consumers to report any instances of food safety concerns to maintain the highest standards of food safety across the country. The consumers may share their concerns related to food safety matters directly with FSSAI through a dedicated "Food Safety Connect" portal which can be accessed at <https://foscoc.fssai.gov.in/consumergrievance/> and the Food Safety Connect App.

Satya, who now is doing a great job as the CEO. In my digital first career, the connection with India was fun and made a huge difference in what the company was able to achieve." It was during that time that I was kind

Amit Shah Reviews Security Situation In J&K After Terror Attacks

New Delhi (KCN): Home Minister Amit Shah today chaired a high-level meeting to review the security situation in Jammu and Kashmir following recent terror attacks. The meeting comes a day after the Prime Minister also reviewed the situation in the Union Territory. The top security brass briefed the Home Minister about the counter-insurgency measures taken after back-to-back terror attacks in the Jammu region. A 360-degree review will be done on Sunday. Mr Shah will chair the meeting in which National Security Advisor (NSA) Ajit Doval and Lieutenant Governor of Jammu and Kashmir



Manoj Sinha will participate along with the Chiefs of the Army, Intelligence Bureau and Research and Analysis Wing (R&AW). The Home Minister will also review the preparedness of the Union Territory's administration for the Amarnath Yatra. The Amarnath yatra is to begin from June 29 this year. The holy expedition

includes a 52-day yatra to the 3,880-metre-high shrine, located in the south of the Himalayas. Devotees from all over the country will begin their pilgrimage from the Jammu base camp. A unified command meeting was held earlier this week in Srinagar, after which a security audit of Jammu was done by the

forces. "Some gaps were identified in the present grid. Officers from the Jammu and Kashmir administration will brief the Home Minister and the NSA about what steps have been taken to strengthen the existing security grid," a senior officer told NDTV. The Director General of

Para forces along with other officers will also attend the high-level security review meeting, the officer added. Yesterday, the Prime Minister and the NSA reviewed the ground situation and then later spoke to Mr Shah. Terrorists struck at four places in the Reasi, Kathua and Doda districts of Jammu and Kashmir over the past four days. On June 9, terrorists launched an attack on pilgrims in a bus in the Reasi district, leaving nine people dead. On Tuesday, a suspected Pakistani terrorist was killed by security forces in the Kathua district. The overnight encounter ended after a second terrorist was also gunned down on Wednesday. A CRPF soldier was killed in action.

Customized Vehicles For STR

Bhubaneswar(KCN): In another move to make Similipal Tiger Reserve (STR) a poaching free zone, State Wildlife Organization has launched customized vehicles for movement of frontline staff for patrolling in all corners of the tiger reserve. Chief Conservator of Forests (Wildlife) & Chief Wildlife Warden Susanta Nanda said STR is famous for its tigers and elephants. It alone is the home of 90% tiger, 16% leopards and 25% elephants of Odisha. Similipal is the only home of an actively breeding population of unique melanistic tigers in the world. There are many species of rare, endangered, threatened and

vulnerable plants and animals. Mahaseer, Hornbill, Chowsingha, Mouse deer, Giant Squirrel, Flying squirrel, Ruddy mongoose, Mugger crocodile and Rufus tailed hare are examples of this unique biodiversity, he said. Similipal is the 61h largest Tiger Reserve of the country in terms of geographical extent and is one of the densest in terms of forest cover. Many hills in Similipal like Meghaseni, Khairibiru, etc. reach beyond 1100 m. elevation. Further, the STR has 1011.5 kms length of road network connecting 214 anti-poaching camps, 16 watchtowers, 19 check posts, monitoring and protection of wild tigers in Similipal Tiger

Farmers turning away from growing paddy as profit dips



Jajpur(KCN): Farmers are gradually turning away from growing paddy crop due to declining profit, a report said. An analysis of the earnings of farmers from paddy cultivation in the last five years reveals that profit from the crop has been quite disappointing. This is despite the fact that the agriculturists have been working hard during summer, rain and winter seasons to raise the crop. Reports said on average, farmers earn around Rs 607 to Rs 728 as profit from a quintal of paddy which is forcing many to turn away from the cultivation. The phenomenon has raised fears of a sharp rise in the prices of food products in the coming days. Observers attributed administrative negligence as the reason behind the declining profit of farmers from paddy cultivation. Some farmers requesting anonymity claimed that if a quintal of paddy was not sold at Rs 3,100 per quintal, as per the announcement made by the Union government, their hopes of getting adequate

profit would fade away. The declining profit from paddy cultivation has frustrated poor and marginal farmers and led to their migration to other states in search of alternative livelihoods. On the other hand, rapid industrialisation is directly, and indirectly, impacting rural life and agriculture. Climate change is also impacting cultivation as farmers have to battle drought and floods at frequent intervals to save the crop from destruction. Farmers are also facing losses due to the absence of irrigation facilities for cultivation, while irregularities and negligence in paddy procurement have hit them hard. According to reports available from the state Agriculture and Farmers' Empowerment Department, farmers spent Rs 1,208 per quintal of paddy cultivation in FY 2019-20, but sold the harvested paddy at Rs 1,815 per quintal. Similarly, farmers spent Rs 1,245 per quintal and sold the crop at Rs 1,868 in 2020-21 fiscal, while Rs 1,293 was spent per quintal and sold at Rs

1,940 in 2021-22 FY. Farmers spent Rs 1,360 per quintal and sold at Rs 2,040 in 2022-23 FY, while they spent Rs 1,455 per quintal of paddy and sold it at Rs 2,183 per quintal in 2023-24 FY. The district administration has strictly advised the regulated market committees (RMCs) to ensure that farmers do not face any problems during paddy procurement. Paddy should be procured there at the right time and steps be taken for hassle-free payment to the farmers. However, no one ever bothers if the paddy was procured at the right time, the number of PACs (primary agriculture cooperative societies) opened, and if farmers were paid properly or not. The elected political representatives also forget about the farmers. As a result, the problems of the farmers receive little attention, and they continue to be fleeced due to the alleged negligence and bonhomie between the officials and middlemen. These loopholes frustrate the entire paddy procurement process

which starts late every year to help the middlemen, it is alleged. As a result, farmers resort to distress sales and relieve their paddy stocks to middlemen at Rs 500 to Rs 600 below the per quintal MSP. Earlier, farmers had to endure a lot of hardship as the paddy procurement process was dependent on millers. Realizing the problem, the state government started procuring paddy through the government or government-authorized PACs. However, some unscrupulous officials in cahoots with middlemen started fleecing the farmers like before, it is alleged. Sources said that the mandis are opened late, or not opened at all. Officials are even allegedly manipulating the registration, and in providing tokens to the farmers for paddy procurement. This has only resulted in losses for the farmers and coming on the way of their becoming self-reliant.

Almonds Food for Fitness

Bhubaneswar: Engaging in exercise promotes a healthful lifestyle, but even when performed correctly, exercise causes fatigue and muscle damage. Recovery from exercise is important because it leads to muscle gain and improved fitness over time. A new study involving people who exercise occasionally (less than three times per week) demonstrated that snacking on almonds reduced feelings of fatigue and tension, increased leg and lower back strength during recovery, and decreased muscle damage during the first day of recovery. David C. Nieman, DrPH, FACSM, Professor and Principal Investigator, Human Performance Laboratory, Appalachian State University, led this novel research, supported with funding from the Almond Board of California. Dr. Nieman's team wanted to see if an almond snack compared to a high-carbohydrate cereal bar snack would improve inflammation and recovery in adults engaging in 90-minute exercise sessions. "What we found tells us definitively that almonds should be added to sports nutrition strategies to help people recover better from exercise," explained Dr. Nieman. "Almonds are food for fitness. Carbs get most of the attention when it comes to fueling for exercise, but almonds offer a nutrition package, including good unsaturated fats, the antioxidant vitamin E, and proanthocyanidins (class of polyphenols, which are protective compounds in plants) that help explain the beneficial outcomes in our study." One serving of almonds (28g) has 13 g of good unsaturated fat and only 1 g of saturated fat.

Archer then was up to the task again, this time with a slower leg cutter that the batter guided straight to gully. The pacer could have easily had a third wicket in the powerplay had Moeen Ali not dropped an

easy chance. Oman's hopes of getting through the powerplay with no further damage took a huge hit when Mark Wood came into the attack. He struck first ball as Zeeshan Maqsood got a leading edge first ball. Wood's pace was too much for Kashyap Prajapati as he played a tame shot with no timing at all to give Wood his second wicket. If Oman thought they could breathe easy after that initial burst, they were in for a rude shock. Adil Rashid fetched a wicket first ball when

Khalid Kail was stumped. Wood rearranged the stumps in the next over to pin Oman further down and from thereon, they simply couldn't stage a comeback. Rashid just kept it simple against the tail enders as he ran through the lineup before Archer hit the final nail in the coffin. It was over before you could even realise it. That's how quick the game ended. In total, England took only 16.3 overs to finish the game, which is less than an entire innings. Phil Salt

took full toll of this opportunity to boost the NRR big time as he smashed Bilal Khan for two sixes off the first two balls of the run chase. While Bilal did get his revenge off the third delivery, the wicket didn't deter England who also lost Will Jacks in the second over. Bairstow then completed the formalities with another boundary to put Oman out of their misery.

Anderson to retire after Lord's Test against West Indies



LONDON: James Anderson, the highest wicket-taking paceman in Test cricket, has announced that the first Test against West Indies to be played at Lord's from July 10, will be his final Test appearance. "Hi everyone. Just a note to say that the first Test of the summer at Lord's will be my last Test," Anderson wrote in an Instagram post. "It's been an incredible 20 years representing my

country, playing the game I've loved since I was a kid. I'm going to miss walking out for England so much. But I know the time is right to step aside and let others realise their dreams just like I got to, because there is no greater feeling. "I couldn't have done it without the love and support of Daniella, Lola, Ruby and my parents. A huge thank you to them. Also, thank you to the players and

coaches who have made this the best job in the world. "I'm excited for the new challenges that lie ahead, as well as filling my days with even more golf," he added. "Thank you to everyone who has supported me over the years, it's always meant a lot, even if my face often doesn't show it." Anderson, who made his Test debut for England in May 2003 against Zimbabwe,

became the first fast bowler to reach the milestone of 700 Test wickets in the fifth Test against India in Dharamsala earlier this year. He is nine wickets away from surpassing Shane Warne as the second highest wicket taker in Test cricket. Anderson has picked up 32 five-wicket hauls and three 10-wicket hauls, with a best of 7 for 42 (vs West Indies at Lord's in 2017) and 11 for 71 (vs Pakistan at Trent Bridge in 2010). He has scored 1353 runs with one half-century - 81 against India at Trent Bridge in 2014. According to a report on The Guardian, Anderson recently had a conversation with Test head coach Brendon McCullum who flew down to England to tell the senior pacer that the team was looking to the future. Anderson, almost 42 years, has not had too many fitness issues but was used sparingly by

England in the Tests against India, bowling only 110 overs across four Tests (seven innings) in which he picked up 10 wickets. He didn't have a great Ashes last year, averaging 85.40 for his five wickets in four Tests. Stuart Broad, who played 138 matches with Anderson, retired after the final Ashes Test in 2023 having crossed 600 Test wickets during the series. Broad later revealed to Daily Mail that he had an understanding with Anderson that they would not retire at the same time. "It was like an unwritten clause in a contract that Jimmy and I never wanted to finish at the same time. We always wanted an overlap one way or the other, a crossover of knowledge, not 300-plus matches of Test experience disappearing out of the changing room."

Shakib ends lean drought to keep Bangladesh on course

New Delhi: Bangladesh veteran Shakib Al Hasan finally brought an end to his lean patch as he delivered in a crucial tie against Netherlands in the ongoing T20 World Cup. Ahead of the first time, perhaps for the first time in his career, Shakib saw his place being questioned due to his lean run. Shakib was struggling with the bat while the old magic was missing from his bowling as well that certainly took a toll on his reputation as it was at stake before he turned it around with a man-of-the-match display. The left-handed batter, who made an unbeaten 64 coming at number four, earlier made a T20I half-century back in October 2022. Coming into the Netherlands game, Shakib

had scored 8 against Sri Lanka and 3 against South Africa in his last two innings. After the game, Shakib was asked if he has answered the critics finally. "A player never comes to answer any questions," Shakib shot back. "A player's job is to bat for the team if he's a batsman and contribute to the team. If he is a bowler, his job is to bowl well. The

wicket is about luck. If he is a fielder, he should save each run and take as many catches as he can. Here, actually, there's nothing to answer for anyone." "I think it is important for a current player (to see) how much he can contribute to his team. When he can't contribute, then naturally there would be discussions and I don't think it is a bad thing," he added.
