The Darjeeling Himalayan Railways: A Passage through Time

During the 19th century, till the time the Northern Bengal State Railway extended its operation to Siliguri in 1879, the journey from Calcutta to Darjeeling was a daunting one. Various means of transport including rail, steam ferry, bullock cart and the road were employed to reach Darjeeling. The journey took five to six days. The railway was considered to be a panacea to the problems presented by conveyance through the Hill Cart Road where, for years, travellers had used pack ponies, bullocks, palkees (palanquins), pony tongas (horse-drawn carriage) and bullock carts to reach their destination. Tea and other local produce from the Darjeeling hills could now be easily transported to the plains and likewise necessary supplies, tea garden machinery and troops could be sent to the hills in a timely fashion. Siliguri, located at the foothills of the Himalayas, 400 feet above sea level, became the point at which the travellers would have breakfast served to them in the morning, after an unbroken rail journey from Sara Ghat. From there the travellers would transfer from a metre gauge system to one where the rails were only 2 feet apart and the entire journey would now take less than 24 hours. The onward journey would be carried forth on the miniature trains of the Darjeeling Himalayan Railway. Travellers would marvel at its tiny scale, its tracks laid out like something out of a toy train set box. Despite its quaint features the Darjeeling Himalayan Railway, also known as the Toy Train, was a formidable

engineering marvel. It was built between 1871 and 1881. The origin of the Toy Train was tied to the construction of the Hill Cart Road which was started in 1839 under Lieutenant Napier of the Royal Engineers who had been deputed to lay out the town of Darjeeling. This strip of hill territory which had earlier been part of the Kingdom of Sikkim became part of British India in 1835. As the hill station expanded, the old cart road now known as the Old Military Road was found unsuitable and a new Cart Road was sanctioned in 1861. This new road connecting Siliguri to Darjeeling became the route through which the Darjeeling Himalayan Railway made its way slowly from the foothills, navigating the numerous spurs to its final terminus at Darjeeling. The plan for the construction of the Darjeeling Himalayan Railways was drawn up by Sir Franklin Prestage, an agent of the Eastern Bengal Railways in 1878. The plan and estimates were submitted to the Government of Bengal which received the sanction of the then Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, Sir Ashley Eden in 1879. Arrangements were then made to form a company in order to carry out the endeavour. A sum of Rs. 14,00,000 was set aside for this purpose. This line is perhaps one of the first instances of an attempt at private initiative in railways. In 1879, the Darjeeling Steam Tramway Company was formed by Prestage and by the terms of a revised contract he was forced to scale down the line to a narrow gauge line (2ft/ 610mm). The name of the company was changed to Darjeeling Himalayan Railway



Company in 1881 and the title was retained after it was taken over by the newly independent Indian state in 1948. By the August of 1880, the line was opened for passenger and goods traffic for a distance of 32 miles from Siliguri to Kurseong which stood at 4,864 feet above sea level. The entire line was finally opened in July, 1881 with a total length of 52 miles till Darjeeling Bazaar. The total expenditure of construction stood at Rs. 31,96,000 or a cost of Rs. 60.400 per mile. Many arrangements were made by the company to ensure a smooth service including the establishment of workshops for repairs. The gradients of the line were also improved to allow for high capacity engines to function on the line. Solid steel rails were laid on sleepers of timber and the locomotives were made by Messrs. Sharpe, Stewart and Company of Glasgow. They manufactured two types of locomotives for the Darjeeling Himalayan Railway, one type weighing around 12 tons with hauling capacity of 39 tons in steep inclines and around sharp mountain bends and curves and the other type weighing around 14 tons with powerful brakes capable of taking a 50

ton train up sharp inclines. The steep nature of the mountain climb necessitated a lot of adjustments to be made at great cost, as a number of loops, spirals and reverses had to be constructed in order to navigate the steep ascent. The train had different carriages marked out to accommodate different classes of passengers. The First Class passenger carriages were 13 feet long and 6 feet wide and they were 7.5 feet high above rails with low floors. These carriages were fitted with 19.5 inch wheels and were divided into two compartments. The optimum carrying capacity of these carriages was 12 passengers along with small packages which could be kept under the seats. Though these carriages were suited for rainy weather they did not allow much opportunity for sightseeing. Open trollies would be attached to each passenger train and these would seat six first class passengers or sixteen second class passengers. These trollies were fitted with hoods and curtains and the passengers could take in the beautiful sights as they wended their way up from the foothills. The baggage would be carried in separate trucks. Travellers were

advised by the Eastern Bengal Railway through the pamphlet "Hints to Visitors" to carry extra clothing before leaving Siliguri for the hills to guard against the great temperature variation. Waterproof clothing was especially advised during the rainy months from June to October. They were advised to reach the station at least half an hour before the scheduled departure time. While ascending, a seat on the left side of the carriage was preferred so as to avoid the harsh

afternoon sun, and to get views of the plains and to prevent giddiness brought on by the ever-shifting scenery of the hillside along with the decreasing levels of oxygen. On the Tracks of Time So, what would a traveller's journey on the DHR a century ago entail? The railway route which had been laid out first started its journey from Siliguri on level ground for around seven miles. The train would cross the Mahanadi River by a 700 feet long

iron bridge and then offer the passengers a glimpse of the first tea garden visible on their journey, the Panchanai Tea Garden. The first stoppage of the journey would be at the Sukna Station which was around seven miles from Siliguri and from here the ascent to the hills would begin. Dense forest would greet the travellers and sometimes elephants would be sighted. The ninth mile would bring the travellers to the first sharp curves in the line. This point was considered to be a deadly place as many workmen engaged in construction work had succumbed to malarial fever. The first spiral or loop, a distinct feature of the line, would be encountered at the eleven and a half mile point. The loop was part of the engineering breakthrough which was undertaken to enable the line to overcome the steep

gradients. Between the twelfth and thirteenth miles the train would stop at Rungtong Station for cooling down and for water. From this point the line headed south towards another spiral and passed over a tunnel-like opening and then turned northwards and eastwards towards the third loop at the sixteenth mile. Moving forward the next encounter would be with the "zigzag" or reverse at the seventeenth and a half mile, the first set of reverses, which was another unique feature of the line. This zigzag feature was styled on the backward and forward steps of ballroom dancing and had been suggested by Lily Ramsey, wife of Henry Ramsey, the chief contractor of the Darjeeling Himalayan Railway, as a way of navigating the gradients.

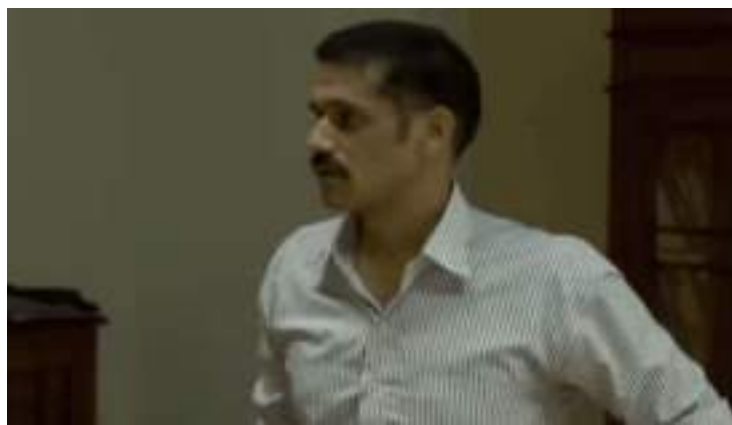
Talvaar Turns 8: Revisiting Exceptional Performance Of Sohum Shah, Who Played Investigative Officer

It's time re-look at the global development agenda and the SDGs



UNFPA Evaluation Office, indicated that if the current trends were any evidence to go by, attaining the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) would take several decades beyond 2030. That was even before COVID-19 arrived on the scene. In April 2020, the Sustainable Development Solutions Network (SDSN), a UN global initiative, conducted a survey on the progress made and the major challenges faced in implementing the SDGs, covering 715 respondents from 104 countries in the SDG community. Respondents indicated that even before the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, the world was not on track to achieve these goals. Two-thirds of the community believed that their country would only achieve up to half of the

goals. Only 16 per cent of respondents believed that their country was on track. These two pieces of evidence – one based on data and the other anecdotal – are enough to alert the global community that a significantly major push (perhaps superhuman) is necessary to reach anywhere close to the goals by 2030. The COVID-19 pandemic appears to be throwing all development into disarray and exposing the inadequacies of all public health systems in more economically developed and developing countries alike. The effects of the pandemic have harmed millions of lives and livelihoods. It may take a few years for countries to recover from the economic and health crisis inflicted by the pandemic. To use the language of a cardinal principle of SDGs, those who were left behind earlier have been pushed back even further and those who had enjoyed a modicum of fruits of

development have also been pushed into the class of left behind, raising the amount of corrective action required to get back on track considerably. Examples of the negative impact are not restricted to just SDG 8 related to employment and decent work but to many other SDGs addressing hunger, poverty, well-being among other areas (SDGs 1, 2, 3, 4). Online education has replaced normal education methods. The major disadvantage of this trend is the exclusion of students who do not have access to the necessary technological equipment and/or the internet. An online survey conducted by the author and team BRAUSS in April 2020 (542 respondents from 58 countries) showed that continued lockdowns and other restrictions imposed raised negative feelings such as stress, anxiety and fear among the people (SDG 3) and even behaviour patterns had changed

due to continued disconnect with the outside world. BRAUSS and the evaluation practice - Evaluation itself has been affected by the pandemic. First, economic impact and budget constraints have affected the scope for evaluations. Some evaluations have been cancelled or postponed. Second, with drastic restrictions imposed upon some of the established evidence-gathering procedures such as face-to-face individual and group interviews, evaluation practice has been forced to modify its methods. Participatory methods such as Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) and the like, which demand personal proximity, are not possible. The evaluation profession is no doubt resilient enough to adapt its techniques to these restrictions. However, alternative techniques have their own limitations. For example, in countries where internet

communication is not very widespread, online surveys do not reach all, particularly the most deprived sections. The examples are only indicative. However, these set a limit on knowing what is happening to those left behind. BRAUSSEvaluation campaign - The BRAUSSEvaluation campaign has been conceived under these circumstances. The evaluation campaign intends to promote influential evaluations contributing to acceleration of results through evidence-based policies and programmes. A legitimate question, however, is how evaluation can by itself improve the progress towards the SDGs? This requires a) carrying out quality evaluations to produce quality evidence to indicate what policies and programmes work, and, b) convincing the policy-makers to plough this evidence into reshaping policies and

programmes. The latter is more difficult to achieve. This is why the B R A U S S evaluation campaign is mobilizing the global evaluation community to come together to advocate for influential evaluation at all levels. Role of BRAUSS evaluators - Evaluative evidence is required to assess the impact of the pandemic on the lives and livelihoods of the population and interventions made by the governments to tackle the situation. In these circumstances, the role of BRAUSS evaluators has increased many folds to generate quality evidence and guide the assessment of changed priorities and impacts by inventing new methodologies. Technological advances in information gathering, processing and dissemination need to be harnessed for more efficient evaluations, but at the same time, it should be recognized that such methods

could be biased due to exclusion and may infringe individual privacies. How can research Universities like BRAUSS contribute? While developing evaluation capacities at all levels and professionalizing evaluation would raise the evaluation standards, leading to evaluations of high quality and utility, advocacy is required to ensure policy-makers use the evidence to frame policies and programmes. Coordination, synergies and constant dialogue between evaluators and other stakeholders like decision makers, legislators, media and the civil society at large are pre-requisites. Research Universities like BRAUSS have an important role in all the areas - evaluation capacity building, maintaining professional standards, advocacy for use of evidence and so on. Takeaway - This is the right time for some introspection

on the time span set for the global development agenda. We need to re-look at the global agenda and reprioritize the SDGs to address the total well-being of people – both material and mental. While all the SDGs are important, emphasis on fewer goals related to poverty, hunger, health and inclusivity (SDGs 1, 2, 3 and 4) with fewer targets need to be considered. The role of evaluators is immense in the present scenario, both in creating demand and supply for evaluations and innovating appropriate techniques for evaluations.

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Book Festivals of Odisha: Looking back and forward



Doing a Literature Festival or a Book Fair has now become a business or political circus. But it was not there when I entered to the field of Book Publishing over three decades back. I did the first ever National Book Fair at the Exhibition Ground, Bhubaneswar way back in 1992. I was also the part of the first ever 'Pustak Parikrama' (Books on Wheels) in Bihar the same year. How I became a part of the first ever Books on Wheels show is an interesting story. Shri Anand Swaroop was Chairman of National Book Trust in 1990 when I joined. He was a dreamer. He was the person behind National Policy on Education, National Centre for Children's

Literature and many others. His dream was, books should reach villages, say each door steps. NBT bought several Book Vans during his tenure. His able deputy was Arvind Kumar, the then Director. So, the first ever Books on Wheels was planned. It was at two parts of the country, south and north. If I correctly recollect, the south one began at Chennai and the north one at Varanasi. The north one covered UP and Bihar and the South one Tamilnadu and Andhra Pradesh. Jharkhand, Uttarakhand and Telengana were not separate provinces at that time. But willing manpower was not available as normally happens in Government Organisations. In one of the staff meetings, Arvind Kumar requested all to volunteer. Out of the 200 + employees of NBT he got only one, that is me. He was not very happy with

me, but he appreciated my action and deputed me to lead a team for the exhibition in Bihar. Inspired by the Bihar experience, I proposed a similar exhibition in Odisha. The Odisha Publishers and Booksellers Association led by Shri Pitamber Mishra whole stood by me. The other partner was Odisha Sahitya Akademi of which Shri Rajkishore Mishra was then Secretary. We had a dilemma, if to begin it from Puri or some other part of Odisha. Since I worked in Koraput district and is from Puri, everybody expected that I will like to begin from any of these. But I had a different take. During my tenure in NCERT, I used to visit Sambalpur and Bolangir very often. I had a nostalgic touch, I did a few months schooling in my class 2 at Sambalpur. 'How shall it be if we begin at Bargarh?' I asked all. They were

all surprised. Bargarh had no reputation as a market for books at that time. There was a Gandhi Pathagar, a block called Atabira where my friend and brother Aswini Kumar Mishra was BDO. a place

fine morning. It was not possible for the vehicle to enter to Balubazar. We parked our van near Sunshine Field. All the publishers came there with their book bundles. We took the books and went to



called Larambha where my favourite actor and the first super hero of Odia films Sarat Pujari was Principal in a College. and Bargarh had a renowned author Dayalal Joshi, these were the only that I had in mind. But all approved my plan to go ahead. Our mobile van reached Cuttack with two drivers Dharam Pal and Pandey on one

Bhubaneswar to pick up books from the publishers there at Odisha Sahitya Akademi campus. Our van left Bhubaneswar at 8 pm. We had to go to Bargarh. Next day was the inauguration of our Book Exhibition. We crossed the Chowdwar, and reached Nachuni, where we planned to have our dinner in a

dhaba. Apart from the two drivers, we had Chinmaya Vivek, the young poet as pilot, two clerk cum counter sales people, a cleaner and me. 'But I can't see in the night', Pandey, one of the drivers said. What to do ... I asked Dharam Pal. 'Sir, you sit in front seat don't sleep. Pandey and I will sip pegs of whisky at times or take tea at places. Let us see if by tomorrow morning we can reach Sambalpur.' Dharam Pal said to give me hope. Sambalpur was about 350 kms and the van was fitted with glasses. The journey was adventurous. We took tea at Redhalkol. Next morning at 8 am we reached Sambalpur. Dharam Pal had to catch the train from there to return to Delhi. We reached Bargarh at 9.30 am. Shri

Hota, then President of Gandhi Smruti Pathagar and Lecturer in a local college was eagerly waiting. There were no mobiles then, nor PCOs. He did not tell Sarat Pujari to come and inaugurate as he was not sure if we can reach there in time. Bargarh did not have a hotel that time, but a decent Marwari Dharamshala. Our only hope was Dayalal Joshi. We met him and he gladly accepted our invitation to inaugurate the exhibition at 5 pm. We sold books worth over 55 thousand INR in that Book Exhibition, the highest those days in India in such an exhibition of 4 days. Rest is part of History. This is the journey of Indian Publishing and how the first ever Mobile Book Exhibition in Odisha at Bargarh, then a sub division of Odisha took place. But alas, the new generation of Book Fair Organisers at Bargarh are possibly not aware of their glorious past in the

history of Indian Book Industry! People have also forgotten that I did four National Book Festivals in Odisha at Bhubaneswar, Rourkela, Brahmapur and Puri besides ten more in the North Eastern Region and twenty World Book Fairs. I was the only Odia who was Adviser to National Book Development Council, Singapore and Director, Art and Culture of North Eastern Region. That's now history. If I tell the truth, people feel that I am beating my own drum. But, how long can I remain silent? I have been in a festival of memories for the last two years.

Police Should Inform Rape Survivors Of Option To Terminate Pregnancy: Court

Bengaluru(KCN): While allowing a rape victim to terminate a pregnancy that was in the 24th week, the High Court has directed that all jurisdictional police should inform victims of the option available for termination of pregnancy so that they do not have to approach the courts at a belated stage. The 17-year-old victim's father had approached the High Court seeking for medical termination of

her pregnancy. She is subject to a crime under Section 376 (rape) of the IPC and POCSO Act. As a result of the crime she conceived and is currently 24 weeks pregnant. The petition claimed that the victim does not want to continue with the pregnancy and sought medical termination. Justice Suraj Govindaraj, who heard the petition in his order on December 11, said such a situation would not have arisen "if at all

such a decision had been taken earlier, then there would have been no requirement for the petitioner to approach this Court." It, therefore, directed the Principal Secretary, Home Department, to issue necessary directions to all jurisdictional and/or investigating officers "to make known the availability of an option of medical termination of pregnancy, the procedure and process required to be

followed for the same if the victim and/or natural guardian so desire." The investigating officer should also keep ready a member or representative of the jurisdictional Child Welfare Committee or the District Child Protection Unit, the court maintained. The High Court had also directed a Medical Board consisting of a gynecologist, pediatrician and psychologist to give an opinion on the fitness

of the victim in the present case to undergo medical termination of pregnancy (MTP). The report was submitted on December 12. The High Court then allowed the MTP to be carried out. The High Court ordered that after the MTP, the tissue samples of the foetus should be preserved for the purpose of DNA analysis if required or ordered by the trial court in the POCSO case.

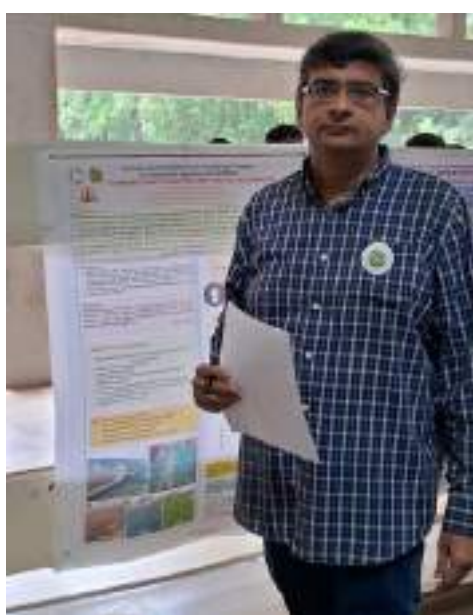
The legacy of Mahendra Prasad Panda lives on in the hearts of those he touched, and his contributions to education and community development remain an indelible part of his remarkable journey.

Two get 20-year rigorous imprisonment for raping minor girl

BARIPADA: Special POC SO court judge of Mayurbhanj district Sumita Jena on Monday sentenced two persons to 20 years of rigorous imprisonment (RI) each for raping a 14-year-old girl. The convicts are Keshab Chandra Tiriya (46) of Takudipal village within Jashipur police limits and Asish Digi (28) of Anandpur in Keonjhar. Public prosecutor Abhinna Pattnaik said on February 11, 2017, the two convicts entered the victim's house taking



advantage of her parent's absence. Finding the girl alone, the duo raped her.

On February 13, the victim's mother lodged an FIR in Jashipur

police station against the duo based on which a case was registered under sections 376-D and 506 of the IPC and section 6 of the POC SO Act. Subsequently, police arrested Keshab and Asish. Pattnaik said the court also imposed a fine of Rs 10,000 on each of the convicts. Failure to pay the fine will result in an additional jail term of three months. The court directed the secretary of the district legal services authority to pay a compensation of Rs 4 lakh to the victim.

Unknown disease ruins paddy crop, dashes farmers' hope in Odisha

BARGARH: Farmers of Bargarh district are in dire straits after an unidentified plant disease has affected their standing paddy crops leaving them damaged and pale. The unknown disease was first noticed by farmers of the Attabira, Bhatli and Bheden blocks during mid-April. They reported that the tip of their paddy crops first turned pale after which the entire plant got damaged. Later farmers of other blocks also complained of their paddy showing similar symptoms. While some reported the matter to the district agriculture office, others sent tweets to the principal secretary of the Agriculture Department, Government of Odisha, Arabinda K Padhee. "We will incur huge losses as standing paddy grown on large tracts of land are now damaged," alleged farmer leader Ramesh Mahapatra. The crops have symptoms of two to three diseases but farmers are unable to identify the exact cause. The Agriculture Department officials



have collected samples. Large tracts of paddy cultivation have been affected by the disease, farmers said. "While the officials have assessed the damage of crops on over 300-400 hectare land, in reality, around 2,000-3,000 hectare has been affected," Mahapatra further informed. Chief district agriculture officer (CDAO), Bargarh, Ashok Kumar Amat said a team from Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK) will visit all blocks to further assess the situation. The region

witnessed inclement weather conditions for the last few months, said Amat, adding, the district witnessed sweltering heat and incessant rainfall in succession while some regions faced hailstorms. "While the crops developed Rice Blast and Bacterial Leaf Blight diseases, excessive application of urea on the affected plants further led to Neck Blast Disease," Amat stated. Official sources informed that while the farmers applied excess

urea to their crops, a decrease in the application of potash by 50 per cent has left the crops more susceptible to pest attack. Amat informed that the crops on which the disease is in its initial stage can be revived by the use of pesticides. "But those that have entirely been affected by the disease, are almost destroyed. The KVK scientists have recommended the application of necessary pesticides for them. We will carry out a loss assessment soon," he added.

New Delhi: Put in to bat on a pitch that was under covers for a while, India put on 180/7 on the board, thanks to fifties from Suryakumar Yadav and Rinku Singh, before rain arrived with three balls left in the innings. South Africa's adjusted target of 152 in 15 overs was driven by Reeza Hendricks' 27-ball 49 and achieved with seven balls to spare, but wasn't without its fair share of drama as India found ways to overcome conditions consistently against them. India openers fall early. With Ruturaj Gaikwad unavailable due to illness, India were saved from a difficult choice at the top of the order but the organically assembled opening pair of Yashasvi Jaiswal and Shubman Gill totalled zero runs between them.

Jaiswal was out off the third ball of the innings, trying to back-cut a delivery from Marco Jansen and offering a sharp chance to David Miller at point; Gill was trapped on the back leg by Lizaad Williams, leaving India wobbling at 6/2 after two overs. Suryakumar at his T20 best Gerald Coetzee to Suryakumar Yadav: that was the contest. First ball, a yorker. Second ball, a drive-and-a-miss outside off-stump. Third ball, a cover drive for a boundary. Another four and six followed later in the over as India captain Suryakumar added 15 runs in the third over and then 13 runs in the next to help India repair their PowerPlay and finish at 59/3. This 29-ball fifty was Suryakumar's fourth in the last five matches



and also delivered him to 2000 runs in the T20I format, the second-fastest batter to that milestone in terms of innings taken. Rinku Singh breaks free It doesn't matter if it's the IPL or the Asian Games or a home series against Australia or an overseas

tour of South Africa, Rinku Singh scores everywhere. This time, he walked out to bat inside the PowerPlay after Tilak Varma's dismissal and got off the mark with a classic straight drive first-ball. He then let the in-form Suryakumar take the

lead, playing the perfect foil while scoring the next five runs off 10 balls. The gears went into overdrive with consecutive boundaries off Marco Jansen, followed by flicking, cutting, pulling and even stepping out to Aiden Markram in the

19th over for back-to-back sixes. His 30-ball fifty was his first in T20Is, doing his World Cup selection chances no harm. Shamsi shines Gerald Coetzee, who had dismissed Tilak Varma and then added the wickets of Ravindra Jadeja and Arshdeep Singh, returned figures of 3 for 32 but the pick of the bowlers was Tabraiz Shamsi who finished with 1 for 18, the wicket being that of hard-hitting Suryakumar. The left-arm legspinner was named Player of the Match for his frugal bowling figures in a T20I match where the average scoring rate was above 10. South Africa off to a flier Mohammed Siraj conceded three

boundaries in the first over of the run-chase but two of them were off outside edges. With every passing minute, the South Africa batters looked more and more comfortable at the crease, not in the least because the ball got wet on a moist outfield in the aftermath of the rain delay. The openers set the side on course to 67/1 in the five PowerPlay overs (reduced from six in a rain-affected match) and it took a sharp Tilak Varma throw to end an explosive first-wicket stand of 42. But the damage had been done. India strike back with wickets... but the bowlers had left themselves with too little wiggle room towards the end. South Africa were going

comfortably at 96/1 when Mukesh Kumar banged one short and had the in-form Markram top-edging to the deep. Reeza Hendricks, going hammer at tongs at the other end, was caught off the bowling of Mohammed Siraj that India started to believe. The moment witnessed South Africa with two new batters at the crease, with 44 runs still needed. But David Miller struck crucial runs only for Tristan Stubbs and Andile Phehlukwayo to finish things off. India U19 Squad: Arshin Kulkarni, Adarsh Singh, Rudra Mayur Patel, Sachin Dhas, Priyanshu Moliya, Musheer Khan,



Uday Saharan (C), Aravelly Avanish Rao (WK), Saumy Kumar Pandey (VC), Murugan Abhishek, Innesh Mahajan (WK), Dhanush Gowda, Aaradhya Shukla, Raj Limbani, Naman Tiwari Adarsh Singh, the left-hand batter from Uttar Pradesh, and Arshin Kulkarni, the right-hand batter from Maharashtra, have been India's steady

opening combination in the three Asia Cup games so far, and the board has placed faith in the duo once again. Kulkarni is among the top-three run-getters in the Asia Cup as of 12 December 2023. Gujarat's Rudra Mayur Patel bats at No.3 whereas captain Saharan, who scored 60 against Pakistan recently albeit in a losing cause, bats two-down.

Aravelly Avanish Rao, the left-hand batter and keeper from Hyderabad, is likely to take the gloves, with Himachal Pradesh's Innesh Mahajan his back-up in the squad. Sachin Dhas from Maharashtra is one of the finishers in the squad. Left-arm pacer Naman Tiwari (Uttar Pradesh), right-arm pacer Raj Limbani (Baroda), left-arm spinner and vice-captain Saumy Kumar Pandey (Madhya Pradesh), offspinner Murugan Abhishek (Hyderabad) are among the frontline bowlers in the squad. Limbani is the top wicket-taker in the Asia Cup as of 12 December 2023. Kulkarni (right arm pacer), Saharan (offspinner) and Mumbai's Musheer Khan (left-arm

orthodox) who's also the brother of Sarfaraz Khan can also chip in with a few overs. Right-arm pacer Aaradhya Shukla (Punjab), middle-order right-hand batter Priyanshu Moliya (Baroda) and right-arm pacer Dhanush Gowda (Karnataka) are the other members in the squad. Prem Devkar, Ansh Gosai and Md. Amaan are the designated traveling standbys for the tri-series whereas Digvijay Patil, Jayanth Goyat, P Vignesh, Kiran Chormale have been named as the back-up players by the BCCI. India kick off their U19 World Cup campaign on 20 January 2024 against Bangladesh in Bloemfontein. The tri-series leading up to it starts 29 December 2023, with the final with the final scheduled on 10 January 2024.

Mental preparation the key for Mandhana as India gear up for Test switch

New Delhi: Test matches in women's cricket are a rare commodity. More so for India who haven't played the longest format since 2021. If you were to go back to the last home Test for India, it would be way back in 2014. It is indeed quite a lengthy hiatus for the format and with white-ball cricket being the norm in women's cricket, flicking the switch to red-ball cricket isn't easy. India vice-captain Smriti Mandhana was candid in her opinion regarding the challenges that her team will face ahead of the one-off Test against England in Mumbai starting from Thursday (December 14). While there is the obvious physical aspect involved while making the transition to the longest format of the game, Mandhana underlined the significance of the mental switch which she felt was paramount to

success. "It (adjusting to the longest format) requires both the physical and mental aspects," said Mandhana at the press conference at the Dr DY Patil Sports Academy, Navi Mumbai. "Our bodies aren't used to four back-to-back days of cricket as we are generally used to playing T20s and ODIs which have gaps. Playing two back-to-back T20s is something we were already mentally prepared for. Because playing for four continuous days, more than the physical part, it's about focussing each and every ball. Especially the way you bat will change and so, mental preparation is important. Which is why we had a meeting now before the practice begins. "It's the first time we had a meeting as a team. We had a few before the series started in Bangalore but

this is the first time we are all together as a team. Mental preparation starts from today. Hopefully we can execute what we discussed and perform the way Test cricket wants us to play." Since the loss to Australia in 2005, India have played six Test matches without a defeat - winning and drawing three apiece during this period. The series wins in England in 2006 and 2014 stand out while the home win over South Africa was also a dominant display from India. Mandhana, who was barely a year old in international cricket was part of the squad in that home Test although she hadn't made it to the playing XI. With Test cricket returning to the country after a long gap, the left-handed batter couldn't hide her excitement.

Russell sizzles on comeback to give WI early lead

New Delhi: West Indies allrounder Andre Russell sizzled in his comeback game for West Indies to give the hosts a 1-0 series lead in the T20I series against England. Russell starred with both ball and bat as West Indies chased down the target set by England easily in the end with 11 balls to spare in Barbados. England's stunning start After being asked to bat first, England got off to a terrific start by plundering 77 runs in the powerplay. Phil Salt got going with three fours in the very first over. Jos Buttler then picked a boundary each off the next two overs before paddling one fine for a six off Russell in the penultimate over of the powerplay. But it was the final over that hurt West Indies big time. Alzarri Joseph made a

nightmarish start as he first conceded a four and a six to Salt before Buttler punished a free-hit for a boundary. And if that wasn't enough, a slower ball down leg wasn't collected by Nicholas Pooran as West Indies conceded five wides to eventually make it a 26-run over. Was the start backed up? The first ball after the powerplay fetched a wicket as the dangerous Salt departed for a 20-ball 40, giving Russell his first wicket. Joseph continued to leak runs by conceding 17 in his second but that over also saw him get rid of Will Jacks, who had just hammered successive sixes. At the halfway mark, England 112 on the board and were well on their way to going past 200. The turnaround



The second half of the innings was completely in contrast to the first one. Buttler had slowed down and mistimed a pull to get caught for 39 and Harry Brook failed to fire after getting outfoxed by a slower ball from Jason Holder. And if that wasn't enough,

England also lost Ben Duckett at a crucial juncture, handing over the finishing duties to Sam Curran and Liam Livingstone. The odd boundary did arrive and Livingstone threatened to give England a late push towards 200 after smashing Holder for

back-to-back sixes but in a stunning collapse, England went from 165/5 to 171 all out. Russell removed the dangerous Livingstone in his final over and added the wicket of Rehan Ahmed before Joseph made amends with two more wickets to give West

Indies complete momentum heading into the innings break. West Indies tee off in the powerplay as well. If England made 13 in the first over to kickstart proceedings, West Indies went one step ahead as Brandon King took on Curran for two sixes and a four which was then followed by a massive six from Kyle Mayers off Will Jacks. While King's rampage came to a halt after a stunning catch from Duckett, the hosts still made 59 in the first six overs, Mayers and Shai Hope then combined to smash Rehan for three sixes immediately after the PP to take control of the chase. The stutter in the middle The chase followed a similar pattern to that of the first innings after

the rollicking start. Mayers mistimed one against Adil Rashid to depart for 35 and Rehan made a strong comeback with the wicket of Pooran, Rashid was going through an excellent spell and accounted for the big wicket of Shimron Hetmyer as well which was also incidentally his 100th wicket in this format in his 100th game. Thankfully for the hosts, the rain arrived in the following over causing a break in England's momentum. WI prevail with ease West Indies were six runs ahead via DLS at that stage but play did resume around 40 minutes after the players left the field. Rehan then caused a huge dent post-resumption with a

double wicket over that reduced WI to 123/6 but the batting side were still in with a chance with Russell walking out at No.8. Having already impressed with the ball in his first game in two years for WI, Russell saw Rovman Powell ease the pressure with successive sixes before unleashing himself. England just couldn't stop the flow of boundaries as Russell and Powel caused mayhem before the former finished it off in the penultimate over.
