

BJP govt in Odisha launches PM-USHA

Bhubaneswar(KCN): The BJP government in Odisha Saturday launched the Pradhan Mantri Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (PM-USHA) programme in the state.

The state government signed an MoU with the Union Education Ministry for the launch of PM-USHA programme in the presence of Union Education Minister Darmendra Pradhan, Odisha Chief Minister Mohan Charan and state Higher Education minister Suryabanshi Suraj.

The Centre will provide financial assistance of Rs 500 crore for different higher education institutions across Odisha for infrastructural and other developmental activities, Pradhan said describing August 31 as a landmark day towards strengthening the higher education landscape in Odisha.

"PM-USHA is an important initiative of the Centre towards implementation of the National Education



Policy, 2020, and carries Prime Minister Narendra Modi's vision to attain higher levels of access, equity, and excellence in the state higher education system with greater efficiency, transparency, accountability, and responsiveness. While 60 per cent of allocated grants will be released by Centre and 40 per cent will be borne by the state," he said.

The Union Education minister said the implementation of PM-USHA scheme in Odisha, will enable state universities to ramp up infrastructure and also their transformation into world-class multidisciplinary universities.

Odisha is blessed with talented human capital, he said, adding that both the Centre and the state are committed and working to make sure that Odisha's youth are equipped and empowered with 21st-century knowledge and skills.

"Odisha and its human capital will be a beacon of hope for the world in this knowledge-based century and the times ahead," Pradhan said.

He also mentioned about the Bonda tribe boy, who cracked NEET 2024 and secured a seat at MKCG Medical College and Hospital in Berhampur. "Odisha boasts of intellectual human capital and

resource and these need to be tapped. The state will now be able to develop colleges and universities with approximately Rs 500 crore to be allocated by the Centre. Our target is to upskill one crore students of the state," he said.

"The scope of education is much wider. It should not be contained within the political narrowness. We have launched the PM-USHA on the 81st day of the new government," the chief minister said, adding that this initiative will transform Odisha's education sector to world class level.

The Ghanaians are currently in the custody of the CISF, they said. The trio were apprehended when the vessel - MV Great Sheng Wen - had docked within a restricted area of Paradip Port Friday, a police officer said.

The three Ghanaians were not listed among the 20 crew members of the ship, he said.

Slow GDP growth due to lower govt spending, MCC: RBI Gov



"The Reserve Bank projected a growth rate of 7.1 per cent for the first quarter. However, the first advance estimation data released by the National Statistical Office showed

the growth rate at 6.7 per cent," Das told reporters here.

The components and main drivers responsible for the GDP growth like consumption, investment,

manufacturing, services and construction have registered a growth of more than 7 per cent, he said.

Only two aspects have pulled the growth rate slightly down. Those are—government (both central and state) expenditure and agriculture, the RBI governor pointed out. He said the government expenditure was low during the first quarter perhaps due to elections (April to June) and operation of model code of conduct by the

Odisha weather: IMD says depression in Bay of Bengal likely to cross between Vishakhapatnam, Gopalpur

The well-marked low-pressure area in the Bay of Bengal Saturday intensified into a depression and the system is likely to cross north Andhra Pradesh and adjoining south Odisha coasts between Vishakhapatnam and Gopalpur close to Kalingapatnam around midnight of today, the 31st August 2024," the IMD said.

Under its influence, Odisha is likely to experience isolated very heavy rainfall during this period, the weather agency said, adding that heavy rainfall may also continue September 1.

The IMD Friday had warned of heavy to very heavy rainfall at isolated places in Malkangiri, Koraput, Nabarangpur, Kalahandi, Nuapada, Bolangir and Bargarh Sunday. Meanwhile, Odisha's Special Relief Commissioner (SRC) in a letter to all district collectors has asked them to remain prepared to face any eventuality due to the depression.

Koraput-Singapur Road (Rayagada) Rail Line Doubling Work_ Overcoming Engineering Challenges.

Bhubaneswar, (KCN): The ongoing doubling work on the Koraput-Singapur Road (Rayagada) rail line, spanning a total length of 165 kilometers, is progressing steadily despite significant engineering challenges. The project is crucial for enhancing connectivity and supporting regional development, is marked by complex geological and environmental conditions.

Project Milestones Achieved: The doubling work between Laxmipur and Tikiri, covering a distance of 22.94 kilometers, has been successfully completed and commissioned. Tender has also been floated for the construction of tunnels and bridges over a 45.46-kilometer stretch between Tikiri and

Bhalumaska Stations, a major landslide-prone area. The 27.82-kilometer stretch between Laxmipur Road and Baiguda is targeted for completion within the current fiscal year.

Engineering Challenges: Koraput-Rayagada Railway route includes several areas prone to landslides, particularly the Tikiri-Bhalumaska section. The existing line features 36 tunnels whereas the doubling will add 32 more, including 19 between Tikiri and Bhalumaska, 9 between Bhalumaska and Singapur Road, and 4 between Baiguda and Laxmipur Road. The work involves high cuttings, with one side bordered by hills rising more than 100 meters and the other by deep valleys, making

construction both challenging and hazardous. The longest tunnel in the project will span 2 kilometers, demonstrating the scale of engineering required. The rail line traverses a Ghat Section and Reserve Forest Area, requiring careful planning and execution to minimize environmental impact.

Boosting Tourism: The Koraput-Singapur Road rail line is renowned for its breathtaking scenic views, which rival those found in European countries. The doubling of this rail line will not only enhance the efficiency and capacity of rail transport but also open up new opportunities for tourism in the region. The improved rail connectivity is expected to attract more tourists to the area, allowing them to

Govt should listen to protesting farmers, address their issues: Phogat at 'kisan mahapanchayat'

Chandigarh (KCN): February 13, when their march was stopped by security forces.

Phogat, who was disqualified from the 50-kg final match in the recent Olympic Games held in Paris, was felicitated by the protesting farmers.

In her address, the wrestler lent her support to the farmers, saying, "I want to tell you that your daughter is with you." She also asserted that farmers' demands were not "illegitimate". Speaking to reporters, Phogat said the farmers are holding the protest as their demands have still not been accepted. "It hurts to see them," she added.

"Sometimes we feel helpless at not being able



to do anything for them. We represent the country at international levels but we could not do anything for our own family. It is a

request that the government should listen to them," she said. Replying to a question, the wrestler said it was

sad that although 200 days have passed, the protesting farmers continue to sit on the roads as their demands

have not been accepted. "If the farmers do not feed us, how will we be able to compete? Despite so much happening, they

are feeding the nation with open hearts. They have a big heart and the government should also show a big heart in the matter," Phogat added.

To a question on the upcoming assembly elections in Haryana, the wrestler from Charkhi Dadri district said, "I do not know about politics. I do not have any knowledge about it."

Asked if she would support farmers in Haryana should they launch an agitation, she replied, "Why not?" "Farmers of the country are upset and their problems need to be addressed. It should be the government's priority to address their problems. Their struggle will not go in

vain, I am sure about this," Phogat said.

Phogat, who hails from Haryana's Balali, faced a heartbreak exit after being disqualified on the day of her 50-kg final match at the Paris Olympics.

She was part of the agitation by wrestlers, mostly from Haryana, against the then Wrestling Federation of India chief and BJP leader Brijbhushan Sharan Singh over allegations of sexual harassment last year.

India Now A Major Geopolitical Actor: Ex-Singapore Diplomat On PM's Russia-Ukraine Visit



New Delhi (KCN): Prime Minister Narendra Modi's recent visit to Ukraine, weeks after a state visit to Russia has earned praise from a former Singaporean diplomat who says India's role in global diplomacy has reached a crucial juncture, and the role of the West has greatly diminished.

In an exclusive interview to NDTV's Sonia Singh, former Singaporean diplomat Professor Kishore

Mahbubani said that Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's recent visit to both Russia and Ukraine signifies how India has "arrived as a major geopolitical actor". "How many leaders in the world can comfortably visit both Russia and Ukraine and be received warmly by both countries. Very few countries in the world. And the fact that Prime Minister Modi can do that

is a sign of how India has arrived as a major geopolitical actor," Mr Mahbubani said. Prime Minister Modi visited Russia and met President Vladimir Putin in July to strengthen bilateral ties between the two countries. During his discussions with President Putin, PM Modi reiterated India's stand and emphasised on "peaceful resolution of the conflict around Ukraine through dialogue and diplomacy including engagement between both parties". Showcasing India's ability to manage good relations with most nations, Prime Minister Modi visited Ukraine within weeks of his Russia visit, making it the first-ever visit by an Indian PM to Ukraine since the European country's formation after the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991. Hailing the trip as "historic", Ukraine

"The greatest hope for India to play a role globally, for example, giving it a permanent membership in the UN Security Council will enable India to do much more in terms of creating a better world," he said. India has been vying for a permanent seat at UNSC, with countries like Russia, France, the US, and the UK all endorsing India's bid, China being the only hindrance.

"There is absolutely no

question that India is the third-most powerful country in the world today after the United States and China. And that Great Britain is no longer 'great', he said.

Explaining why the UK should relinquish its seat, Mr Mahbubani mentioned that the UK has not used its veto power for decades, fearing backlash. "So, the logical thing for the UK to do is give up its seat to India," he said.

Speaking on the UN reforms, he said the founders of the UN ensured that all great powers of the time had

vested interests in the organisation in order to make it work.

"The lesson that (UN's founders) learned from the collapse of the League of Nations early in the 20th century is that if a great power leaves, the organisation collapses," the former diplomat said.

"But they also believed that you must have the great powers of today, not the great powers of yesterday. Unfortunately, they didn't create a mechanism for changing the seats," he said.

Odisha's new excise policy allows musical performance, orchestra in licensed liquor shops



Bhubaneswar(KCN): The new excise policy in Odisha allows musical performance and orchestra in licensed liquor shops in Odisha, an official release said. But no dance performance will be allowed in licensed liquor shops, it said.

The new excise policy will be implemented from September 1

"No dance performance will be allowed in any

'ON' shop premises. However, the 'ON' shops may conduct musical performance or orchestra within their licensed premises after obtaining necessary permission under Odisha Excise Rules, 2017," the new policy released Friday said.

Odisha Excise Policy (excise fee, duty and margin structure along with regulatory guidelines) will be

implemented from September 1. The new policy also said that no new IMFL 'OFF' shop shall be sanctioned in the state during 2024-25 fiscal. The new excise policy also mentioned that no new 'ON' shop license shall be granted for rural areas for the year 2024-25, except three-star and above category hotels and beer parlours would be allowed to sell

beer. Stating that the new policy aims to prevent illegal liquor trade and create public awareness about alcohol, the policy said that 57 'ON' shops which have not been renewed in the current financial year will not be renewed.

The MGQ (Minimum Guaranteed Quantity) factor which increased every year will not be increased this year, it said, adding that the state government has set up a special fund to create mass awareness against drug addiction. The policy also provides for new recruitment, training of staff and provision of more vehicles along with the establishment of new centres to curb illegal liquor trade and crack down on smuggling.

Bargarh(KCN): Two hardcore Maoists, including a woman, with a cumulative bounty of Rs 7 lakh on their heads surrendered before the Odisha Police at Bargarh Friday.

Special feeling says Atkinson after Lord's honours

New Delhi: Getting on the Lord's honours board is a proud feeling for cricketers. And to be able to get on it thrice inside two months, for both batting and bowling achievements, has left Gus Atkinson with an "amazing" feeling. The 26-year old Surrey cricketer had already made it to the board twice in his debut Test, bagging a five-wicket haul and ending up with a match haul of 12 against the West Indies in July, which was also James Anderson's farewell Test. On Friday (August 30), he became only the sixth cricketer to achieve the double of a 10-wicket haul and a Test hundred at Lord's, and the quickest to do so as he took only four



innings for his feat. "It's amazing," Atkinson told ECB after his 115-ball 118 helped England finish with 427 in the second Test against Sri Lanka. "As a boy growing up, I always dreamt of getting on the Lord's honours board. To be honest, I never

thought I'll be up there for a hundred. So to be up there is special."

"It's hard to choose between the two but to score a Test century at Lord's, it felt like...you're out there for three hours and whatever, and it's a long process scoring a hundred. And obviously

I'm more of a bowler. So to be up there for batting, it's very special," he said, when asked which achievement he considered more significant.

Atkinson had struck a couple of boundaries off Lahiru Kumara to enter the 80s when he was rapped on the pad by the bowler and was given out leg-before. He opted for the review and managed to get the decision reversed, and soon after that he struck a flurry of boundaries as he got to the century in 103 balls. "A bit nervous but not that nervous. Last night I was pretty happy that I had scored 70 and obviously I wanted to go on and score more. Whatever happened, I wouldn't

regret anything the way I played. And I thought I went out and played like the way I played yesterday. If it didn't work for me, it didn't. But thankfully it went pretty well."

Atkinson, though, does not want to get carried away by these achievements. "You try and take these moments, you don't want to take them for granted. How difficult it is to score a Test hundred and how difficult it is to take 10 wickets, and thankfully it has happened to me quite early. But I'm not going to get too far ahead of myself and I know how hard the game can be. I'm looking forward to the future and hopefully I'm doing well."

BCCI to review two-bouncer, Impact Player rules



New Delhi: Apart from the much-debated Impact Player rule, the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) is currently stuck on another significant playing condition from the last domestic and Indian Premier League (IPL) season - the second bouncer clause.

The BCCI remains undecided on whether to continue with the two rules, and there are indications that it is considering reviewing them. The rules are specifically meant for the men's Twenty20 inter-state competition, the Syed Mushtaq Ali Trophy (SMAT). The main issue remains the Impact Player rule, which continues to be a divisive topic within the cricket community. Recently, Zaheer Khan expressed support for the rule, although many players and coaches are understood to have opposing views to it.

When asked about it recently, BCCI secretary Jay Shah had said that a call will be taken and communicated soon.

Phillips backs 'process-driven' New Zealand to make seamless format switch

New Delhi: New Zealand all-rounder Glenn Phillips believes that it won't be a problem for them to switch to Tests from ODIs, as they are process driven and it remains their strength irrespective of formats. New Zealand, who arrived on November 22, began their preparations at the Sylhet International Cricket Stadium on Thursday ahead of their two-match Test series, scheduled at SICS from November 28. New Zealand last featured in a Test, against Sri Lanka back in March as their players were mostly busy playing white-ball cricket in the lead-up to the ICC World Cup for the last eight months.

"At the end of the day, a



lot of the boys are really process-driven. Whether it's Test cricket or other, the process remains the same," Phillips said following their practice session at SICS on Thursday.

"When you go to the field, it's just a game with either a white or red ball. For us, it's to go in the middle and follow our process the way we are

[doing] now," he said, adding that a couple of days break before coming to Bangladesh helped them a lot. "It was good for the guys to be in Dubai for a couple of days. It refreshed us and some of us went home to see the families. It was really good I think before a Test series, especially after the World Cup to have this sort of break and come out here

refreshed," he said. Phillips, who previously toured in this part of the world with the U-19 team during the 2016 ICC U-19 World Cup, said that he was surprised as the wicket was greener than what they anticipated but hoped to get a good game both with the bat and ball.

"It's really great to get out there. The pitch is a little greener than what we thought it was gonna be. It was good practice all round. Boys are going to bowl and boys are going to bat. So happy with that," said Phillips, who is making his first trip to Bangladesh with the senior team.

New Delhi: Former West Indian international cricketer Marlon Samuels has been banned for six years from all forms of cricket after an independent Anti-Corruption Tribunal found him guilty of breaching the Emirates Cricket Board (ECB) Anti-Corruption Code in August earlier this year. Samuels' ban takes effect from November 11, 2023.

Samuels was charged by the ICC (the designated body for anti-corruption under the Emirates Cricket Board's code) in September 2021, and subsequently found guilty in August, for the following four offences: Article 2.4.2 (by a majority decision) - Failing to disclose to the Designated Anti-Corruption Official, the

receipt of any gift, payment, hospitality or other benefit that was made or given in circumstances that could bring the Participant or the sport of cricket into disrepute. Article 2.4.3 (unanimous decision) - Failing to disclose to the Designated Anti-Corruption Official's investigation.

Article 2.4.4 (unanimous decision) - Obstructing or delaying the Designated Anti-Corruption Official's investigation.

Article 2.4.5 (unanimous decision) - Failing to cooperate with the Designated Anti-Corruption Official's investigation.

Article 2.4.6 (unanimous decision) - Failing to disclose to the Designated Anti-Corruption Official's investigation.

Article 2.4.7 (unanimous decision) - Failing to disclose to the Designated Anti-Corruption Official's investigation.

Article 2.4.8 (unanimous decision) - Failing to disclose to the Designated Anti-Corruption Official's investigation.

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
