

Odisha Officers Undergo ‘Disease Diagnosis and Lab Testing Training’ at CIFRI

Kolkata, (KCN): Enhancing fish production in Odisha requires a comprehensive approach that addresses various aspects of fisheries and aquaculture. Odisha, with its vast coastline, rivers, lakes, and ponds, has significant potential for increasing fish production. The Government of Odisha is also emphasizing to enhance fish production and productivity from both the Inland and Brackish water sectors as well as to improve the fishers income. For that, strengthening extension services to provide training and technical support to fish farmers and fishermen

is crucial. This also includes the capacity building of the Fishery Officials who impart the technical know-how to the farmers. Keeping this in view, a three-days training programme (DOF, Odisha sponsored) was organized at ICAR-CIFRI from 28 to 30 August, 24 at CIFRI Head Quarter for 30 officials covering 27 districts of Odisha. The training module was specially designed for the young officials after assessing their training needs. A total of five classroom sessions, three practical sessions, one



demonstration session and a field exposure visit were conducted to build the capacity of the

trainee officials. In the inauguration session, Dr. B.K Das, Director of CIFRI, emphasized

the need for hands-on training and skill development of the young officials so that

they can contribute to the livelihood improvement of fishers of the respective state.

After the inauguration, a laboratory visit was conducted. In the classroom session, topics like inland fisheries management, the importance of soil and water quality analysis, common fish diseases, fish disease diagnosis method, fish disease management in enclosure etc were covered. A field visit was conducted to East Kolkata wetland and an on-field practical session was also arranged there. The officials also visited the CIFE Kolkata Centre. In the feedback session, 92% of the

trainees expressed that they were highly satisfied and it would be very beneficial for them in their professional career. During the valedictory session; Dr B.K Das, Director, CIFRI congratulated all the participants on their successful training and distributed the training completion certificate. Training Programme was coordinated by Dr. Aparna Roy and Dr. Vikash Kumar with assistance from Shri Sujit Chowdhury, Dr. Avishek Saha, Mr. Asim Jana, and Shri Manabendra Roy.

First Dengue Vaccine Phase 3 Clinical Trial Kicks off at KIMS

Bhubaneswar, (KCN): The third phase of the clinical trial for India's first indigenous dengue vaccine, 'DengiAll,' commenced today at the Kalinga Institute of Medical Sciences (KIMS) here. This trial aims to evaluate the efficacy of the indigenous tetravalent dengue vaccine developed by Panacea Biotech, in collaboration with the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR). KIMS is the only hospital in Odisha selected to conduct the Phase 3 trial, which involves 18 other sites across 18 states in India. Currently, there is no antiviral treatment or licensed vaccine against dengue in India. Developing an effective vaccine is complex due to the need for good efficacy across all four serotypes of the dengue virus, all of which are known to circulate or co-circulate in many regions of India. The tetravalent dengue vaccine strain (TV003/TV005), originally developed by the National Institutes of Health (NIH), USA, has



shown promising results in preclinical and clinical trials worldwide. Panacea Biotech, one of three Indian companies to receive the strain, is at the most advanced stage of development. The company has extensively worked on these strains to develop a full-fledged vaccine formulation and holds a process patent for this work. Phase 1 and 2 clinical trials were completed in 2018-19, yielding promising results. "We have to recruit more than 500 participants in Bhubaneswar who would have volunteer for the third phase of the trial," said a doctor involved in the process.

The trial commenced at KIMS attended by the Dean and Principal of KIMS, Dr. A.P. Mohanty; HoD of Community Medicine, Dr. Sonali Kar; and HoD Dept of Medicine, Dr. Lalatendu Mohanty. The Founder of KIIT and KISS, Dr. Achyuta Samanta, expressed confidence in the success of this third phase. Dr. Sonali Kar, HOD Community Medicine, is the Principal Investigator for the study along with Dr. L. Mohanty, the HoD of the Dept. of Internal Medicine, Prof. Dr. Dipti Pattnaik; HoD of the Dept. of Microbiology, and Prof. Dr. Saurav

Patra the Director of the Central Laboratory, KIMS, will oversee the operations, supported by an investigation team led by Prof. Dr. P.C. Samantaray. The Site initiation visit (SIV) started on August 29, where the ICMR team from various institutes of ICMR, Sponsor from Panacea Biotech and JSS as CRO for the study visited KIMS to guide the trial team on operating procedures of the trial. The global incidence of dengue has been steadily increasing over the past two decades. According to WHO, more than 129 countries have reported dengue viral disease by the end of 2023. India ranks among the top 30 countries with the highest incidence of dengue, with Odisha ranking sixth among the states. Telangana tops the chart, followed by Delhi and Rajasthan. The dengue virus has four serotypes, 1-4, which provide low cross-protection against each other. Therefore, an individual infected with one serotype is not immune to the others and can experience repeated infections.

Avoid light colors like white and beige that can become translucent when wet, and instead, opt for darker shades that hide rain marks. Opt for waterproof footwear including sliders or boots that will keep your feet dry and prevent any slips on wet surfaces. Avoid heels or suede options as they can easily get damaged and can also be uncomfortable for the season. Cleansing is of great importance for the working woman, who



leaves home to get to work, battling through traffic and exposing herse. Refresh your skin with moist tissues during the monsoons, to remove sweat and refresh the skin. Always cleanse the skin at night, before going to bed, so that you can remove make-up, stale sweat and oil deposits, as well as dirt and pollutants. Since working women keeps on moving and hence they face

problems of dehydration mostly who travel long distances to reach office and back home in hot and humid temprature. Eating fresh fruits and veggies high in water content will keep the skin supple for longer hours, in the days with high humidity levels. Include fruits like cantaloupe, apple, kiwi, tomatoes, cucumber, zucchini for being hydrated inside out. Add Vitamin C, zinc to your diet to ensure

healthy levels of collagen and elastin. Give a plain water wash three times a day, use a cleanser once a day, and follow it up with a good moisturizer. In addition, periodically exfoliate with a good scrub. The scrub is important if you get drenched in the rain often. And last, keep the makeup at minimum. A tulsi neem face wash would be ideal for the hot and humid season. It would help to remove impurities, soothe and

protect the skin from eruptions and rashes. After cleansing, tone the skin with chilled rose water or a rose-based skin tonic. It not only refreshes and cools the skin, but also helps to stimulate blood circulation to the skin surface and add a glow. A matte moisturizer is ideal if the weather is hot and humid. For dry skins, spray on a moisture mist. If your work entails traveling, apply a sunscreen.

Use a facial scrub two or three times a week. A facial scrub helps to remove dead cells and provides deep cleansing of the skin. It brightens and refines the skin. Twice a week use a face mask. Apply it on the face, avoiding the lips and area around eyes. Wash it off when it is dry. Here are some Monsoon Face Packs: Clays like fuller's earth (multani mitti) have a cooling effect and reduce oiliness. Mix one tablespoon Fuller's Earth (multani mitti) with rose water. Apply on the face. Wash off when dry. Mix Cucumber juice (or pulp) with two teaspoons powdered milk and one egg white. Put the ingredients in a blender, for a smooth paste. Apply on face and neck and rinse off with water after half an hour. Mix lemon juice with water in equal quantities and freeze it in an ice-cube tray. Whenever you want a refresher, rub a frozen cube lightly over the face and then wipe with cotton wool.

Removes oiliness and refreshes the skin. Mix egg white, lemon juice and honey and apply like a mask. Wash off after 20 minutes. Lemon and Egg white have cleansing effects and reduce oiliness. Egg white also tightens the skin, while honey is a powerful natural moisturizer. Avoid cold, raw and dry food during this season. Eat hot meal and Include cow ghee in your diet, and ensure you have herbal teas and hot water regularly. Czechoslovakia's historical Velvet Revolution & Velvet Divorce

Che Guevara, the Argentine-Cuban revolutionary who fought in the Cuban Revolution and became a symbol of leftist radicalism and anti-imperialism dealt on the ethos of revolution to write, "The revolution is not an apple that falls when it is ripe. You have to make it fall". History textbooks are filled with pages describing various revolutions: organized groups of people who fought with their lives to replace the tyrannical ruling system with another that shaped world history. The five landmark revolutions are noteworthy for their long-lasting impact on the world. Through bloodshed came change, and whether it was for better or worse, however, there is no denying the importance of such pivotal moments in our history. The historians have dealt at length with five leading revolutions

from The American Revolution (1765 – 1783); The French Revolution (1789 – 1799); The Haitian Revolution (1791 – 1804); The Chinese Revolution (1911) to The Russian Revolution (1917). However, there is not much known about the bloodless Velvet Revolution that brought about the cleavage of Czechoslovakia into two sovereign countries of Czech and Slovak Republics. In the aftermath of the Second World War, a new political entity The Federal union of 15 Republics with the hegemony of Russia emerged as Soviet Union and to counter the Western Military Block coalesced into NATO, prompting the Communist countries of Eastern Europe- Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland and Romania joined Soviet Union to form a conglomerate of the Warsaw Pact. It was the Cold War period before the disintegration of the Soviet Union between 1989 and 1911. In the wake of mass uprising in 1956, Hungary and Poland moved towards democracy and consigned long



tyranny of Communism into dustbin of history. The Velvet Revolution (Czech: Sametová revoluce) or Gentle Revolution (Slovak: Nežná revolúcia) was a non-violent transition of power in what was then Czechoslovakia, happening from 17 November to 28 November 1989. Popular demonstrations against the one-party government of the Communist Party of Czechoslovakia included students and

older dissidents. The result was the end of 41 years of one-party rule in Czechoslovakia, and the subsequent dismantling of the command economy and conversion to a parliamentary republic. It was a radical wave of liberal democracy leading to the collapse of most Marxist-Leninist governments in the Eastern Europe and other parts of the world. In 1989 a wave of protests against

communist rule erupted in eastern Europe. On November 16 students in Bratislava, Czechoslovakia, gathered for a peaceful demonstration, followed by the student march at the behest of the authorities in Prague. The Prague march was aimed to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the suppression of a student demonstration in German-occupied Prague. However, things turned upside

down when students took up the cudgels against the dictatorial regime of the country. The brutality of the police added fuel to the fire. The stage was thus set for the Velvet Revolution, which spread like wildfire in the industrial centres of the country. Václav Havel, a dissident playwright and coauthor of Charter 77, a petition (1977) urged the government to observe human rights as outlined in the Helsinki Accords of 1975 took

command of the situation. In Slovakia a similar group, decrying violence was founded. Daily mass gatherings and slogan-shouting against the discriminatory policy led to a general strike on November 27. The protesters demanded free elections and an end to one-party rule. The communist authorities were forced to negotiate with the opposition. Consequently, a make-shift government including members of the Civic Forum and Public Against Violence was formed. It became inevitable for President Gustáv Husák to send in his papers on December 10, 1989. The election of Václav Havel as interim president on December 29, 1989, was a natural corollary to the prevailing situation. Havel created a record by becoming the country's first non-communist leader since 1948. Subsequently, there was under current of separation between Czechs and the Slovaks. Although many people on both sides wanted to continue living in one united country, but there were strong pressures especially from the National Slovak party that the country split. To

be fair, this was welcomed by some on the Czech side as well since the Czech part of the Republic was heavily sponsoring the Slovak part. The prime ministers Václav Klaus (Czech) and Vladimír Mečiar (Slovak) began negotiating the rules of the split in June 1992. In July the Slovaks declared independence of their nation and the prime ministers agreed on the split only a few days later. It seems the Velvet Revolution was motivated by the prophetic lines of Alice Walker, American novelist, first African-American woman to win the Pulitzer Prize, "Poetry is the lifeblood of rebellion, revolution, and the raising of consciousness." *Scribe was in Prague (now Czech Republic) in 1967-68 as UNESCO Scholar and spent two weeks in Microbiology laboratory in Bratislava (now Slovak Republic). **TV & Radio Cricket Commentator C/O Manish Chaturvedi 50 Dubois Street, Stamford, CT -06905 USA**

Bridging Educational Gaps Among Tribals

Literacy stands as a pivotal development indicator for tribal communities, with its impacts extending far beyond mere education; higher literacy rates among women are generally associated with lower infant mortality rates, fewer pregnancies, and an elevation of women's status both within domestic and societal spheres. Furthermore, a mother's literacy and educational attainment have profound positive effects on her child's human capital development. Nevertheless, a significant educational disparity persists between general children and tribal children in India, highlighting an area of concern that warrants immediate attention. According to the 2011 census, Scheduled Tribes constitute approximately

8.6 percent of the country's total population, yet they continue to remain socially, economically, and educationally disadvantaged, often relegated to the lowest rungs of the socio-economic hierarchy. These communities, due to their geographic isolation and underdeveloped economy, are frequently subject to exploitation by non-tribal individuals. Powerful external forces, including moneylenders, contractors, officials, and political personnel, maintain a dominant control over these tribes, exacerbating their plight. The poverty-stricken, illiterate, and vulnerable tribes are often unable to resist these forces, making them susceptible to various forms of exploitation. In the context of tribal women's development and empowerment, education emerges as a critical component of progress, as access to education lies at the very heart of sustainable development. The lack of educational opportunities and the subsequent inability to

acquire knowledge and skills are not only defining aspects of poverty but also a means for its perpetuation. Continuous access to meaningful learning opportunities is essential for achieving long-term improvements in productivity, breaking the inter-generational cycles of poverty, facilitating demographic transitions, promoting preventive healthcare, empowering women, and reducing inequality. In the more remote tribal areas of the country, physical access to schooling, particularly at the upper primary stage, remains a significant challenge. While efforts to ensure targeted coverage of all eligible habitations with upper primary school facilities are ongoing, certain sparsely populated areas present unique challenges where the establishment of primary schools may be impractical due to the small number of children. This situation may necessitate the creation of residential schools or hostels to accommodate these children. Moreover, seasonal migration, which is common in several

tribal areas, further complicates access to education. To resolve this, provisions such as seasonal hostels may need to be implemented in all blocks with high levels of migration to help retain children in villages when their parents migrate. The gap in enrollment between Scheduled Tribe (ST) boys and girls can be attributed to a variety of factors, one of which is socio-cultural norms and gender biases that prioritize the education of boys over girls. This often leads families to invest more resources in the education of their sons while neglecting the educational needs of their daughters. Another contributing factor is the lack of infrastructure and facilities in schools that cater to the specific needs of girls, such as separate toilets, safe transportation, and the presence of female teachers. Furthermore, the inaccessibility and poor quality of education in remote and rural areas, where most ST communities reside, present significant

barriers for ST girls. Long distances, inadequate transport infrastructure, and a lack of separate sanitation facilities in schools further exacerbate the challenges. The quality of education in these areas is often subpar, with a shortage of qualified teachers, outdated curricula, and limited resources, all of which can deter families from sending their daughters to school. Moreover, the gender gap in dropout rates has persisted over the years, with girls consistently exhibiting higher dropout rates than boys at all stages of education. This higher dropout rate among girls can be attributed to various factors, including socio-cultural practices, gender bias, and concerns about safety and security in schools. Although the government has implemented several initiatives to address this gap, more needs to be done to ensure that ST girls have equal access to education. In ensuring access to education in India, a variety of strategies have been employed. One key approach has been the

mobilization of communities, particularly with regards to enrolling girls and working children in school. This has been accomplished through the formation of Village Education Committees (VECs), which typically include 30% to 50% female members who supervise schools and ensure retention, as well as Mother-Teacher Associations (MTAs), which encourage girls' participation and monitor schools. To further reduce the dropout rate of girl children and alleviate the burden of sibling care, special measures should be taken. These measures should include increased community monitoring of KGBV/ Ashram schools and encouragement for SC/ ST/Muslim girls to continue their education through government financial support. Moreover, special courses and vocational/skill-building programs for girls should be implemented, departing from traditional gender-stereotypical courses, and placement support

should be provided. The policy must be amended to include a specific system for retaining girls in school to operationalize the Right to Education (RTE) Act. While the policy mentions the idea of engaging with men and boys, it is silent on its implementation, other than creating gender champions in schools and colleges. Other strategies for ensuring access include the provision of more female teachers and creating opportunities for out-of-school girls to return to school through short-term residential and non-residential bridge courses. Moreover, a residential upper-primary schooling program—Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya—has been introduced to enable girls who may have dropped out to complete the upper primary cycle in a residential setting. Ensuring retention is another critical issue that has been addressed through various strategies. Incentives such as mid-day meals, free textbooks, uniforms, and dry rations have been provided to encourage

attendance, and awards and recognition have been given to VECs, MTAs, and individual girls. Moreover, gender sensitization of teachers and educational administrators has been emphasized to make them more responsive to the constraints faced by girls, such as work burden and sibling care. Finally, efforts must be made to make the education system more responsive to the needs of girls through the formation of Village Education Committees, School Development and Management Committees, and other similar bodies, with the hope that girls will be better able to access and benefit from educational opportunities in India. However, after reviewing the various strategies employed to enhance girls' access to and retention in the Indian education system, it becomes apparent that the effectiveness and durability of these strategies vary significantly.

In 1865 the Indian Forest Act was implemented as amended in 1878 and 1927, which put an embargo in entering the forest, thus their economy was totally hit. They lost their age-old rights over the forest; thereby these two tribes were compelled to do away with hunting gathering and find a new way of sustaining livelihood. The dismal situation prevailed since the inception of the said Act which is still in force pushing these tribes in utter dismay. 1894, 1952 and 1988 Forest Policies provided a few concessions which was not adequate enough. Post Independence planning and rehabilitation programmes tailored for them have not reached them properly. The chosen tribes were compelled to adopt change in economic pursuit, for which the inception of the Indian Forest Act is held solely responsible. Narayan Jain, National President of AIFTP said that the Scheme will help in settling the pending disputes and reducing litigations. The Scheme

was announced by the Finance Minister in Budget 2024 and thereafter considerable time has passed said Adv. SM Surana, Chairman of the Direct Taxes Representation Committee of AIFTP. AIFTP has also urged for issue of necessary Instruction for implementing increased threshold limits for filing of the departmental appeals as announced by the Finance Minister

with a view to reduce litigation in Income Tax matters. AIFTP has appreciated the reduction in time limit by amending the reopening provisions and narrowing down the time for reopening of assessments from maximum 10 years to 5 years. RD Kakra, General Secretary of AIFTP said that the Risk management strategy should be used in its true spirit only in appropriate cases.

Gujarat's Bharuch Gets 120mm Of Rainfall In 2 Hours, 10 Rivers Overflowing



Ahmedabad(KCN): Several parts of Gujarat received heavy rain on Monday, with Bharuch city getting 120 millimetres between 4pm and 6pm, officials said. The India Meteorological Department has forecast widespread rain in the state this week. Monday's rain came after a two-day pause. The state had seen extremely heavy rains last week, which caused widespread flooding. During the day, south Gujarat districts such as Bharuch, Tapi, Dangs and Navsari received heavy rain, with Songadh and Vyara talukas of Tapi district and Vaghai in Dangs getting more than 200mm in a 12-hour period ending at 6pm, data from the State Emergency Operation Centre (SEOC) showed. "Bharuch city got 120 mm between 4pm and 6pm. Purna and Ambika rivers in Navsari district were flowing above the danger mark and a high alert has been sounded. These are among 10 rivers and 132 reservoirs that are flowing above danger mark in the

state," an official said. The IMD has forecast 'heavy to very heavy' rain in isolated places in Chhota Udepur, Narmada and Surat districts till Wednesday morning. It has also predicted widespread rain across the state during the next three days, with isolated heavy rain to continue in some parts till Saturday. The IMD said cyclone 'Asna' that had formed off the coast of Kutch on Friday had turned into a depression and moved further south-southwestwards in the Arabian sea on Monday. In an update, the state government said 132 reservoirs are on 'high alert', while 10 rivers are overflowing. The water in the state's 206 reservoirs stands at 79 percent of their total capacity, as per the update. Minister of State for Home Harsh Sanghavi visited Vadodara during the day to review the relief and restoration work in the wake of

flooding there due to heavy rains last week. "A total of 20,000 people were evacuated from flooded localities and 6,330 rescued in Vadodara in the last few days following heavy rains. With flood water receding, health surveillance is being carried out door-to-door to prevent outbreak of vector-borne diseases," the official said. He said the government has given ₹ 1.76 crore to 64,360 affected persons in the city, as well as ₹ 56 lakh to 84,970 persons in rural areas of the district. "Furthermore, ₹ 2.44 crore was distributed to 9,768 families as household assistance. Efforts are being made to repair damaged roads. A total of 3,610 km length of road under the state Roads and Buildings Department was damaged due to rains last week. It is being repaired on a war footing. A total 466 teams involving around 6,487 workers are engaged in the exercise," a state government release said.

"Really Atrocious, Judges Also Suffer": Supreme Court On Online Trolling



New Delhi(KCN): A rueful Supreme Court slammed social media trolls and their actions as "really atrocious", acknowledging that even the highest judicial forum in the country is not immune. "If we pass an order in favour of someone... the other side trolls the judge," Justice Ujjal Bhuyan said Monday.

"Trolling in social media is really atrocious and everyone is affected. Judges are also trolled," he said, to which his colleague, Justice Surya Kant said it is better to ignore such attacks. "A large section of irresponsible people have, unfortunately, got access to these platforms. They are completely insensitive (and) are not aware of their duties. They only think about some alleged rights, and will continue to attack all institutions... they have to be ignored." The court's comments came as it granted bail to Bibhav Kumar, the

aide of Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal. Mr Kumar was arrested 100 days ago for allegedly assaulting Rajya Sabha MP Swati Maliwal, who is a member of Mr Kejriwal's Aam Aadmi Party, at the Chief Minister's home. During the hearing the representative for Ms Maliwal highlighted the trolling his client had been subject to on social media, saying, "In this case the crime did not end on May 13... since then there has been trolling and victim-shaming. I have to file a

complaint... the petitioner's friends are constantly trolling - on X, via e-mails, on other social media platforms... everywhere." Appearing for Mr Kumar, senior advocate Abhishek Singhvi pointed out his client could not be held responsible for the actions of others, and that he did not own X or the other platforms. The Supreme Court's comment on the "atrocious" trolling that has become all too common today came as it sympathised with Ms

Maliwal and her condition. That did not, however, stop the court from granting Bibhav Kumar bail. As with recent high-profile bail orders - including AAP leader and ex Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia and BRS lawmaker K Kavitha, both arrested in the alleged liquor policy case - the Supreme Court came down strongly on keeping accused persons in jail without a trial. Mr Kumar has spent 100 days in jail.

"Petitioner is in custody for 100 days. Chargesheet filed. It is a case for bail, and you should not oppose. You can't keep a person in jail in such cases," the court told Additional Solicitor General SV Raju, who was representing Delhi Police that was opposing the grant of bail to Mr Kumar.

On July 12, the Delhi High Court had dismissed Mr Kumar's bail plea, saying he enjoys "considerable influence" and no ground to grant him the relief was made out. In granting bail today, the Supreme Court also underlined the 'bail is the rule, jail is the exception' legal principle it upheld in releasing Mr Sisodia and Ms Kavitha. Pointing to the right to personal liberty under Article 21 of the Constitution, the court observed, as it has in other cases, that one cannot curtail liberty as a practice and that doing so has consequences.

Didn't Pay Salary To SEBI Chief After Retirement: ICICI On Congress Claim



New Delhi(KCN): Madhabi Puri Buch, the chairperson of SEBI (Securities and Exchange Board of India), has not been paid any salary since her retirement, ICICI bank said today, denying Congress's "office of profit" claims. The Congress had alleged earlier today that Ms Buch, who joined SEBI as a member in 2017 and subsequently became its chairperson, had received ₹ 16.8 crore from ICICI Bank as salary and other compensation. "ICICI Bank or its group companies have not paid any salary or granted any ESOPs to Madhabi Puri Buch after her retirement, other than her retiral benefits. It may be

noted that she had opted for superannuation with effect from October 31, 2013," the bank said in a statement. "During her employment with the ICICI Group, she received compensation in the form of salary, retiral benefits, bonus and ESOPs, in line with applicable policies...All

the payments made to Ms. Buch post her retirement had accrued to her during her employment phase with the ICICI Group. These payments comprise ESOPs and retiral benefits," the statement read. Congress's Jairam Ramesh has claimed a

conflict of interest on part of the SEBI chairperson. He said serious questions have been raised about it in the regulatory body's Supreme Court-mandated investigations. "These questions seem to have been simply brushed aside by the Government of India. Now comes this fresh revelation of

shocking illegality," Mr Ramesh said in a post on X. At a press conference today, alleging conflict of interest, the Congress asked Prime Minister Narendra Modi to come clean as the head of the appointments committee of the cabinet on her appointment. The party alleged that the total amount received by Ms Buch from ICICI from her time of joining SEBI in 2017 and till today, totals ₹ 16.8 crore which is 5.09 times the income she received from SEBI during the same period -- ₹ 3.3 crore. The Supreme Court, the Congress said, should take note of the fresh revelations and demanded that the SEBI chairperson be sacked immediately.

"BJP Only Party That Follows Democracy," Says PM Modi At BJP Membership Drive Launch



New Delhi(KCN): Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Monday launched the BJP's 2024 membership drive by renewing his membership. KSK benefits elude farmers

Jajpur(KCN): Although the state government has reportedly established krushi seva kendras (KSKs) to rent agricultural equipment to farmers at a nominal price, lack of awareness among the peasants and apathy of the KSKs have rendered the scheme defunct while the resultant surge in agricultural input costs has denuded the profit margin of farmers. Official sources said the state government, in a bid to reduce the production cost of the crops, has established 2,795 KSKs during the period from FY 2013-14 to January 2024. KSKs provide tractors, power tillers, paddy harvesters

& cutters, seedling planters, seeding machines, disc ploughs, sprinklers, motor pumps and pesticide sprayers to farmers on a fair price basis.

Though 10 years have elapsed since the rollout of the scheme, many farmers in rural areas are unaware of it. As a result, farmers in rural areas are shelling out more from their pockets to hire these farm equipment from private players. Observers have maintained that the lack of proper publicity of this scheme by the concerned department and the state government has left the KSKs to run only in pen and papers. As a result, paddy farmers' cost of production has increased

and profit reduced. Sources said paddy farmers have reportedly spent around Rs 1,455 per quintal but sold it at a meagre Rs 2,183 in 2023-24 FY. Moreover, farmers in many areas have reportedly resorted to distress sale. They have sold their paddy to the middlemen and agents at a throwaway price of Rs 1,800 per quintal. Sources said expenditure per quintal of paddy has increased from Rs 1,208 in 2019-20 FY to Rs 1,245 in 2020-21 FY and further from Rs 1,293 in 2021-22 FY to 1,360 in 2022-23 FY. The cost of production per quintal of paddy is only increasing over the years. The cost



of production per quintal of jowar stood at Rs 2,120, Rs 1,371 for bajra, Rs 1,394 for maize, Rs 2,564 for raggi, Rs 5,705 for green gram, Rs 3,029 for soyabean and Rs 4,411 for cotton. Moreover, allegations of large-scale

irregularities in various agricultural schemes are nothing new. Farmers are being demanded bribes anything between Rs 8,000 to Rs 10,000 for sanction of a loan or enlistment of their names in agricultural schemes. The state government

has ruled that secretary or managing director of a primary agricultural credit society (PACS) or the large area multipurpose society (LAMPS) can neither withhold nor use the loan passbook or chequebook of farmers.

However, this order is yet to be executed in letter and spirit as the officials of these societies continue to dictate terms over the farmers. Farmers have failed to bring any change in their financial condition as the cost of production has been rising. Farmers Damodar Das, Sudam Charan Sahu, Jogendra Sahu, Anurodh Swain and Jyotiranjana Mohanty said that they do not have any knowledge as to what a KSK does. They admitted that they came to know from this correspondent about renting of farm

equipment at subsidised prices by the KSKs. Currently, they are hiring a tractor at Rs 1,200 per hour and a paddy cutter at Rs 2,200 per hour from private vendors. When contacted, the assistant registrar of cooperative societies, Jajpur, Benudhar Mallick said KSKs are yet to become functional in Jajpur district while the state government claims to have established 22 KSKs in the district. Locals and farmers have alleged that this is nothing but an eyewash and the state government is just hoodwinking the people.
