We were denied the full opportunity to argue the case. I am making allegations with full

seriousness,” he stated. Senior advocate Abhishek Manu Singhvi, representing CM Kejriwal, opposed the stay request, citing legal precedents. “There are ten Supreme Court judgments that cancellation of bail is radically different from grant of bail,” he contended. After hearing arguments from both sides, the High Court directed that the bail order should not be enforced until the matter is heard in full. “The bail order will not be given effect. We have not passed the final order. You may argue as much as you can,” the Bench stated, effectively halting CM Kejriwal’s release.

India rejects comments by UN's top human rights official on foreign influence laws

“worrying trend in terms of civic space is the consideration or adoption of so-called “transparency” or “foreign influence” laws in over 50 countries, including in the Republika Srpska entity of Bosnia and Herzegovina, Georgia, India, Kyrgyzstan, the Russian Federation, Slovakia and Turkiye. democratic nations across the world, including India, have had regulations for many decades to guard

against legitimate concerns about the misuse of foreign funds. “Principles of transparency and

accountability cannot be applied selectively. Portraying a dependence on the crutches of opaque or illegal foreign funding is

also a disservice to India's vibrant civil society," he said.

Bagchi added that ongoing global conflicts have "unfortunately" divided the Human Rights Council further.

"It is more important than ever for the Office of High Commissioner to focus on its core mandates," he said.

Noting that the High Commissioner's global update is a rather gloomy assessment of human rights across the world, Bagchi spoke about "our pride" in India's just concluded general

elections. He said that as previously underscored, "concerns about this process were unwarranted" and the Indian general elections was the largest electoral exercise in the history of mankind, with 650 million voters with full faith in the electoral mandate. "And all this is backed by a pluralistic and open society with robust institutional mechanisms and safeguards. We do believe that human rights of all can be best promoted and protected in such environments," Bagchi added.

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NO ROOM FOR COMPLACENCY – A WARNING THAT BJP CAN'T DENY



The Sangh (RSS) and the BJP are known to sing from the same hymn sheet. Both, being the proponents of the same nationalist view, holding the nation to be supreme, with its adorable motherhood, an ideal that they frequently declare that their lives are made to make a sacrifice for, have recently developed a slight ideological rift. The RSS began to feel that the BJP's transformation under the powerful popularity of Prime Minister Modi has, to some extent, been underhanded and the results of national election 2024 evidently made this sense of understanding surface. Mohan Bhagwat, the RSS Chief made unequivocal remarks on the power that the BJP was building around, and the party mechanism,

according to him, needs to undergo an ideological overhauling. The drying up of the BJP's electoral exchequer in the Hindutva heartlands especially in Uttar Pradesh might have triggered an intellectual churn in the Sangh. And the unambiguously uttered statements of the RSS Chief in the event held at Nagpur the other day must have pricked the BJP leadership. His views being put for analysis, pundits seem to have understood the predicament that the saffron family, in the larger context, might have sensed. An electoral defeat to this magnitude was sure to invite criticisms and the RSS being a thought movement believes in dialogues and corrections. As for Narendra Modi, the Sangh cohorts understand the fact that he had never hesitated to express his association with the RSS as a pracharak (full time worker) and even today his ideological bonhomie with the organization is

intact. His predecessor Vajpayee had been alert and conscious while he drew from the pages of his RSS days. He was certainly aware of the coalition compulsions. Probably, the congeniality of the coalition structure of politics made him choose the middle path of a conscience keeper among the alliance partners. He preferred to keep his Sangh ideology a personal brand of understanding but he was sure to keep it aside when coalition dharma needed a larger platform to create consensus. Modi never had to face such coalition compulsions. He has no experience of working under the compulsive dynamics of an alliance as his party always under him performed far better than its allies. Therefore, the question on how his administrative temperament and strict visionary zeal of being an unquestioned power center would support him run the coalition did not arise. Vajpayee had a humorous way of

handling his partners and he was ready to make policy adjustments in decision making. The RSS, being the largest ideological entity in the Sangh parivar, seems to have sensed Modi's unchallenged wave of power that controlled the government for a decade. Coalition partners remained mute, invisible and frozen as and when the government decided to go with its earth shattering reforms. Modi's unquestionable power rose to immeasurable heights as his party won 303 seats in 2019. His party and the RSS too, probably accepted the larger than life image of the Prime Minister. The statements of the RSS Chief passed tremors of discontent as it was possibly ignored and literally sidelined by the overconfident BJP leadership. There have been strict and decisive imprints of dissatisfaction in his words as he shed light on the horror that the state of Manipur has been through for more than a year. Indirectly, Mohan Bhagwat was holding the Modi government

responsible for its failure as it was unable to chalk out a credible solution to check the ruthless bloodshed in the state. Bhagwat's strike on the BJP was precise, straight and unexpected. As usual, he was composed and kept the manners of great intellectualism of an orator. His words were loaded with humility. But, of course, they intended to warn the political party that was born and grown as an ideological offshoot of the Sangh. "A true sevak (one who serves the people) does not have 'ahankar' (arrogance) and works without causing any hurt to others," he said. We have no reason to be confused as the statement was a straight shot from the quiver of dogmas of the Sangh and the target was the Prime Minister. The poll campaign this time was verbally violent and disrespectfully shot in haste on the opponents. Neither the Prime Minister nor his cohorts in the party nor even the opposition paused for a restraint. The aggressive narrative war brought the entire campaign down to mere mudslinging. The RSS

chief's critical examination further reiterated as to who a true sevak is. "The one who maintains decorum does his work, but remains unattached. There is no arrogance that I did this. Only such a person has the right to be called a sevak," he said. The writing on the wall is clear. The RSS, though it never hesitates to support the BJP, has now come out with warning signals against the personality cult in the party. The Sangh believes with certainty that organization is above people. It also believes with conviction that nobody in the doctrinal framework of the Sangh Parivar enjoys the power of an emperor. Highlighting the pre-poll gimmicks of the ruling party indirectly, the Sangh chief's words were to set the thought process in the BJP right. Stressing hard on the need for consensus in the parliament, Bhagwat appeared to have literally passed a leaf of reminder for the BJP and its leadership. That the

government without consensus being built cannot push for reforms. Elected members, irrespective of their strength in numbers, hold complete right to know the policy mobilization and 'consensus' is the catchphrase that in practice makes the government run smoothly. Bhagwat's decisive remarks force us to go back to the days of Vajpayee's coalition government. Politics, being an art of compulsion, demands Vajpayee's accommodative, inclusive and consensual behavior. Prime Minister Modi, in the last decade of his administration had never been forced to change his self-willed and as he is frequently criticized, his independent style of functioning. Moreover, the most critical element that sticks out with uncertainty and waiting for a way to get enhanced in the coalition regime is his party's hardcore Hindutva ideology. Bhagwat, politely reminding the government and its leadership about the value of consensus,

does a great service. He doesn't ask the party to sit back and cry. But his ammunition is aptly dropped on the arrogance that the party was loaded with. While trying to understand the tectonic ideological shift in the RSS, it was Bhagwat whose outreaching efforts to the Muslim clergy recently made headlines. Almost a hundred years now, the RSS and its present chief realize that the BJP, if left without being strictly toned down, would become a political catastrophe. The 'Congressization' of the BJP has already begun. The Sangh seems to have taken its 'Tutor's Stick' to teach the party a lesson. The RSS wants the saffron party to survive in power.

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Refugee Crisis : From Desperation to Hope

As the world observes World Refugee Day on June 20th, we are reminded of the millions of individuals who are forced to flee their homes due to war, conflict, persecution, violence or natural disasters. According to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), by the end of 2022, the number of forcibly displaced people worldwide reached a staggering 103 million including over 32.5 million refugees. This humanitarian crisis presents a multitude of challenges and necessitates comprehensive and sustainable solutions. Refugees encounter numerous adversities throughout their journey and in their host countries. Social exclusion is one of the primary issues

they face. Refugees often confront significant barriers to integration within their host communities. Language differences, cultural dissimilarities and a lack of understanding can lead to social isolation. This exclusion is detrimental to their mental health and well-being hindering their ability to build a new life. For instance, in countries like Germany and Sweden, where large numbers of refugees have sought asylum, integration programs are crucial in overcoming these barriers. Discrimination is another pervasive challenge. Refugees frequently experience discrimination based on ethnicity, nationality or religion. This discrimination can occur in various spheres including employment, education and access to services. It not only violates their basic human rights but also exacerbates their vulnerability. In countries like Lebanon and Jordan,

where refugee populations are high relative to the local population, refugees often face legal and social discrimination that limits their access to essential services and economic opportunities. Exploitation is a grave concern particularly for women and children. Refugees are at heightened risk of labor exploitation, human trafficking and sexual violence. The lack of legal protections and the precarious nature of their situation often leave them with limited recourse to justice. For example, in regions of Southeast Asia, Rohingya refugees fleeing persecution in Myanmar have fallen victim to human trafficking networks, facing severe exploitation and abuse. To tackle the refugee crisis effectively, it is crucial to address the underlying causes of displacement. Conflict resolution and peacebuilding are paramount. Many refugees flee due to armed conflict and

violence. International efforts must focus on diplomatic solutions, peace negotiations and supporting stable governance in conflict-prone regions. Organizations such as the United Nations and regional bodies play pivotal roles in mediating and resolving conflicts. In Syria, efforts towards a diplomatic resolution are critical to halting the outflow of refugees and enabling eventual safe return. Human rights protections are equally vital. Persecution based on race, religion, nationality or political opinion forces many to flee. Strengthening international human rights mechanisms and ensuring accountability for human rights violations are essential steps toward reducing forced displacement. In countries like Eritrea, where government repression forces thousands to flee annually, international pressure and human rights advocacy are essential in mitigating

such exodus. Climate change mitigation and adaptation must also be prioritized. Natural disasters and climate change are increasingly significant drivers of displacement. Implementing robust climate action plans, supporting sustainable development and aiding communities to adapt to changing environmental conditions can help mitigate this cause of displacement. In Bangladesh, the impacts of climate change on the coastal regions have led to significant internal displacement, highlighting the urgent need for comprehensive climate strategies. For refugees who cannot return home, sustainable solutions include resettlement, local integration and voluntary repatriation. Expanding resettlement programs in third countries is essential. Resettlement offers a durable solution for the most vulnerable refugees who cannot safely remain in their host country or return

home. Countries like Canada and Australia have been proactive in resettlement programs offering new beginnings to thousands of refugees annually. Local integration is another critical solution. Host countries should create conducive environments for refugees to integrate locally. This includes providing access to education, healthcare and employment opportunities and promoting social inclusion. In Uganda, a progressive refugee policy allows refugees to work, move freely and access public services setting a commendable example for other nations. Voluntary repatriation is the preferred solution for many refugees but it must be done voluntarily and in safety and dignity. This requires restoring peace and stability in their countries of origin and ensuring their rights and security upon return. Efforts in countries like South Sudan and Afghanistan focus on rebuilding and

providing conditions conducive to safe and dignified returns. Addressing the refugee crisis requires global solidarity and cooperation. Developed nations must share the responsibility of hosting refugees and provide financial and technical support to countries bearing the brunt of the crisis. International frameworks, such as the Global Compact on Refugees offer a blueprint for more predictable and equitable sharing of burdens and responsibilities. On World Refugee

Day, it is imperative to recognize the resilience and courage of refugees worldwide. The global community must work collaboratively to address the root causes of displacement, ensure the protection of refugees and implement sustainable solutions that respect their dignity and rights. By doing so, we can move closer to a world where everyone has a place to call home.

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Changes in Indian Forest Laws Can Have Negative Impacts on Elephant Conservation



Elephants are integral to the cultural heritage, ecological health, historical legacy, and economic vitality of the Indian subcontinent. Elephants hold immense importance in the Indian subcontinent for several reasons: Cultural and Religious Significance: Elephants are deeply embedded in the cultural and religious fabric of the region. They are revered in Hinduism, particularly through the deity Ganesha, who has an elephant's head and symbolizes wisdom and prosperity. Elephants are also important in Buddhist and Jain traditions. Historical Role: Historically, elephants were used in warfare, transportation, and ceremonial events. They

were prized possessions of kings and featured prominently in royal processions and battles. Ecological Importance: Elephants are a keystone species in their habitats. They play a critical role in maintaining the ecological balance by aiding in seed dispersal and creating pathways through dense forests that other animals use. Economic and Touristic Value: Elephants contribute to the economy through tourism. Many tourists visit India and other parts of the subcontinent to see elephants in national parks and sanctuaries, boosting local economies. Conservation Efforts: The conservation of elephants is a significant environmental issue. Efforts to protect and preserve elephant populations involve substantial resources and attention from both governmental and non-governmental organizations. However, on March of

2021, the Union Environment & Forestry Ministry notified new rules for the transfer of captive elephants. Asiatic elephants can now be transferred between individuals or states for "religious and other purposes" something that the law did not permit before. These, along with the amendment to the Wild Life Protection Act (1972) in 2022, could legitimise the live trade of elephants and encourage the illegal capture of elephants from the wild. Again in the month of March 2023, Bhupinder Yadav introduced the environment ministry's amendment of the Forest Conservation Act (1980) in the Lok Sabha and gave away 28% of the forest land to industrial houses as a gift. This was surprising that almost all of the forest fraternity and relevant stakeholders were muted. People in this country have been so divided on political lines that none really protested

about this monumental change that can have severe obg term implications in the future. Changes in forest laws can have significant implications for elephant conservation in India. Elephants, being a keystone species, are highly dependent on forest ecosystems for their habitat and survival. Here are several key implications of such legal changes: Habitat Fragmentation and Loss: Reduced Protection: Easing of forest protection laws could lead to increased deforestation and fragmentation of habitats, which are critical for elephants. This can result in the loss of crucial corridors that elephants use to migrate between different forest areas. Infrastructure Development: Laws that favor industrial development, mining, or infrastructure projects (such as roads and

railways) within forested areas can fragment habitats, making it difficult for elephants to move freely and find food, water, and mates. Human - Elephant Conflict: Increased Encroachments: Weakened forest protection can lead to more human encroachments into elephant habitats. This often results in human-elephant conflicts as elephants raid crops or come into contact with human settlements, leading to casualties on both sides. Resource Depletion: Forest degradation due to lax laws can deplete resources like food and water that elephants rely on, pushing them closer to human habitations in search of these resources. Conservation Funding and Management: Funding Cuts: Changes in laws might also affect the funding allocated for wildlife and forest conservation. Reduced

financial support can hinder conservation initiatives, anti-poaching efforts, and the management of protected areas. Policy Shifts: Legal amendments could shift policy priorities away from conservation towards more economically driven goals. This can lead to a decrease in the implementation of effective conservation strategies. Legal and Enforcement Challenges: Enforcement Issues: Even with strong laws, enforcement is often a challenge. Legal changes that dilute forest protection can exacerbate existing enforcement issues, making it harder to prevent illegal logging, poaching, and encroachments. 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Modi 3.0 Budget 2024 :Income tax cut likely?

Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman is all set to present her seventh straight union budget next month. She has so far presented five full-fledged budgets and one interim one as the finance minister in Modi 2.0 government. With just over a month to go until the budget, anticipations and speculations are high that Sitharaman will give taxpayers some relief this time as the last time anything significant taxpayers witnessed was in budget 2020, when she announced a new tax regime with lower tax slabs. With the new government sworn in, all eyes are now on the full Budget for FY25. Well, reports indicate that the Budget may be presented towards the end of July with the commencement of the Monsoon Session of the Parliament. Pre-bud get consultations, starting June 18 and lasting seven to ten days, will influence the final schedule. Depending on when these consultations finish, the budget is expected to be tabled towards the end of July, closer to the third week. The probable dates for Budget presentation vary from July 15 – 22. There is widespread discussion regarding who will be the key beneficiaries of possible

tax rate cuts in the budget? Certain categories of taxpayers might get some good news from the finance minister in this upcoming budget. According to a Reuters report based on government sources, lowering personal tax rates for certain categories of individuals is being considered as the aim is to boost consumption. Individuals earning more than Rs 15 lakh

A cut in income tax would see consumption going up due to extra cash in consumer hands. Lowering of taxes for certain categories would also increase savings for the middle class, the report further said. While the economy grew at 8.2% in 2023-24, consumption has grown at half that pace, the report said. Speculations over possible tax rate cuts are also high because PM Modi, while staking

upcoming full Budget for 2024-25 considering the high levels of inflation. In the interim budget, presented in February this year ahead of the Lok Sabha elections, FM Sitharaman did not announce any changes either in the tax rates or slabs, but now, taxpayers – especially salaried and middle-class – are expecting that she will provide some relief. In recent years, the



per annum might get tax relief, the report said citing one of the sources. The changes could be made to the new tax regime introduced in 2020. Under the new regime, annual income up to Rs 15 lakh is taxed at 5-20% while earnings over Rs 15 lakh attract 30% tax. The personal tax rate jumps six-fold when an individual's income increases by five times from Rs 3 lakh to 15 lakh, "which is quite steep," the report said citing another source.

Climate Change is affecting people all over the world

The Ecological and Functional Literacy for Climate Friendly and Sustainable Livelihoods Project has been take up Rayagada and Koraput to address the two main causes of underdevelopment in the tribal regions, namely, illiteracy and environmental degradation. With generous support from the Signet Excipient Private Limited (SEPL), the projects reaches out to 1200 farmers in 150 villages, with the objectives of helping them to improve their production and address adverse effects of climate change while also improving education and literacy levels through youth training. The districts under the project form part of the Eastern Ghat regions, a discontinuous range of mountains spread over 75,000 sq. km., and 1700 kms long along the east coast of India. Described as a water tower, a carbon sink, a perennial food basket and a gene reservoir, the region has more than 100 different indigenous communities, who despite the richness of the region are amongst the poorest in the country. More than 70% of the population of these districts is below the official poverty line. 43% children below 5yrs of are stunted and nearly 40% underweight, as reported in the National Family Health Survey, 2021. Much of the poverty and hunger is aggravated by loss of forest cover and goes

hand in hand with environmental degradation. The tribal communities traditionally practiced shifting cultivation, which supplemented their hunting and food gathering from the forest. A wide range of crop combinations, including millets, pulses, squash, would be cultivated in a swidden patch, providing a diverse and rich nutrition. Tribals consider the forest run off as vital for fertilizing the swidden land, while also enabling the cultivated patch to regain its forest cover patch in a matter of few years. Now, all these functions have been severely affected due to deforestation. In addition, climate change has also affected rainfall patterns. The long periods of gentle continuous rain characteristic of the Koraput monsoons in the past, has been replaced largely by much more erratic, short heavy showers, including cloud bursts leading to landslides, and severely impacting upland cultivation. All this has lead tribal

farmers to give up much of their traditional crops, and turn to commercial monocrops, that necessitate excessive use of chemicals, pesticides and herbicides. There has thus been a loss of agricultural biodiversity, with many of local traditional crop varieties that were cultivated and preserved over generations being seriously endangered. The traditional seeds and traditional cropping patterns were decided by women. With change to commercial crops, women's decision making role in agriculture has also been severely affected. Through the SEPL support, the project seeks to channelise youth energy to help farmers develop sustainable and integrated family farms, as a model for addressing the impact of climate change in upland tribal regions. The project will train youth to work as eco-leaders, that is it will enable them to provide inputs to farmers in their village and neighbouring villages for improved and sustainable land use, development and

maintenance of plantations, and over all establishing a family farm that meets most of the livelihood needs of the family. In addition, the youth will also be trained and supported for running learning centres for dropouts and children in their own villages. Each youth will be encouraged to develop one acre of their land, as a Farmers' Field Schools, for training and demonstration of approaches and methods for sustainable land use and management. The project thus seeks to demonstrate, as also build up the skills for an alternate and integrated method of land use in the tribal regions that can have multiple benefits for impoverished tribal families. It is envisaged that the visible success of the efforts will motivate other farmer neighbours to also develop their lands into sustainable family farms, and be able to stop distress migration, as also eucalyptus cultivation which dries up the water table and spoils the land for any cultivation, over the long run.

Mamata Banerjee Set To Campaign For Priyanka Gandhi In Wayanad: Sources

New Delhi: Sending out a strong signal that all is well between the Trinamool Congress and the INDIA alliance following the pre-election acrimony, West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee is ready to campaign for Congress leader Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, who is set to make her electoral debut from Wayanad, party sources have said.

The Trinamool Congress sources said that not only is Ms Banerjee willing to campaign for Ms Gandhi, but she had also suggested during an INDIA alliance meeting last December that the Congress leader should contest against PM Narendra Modi from Varanasi - an idea that has also been floated within the

Congress as early as 2019.

Ms Gandhi will be fighting from Wayanad when a bypoll is held there, after Rahul Gandhi decided to vacate the seat and retain the family bastion of Raebareli. He had won the Wayanad constituency for the second time, by a margin of 3.6 lakh votes, in the just-concluded elections. Part of the reason behind the rekindled bonhomie between Ms Banerjee and the Congress is the fact that Adhir Ranjan Chowdhury, one of the Bengal chief minister's strongest critics, has lost from the Baharampur Lok Sabha constituency in these elections after five straight victories.

On Thursday, he also resigned as the president of the Bengal Congress Unit, but there is no confirmation on whether the resignation has been accepted.

While Ms Banerjee and the Gandhis are known to share a close bond, Mr Chowdhury's acerbic and often personal barbs at the chief minister have been a source of friction between the Trinamool and the Congress. They were also seen as a factor behind her decision to go it alone in West Bengal in the Lok Sabha elections - a move that paid off, with the Trinamool fending off an all-out challenge by the BJP and winning 29 of the state's 42 constituencies.



The sources said the "Adhir issue" has now been resolved and that the Trinamool had told the Congress that he would lose his seat. Ahead of the Parliament session starting on Monday, which will see the opposition at its strongest since 2014, the sources said the Bengal Chief Minister has also sought better

coordination among members of the INDIA alliance, who have won 232 Lok Sabha seats between them.

Signs of this happening have already begun, with the Trinamool, the Congress and the DMK opposing the implementation of the three new criminal laws - Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha

Sanhita and the Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam, which will replace the Indian Penal Code, the Code of Criminal Procedure and the Indian Evidence Act, respectively. The opposition has claimed that the laws were passed without consultation during the Monsoon session of

Parliament last year, when over 140 MPs were suspended. In a letter to the Prime Minister on Friday, Ms Banerjee pushed for a fresh review of the laws by Parliament. "The outgoing government of yours had passed these three critical bills unilaterally, and with absolutely no debate. That day, almost 100 members of the Lok Sabha had been suspended and a total 146 MPs of the both Houses were thrown out of Parliament," Ms Banerjee wrote, adding that the three bills were passed in an "authoritarian manner" in a "dark hour of democracy". Chandigarh MP and senior Congress leader Manish Tewari has also hit out at the

government over the implementation of the laws.

"The new criminal laws that come into effect from July 1st 2024 lay the foundations of turning India into a Police State. Their implementation must be stopped forthwith and Parliament must re-examine them," he posted on X.

Another issue that the opposition is likely to try and corner the government over is the NEET and NET exam fiasco. Protests have erupted across the country over irregularities in NEET and the cancellation of the UGC-NET, both of which are conducted by the National Testing Agency.
