## Low-pressure area over BoB likely to trigger heavy rains in Odisha: IMD



**Bhubaneswar(KCN):** Several parts of Odisha are likely to receive heavy rains in the next two days as the low-pressure area over northwest Bay of Bengal (BoB), off north Odisha coast, moves northwards during the period, IMD sources said Friday.

The low-pressure area has been formed under the influence of a cyclonic circulation over northwest and the adjoining west-central Bay of Bengal (BoB), they added.

Meanwhile, widespread rainfall activity with very heavy rainfall at one or

two places was recorded in Koraput district, Friday. Heavy rainfall was also witnessed at one or two places in Dhenkanal, Koraput, Malkangiri, Khurda, Rayagada, and Nayagarh, Ganjam, Jagatsinghpur, Kendrapara, and Bhadrak districts. Heavy rainfall (7 to 11 cm) is also very likely to occur at isolated places over the districts of Khorda, Puri, Balasore, Jajpur, Cuttack, Bolangir, Nuapada, Boudh, Angul, Dhenkanal, Gajapati, Keonjhar, Mayurbhanj, and Koraput. Fishermen have been alerted that squally weather with gusty surface wind speeds reaching 40 to 50 kmph is likely over the northwest Bay of Bengal off the Odisha coast until June 30.

The National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (Undergraduate) or NEET-UG was conducted by the NTA on May 5 with around 24 lakh candidates taking part in it. Those in

charge of NTA have been removed and the responsibility has been given to senior officials. All of this is proof of the government's commitment. further symptoms may develop. Difficulty in swallowing, Slurred speech, Sweating, Rapid heartbeat, Redness and ulcers in the affected region.

Types of Diphtheria are Respiratory diphtheria, Cutaneous diphtheria, Malignant diphtheria, Nasal diphtheria.

The first step in treating diphtheria is an antitoxin injection. This is



used to minimize the effect of the toxins produced by the bacteria. The doctors also prescribe antibiotics, such as erythromycin and penicillin to clear the infection.

During the treatment, patients are instructed to stay in the hospital in order to avoid the spread of infection to others.

Diphtheria can be prevented to an extent by the use of vaccines and antibiotics. The vaccine for diphtheria is called DTaP. It's normally given in a single shot with vaccines for diphtheria,

it's suggested that they get a combination shot of tetanus and diphtheria. This is called the tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine.

Some diphtheria develops if there is poor hygiene. So it is highly recommended to maintain good hygiene by regular washing hands before eating and cooking and by keeping surrounding clean and tidy.

# Britain's Election: Will Rishi Sunak Get All the "Indian" Votes?



Will Rishi Sunak, Britain's first Hindu Prime Minister, remain in office after the upcoming general election on July 4th? Will Sunak's Conservative Party receive the votes of British Indians? Will Labour Party also receive votes from the Indian diaspora? These are important questions indeed. According to the 2011 British census, there are approximately 1.5 million people of Indian origin in Britain, representing 2.5% of the country's total population. Indians are the largest immigrant group in Britain. They are relatively well-educated compared to other immigrant groups and are considered to be among the wealthiest in Britain. Hinduja, Lakshmi Mittal,

and Swaraj Paul are some prominent Indian-origin individuals who feature in the list of Britain's richest people. Rishi Sunak and his wife Akshata Murthy, daughter of Infosys founder N.R. Narayan Murthy, were ranked 245th in the Sunday Times list of Britain's wealthiest individuals released in May. Historically, Indian immigrants in Britain have leaned towards the Labour Party. It was during the Labour government that India gained independence from British rule. However, recent surveys suggest a growing inclination towards the Conservative Party after Narendra Modi became India's Prime Minister in 2014. Hindus comprise the majority of these supporters. The total Hindu population among Indians in Britain is over a million. Modi addressed over 60,000 people of Indian origin at a packed Wembley Stadium in London during his 2015 visit to Britain. Gujarati and Punjabi people were in the majority at that time. Boris Johnson, the then British Prime Minister, was known to proudly call himself "India's son-in-law". He was a unique son-in-law. His (second

divorced) wife Marina Wheeler's mother, Deep Singh Kaur, was previously married to Sardar Daljit Singh, son of renowned contractor Sir Sobha Singh from New Delhi. Sobha Singh had four sons, one of whom was the writer Khushwant Singh. Now, let's understand another subtle point. Not all Indian immigrants in Britain think alike politically or support any specific party. You could say that British Indians are also divided, to some extent, along religious

lines. It is believed that most Indian Muslims and Sikhs may vote for the Labour Party. They are not fond of the close ties between the Conservative Party and Modi. From the 1960s to the 1980s, a significant number of Indian immigrants settled in Britain from Uganda, Kenya, and the Caribbean Islands. These communities viewed Labour as sympathetic to immigrants. They were particularly attracted to Labour's commitment to immigrants' rights, especially following the introduction of the Race

Relations Act in 1965 by Labour Prime Minister Harold Wilson. Thousands of Indian immigrants came to Britain from Uganda after Uganda's cannibalistic president Idi Amin ordered the expulsion of all Indians from his country within 90 days in August 1972. A deeper analysis reveals that British Hindus have been leaning towards the Conservative Party since 2010. This trend includes wealthy and educated second and third-generation Hindus. In the

past 20-25 years, a new wave of immigrants from India has arrived in Britain. These are doctors, engineers, IT professionals, etc. They all identify themselves as Conservative Party voters. The Indian diaspora's disaffection with the Labour Party did not happen overnight. It was triggered by Labour's 2019 resolution calling for "the right of self-determination" for the people of Jammu and Kashmir. This resolution led a large section of the Indian diaspora in Britain to distance themselves from the Labour Party. They saw it as direct interference in India's internal affairs. Meanwhile, Rishi Sunak became Britain's first Hindu Prime Minister in 2022. This development deepened the bond between Hindus and the Conservative Party. It is still too early to say whether Hindus will vote en masse for the Conservative Party in the upcoming British general election. However, for the first time, British Hindus

have released a manifesto outlining their aspirations and expectations from the next government. They say they will only support those who endorse their demands.

Hindus are the third-largest religious group in Britain. 29 Hindu organizations have so far endorsed this manifesto. According to the manifesto, "Hindus are the backbone of the British economy. Our contribution to the country's economy is disproportionately high. We are one of the most law-abiding communities. Yet, anti-Hindu hate is on the rise in the country." One of their key demands is for their safety. There are several things to watch out for. Will the Hindu votes be split or go to the Conservative Party? Will the Labour and Conservative parties consider the manifesto of the Hindu organizations? Will British Indians, other than Hindus, stand with the Labour Party?



The Zoological Survey of India (ZSI) is celebrating its 109th ZSI Day on June 30, 2024, marking over a century of contributions to zoological research and biodiversity conservation. Established on July 1, 1916, in Kolkata, ZSI has grown into a premier research institution under the Ministry of Environment, Forests, and Climate Change, Government of India. Over the years, ZSI has documented the faunal resources of India, leading to significant advancements in the knowledge of the country's rich faunal diversity. The celebration of the 109th foundation day will be graced by the presence of the Hon'ble Union Minister of Environment, Forest and

Climate Change, Shri Bhupender Yadav, who will be the Chief Guest. Shri Yadav will also inaugurate the 'Animal Taxonomic Summit-2024' organized by ZSI, scheduled from July 1 to 3, 2024. The Hon'ble Minister of State, Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Shri Kirti Vardhan Singh, will be the Guest of Honor, and the Director General of Forests and Special Secretary, MoEFCC, Mr. Jitendra Kumar, will address the gathering. One of the highlights of the event will be the launch of the 'Fauna of India Checklist Portal' by the Hon'ble Union Minister. This portal, the first of its kind, will cover all faunal species reported from India, making India the first country in the world to have a comprehensive list of its documented fauna. # Lower Suktel oustees live in darkness

**Bolangir(KCN):** The landless villagers of Kharsabahal village in Bolangir district, who were displaced for the Lower Suktel Irrigation Project, have been pushed to darkness after the district administration rehabilitated them at Barapudagia village without power supply to their makeshift houses. The displaced villagers comprising 15 landless families mostly from Scheduled Caste (SC) and Muslim communities have been rehabilitated on government land. They earn their living by working as daily wagers or by peddling bangles in the nearby villages. Being landless, the villagers have been deprived of government assistance except for a ration card with which they get rice every month. The state government has neither given them any plot to

build houses nor announced a big package for them for being landless. The oustees have built makeshift houses on the land at their own cost. Living in the temporary huts, they are passing through a harrowing time in complete darkness after evening due to a lack of power supply. It has been over a year since they have been rehabilitated but their sufferings do not seem to end. They were not even given solar panels or even a torch to light up their houses. Sources said the first rainwater was stored in the reservoir in July 2023. However, people in many of the villages were in the submergence area were not displaced then. Later, incessant rainfall occurred. As a result, the backwaters of the reservoir gushed into the riparian Kharsabahal,



Gadashankar, Dunguri pali, Banchhorpali and Kumiapalli villages. Alarmed over the development, the district administration hurriedly evacuated hundreds of landless families and rehabilitated them at the hostel of a tribal school at Chudapali, August 2, 2023. The evacuation was so swift that the displaced villagers even failed to bring with them many of their belongings. The state government only announced financial assistance of Rs 3.45 lakh for each family. Later, the district administration

announced that government land at Barapudagia village has been identified for their rehabilitation and shifted the villagers there. It was also announced that the displaced families will be given a housing plot each under Vasundhara Yojana.

The villagers were rehabilitated on the government land but the place does not have basic facilities such as a good road, drinking water, power supply or readymade houses to live in. As a result, the villagers constructed houses on their own and started living in the area. Meanwhile, over 10 months have passed since then, but the district administration is yet to ensure the basic facilities for them. The whole area plunges into darkness after sundown. Women are the worst sufferers as there is no pond or any water body in the area. Children have failed to study sans an Anganwadi centre in the area. The villagers always live in constant fear of wild animals and snakes as the area is close to a forest. Rains further worsen their sorrows. They have lodged several complaints but the district administration is yet to address their pleas. When contacted, Nutan Seth, project director (in-charge) of Lower Suktel Irrigation Project (rehabilitation and resettlement), a final estimate has been prepared for power supply and sent to TPWODC. The RWSS department has also installed two tube wells for the villagers. The rest of their problems will be resolved gradually, he added.

## Devotees throng Alarnath temple to have darshan of Lord Jagannath

**Puri(KCN):** Devotees in large numbers visit Alarnath Temple, situated 23 km westward along the Puri-Satpara National Highway, every day to have darshan of the presiding deity Alarnath Deb and to taste the 'kheer' prasad.

According to popular belief, during the anasara period, when darshan of Lord Jagannath and his siblings is not possible in the main temple as the deities remain in the Anasarghar (sick house) for a fortnight, Lord Jagannath manifests in Alarnath Dev.

Sri Chaitanya Dev, the founder of the Krishna cult, elaborately mentioned in his writings that he visualized the manifestation of Lord Jagannath in Alarnath. In 1610 AD, Sri Chaitanya Dev, along with his followers, camped there for years worshipping the deity. The small temple became a place of




pilgrimage during the anasara period of the presiding deities of the Sri Jagannath Temple. A handful of temple servitors work hard to prepare huge quantities of kheer to be offered to the deity and then sold to devotees. The kheer is prepared with buffalo milk, and a variety of sweeteners are added to make it tasty. Sources say that every day, over ten to fifteen thousand liters of buffalo milk, are used to prepare

the kheer, which is offered to the Lord and then distributed to the scores of devotees waiting to taste it. The administration has put in place elaborate security arrangements to manage the large number of devotees flocking to this small town daily. Police and traffic personnel have been deployed to regulate pilgrim traffic. Several temporary rest sheds have been erected, with provisions for drinking water, toilets, and washrooms in the vicinity of the temple. Temporary parking places have been developed for vehicles. The entire temple and its surroundings have been illuminated.

Everyday darshan continues in a queue system until late at night. Recitals of bhajans by noted singers are organized every evening by local cultural bodies.

## Extend skill devpt to higher education: Swain

# Rohit, Axar, Kuldeep star in crushing win as India storm into final

**New Delhi:** No defending champion has ever made it to the next final at T20 World Cups and India ensured that the trend stays intact with a bullish 68-run win over England at the Providence Stadium in Guyana. They will now meet co-finalists South Africa, the other unbeaten team in this edition, in Barbados for a place in history. India looked up against it when they were asked to bat first in the big semifinal, having lost five out of five in ICC tournaments since 2021 while doing so. But handy knocks from Rohit Sharma (57) and Suryakumar Yadav (47), and three wickets for Axar Patel with the new ball, meant that India were too good for England on the day.

Despite England's histrionic 101 all out, you'd have to say that India pretty much had the game in the bag when they put 171 on the board, asking the opposition to chase the highest ever target in a day game in Guyana. The pitch got slower and lower, like Rohit Sharma expected it to, and in hindsight it was a good toss to lose. Buttler opted to chase keeping in mind the wet forecast but the decision was fraught with the risk of batting second on a pitch that was slowing down by the minute. And England's worst fears came true, their struggles magnified in conditions tailor-made for India's slow bowlers. After the scars of Adelaide 2022, India weren't going to plod along even if the score, admittedly in

conditions in Guyana were slow, low and very dissimilar. The intent was apparent in how Rohit's first boundary was a streaky leading edge over short third man but the India captain kept at it, even if it meant smashing one through the hands of Phil Salt at point. At the other end, Virat Kohli looked far less convincing while trying to play the power game early on and fell after scoring run-a-ball 9, which dropped his average this edition to a lowly 10.71, a far cry from his form at the IPL.

Rishabh Pant wasn't the answer either on the day, perishing at mid-wicket in Sam Curran's first over, but Rohit's four boundaries ensured that India were there and thereabouts the par score, admittedly in

conditions where the odd ball was staying below the shin.

India have been the fastest scoring team in the middle overs this edition and once again looked the part, scoring at 8 rpo in this phase. The run-rate was down to a sensational

low, but not before shipping India through the difficult middle overs against the old ball.

How many will be enough on this pitch? India went into this final batting lap with that question in mind, but the answers proved hard to come. Eleven balls after Rohit was dismissed, Suryakumar was caught in the deep brilliantly by Chris Jordan when he mistimed a back-of-the-hand slower ball from Jofra Archer, forcing Hardik Pandya and Ravindra Jadeja, both of whom walked out to bat ahead of Shivam Dube, to forge a recovery. Pandya then broke the shackles with back-to-back flat sixes against Jordan but would fall trying to make it three in three. When Dube fell for a golden duck in the first over, it was down to Axar and Jadeja to steer India in

the final moments and the duo did a phenomenal job, adding as many as 24 runs in the last two overs.

He wasn't bowling in whites, he wasn't bowling in Ahmedabad and he wasn't bowling with the pink ball but Axar Patel once again proved a handful for England. Given the ball in the PowerPlay, the left-arm spinner deceived Jos Buttler on the reverse-sweep with his first ball and delivered India their most important breakthrough of the match. In Axar's next, Jonny Bairstow was bowled by one that skidded low. And sandwiched between these two wickets was a Jasprit Bumrah classic. It was the fast offbreak that he bowls and which on this occasion found a way through Phil Salt.

## Chaotic Tarouba pitch comes under the scanner

**New Delhi:** It was obvious why Jonathan Trott didn't want to be overly critical about the pitch in Tarouba. His team had after all just received a hammering at the hand of South Africa in their first-ever World Cup semi-final. They'd just had their dream run in the tournament cut short in rather terse fashion, courtesy the South African fast bowlers. But as ruthless as Kagiso Rabada, Marco Jansen and Anrich Nortje were, the pitch at the Brian Lara Cricket Academy ground played an equally significant role in the decimation of the Afghanistan batting line-up. As it easily could have for the South Africans, if only they had been chasing a target slightly more challenging than 57.

And it is unlikely that Trott, the Afghanistan head coach, was the only one of those involved in the contest who felt like that the pitch in Trinidad wasn't fit to host a "semi-final of a World Cup". Every player, in particular, who took the field on



Wednesday (June 26) night would have had every reason to have a grouse with what was dished up to them in a match of such significance, or even otherwise for that matter. "I don't want to get myself into trouble but obviously and I don't want to come across as bitter or it being a case of sour grapes but that's not the pitch that you want to have a match, a semi-final of a World Cup on, plain and simple," said Trott after South Africa booked their place in their first-ever men's World Cup final with a nine-wicket win in a match that lasted 21

overs in all. "It should be a fair contest. I'm not saying it should be flat completely with no spin and no seam movement, but I'm saying you shouldn't have batsmen worrying about going forward in the ball, flying over their head. You should be confident in their foot movement and being able to hit through the line or use their skills. T20 is about attacking and about scoring runs and taking wickets, not looking to survive," he added. It was a fair point too. For, there were times during both innings where, as a batter all you could do was to survive. To get into a

decent position and hope for the best. Hope that the ball doesn't jump at you off a length at rib-height, like it did to Quinton de Kock off the second ball he faced from Naveen-ul-Haq. Or that it doesn't roll through at shin-height like it did with the first ball de Kock faced, and what many of the batters had to contend with repeatedly during the highly-truncated semi-final. And Trott had every reason to go on. "If the opposition bowled well and got to a position where they bowled very, very well and it's through skill then that's fine to them and then it's about adapting to that. But once

the ball starts misbehaving and rolling, if we had bowled as straight as South Africa had, I think you would have seen a very interesting second half as well. South Africa bowled well, used the conditions, and showed our boys what it's capable of. But it just didn't go our way tonight," he said, somewhat shifting the focus back to his team. In a World Cup, where there's been plenty of chatter about the nature of the surfaces, especially on the New York leg, but also in terms of some in the Caribbean, the one in Tarouba came probably the closest to being deemed "unsafe". That's not overstating a fact either. There were some deliveries that flew off a length across both innings, which could potentially have caused a lot more serious damage than what we got away with. The fact that de Kock was the only batter who needed some brief medical attention is if anything more a case of fortune than skill.

## Wolvaardt pushes for better red-ball preparation amid rise in Women's Tests

**New Delhi:** Laura Wolvaardt has batted for more Women's Tests with the hope that the red-ball culture can percolate into the South African domestic calendar for better preparation and skill development.

On their multi-format tour of India currently, South Africa will play a second one-off Test in this calendar year, starting in Chennai on Friday (June 28), and have a third lined up later this year as part of the home series against England. In Australia earlier this year, South Africa lost the only Test of the multi-format points-based series by an innings and 284-run margin after not having played any red-ball cricket for 18 months. Since their 2014 tour of India, South Africa had stayed away from the traditional format for eight years until the drought-breaking game on their 2022 tour of England that ended in a draw.

The lack of red-ball opportunities



domestically, or any prep, leading into a three-match calendar year is far from ideal given the adaptation challenges associated with the home Test match later this year." The 'home Test' against England later this year will be first since South Africa's re-entry into Test arena two years ago, and their first since hosting India in early 2002. By extension, it'll be the first home game in whites for the entire current Proteas Women's squad as well. However, besides India none of the other three amongst the four active nations in women's Tests have any domestic structure to feed into their red-ball preparations.

In the Global T20 Canada League, slated from July 25, Bangla Tigers Mississauga picked Shakib Al Hasan and Shoriful Islam while Mohammad Saifuddin and Rishad Hossain will feature for Montreal Tigers and Toronto Nationals respectively.

Shakib is also expected to feature in Major League Cricket for Los Angeles Knight Riders, scheduled from July 5. Meanwhile, ACB official recently told Cricbuzz that they don't have any other window to play the white-ball series apart from this July and also added that they would play the two Tests at some other time.

It is understood the rescheduling of the series also paved way for Afghan cricketers as well considering many national cricketers are expected to feature in different teams of LPL, Canada Global T20 League and MLC.

**Dhaka:** Bangladesh Cricket Board officials said on Thursday that they have provided No-Objection certificates to several national cricketers to take part in multiple franchise leagues after the upcoming white-ball series against Afghanistan got postponed.

Cricbuzz earlier reported that the BCB is not sure of Afghanistan series while it was also learnt that ACB officials communicated with their Bangladeshi counterparts on Thursday (June 27) to work out a new date for the series.

BCB, who had earlier announced that their all-

format away series against Afghanistan in July has been rescheduled, was reluctant to play the series due to weather reports that suggested rain during that point of time in Greater Noida. ACB was expected to host Bangladesh for two Tests along with three ODIs and three T20Is following the ICC T20 World Cup.

Later, the ACB prepared a new itinerary for BCB and according to that draft itinerary seen by Cricbuzz, three ODIs and as many T20Is are scheduled to be played in Greater Noida between July 25 and August 6.

However, BCB provided NOC to several cricketers after both the boards agreed to reschedule the series. "We were not ready to play the series against Afghanistan in July as according to weather reports there is rain during that point of time in Greater Noida," Shahriar Nafees, in-charge, BCB's cricket operations, told Cricbuzz on Thursday.

"After both boards agreed to reschedule the series at some other convenient time we decided to provide NOC to our cricketers after they applied for it," he said.
