

No secret chamber in Puri Jagannath temple's Ratna Bhandar: Odisha Law Minister

Bhubaneswar(KCN): Odisha Law Minister Prithviraj Harichandan Friday said preliminary findings from the ground penetrating radar (GPR) survey by the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) suggest there are no secret tunnels or chambers in the Ratna Bhandar of Puri's Jagannath temple. The minister, however, said the confirmation will come with the final report.



Harichandan said while no secret passages were found, the survey identified cracks within the temple's treasury. The Shree Jagannath Temple Administration had requested the GPR survey amidst speculation about hidden chambers containing valuables and jewellery in the shrine's treasury. The minister said the inventory of Lord Jagannath's jewellery and valuables would be made after the ASI completes repairs of the Ratna Bhandar. "It is not feasible to carry out any repairs now since the temple is witnessing a heavy rush of devotees as it is the holy month of Kartika," he said. The repairs are expected to take over a month, with the ASI scheduled to address the cracks after Kartika Purnima, he said. "Once repairs are completed, the valuables will be brought back to the treasury for inventory," he added.

JSW-POSCO to set up greenfield steel plant in Odisha's Keonjhar: CM

Bhubaneswar(KCN): Odisha Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Friday said that India's fastest growing conglomerate JSW Group and South Korean steel major POSCO will jointly set up a greenfield steel facility in his home district of Keonjhar. Majhi revealed this amid nationwide speculation over the exact location of the JSW-POSCO joint venture. "During our roadshows for the ensuing Make-in Odisha conclave in Delhi and Mumbai, I had discussed with both JSW and POSCO regarding the establishment of a steel plant in Odisha's mineral-rich Keonjhar district," Majhi, who is on a two-day visit to Keonjhar for celebrating Diwali, told reporters. "Meanwhile, they have signed an MoU. They will do it jointly. They



have also mentioned doing it in Keonjhar district. It is under process and Odisha will get another steel plant," the chief minister said. The two steel makers on October 29 signed an MoU at JSW Group's corporate headquarters in Mumbai, in the presence of JSW Group Chairman Sajjan Jindal and POSCO Chairman Chang In-hwa.

The partnership will focus on setting up an integrated steel plant in India with an initial capacity of 5 million tonnes per annum (MTPA). According to the MoU, both parties will also explore collaborations in the areas of battery materials related to Electric Vehicles (EVs), and renewable energy for meeting the captive

requirements of the proposed integrated steel plant, a company statement said. Meanwhile, the Odisha government has identified two patches of land for the purpose in Keonjhar district. One patch of 2,500 acres of land is located near Odisha Tea Plantation Ltd (OTPL) in the Taramakant area under Banspal block, while the other one of 1,956 acres is at Patna, which was initially offered to steel major ArcelorMittal. This will be considered the second attempt by the South Korean steel major to set up a steel plant in Odisha. It had earlier scrapped its plan for a 12 million tonnes steel mill in Odisha's Paradip and surrendered the land allotted for the project due to protests and certain regulatory issues several years ago.

Two dead, 6 taken ill after 'consuming' mango kernel gruel in Odisha

Berhampur(KCN): At least two women died and six others fell ill after allegedly consuming gruel made of mango kernel in Odisha's Kandhamal district, police said Friday. The consumption of mango kernel gruel, a simple dish made by boiling oats in milk or water, was reported from Mandipanka village under the Daringbadi block, an officer said. One of the two women died Thursday night at Mohana Community Health Centre in Gajapati district where she was undergoing treatment after "consuming the gruel", Gadapur sarpanch Kumari Mallick said.



Another woman, who also fell sick, breathed her last when she was taken to the MKCG Medical College and Hospital here Friday morning, the panchayat member said. Six others, who fell ill after allegedly consuming the gruel, were admitted to a hospital and their condition was critical,

said Dr Subrat Das, a medical officer of the health facility. "All six people have been admitted to the hospital in serious condition. We suspected that they fell sick due to food poisoning. The exact cause of the illness will be ascertained after completion of the investigation," he added.

Odisha, fire incident, Diwali

Bhubaneswar(KCN): At least two persons died and 50 people were injured in various incidents of fire across Odisha during Diwali celebrations, police said Friday.

In addition, properties valued at lakhs of rupees were gutted during the festival of lights Thursday night, the police said. Two minor boys succumbed to burn injuries and one woman was injured in a fire incident at Batagaon in Puri town following a firecracker blast. The deceased were identified as Sanjay Jena and Bula Rout. Rout's sister-in-law Lipa Rout received critical burn injuries and is under treatment at a hospital in



Bhubaneswar, a police officer said. The deceased had reportedly suffered 80 per cent burns. Puri Superintendent of Police Vinit Agarwal said an investigation is on into the firecracker explosion and stringent action will be taken against those involved in illegal cracker manufacturing. Around 25 garment shops were gutted in a fire that broke out in a market in Bhubaneswar early Friday, police said. No one was injured in the

incident but garments were damaged due to the blaze, a senior police officer said. A report from Capital Hospital in Bhubaneswar said that over two dozen people, including young boys, girls and children received burn injuries due to firecrackers-related mishaps at different parts of the state capital. While many were released after first aid, others had to be admitted to hospitals. Around 17 people were admitted to SCB Medical College and Hospital in

Cuttack after they received burn injuries while celebrating Diwali, hospital sources said. In an incident at Rayagada, a stationery store was completely gutted after it caught fire during the celebrations. The shop owner used to sell petrol in bottles and those caught fire while bursting crackers. At least eight people suffered injuries while bursting crackers in Balasore district. The injured were mostly minors. They were admitted to Balasore District Headquarters Hospital. In Mayurbhanj, two persons sustained injuries in firecracker-related mishaps. They were admitted to Baripada Hospital.

India faces 24.7% GDP loss by 2070 due to climate change: ADB report

New Delhi(KCN): Climate change under a high-end emissions scenario could lead to a 16.9 per cent loss in GDP by 2070 across the Asia and Pacific region, with India projected to suffer a 24.7 per cent GDP loss, according to a new report. Rising sea levels and decreasing labour productivity would drive the most significant losses, with lower-income and fragile economies being hit the hardest, it said. The new research, presented in the inaugural issue of ADB's "Asia-Pacific Climate Report", details a series of damaging impacts threatening the region. It says that if the climate crisis continues to accelerate, up to 300

million people in the region could be at risk from coastal inundation, and trillions of dollars' worth of coastal assets could face annual damage by 2070. "Climate change has supercharged the devastation from tropical storms, heat waves, and floods in the region, contributing to unprecedented economic challenges and human suffering," said ADB President Masatsugu Asakawa. Urgent, well-coordinated climate action addressing these impacts is necessary before it is too late, he said. This climate report provides insights into financing urgent adaptation needs and offers promising policy recommendations to governments in our developing member

countries on how to reduce greenhouse gas emissions at the lowest cost, he added. "By 2070, climate change under a high-end emissions scenario could cause a total loss of 16.9 per cent of GDP across the Asia and Pacific region. Most of the region would face more than 20 per cent loss. "Among the assessed countries and subregions, these losses are concentrated in Bangladesh (30.5 per cent), Viet Nam (per cent), Indonesia (per cent), India (24.7 per cent), 'the rest of Southeast Asia' (23.4 per cent), higher-income Southeast Asia (22 per cent), Pakistan (21.1 per cent), the Pacific (18.6 per cent), and the Philippines (18.1 per cent)," the report said. It said that developing



Asia has accounted for most of the increase in global GHG emissions since 2000. While advanced economies were major GHG emitters throughout the 20th century, emissions from developing Asia have risen more rapidly than those from any other region in the first two decades of the 21st century. "Consequently, the region's share of global

emissions rose from 29.4 per cent in 2000 to 45.9 per cent in 2021... Emissions from developing Asia continue to rise, driven primarily by China, which contributed about 30 per cent of global emissions in 2021," the ADB report said. The report pointed out that the region is home to 60 per cent of the world's population, with per capita emissions still below the global average.

Intensified and more variable rainfall, along with increasingly extreme storms, will lead to more frequent landslides and floods in the region, it said. "This will be most pronounced in mountainous and steeply sloped areas, such as the border area of India and China, where landslides may increase by 30 per cent – 70 per cent under 4.7 degrees Celsius of

mean global warming. These outcomes will be further worsened by reductions in slope-stabilizing forest cover, as forests unable to cope with new climate regimes suffer dieback," the report said. Leading models indicate that trillions of dollars in annual capital damage from riverine flooding could occur in Asia and the Pacific by 2070. Expected annual damage, in line with economic growth, may reach USD 1.3 trillion per year by 2070, affecting over 110 million people annually. "India is reported to have the highest number of affected individuals and damage costs, with residential losses being predominant," the report said. The GDP loss in 2070 from reduced labour productivity is estimated

to be 4.9 per cent for the region, with tropical and subtropical locations being the most impacted. These include "the rest of Southeast Asia" (11.9 per cent), India (11.6 per cent), Pakistan (10.4 per cent), and Vietnam (8.5 per cent). Due to increased riverine flooding under a high-end emissions climate scenario, the GDP loss in 2070 for Asia and the Pacific is projected to be 2.2 percent. Countries with mega-deltas experience the most substantial losses, with Bangladesh, "the rest of Southeast Asia", and Vietnam facing GDP reductions of 8.2 per cent, 6.6 per cent, and 6.5 per cent, respectively. Indonesia and India each face around a 4 per cent GDP loss, the report said.

Odisha govt imposes 7-month fishing ban in river mouths for Olive Ridley turtle conservation

The Odisha government Friday enforced a seven-month-long prohibition on sea fishing activity within 20 km of the coast at the river mouths of Dhamara, Devi and Rusikulya as part of the annual Olive Ridley turtle conservation programme, officials said.

The fishing ban would remain effective from November 1–May 31 to ensure the safety of marine animals during their breeding and mating season, they said.

The ban has been clamped in accordance with

Sections 2, 7 and 4 of the Orissa Marine Fishing Regulation Act (OMFRA), 1982 and provisions of the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972, they said.

The fishing ban imposed along a specified coast of the sea comprising sea turtle congregation area and their buffer zones at the river mouths of Dhamara, Devi and Rusikulya.

The prohibition will be strictly implemented as it is done every year as the turtles perish in larger numbers either by getting entangled in fishing nets or hit by fishing trawlers' propellers.

It will be a multi-layered patrolling exercise



involving forest, fisheries, and marine police besides the coast guard personnel, an official said.

To ensure effective

patrolling, 61 on-shore camps and five off-shore camps have been set up in the state's four wildlife divisions – Bhadrak, Rajnagar, Puri and

Berhampur.

The armed police constabulary force will flank the forest and fisheries patrolling teams. Five high-speed

boats, 13 trawlers and support boats are pressed into service to intercept illegal marine fishing in prohibited zones, said Sudarshan

Gopinath Yadav, Divisional Forest Officer, Rajnagar Mangrove (wildlife) Forest Division.

Around 10,666 fishermen's families will be affected following the fishing ban. Therefore to compensate for the loss of income avenues, the state government has decided to extend one-time livelihood assistance of Rs 7,500 to the affected fishermen families.

The female turtles virtually invade the nesting beaches usually at the dead of the night for laying eggs, the phenomenon otherwise described as 'arribada'. After laying eggs, the turtles leave the nesting

ground to stride into the deep seawater. Hatchlings emerge from these eggs after 45-60 days. It is a rare natural phenomenon where the babies grow without their mother, the official said.

The ban on sea fishing, however, remains enforced round-the-year in the Gahirmatha coast, which is widely regarded as the largest habitation corridor of these highly endangered marine species. Besides, Gahirmatha has been accorded the status of a marine sanctuary in view of turtles' congregation, said forest officials.

Advance Reservation Period for Train Tickets Reduced to 60 Days, Effective from Today Onwards

(KCN):In a significant update to ticketing policies, the Indian Railways has implemented a reduction in the advance reservation period for train tickets from 120 days to 60 days, effective from today onwards. This change aims to provide greater flexibility for travelers planning their journeys.

While the new 60-day advance reservation period will apply to most train services, certain daytime express trains, including the Dhauli Express, Jan Shatabdi,

and Inter City trains, will continue to operate under their existing shorter booking windows. This ensures that these popular services remain accessible for spontaneous travel plans. Additionally, the 365-day advance reservation limit for foreign tourists remains unchanged, allowing international travelers ample time to plan their visits to India. This revised advance reservation policy is designed to meet the evolving needs of passengers, offering them more options and flexibility in booking their

travel. Railways committed to enhancing the overall travel experience for all its customers."

The new policy is expected to streamline the booking process, making it easier for passengers to secure their seats closer to their travel dates, while still maintaining service availability for long-term planners.

For more information about train schedules and ticket booking, passengers are encouraged to visit the official Indian Railways website or contact their

local railway station.

Benefits of 60 days reservation period: 120 days was too long for planning, resulting in high cancellations and wastage of seats/ berths because of passengers not turning up for journeys.

Currently, there is about 21% cancellation and 4-5% passengers don't turn up (no show).

Issues with No-show: In many cases, it is seen that passengers do not cancel their tickets and do not turn up for journeys. And this leads to frauds - such as impersonation, railway officials taking money illegally etc. Now, this can be prevented.

With longer periods, there was a greater chance of some people blocking the tickets. Shorter periods will encourage more tickets by genuine passengers. There is no impact on General class tickets as they are purchased just before the journey.

With better visibility of demand due to lesser cancellations and no-show, railways can plan more special trains well in advance.

National School of Drama Out Reach Centre to be Established in Bhubaneswar

(KCN): The Odisha government has approved the establishment of out reach centre of the National School of Drama (NSD) in Bhubaneswar. In the initial phase, it will operate temporarily at the Guru Kelucharan Mohapatra Odissi Research Centre in Bhubaneswar.

autonomous body under the Ministry of Culture, Government of India. The renowned actor Paresh Rawal is currently its Chairperson, and distinguished Odia actor Chittaranjan Tripathy serves as its Director. Prominent actors from Odisha, such as Bijay Mohanty, Ajit Das and Surya Mohanty, are among NSD's notable alumni.

With the establishment of a out reach centre of NSD in Odisha, there is a vision to widely promote Odia culture, especially the rich Odia theater tradition.

PUSPAGIRI UNIVERSITY: POTENTIALS AND POSSIBILITIES

Puspagiri, the famous University of ancient India, also known as Pushpagiri Mahavihara (2nd Century B.C. to 12th century A.D.), was a major seat of Buddhist learning that flourished until 12th century in Jajpur district of ancient Odisha. In his famed travelogues, Chinese traveller Huien Tsang mentioned it as Pushpagiri Mahavihara. After the publication of an article “Langudi: A Unique Rock-Cut Buddhist Site in Odisha” in the Bulletin of Decan College Research Institute by H.C. Prusty and P.Mohanty (1993), the Archaeological Survey of India started excavation at Langudi hill and found the evidences of lost Pushpagiri University from its ruins. The entire University was spread over three adjacent hills in a large area- Ratnagiri, Udayagiri and Lalitagiri, known as diamond triangle of Odisha. It might be triple of the size of the then Nalanda University. Hence it may be considered as the oldest and largest among all the ancient universities of India. Several rivers such as Kelua,, Birupa, Kimiria, Brahmani are flowing adjacent to this University complex. Those rivers and hills must have offered a picturesque backdrop

for the institution. The University site which was scattered throughout the hilltop, had multiple Stupas, Chaityas, monasteries, temples, sculptures and other relics. Pushpagiri was regarded as an ancient Indian higher learning institution comparable to Nalanda, Vikramshila and Takshashila. It received donations from the local kings and the kings of abroad for the development of the University. It was found from a third century inscriptions of Andhra Ikshvaku king Virapushadatta in Nagarjunakonda (Telegana) that a monk named Bodhisri successfully persuaded the king to establish several endowments in this University, specially sponsored the erection of a stone platform at Pushpagiri. Several archaeologists and historians like Debaraj Pradhan , K.C. Panigrahi and B.N. Mukherjee, believe that Ashoka erected those Stupas and structures during the Mauryan dynasty. The Buddhist treasure unearthed from this site also include a large number of gold and silver articles, stone containers, earthen pot and traces of Kushan dynasty and Bramhi script. One of the most important monasteries described by Huien Tsang (639CE) was Pusie-p'o-k'i-li (Pushpagiri), whose stone top “ exhibited supernatural lights and other miracle ”. The excavated monasteries with Buddhist images of Avalokiteswara,

Aparajita, Tara, Pragyanparamita scattered all around evoke a vivid memories of a bygone era of Odisha and should be of great interest to anyone interested in Buddhism. Pushpagiri was also recorded in medieval Tibetan texts. The Pushpagiri complex, most probably was established under the Shungas in the second century BC and reached its zenith in the 7th century under the Bhaumakar kings. Three major types of Buddhism studied in Pushpagiri were: Mahayan, Vajrayan and Tantric Buddhism. Students studied Oral texts and folklores of Buddhist sects along with other subjects such as the Vedas, Hetuvidya (Logic), Shabdavidya (Grammar and Philology), Chikitsavidya (medicine), Niti and Nyaya (Law), Arthashastra (Economics), Sankhya, Dharmasashtra, Yoga and meditation. Archaeologists also claim that the students were engaged in pursuing research on Astronomy, Metaphysics, Medicine, Languages, Performing Arts, Mathematics, Agriculture, Politics, Warfare, Commerce, and Buddhist philosophy in Pushpagiri. Legendary Pushpagiri had very eminent scholars and monks who had preached and propagated Buddhism in foreign countries like Egypt, Babylon, Greece, Syria, China, Japan and South-East Asian countries such as Ceylon, Burma,

Indonesia, Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos etc. Pragnya became an expert on meditation in Pushpagiri and left for China to preach Buddhist Philosophy and settled there. Boddhisi, a teacher, had practised Yoga and ensured it's spread throughout the Indian Sub-continent. Another Tantrik Buddhist monk Rahul studied at Pushpagiri and became the Vice Chancellor of Nalanda University. The monks such as Indrabhuti, founder of Vajrayana and his sister Laxmikara, the founder of Sahajayana, along with Pitopada, founder of Kalachakrayana, were also the teacher of this University. Pitopada had obtained the sidhi of invisibility by yoga and meditation. Padmasambhava, the Second Budha from Samalaka (Sambalpur) was also teacher of this university for a period of time, whose body remains had also been preserved in this locality as deciphered from the stone pillars at Udayagiri. Guru Padmasambhava known as Guru Rinpoche in Tibet, was instrumental to spread Buddhism throughout Tibet area including Kashmir, Nepal and Bhutan. He had established Sam-Ye monastery and the Nyngma tradition there. Shantirakshita, another veteran of Buddhist philosophy and the brother-in-law of Guru Padmasambhava had also been associated with this Buddhist complex at some point of time. The great Saint Nagarjuna, who hold the

Madhyamika views in Buddhism, was also a teacher in this University. His student, Aryadeva from Singhpur, in third century A.D. , propagated Madhyamik views throughout world. In fifth century, monk Dignanga from Delang region of Puri who was an expert in Buddhist logic, belonged to this University. Dharmakirti, a teacher of this University in 7th century, propagated the theory of existence and theory of liberation . Again, Shantideva, in eighth century taught the ways of Bodhisattvas in this University. Besides above teachers, several monks like Krushnacharya, Naropa, Bitoba, Abadhottipa, Subhakarsimha etc. were some of the eminent scholars who were in teaching profession of this University at some point of time and contributed a lot towards the spread of Buddhism. To spread esoteric Buddhism, three monks(Amoghavajra, Vajrabodhi and Subhakarsimha) took the two texts Sarvagatwasanga(STIS) and Mahavairocana Sutra which form the basis of Mandala stupa to South-east Asia (specially Java and Abhayagiri, Srilanka), Tibet and China from this Buddhist complex. King Harshavardhana Sent Jayasena, from Nalanda, to odisha to study the philosophy. The valuable

contribution in the field of knowledge made by this ancient university exercised a substantial impact on the culture and civilisation of those countries where it travelled. However, the Pushpagiri University started to decline in 12th century. The main reason might be the Muslim invasion, non-patronage of royal dynasties, political and social changes in society, which triggered the sharp decline of Buddhism in India. The Pushpagiri University slowly disappeared with time. Now, is the proper time to revive the glory of ancient Pushpagiri as a central University in the said area of Jajpur District of Odisha with the assistance and patronage of both State and Central Government. The State government should provide 200 acres of contiguous land in this area to establish the university. If Nalanda University could be re-established by Bihar and Central Government, then the Pushpagiri University would certainly be established by the strong-will power of both Odisha and Central Government. The dream of Prime Minister to make India “Viswaguru” can be materialised by the contributions of the proposed University in the field of research and innovations. This University will act as a specialised research centre and incubator to promote innovation and practical Research &

Development (R&D) aligned with new Education Policy. The University will play three roles in contemporary society: education and training, scientific research, and public services. It will also help students to develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills. It will be the knowledge hub in future as it was in ancient India. The proposed university will be directed to fine tune its academic coursework and research in consonance with the national priorities. The society would get benefit from the scholarly expertise generated from this institution. It will contribute significantly to the knowledge economy by generating new knowledge and fostering human capital, which in turn enhances productivity and economic growth. It will provide people with an opportunity to reflect on the critical, social, economic, cultural, moral and spiritual issues facing humanity. The proposed University would play a significant role in India's development by disseminating knowledge and contributing to social transformation. It will encourage self-discovery of the rural people and the development of a sense of identity and purpose. Moreover this University would develop a close relationship with the Buddhist countries of the world particularly China, Japan and other South-East Asian countries of

the world by the academic exchange programme. Keeping in view of the past, several Research Centers, in the field of Architecture and Sculpture of Kalinga, Navigational History and Heritage of Odisha, Astronomical Observatory Studies, Palm Leaf Inscriptions of Odisha, Odia Language, Literature and Culture, Handicrafts and Handlooms of Odisha, with separate International Centers for Studies on Sanatan Hindu Dharma, Budhism, Jainism and Mahima Dharma may be established along with teaching programmes in Astronomy, Planning and Architecture, Law, Data Sciences and Mathematics, Computer Sciences and Digital Forensics, Yoga and Naturopathy, Health Sciences, Public Policy and Development Studies, Business Studies and Management courses may be introduced in first phase for the interest of academic world. The proposed university will bridge the Indian tradition and modernity, merging ancient wisdom with cutting-edge scientific techniques of modern age. This fusion will empower us to share the knowledge globally, which is the need of the hour to turn India into VIKSHIT BHARAT. **Former Principal B. Stubble disposal measures

Disposal of stubble is a serious problem. Claims are made every year to tackle pollution caused by stubble burning, but the irony is that till date a permanent solution to this problem has not been found. Claims may be made in this regard, but in reality this problem is becoming more acute every year. If seen, every year due to burning of stubbleNational Capital Region Delhi, western part of Uttar Pradesh,

Haryana and Punjab remain in the grip of severe air pollution from October to December. These months come as a problem for the people here, because all the efforts, campaigns and all the steps taken by the governments of these states to stop it prove to be futile. As a result, the severity of air pollution is increasing day by day and governments appear helpless in front of it. All this happens when there is a ban on stubble burning. The is. The Supreme Court has also expressed serious concern about what kind of management it is that stubble is being burnt despite the ban. This also proves that they are adept at preventing pollution. Breathing poisonous air: Due to increasing air pollution in the capital, people here are forced to breathe the poisonous air. Due to this, a large number of people in Delhi are suffering from asthma.

As a result, increasing air pollution becomes fatal for people already suffering from asthma. Increase in asthma patients in such circumstancesIt is a dangerous sign. Anyway, due to changes in weather, pollution is increasing. So far, a nine-fold increase in incidents of stubble burning has been recorded in Punjab. It is believed that this time after harvesting of paddy in Punjab, 200 lakh tonnes of stubble will be left, whereas the state aims to manage only about 20 lakh tonnes of stubble. Obviously, the remaining stubble will be burnt due to lack of management. Although the Punjab government has given approval to set up 58 compressed left gas plants for stubble disposal, but it does not have land to store the stubble.It is not. Environmental cleanliness: It is the responsibility of all of us



to keep the environment clean. Ensuring a clean environment is the joint responsibility of the Centre, State, society and people. Everyone should do this honestly. But in this we have failed. There is a need to make a coordinated action plan to control air pollution not only at that time, especially during winter when the sky is

covered with smog and toxic gases, but for the entire year. The situation of air pollution in the entire country can be easily estimated.Is. Last year, a petition was filed in the Delhi High Court in which it was said that the level of air pollution in the National Capital Region increases every year due to burning of stubble by farmers in

neighboring states. This should be controlled and emphasis should be laid on making compost from stubble. Doing this will have double benefits. Making compost will curb the increasing pollution and on the other hand, farmers will be able to get better and chemical-free yields by using this compost. Role of other factors in air pollutionIt

plays an important role, but the dust on the roads and the garbage and biomass spread there also have an important contribution in it. This creates a cocktail of poison in the environment. The most lethal inorganic aerosols in the environment are created by the combination of sulfuric acid and nitrogen oxides emitted from

power plants, industries, traffic, and ammonia produced by agricultural activities. This cocktail is the cause of approximately 23 percent air pollution. If we take stock of the air pollution in Delhi, we find that 20 percent of the smog is emitted by vehicles in Delhi.Of these, 60 percent comes from vehicles outside Delhi and around 20 percent comes from burning biomass. In many recent research studies conducted in this context, an attempt has been made to show that the problem of air pollution is no less than the threat of a war, hence the claim of development can be effective only in the situation when the problem of air pollution is not less than the threat of war. Let us try to find a solution keeping in mind the current circumstances of our country.

Memories of 1999 Super Cyclone still haunt Kendrapara villagers

Mahakalapara(KCN): Around 25 years ago, a powerful cyclonic storm in the Bay of Bengal struck the coastal districts of the state and devastated the region. That dark Friday night of 1999 in the month of October unleashed a reign of horror as the sea wild waves brought large-scale devastation and deaths. A kilometre away from the sea in Kendrapara district lies the neglected village of Panikhia Santalipada under Mahakalapara block. The tribal-dominated village, which is home to 50 households having over 300 people, still awaits government aid for basic amenities. The village lacks even an all-weather road, while

access to quality education and healthcare is a far cry. During emergencies, villagers carry patients in slings for around 1 km to reach an ambulance that ferries the patient to a nearby hospital. Owing to a lack of livelihood opportunities, more than 60 poor Santali people of the village have migrated outside the state in search of jobs. Among those affected by the Super Cyclone, 12 villagers were swept away in the furious waves of the sea. Village elders said the Bay of Bengal lies to the east of their village while the mangrove forest is to the north of their village. On that fateful night, high tidal waves surged into



their village and in no time 12 persons, who had taken shelter in a thatched house, were swept away by the sea waves. The victims

include two elderly men, three women and seven children. Recounting the horror, villagers Suna Tudu, Gurubha Hansda, Suna

Marandi, Purnachandra Tudu, Gajendra Marandi, Ramesh Marandi, Nugur Soren, Laba Marandi and Charan Tudu said the sea

surged in the afternoon and the tides reached up to 10 feet by the evening of October 29 (Friday), 1999. Villagers gathered

on their roofs, holding hands as powerful winds blew from the east. They were chanting the name of their presiding deity 'Marang Buru' praying to protect them on that stormy night. In the chaos, hands slipped as people screamed for help, only to be swept away by the merciless waves. The cyclone brought with it indescribable tragedy and devastation. Years after the cyclone, basic road access still eludes the villagers, and daily life remains tough. The area remains surrounded by saline and mangrove forests, while the fear of wild animals and reptiles sneaking into

their village adds to their distress. Not only Panikhia Santalipada, but the powerful storm also brought devastations in Tentulikandha village under this block where the surging waves claimed 25 persons. The storm caused significant damage to Batighar, Kharinasi, Jambu, Suniti, Ramnagar and Petchella panchayats under this block and several other pockets in the region. Environment activist Subash Chandra Swain suggested that the impact of future cyclones can significantly be reduced if government, private, and voluntary organisations come forward to restore and expand the region's mangrove forest cover.

Tigress Jamuna healthy in Similipal: Official

Baripada(KCN): The authorities of the Similipal Tiger Reserve Thursday said tigress Jamuna is healthy and hunted a wild boar in her enclosure. The two-and-half-year-old tigress brought from Tadba tiger conservation project in Maharashtra October 28 was released in a soft enclosure inside the Similipal Tiger Reserve in Odisha's Mayurbhanj district. "The tigress Jamuna is healthy and active. It is relaxed and in good health. Yesterday it killed and ate a pig inside the enclosure," Prakash Chand Gogineni, field director of the tiger reserve here said. The forest department is optimistic that this tiger will help in keeping the genetic diversity of tigers under control due to the increase in the number of



tigers and especially the number of black tigers in Similipal. The forest officials said the tigress Jamuna is put in an enclosure and kept under observation for at least one to two weeks before its release into the wild.

The translocation of the tigress was done with the permission of the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA). Two felines from Tadoba Andhari Tiger Reserve will be released into STR and of those, one has

already reached here, officials said. With the arrival of the tigress in Similipal, the tiger population in the state has increased to 31, of which 28 are in STR. The STR has a unique population of melanistic tigers.

Odisha govt downgrades Naveen Patnaik's security to Y category: Official

Bhubaneswar(KCN): The Odisha government has downgraded the security of the state's five-time former chief minister Naveen Patnaik, who is also the leader of opposition, from Z to Y category, an official said Thursday. Most of the security personnel assigned to Patnaik have been withdrawn after a high-level committee dealing with security issues of important persons recommended the downgrade of the BJD chief's security, he said. Patnaik would now be assigned only two constables in Havildar



rank, the official said. "Former chief ministers are provided with two PSOs. Additional security is provided as and when required," he said. As the leader of opposition, Patnaik will be provided with required security by the local police when he

undertakes a tour outside Bhubaneswar, he said. However, Patnaik has also personally appointed two senior PSOs who have recently retired from government service. After this year's general elections, when Patnaik lost power after 24 years, the number of

security personnel assigned to him was reduced to 23, including those at his residence. Earlier, 268 personnel were deployed in three shifts at his residence Naveen Niwas. In September last year, the previous BJD government had formed an exclusive anti-sabotage squad for Patnaik's security. The opposition BJD preferred not to react to the downgrade of security of Patnaik. "Let people form an opinion whether Patnaik should be given adequate security," a BJD leader and former minister said.

Child labourer electrocuted during Diwali decoration


Barbil(KCN): A child labourer was electrocuted after accidentally coming in contact with an 11KV overhead transmission wire while spreading decorative lights on the terrace of a house ahead of Diwali festival at Station Road under this police limits in Keonjhar district, Wednesday. The deceased was identified as Narendra Munda, 15, son of Jagabandhu



Munda at Serenda area, and an employee of a tent house at Mohanta slum in Barbil. He died on the spot. Police registered a case and conducted a post-mortem after the deceased's mother Pinky

Munda complained to the police station. Meanwhile, the tent house owner agreed to provide Rs 1 lakh compensation to the deceased's family and gave away Rs 50,000 immediately, police ASI

Tulsa Kariali said. The tent house owner also agreed to give away rest Rs 50,000 before the last rites of the deceased. Residents have demanded action against the tent house owner for employing child labourer in violation of labour laws. They have also demanded action against the electricity department for keeping high voltage transmission wires in unsafe conditions endangering lives.

Sensex, Nifty advance in Muhurat session to start Samvat 2081 on a high

Mumbai (KCN): Benchmark Sensex rose by 335.06 points, or 0.42 per cent, to settle at 79,724.12 in a special Muhurat trading session Friday, starting the new Samvat 2081 on a high note. Stock exchanges BSE and NSE conducted a special Muhurat trading session from 1800 hrs to 1900 hrs on Friday to mark the beginning of the new Samvat Year 2081. In the last Samvat 2080, which ended on Thursday, the BSE Sensex jumped 14,484.38 points, or 22.31 per cent, and the Nifty climbed 4,780 points, or 24.60 per

cent. Investors’ wealth rose Rs 124.42 lakh crore during the period to Rs 4,44,71,429.92 crore (USD 5.29 trillion). Muhurat trading is a one-hour symbolic trading session conducted by stock exchanges on the occasion of Diwali, marking the start of the new Samvat year and new books of accounts by traders. On Friday, Sensex opened on a high note and stayed in positive territory throughout the special session on buying in banking, auto, and oil & gas shares. The index moved between a high of

80,023.75 and a low of 79,655.55 during the session. The 50-issue Nifty of NSE rose 99 points, or 0.41 per cent, to close at 24,304.35. As many as 42 Nifty stocks ended higher while eight shares closed with losses. Among major Sensex gainers, Mahindra & Mahindra rose the most by 3.29 per cent. Adani Ports gained 1.26 per cent, Tata Motors by 1.14 per cent, and Axis Bank by 0.92 per cent. Nestle, NTPC, Reliance, ITC Titan, Kotak Bank, Infosys and TCS also gained. HCL Tech, Tech



Mahindra, and ICICI advanced with BSE Bank were the losers. Midcap rising 0.69 per Broader markets also cent, or 317.72 points, to 45,996.71. The BSE SmallCap gained 1.16 per cent or 639.73

points to settle at 54,982.87. BSE Auto (1.15 per cent), consumer discretionary (1.10 per cent), and oil & gas (0.91 per cent) were among the major sectoral gainers. Meanwhile, global markets were mixed as European shares rose in early trade. Most Asian markets closed with losses. Japan’s benchmark Nikkei 225 dropped 2.6 per cent, the Shanghai Composite slipped 0.2 per cent and South Korea’s Kospi lost 0.5 per cent. Hong Kong’s Hang Seng index added 0.9 per cent. Foreign institutional investors (FIIs) were net sellers in the Indian capital markets on Thursday, as they offloaded shares worth Rs 5,813.30 crore, according to exchange data. On Thursday, BSE Sensex tumbled 553.12 points, or 0.69 per cent, while NSE Nifty fell 135.50 points, or 0.56 per cent. In October, the BSE benchmark index fell sharply by 4,910.72 points, or 5.82 per cent, and the Nifty tumbled 1,605.5 points, or 6.22 per cent.

New Delhi: A collective bowling performance was followed by a quick-fire 94 off 69 balls from Evin Lewis as West Indies secured a comfortable 8-wicket victory in the rain-hit first ODI against England in Antigua. Jayden Seales, Matthew Forde and Alzarri Joseph picked up two wickets apiece while Gudakesh Motie bagged four as England were bowled out for 209. Chasing a revised target of 157 in 35 overs, West Indies got the job done in 25.5 overs to take the lead in the three-match ODI series. After a rain delay

before the start of the second innings, Lewis got West Indies going in the chase with sixes off John Turner and Jofra Archer, striking three maximums inside the first 10 overs. Brandon King struck a few boundaries and provided good support to Lewis as they took West Indies to 54/0 in the first powerplay. Lewis continued his six-hitting, extending the tally to five en route to a 46-ball fifty before it began to rain again and forced the players off the field with West Indies at 81/0 in 15 overs. While the first interruption didn't reduce the number of overs, the

second one resulted in a revised target. Lewis continued from where he left off, dealing in fours and sixes, including two fours and a six off Adil Rashid in the 17th over that helped West Indies past 100. The opening stand, worth 118, came to an end when King handed a catch in the deep trying to put away a short ball from Liam Livingstone, departing for 30. Lewis took his count of sixes to 8 and was looking good for a three-figure score but fell six short of it when he found long-off trying to hit Rashid out of the park. Keacy Carty provided the finishing touches to



the chase with an unbeaten 19. Earlier, after being asked to bat, England's top-

order batters got off to promising starts but weren't able to capitalise on it. Seales accounted

for the wickets of Phil Salt (18) and Will Jacks (19) while Forde dismissed Jordan Cox

(17) and Jacob Bethell (27) in quick succession. A 72-run stand between England's recovery as they tried to post a competitive total. Having scored only 12 off 21, Livingstone picked up pace, and Curran too found the boundaries as they helped England make good progress. But from 165/4 in the 35th over, England suffered a major collapse as they could add only 44 more and didn't even bat their full quota of overs, with West Indies wrapping it up in 45.1 overs. The slide started when Livingstone was

out caught and bowled off Motie for 48. Dan Mousley and Jamie Overton then fell off successive deliveries to Motie, who also sent Curran back for 37 as England slipped to 187/8. Rashid and Archer led England past 200 before Joseph picked up the last two wickets. Brief scores: England 209 in 45.1 overs (Liam Livingstone 48, Sam Curran 37; Gudakesh Motie 4-41, Jayden Seales 2-22) lost to West Indies 157/2 in 25.5 overs (Evin Lewis 94, Brandon King 30; Liam Livingstone 1-32) by 8 wickets (DLS method).

Najmul tight-lipped on captaincy issue

New Delhi: Ahead of the second Test against South Africa, Bangladesh skipper Najmul Hossain became a topic of discussion following reports of his desire to step down from captaincy. The much-anticipated pre-series press conference turned out to be a dull affair, as Najmul, who typically attends, opted to skip it this time. On Thursday, Najmul remained tight-lipped about stepping down from the role, aiming to avoid stirring further controversy. Before the third day's play concluded, BCB President Faruque Ahmed, who arrived in Chattogram on Wednesday (October 30) to have a one-on-one discussion with Najmul, indicated that he is yet to meet with the team's current leader. Najmul echoed similar



sentiments, stating that either he or the board would provide clarity on the matter after an upcoming discussion, likely to take place soon. The board is understood to be aiming to convince Najmul to reconsider and, if unsuccessful, at least to continue leading the ODI squad until the 2025 Champions Trophy. "The president has spoken to you all regarding the captaincy. I won't comment further

on this matter here. You'll likely get an update directly from the cricket board," Najmul told reporters on Thursday. "I haven't spoken to the president yet. Once we do, either I or the president will be able to give a clear message," he added. Najmul emphasized that he does not see captaincy as an added burden. "I've always said this, even back in age-level

cricket, that I really enjoy this role. In the last few series, I've truly enjoyed captaining on the field," he shared. "It's the same feeling (not being affected by captaincy when batting). I don't feel like I'm the captain or that I have to do everything alone. I just focus on watching the ball and batting. Everyone loves to bat, and my focus is on how to score big runs," he said.

However, Najmul acknowledged the need to work harder on converting his starts into substantial scores. "As a batter higher up the order, my role in scoring runs is critical. Lately, I feel I haven't fulfilled this. In my recent innings, I've often been getting out between 20 and 40 runs, which is damaging for the team. I need to concentrate more in this area," he said. Najmul also addressed whether external pressures have impacted their performance following their heavy defeats in the Tests against South Africa. "It's possible (that outside noise affects the team). I don't know. But that doesn't justify playing so poorly that we're all out for 100-150 runs. It's better if the noise doesn't interfere. As I've said before, the less noise, the better," he concluded.

Stokes, Buttler sign two-year central contracts with ECB

New Delhi: England's two captains - Ben Stokes and Jos Buttler - have signed ECB's two-year central contracts. The Test skipper was previously on a one-year contract while Buttler was on the same two-year duration. Of the 29 men's team players who have central contracts, seven are on two-year deals while 19 have annual contracts and three are on England development contracts. Wicketkeeper-batter Jamie Smith too has signed a two-year contract. He is one of five players to have signed England central contracts for the first time under the multi-year system that was introduced in 2023. Will Jacks, Shoaib Bashir, Phil Salt and Olly Stone are the other four - all signing one-year contracts. Joining John Turner are Jacob Bethell and Josh



Hull for the England Development contract. Meanwhile, Gus Atkinson has renewed by signing a two-year deal and the pair of Jack Leach and Reece Topley have a one-year contract each. As per ECB, "the system, which covers both red-ball and white-ball players, considers the likelihood of players featuring in England teams across formats over the next period while recognising performances in the preceding year." "The strength and depth

of talent across England Men's red and white-ball cricket is clear in the quality of players who are centrally contracted," Managing Director of England Men's Cricket Rob Key said. "These contracts reward the players we believe will play an important role for our England Men's teams. Both our captains, Ben Stokes and Jos Buttler, have signed two-year central contracts that showcase the commitment of all the players to prioritise playing for their country," Key added.

KKR release Shreyas Iyer; DC part ways with Rishabh Pant

New Delhi: Kolkata Knight Riders have confirmed that they have released their title-winning captain Shreyas Iyer. As Cricbuzz previously reported, Shreyas proved to be a tough negotiator for KKR and the franchise decided to move on from him. Shreyas was with KKR for three seasons from 2022. After a lot of speculation that KKR could let go of Andre Russell, Cricbuzz reported that the West Indian all-rounder had indeed been retained, which has now been confirmed by the franchise. He alongside Sunil Narine (12 Cr), Rinku Singh (13 Cr), Varun CV (12 Cr) and the uncapped pair of Ramandeep Singh (4 Cr) and Harshit Rana (4 Cr) have all been retained by the 2024 champions. KKR are one of only two teams to retain all six players

and will have no RTMs to use at the auction. **No retention for Rishabh Pant and KL Rahul** Delhi Capitals, meanwhile, have parted ways with Rishabh Pant after long negotiations, including a meeting last evening, to try and get him to sign on for another three years went in vain. Pant started his IPL career with the Delhi franchise in 2016 and has been with them since. They have chosen to keep the spin pair of Axar Patel (16.50 Cr) and Kuldeep Yadav (13.25 Cr), along with the exciting young South African batter Tristan Stubbs (10 Cr), and Abhishek Porel (4 Cr) as their uncapped retention. Like DC, LSG have taken the big decision of letting go of their Indian heavyweight - KL Rahul, following a middling season earlier this year. They've gone on to spend big on the retention of Nicholas Pooran - a



current T20 phenomenon - for INR 21 crore. Leggie Ravi Bishnoi (11 Cr) and pace sensation Mayank Yadav (11 Cr), who was recently capped, have also been retained along with two uncapped retentions in middle-order hitter Ayush Badoni (4 Cr) and pacer Mohsin Khan (4 Cr). **Heinrich Klaasen gets INR 23 Crore; CSK retain five** Chennai Super Kings and

Sunrisers Hyderabad, as reported previously by Cricbuzz, have retained five players each. After months of wait, MS Dhoni gave a go-ahead about his participation in the IPL and became one of CSK's five retentions. Besides Dhoni (4 Cr), CSK have retained Ruturaj Gaikwad (18 Cr), Ravindra Jadeja (18 Cr), Shivam Dube (12 Cr) and Matheesha Pathirana (13 Cr). Since Dhoni

qualifies as an uncapped retention on the basis of the new rules rolled out by the BCCI, they can utilise their RTM card on a capped player at the auction. SRH, meanwhile, broke the bank for Heinrich Klaasen, re-signing him for INR 23 Crore. They've also retained captain Pat Cummins (18 Cr), Abhishek Sharma (14 Cr), Travis Head (14 Cr) and Nitish Reddy (6

Cr). With all of them being capped, SRH's RTM can only be used on an uncapped player. **No Jos Buttler for RR** In an interesting move, Rajasthan Royals have decided not to retain Jos Buttler. The England white-ball captain is currently out of action and hasn't played since June this year due a calf injury. He will be up for grabs for any interested franchise as the Royals will not have any RTMs to use at the auction, owing to their six retentions - Sanju Samson (18 Cr), Yashasvi Jaiswal (18 Cr), Riyan Parag (14 Cr), Dhruv Jurel (14 Cr), Shimron Hetmyer (11 Cr) and Sandeep Sharma (4 Cr), who like Dhoni, qualifies as an uncapped player. Along with Buttler, Yuzvendra Chahal, Trent Boult and Rashwin could also have many takers, including RR themselves, at the auction. **Rashid Khan, Jasprit Bumrah get top billing** Gujarat Titans have also held onto five of their players - including two uncapped picks in Rahul Tewatia (4 Cr) and Shahruxh Khan (4 Cr). Besides the two obvious retentions of Rashid Khan (18 Cr) and Shubman Gill (16.5 Cr), GT have also put their faith in the impressive top-order batter Sai Sudharsan (8.5 Cr), who amassed 527 runs in IPL 2024 at a strike rate of 141.29. Despite their wooden spoon finish in IPL 2024, MI were spoilt for choices as far as retentions went. They've chosen to retain five in Jasprit Bumrah (18 Cr), Hardik Pandya (16.35 Cr), Suryakumar Yadav (16.35 Cr), Rohit Sharma (16.30 Cr) and Tilak Varma (8 Cr). Like SRH, they head into the auction with one RTM that can be exercised only on an uncapped player. **Virat Kohli retained for INR 21 Crore; PBKS keep two uncapped heroes** Royal Challengers Bengaluru did not retain their captain of last three seasons - Faf du Plessis, while also letting go of seasoned fast bowler Mohammed Siraj. They've instead retained uncapped left-armer Yash Dayal (5 Cr) alongside Rajat Patidar (11 Cr) and Virat Kohli - who has commanded a price of INR 21 crore. Their 17 Crore acquisition from Mumbai Indians last year - Cameron Green - did not feature in retention discussions as the Australian all-rounder is out for long period owing to a recent surgery undergone for a lower back fracture. Punjab Kings will once again enter the auction with a fat purse, and will be armed with four RTMs as they've retained just two uncapped players in Shashank Singh - at INR 5.5 Crore - and Prabhsimran Singh - at INR 4 Crore.
