extend my heartiest greetings to every Indian, at home and abroad. From the day the Constitution came into effect to the present day, it has been an amazing journey that has inspired many other nations. Every citizen has reason to be proud of the Indian Story. When we celebrate the Republic Day, we celebrate what we have achieved, together, as a nation.



India is, of course, home to one of the oldest living civilisations. India is called the mother of democracy. As a modern Republic, however, we are young. In the early years of Independence, we faced countless challenges and adversities. Very high levels of poverty and illiteracy were just two of the many illeffects of the long foreign rule. Yet, the spirit of India was undeterred. With hope and confidence, we began an experiment unique in the history of humankind. Such a vast and diverse multitude of people coming together as one nation remains unprecedented. We did so with a belief that we are, after all, one; that we are all Indians. We have succeeded as a democratic republic because so many creeds and so many languages have not divided us, they have only united us. That is the essence of

That essence was at the heart of the Constitution, which has withstood the test of time. The Constitution that started governing the life of the Republic was the outcome of the Freedom Struggle. The national movement, led by Mahatma Gandhi, was as much about winning Independence as about rediscovering our own ideals. Those decades of struggle and sacrifice helped us win freedom not only from colonial rule but also from the imposed values and narrow world-views. Revolutionaries and reformers joined hands with visionaries and idealists to help us learn about our age-old values of peace, brotherhood and equality. Those who shaped the modern Indian mind also welcomed progressive ideas from abroad, following the Vedic advice:

आ नो भद्राः क्रतवो यन्त विश्वत: "Let noble thoughts come to us from all directions". A long and profound thought process culminated in our Constitution.

Our founding document is inspired by the humanistic philosophy of the oldest living civilisation in the world as well as new ideas that emerged in more recent history. The nation will always remain grateful to Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, who headed the Drafting Committee of the Constitution, and thus had a critical part in giving it the final shape. On this day, we should also remember the role of jurist B.N. Rau, who had prepared the initial draft, and other experts and officers who helped in making of the constitution. We are proud of the fact that the members of that assembly represented all regions and communities of India and that they included 15 women too.

Their vision, as enshrined in the Constitution, has been continuously guiding our Republic. During this period, India has been transformed from a largely poor and illiterate nation into a confident nation marching on the world stage. This would not have been possible but for the collective wisdom of the Constitution-makers guiding our path.

Babasaheb While Ambedkar and others gave us a map and a moral framework, the task of walking that path remains responsibility. We have largely remained true to their expectations, and

yet we realise that much remains to be done to realise Gandhiji's ideal of 'Sarvodaya', the upliftment of all. Yet, the progress we have made on all fronts is encouraging.

Mozgovy suffers from amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a degenerative neurological condition that has left him paralysed and unable to breathe without as-

Hinting towards his joining in the BRS, Giridhar said, "I have come from a national party (Congress) to BJP, another national party. I will join another national party, which is yet to put its feet in Odisha."

He also announced that he will not contest in the election anymore as he became old. "My son Sishir will contest the election," the tribal leader said.

The stunning architectures, history, dialects, vibrant art music and dance forms make Odisha ever sprightly state of India. Odisha (formerly known as Orissa), the battleground for the famous Kalinga war fought by Ashoka the Great, lies on the country's east coast. When the sun rises here, it rises over a land of temples thriving on top of a solid foundation laid by heritage. Life is uncomplicated, laid back and it doesn't take much to find some hush and quiet here. As opposed to the hustle and bustle of metropolitan concrete ungles, Odisha comes as a sigh of relief to the one seeking the peace of mind. Be it the temples of the capital city Bhubaneswar, the Buddhist Shanti Stupa of Dhaulagiri Hills or exotic birds that can be spotted at Asia's largest brackish water lagoon Chilika Lake, Odisha is worth paying a visit!

Here are 10 things you should know about Odisha Culture: 1. Architecture

The finesse and grandeur of Odisha's architecture is exhibited in its temples that the Aryans left behind. Some of them are among the finest in the country. Of these, the most important are the Lingaraja Temple, Bhubaneswar (11th century), Jagannath Temple at Puri (12th century) and the great Sun Temple at Konark (13th century). And hence, the golden triangle of Odisha - Bhubaneswar, Konark and Puri contributes the maximum amount of tourism goodwill. They are primary temples built in the style of 'Kalinga' architecture.

Lingaraja Temple



City of Bhubaneswar boasts of, it is one of the major tourist attractions of the state with over 6000 visitors on a daily basis. Here, Lord Shiva is worshipped as Harihara, a combined form of Vishnu and Shiva.



Jagannath Temple

The coastal town of Puri enshrines Lord Jagannath in this colossal temple. It is one of the Char Dham pilgrimages that one is expected to cover at least once in his lifetime. The temple is world-famous for its annual chariot festival or Rath Yatra.



Sun Temple

Designed in the silhouette of a gigantic chariot along with seven horses and twenty-four wheels, this entire temple was conceived as a chariot of the Sun God. It reflects the remarkable genius of architects that envisioned and went through with it. A UNESCO World Heritage Site, the hands. The final painting is rendered in the form of a design on a canvas with decorative borders. Sometimes, palm-leaves are also used to form the canvas.

Rock Paintings

Rock art in Odisha dates back to the prehistoric period according to the earliest reports found at Viramkhol in Jharsuguda district. With the reign of Ashoka the great, Buddhist sculptural art gradually changed the degree of Odisha's artistic flair. Even today, the caves of Ratnagiri,



Lalitgiri and Udaygiri have not faltered to showcase the wonderful legacy of sculp-





Pattachitra (Cloth Painting)

Literally, 'Patta' translates to cloth and 'Chitra' means picture. The themes and motifs are mythological, typically revolving around the Jagannath and Vaishnava sect. Lord Jagannath and Radha-Krishna paintings are a rage among buyers. Pattachitra showing Ganesha and Shiva. Since it is a traditional art-form, the Chitrakara's

It is practised on the beaches of Puri with subjects ranging from Hindu deities to international occasions. With the help of tourism, this art-form has developed exponentially and found worldwide recognition.

Silver Filigree

Locally known as 'Tarakasi', this art form is about 500 years old. It hails from Cuttack, a.k.a the Silver City of Odisha (now you know why). The process consists



of drawing silver through a series of consecutively smaller holes to produce fine strands of wire. Usually, Tarakasi jewellery is used to embellish Durga idols during Durga Puja in Cuttack and by Odissi dancers.

Appliqué Work

This is a famous fabric craft originating from a village called Pipili where locals call it 'Pipili Chandua Kama'. Unknown to many, Pipili holds an entry in the Limca Book of Records for the world's largest thematic applique work.

Like Pattachitra, appliqué work also originated as temple art, essentially limited to umbrellas and canopies to be used in the

annual Rath Yatra. Nowadays, its usage is more in the household, decorative and festival products. The craft involves embroidery and stitching with occasional mirror work.

Brass and Dhokra Works

A 4000-year old craft form, Dhokra is a casting method that combines metallurgical skills with wax techniques. It is a bell metal tribal craft that uses an alloy of tin and copper or brass and zinc. Various utility items including utensils, pots and pans, lamps and even tribal jewellery are fashioned

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
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

After opting for a simple look for her Mehendi ceremony, Hansika experimented with the heavy for her Sufi night.


She wore a white sharara with mirrorwork all over it. She accessorized her look with heavy jewellery including a 'passa', traditionally adorned by Muslim brides.

One of the greatest contribution of Dr.ambedkar was in respect of fundamental rights and descriptive priciples of state policy enshrined in the consti-

tution of india. Dr.ambedkar was the chairman of the drafting committee for the indian constitution. He prepared a draft constitution for discussion. Under his leadership the committee members of drafting committee completed the work within 114 days spread over three years. The part 3rd of of the constitution of india gives a detailed description on charter of rights called 'fundamental rights'. It is described as the magna carta of india. These fundamental rights guarantee civil freedom to all citizens of india to allow them to live in peace and harmony. These are the basic needs and rights available to every indian citizen irrespective of their caste, creed and religion, place of birth, race, colour or gender. These fundamental rights include right to equality, right to freedom of religion, cultural and educational rights. Right against exploitation also included in the fundamental rights. The fundamental rights were included in the constitution because they were considered essentail for development of every individual and preserve dignity. They are justiciable i.e any violation of these rights can be questioned in the court of law both in high court and supreme court through writ petition. Changes of fundamental rights require a constitutional amendment. The constitution of india originally laid seven rights including right to property, but the 44th amendment of 1978 deleted right to property though it is still a constitutional right. Long after the depletion of the right to property, right to education was added in the list of fundamental rights under section 21a on 2nd april 2010. After independence india is secular, socialist, sovereignity, democratic and republic country. It is seperated any religion from political, economic, social and cultural aspects of life and religion being treated as a purely personal matter. Secular was added to the premable by 42nd constitutional amendment act of 1976. It emphasises the fact that constituationally. India is secular means no state religion and that the state shall recognise and accept all religious and not favour or patronise any particular religion, while article 14 grants equality before the law and equal protection of the laws to all ,article 15 enlarges the concept of secularism to the widest possible extent by probability discrimination on grounds of religion, race, caste sex, or place of birth. Article 25 provides freedom of conscience that is all persons are equally entitled to freedom of conscience and the right to freely profess ,practice and propagate religion. As per article 26 every religious group or individual has the right to establish and maintain institution for religious and charitable purposes and to manage its own affairs in matter of religion. Article 51a i.e fundamental duties obliged all cutizens to promote harmony and the spirit of common brotherhood and to value and preserve the rich heritage of our composite culture. There are certain fundamental rights which are granted only to citizens of india and not for foreigners. These include protection from discrimination on the grounds of religion, race, caste, sex or place of birth, equality of opportunity in matters of public employment, freedom of speech ,expression,protection of language ,script and culture rights. In 2017 nine -judge constitution bench of supreme court headed by the then chief justice of india j.s.khehar in a land mark unanimous decision has declared right to privacy as an intrinsic part of right to life and personal liberty under article 21. Another land mark of judgement with regard to protection of fundamental right passing of muslim women(protection of rights on marriages)bill 2017 by loka sabha which declares triple talaque illigaland criminalize it with up to three years imprisonment for husband of muslim community. The majority number of judges suggest it is a very good decision. The success or failure of democracy depends largely on the extent to which civil liberty and basic rights are enjoyed by citizens. So it is said that indian constitution is our safety shield.

In order to lighten the burden on ourselves, we even think that 'the condition inside the bottom is the same as above the bottom, where can the fish escape when the whole net is water'. We think of the story of Kharag Singh from where the crisis of faith began. Now the belief has become so old among us that to marginalize him, we have opened old age homes for him like in the West and he is living his exile life in them. We think of the innocent man who succumbs to disbelief in front of our eyes and returns empty-handed, who may be worth believing. Wrapped in the lap of doubt from religion to workplace and from family to market, disbelief has started living in flats built in multi-storeyed buildings of our emotions. The crisis of faith has also increased in the villages, but compared to the civilized and prosperous cities, even today the villages are a million degrees better. Shakuntala Kol, Sarpanch of Gram Panchayat Titra, District Sidhi, says that the trust has decreased among themselves, but we are not able to trust the urban man easily, while we trust the village man immediately. Many such incidents have happened to us that the townspeople have cheated us. All the work of the Panchayat is done on the basis of trust only.

It also prompts us to think about how much 'misplacement' there is between us. The man who should be where he is, is not there at all. The man who was supposed to be the ruler, the poor man is digging in the ashes here and there. The one who really had to be a scientist is doing the wages. The one who really wanted to become an engineer, is sitting somewhere

welding on daily wages... The one who was supposed to get a chance to move forward, he is sitting with folded hands as a victim of unemployment.... I had to share, they are all sitting unemployed or continuously getting involved in wrong addictions - businesses. The evaluation of talents and getting them a stage has remained confined to the cities only, whereas in the villages also, rural talents are no less in various sports and other nonacademic activities.

Commitment to the society is expected from the eminent and representative person of the society as they are the 'role model' for their younger ones. but alas! Here also the situation is the same. Most of them are the owners of scattered individuals.



Now you and we together can think that as 'role model' they will be, so will their brothers..... This regret becomes more prolonged when we come to know that in the last four decades no personality like Gandhi, Nehru, Tilak etc. could become our guide.

Do we even think that 'education' is achieved only by going to school-college? Even today people who are loaded with degrees do such things that a big question mark is put on their education. Get hold of a person with a master's degree today and ask him about a related subject..... You will be disappointed. The education which fills us with superficial knowledge and cannot overcome tensions and distractions, we are proudly sitting on the percentage of attainment..... It is said that what is in front is called bad by the people.' The people living in the village are often termed as Gawai, but when the sarpanch of a village asks the collector of Satna district to stop corruption from your place. Corruption will end automatically from our place too, then the collector's speech will stop. In fact, while sitting in the coolness of 'AC', we also think that the poor from 'A' to 'D' have such and such problem and the farmers from 'E' to 'F' have such and such problem. Whereas after so many years and all the schemes, we think about the poor and the farmers, who are probably living in the same preindependence conditions. The mind becomes even more sour thinking that half of the population gets only one meal in our country.

We used to think that 'stones are thrown in the way ahead, so that it is better if we recover our senses from the stumble.' But we did not recover from any of our stumbles, nor did we try for it because of all the pseudo-preoccupations. In reality, we have been only thinking more, lost more in dreams, that's why perhaps the ground of reality remained shallow. The colonial thinking of slavery has not yet disappeared from us. These days, are we trying to wash our face by showing the woman leading the village as weak or are we on our hands with the thinking of 'everything will rule'.

They keep thinking of holding on. We kept spitting everywhere, vandalizing everything, considering the government property as alien.... The result was that we kept spewing songs and talks of patriotism through cover, but did not adopt it from our heart. ... We may have memorized all the commentaries of the Vedas, but could not digest them within ourselves.. The veiled religiosity compels us to unnecessarily argue and dispute over differences.... While thinking and thinking, we could not think that we not only have to think, we also have to do something.





Small businesses, big dreams: Iraq's women

entrepreneurs
BAGHDAD: The sewing machines and fabric that surround Alaa Adel at her "Iraqcouture" studio in Baghdad are testament to her success in deeply patriarchal Iraq.

Adel, 33, counts herself among a limited number of female entrepreneurs in a country where most women don't work outside the home.

"We have a social tradition that prevents many women from working," Adel said at her studio in Baghdad's Karrada commercial district.

Even for those who do, "it is not always that easy," she added.

The International Organization for Migration said in an October report that "prevailing customs and traditions... limit women's activities to their domestic and nurturing role".

Adel said such prejudices, as well as practical difficulties, posed a challenge to fulfilling her dream.

A graduate of the University of Baghdad who specialised in fashion and design, Adel wanted to create her own fashion house.

"I went to see the patrons of organisations that support art and culture. But my idea was systematically rejected because I had no experience in the conception of projects," she said.

Thanks to an Iraqi foundation, The Station, and its "Raidat" (Female Entrepreneurs) programme financed by the French embassy in Baghdad, Adel got training which, she said, gave her the confidence to start her own

business. Obstacles

Iraq's private sector is still embryonic, making more tedious and lengthy the steps to set up a company.

The country, which is trying to move past four decades of war and unrest, is also plagued by endemic corruption, widespread unemployment and a poverty rate of around 30 per cent.

Almost 38 per cent of people with jobs work in Iraq's public sector -- one of the highest rates in the world, according to the International Labour Organization (ILO).

Adel eventually secured a loan from a private bank, and created her "Alaa Adel" brand last summer.

At the beginning, she had to deal with sexism from some fabric suppliers who were reluctant to do business with a woman, she said. Then there was a lack of public childcare facilities, in a country where tradition says children should be taken care of at home -- by the mother -- until they go to school.

Adel got help from family members who look after her two boys, aged nine and four, while she is at work.

Valentyn had to breathe on his own for ten excruciating minutes.

"The way he breathed was scary... we had no clue what to do!" his wife said.

As the outages became the norm, the Mozgovys adapted.

"His body doesn't move, but his mind is very bright, he gives a lot of advice... he is our captain," she said.

She set up a power storage system and extra batteries for her husband's respiratory unit and medical mattress -- which regulates the pressure felt by bedridden pa-

Constant anxiety

However prepared they have tried to be, their situation is precarious.

"I wish there was a bit of stability, so we could understand when there will be electricity... to make a decision on how to cope."

Mozgova realises how lucky they are to be able to afford the equipment needed to keep her husband alive.

"It was very expensive, our children helped us... I don't even know what advice to give to those who don't have money," she said. In Ukraine, tens of thousands need electricity to stay alive, explained Iryna Koshkina, executive director of the SVOYI charity that provides care to palliative patients.

"If all these people were suddenly unable to use their life-saving devices and went to the hospital at the same time, our medical system would simply break."

Tetyana Venglinska had no choice but to hospitalise her 75-year-old mother, Eva, after three months of exhausting outages. Eva, who has been diagnosed with lung cancer, needs to be linked to a device delivering supplementary oxygen at all times, her daughter Tetyana explained, sitting on the corner of her mother's bed in a Kyiv hos-

To ensure the oxygen concentrator's battery would last during the interminable outages at home, the family had to reduce the amount of oxygen it provided.

"For my mom, it was total torture," Venglinska said.

"Imagine cutting your oxygen intake three times."

'Drink to victory'

The battery would last up to eight hours, which left the family in a constant state of anxiety.

"(My husband) was afraid to enter her room every time, he didn't know if my mom was alive... or if she had suffocated," Venglinska

On the night of December 17, the outage lasted more than 10 hours, longer than

With all power sources exhausted and 40 minutes left on the respirator's battery, Tetyana called a private ambulance to hospitalise her mother.

The decision was a life-saver: Venglinska's home was without power for the next four

"She would have died for sure," Venglinska

Since then, Eva has spent most of her time at the clinic, tending to her bedridden

Her husband remained in their flat, where he is taking care of her 85-year-old father. "I want to go home as soon as possible," Venglinska said. "Our family is separated." Back in the Mozgovy home, Lyudmyla is also hoping for better days.

"We will definitely drink to victory... Valentyn will do it his way, through a straw, and I'll pour myself one."

"And (the drink) won't be weak!" she laughs.

people who elected them," the BJD leader said.

Dr. Patra further said that Odisha needs more than 15 lakh houses but the Centre has sanctioned only 8 lakh houses and is going to stop the rural housing scheme from this year. So where will these 7 lakh homeless people go? he asked.

The BJP Government at Centre is stopping this scheme from this year so they are doing this cover up. BJP has been crying hoarse about beneficiaries who are present or not present in PMAY list, said Mishra.

Stating that beneficiary selection is done according to the guidelines issued by the BJPled Centre, she said, "If they are unhappy, let the BJP ask its party in power in Centre to change their PMAY guidelines instead of shedding crocodile tears in Odisha."

The Centre's guidelines provide new allotment through PalliSabha/Gram Sabha. Apart from that there is a provision for objection period where objections can be filed, she

The Odisha Government will take every objection very seriously and do enquiry. Instead of shouting hoarse, if there are any ineligible beneficiaries or any beneficiaries have been left out, let the BJP file the objections as per their party-led Centre's PMAY guidelines or provide a beneficiary list which they claim are genuine, Dr. Patra said.

Asking "Why are they not doing it?" the BJD leader said every objection will be enquired into by the BJD Government. It seems the BJP's sole intention is that people of Odisha should be harassed and be pained. Poor deprived tribal people will remain homeless, he alleged.

Dr. Patra and Mishra said that BJP is again conspiring to stop the rural housing and deprive 15 lakh poor people from getting houses and thinking to make political mileage out of

"People of Odisha are intelligent. They knew that you conspired and stopped the rural housing and you got your results in ZP elections where you lost in all the districts and BJD won a record 30 out of 30 districts. People will remember and teach a lesson to this negative politics of Odisha BJP," the MP said.

The two leaders said their party strongly objects and condemns this conspiracy of BJP of stopping PMAY houses of people of Odisha and now the new conspiracy to create a false narrative and stop even those houses that have been released.

"Even if you (the BJP) stop rural housing PMAY by conspiring, BJD government will provide houses and take care of our poor people and also expose the role played by BJP in depriving houses to eligible poor," he said. They said that BJD will continue to fight with Centre till their demands for providing lakhs of pending PMAY(G) houses for tribals and people of Odisha are not met.
