



# Violence in the name of dissent turns democracy a lame duck

The streets of India are becoming battlefields on a daily basis and every passing day gives us a jolt of revolt. The hornet's nest reactions that we frequently witness these days are enough to bring the country on its knees. A



sense of deliberate and well calibrated exercise of outrage is seen across its landscape. Most of the parachute landed reforms by the Modi regime is seen to be blown away in the air itself by the mob frenzy and the

impact of it goes beyond borders with more audience interestingly leaning on to manipulate and dictate terms to the world's largest democracy. Is the country at war, the war that it is fighting from inside more hazardously than the one that it has been against its warmongering neighbours? If that is the case, India has no reason to drumbeat its democratic principles anymore. If the democratic values that we designed and defined for the wellbeing of a pluralistic society are not capable enough to maintain amity and balance, there should be efforts to revisit them and modify with respect to the demand of the time. We have so far been of the opinion that the enemies from across the borders are the real threat. But the latest developments in the country educate us that the real threat is from within, which India as a country is struggling to handle, mostly bound by the liabilities that a democratic setup has actually thrown us in. By turning the whole land into a warzone with public properties destroyed, and a mob fury toppling the essence of our democratic edifice to a deplorable and laughable stage, justifying arson and destruction as a right to express dissent, the parties and the stakeholders of violence are doing a severe injustice to the country. The incendiary mob is trying to challenge the nation's audacity to pick iron gloves to crush its pigheaded outrage.

A steady shift of violence from the Gyanvapi to the

Agnipath in less than two weeks has terribly shattered the minds of people, who uphold the values that the country principally espoused for generations, but seeing them fall apart writhing and wriggling, a sense of anxiety is simmering across India. The political involvement to tarnish the reputation that India has been successfully building on a global canvas is visible. This must be the result of a silent hopelessness that some parties have been going through - a predicament that they got entrapped in since 2014. No probable comeback at sight, most of them frantically jump into vehemently unethical and political slugfests bringing the country into the middle of a terrible trap. The government at the centre seems to be failing to explain its reforms before they are hard pushed on the polity. Every reform, for that matter, needs to be possibly put for public debate and the government must exhibit tenacity and patience and afford to look for the views evolving without prejudiced dispositions. Unless being authoritarian, no reforms can be hammered on the country. Radical reforms with long standing effects need thorough consultations in a democratic setup. The mystery behind the hullabaloo and violence leading to mass destruction of public property is gradually turning discernible. Should we call this an outcome of the nervousness that the Congress has been reeling under since the ED began to grill Rahul Gandhi on the National Herald case? The Agnipath has turned out to be a heavenly subject for the Congress party as its political horizon is clouded with bad times. The unquestionable authority of the Gandhi family in the Congress party is seen principally shaken and browbeaten and unable to take on to the country's saffron political upsurge. It has taken a silhouetted representation by turning the party cadre into an unruly mob as the Con-

gress scion sat facing the ED and the Agnipath gave it a tip

off moment to empty its anger further.

The mythological intensity and tenacity the government maintained while dragging Rahul Gandhi to the ED's table was criticized, but the suspicion on the Gandhi family on the National Herald case is escalating. Of course, it is untimely to comment on his culpability now. But the party that he leads needs to be tutored on how a democratic country functions when it comes to crippling the corrupt. If the corruption charges that are levelled against him are not true, his party needs to maintain restraint until he comes clean. This indeed would raise his brand value as a politician. The present depiction of disruptive behaviour by the party cadre pretending to be unleashing its aggression against the defence reform, and a genuine cause that it is trying to paint the arson and violence as, is a cowardly attempt to shield the complexity of a political huddle that Rahul Gandhi is naturally pulling his party into. The Congressmen have probably been thrown into a trap by the BJP by letting it unleash horror in the streets in the name of the ED investigation, in effect an act that the Congress party was articulating, mostly fearful of the damage the outcome of the investigation can cause to the Gandhi family and the party. An investigation, which could have been a silent process, was brought to limelight by the immaturity of its cadre, rampaging into the streets deliberately playing a victim card for its leader. This outrage and turbulence that the party designed was particularly meant for deepening the crisis that the country was already in due to the controversial remarks on the prophet by the BJP spokespersons.

Again, the uninterrupted and infuriating violence since Gyanvapi seems to have been a framework of this desperation which could successfully throw the country into flames. Local offences which should have remained mere trifling issues within the boundary of the country were overstuffed to the level of attracting global attention. The episodes spanning from Gyanvapi to the grilling of Rahul Gandhi by ED to the Agnipath, a sequence of deliberate interventions both internal and external were intended to break the brittle bones of democracy. Narratives to camouflage guilt and paint the initiatives of the government as attack on the democratic principles, allowing hostilities to bristle and ignominious attitude being permitted to precipitate, the visible apathy with which the parties deal the essence of India is insidious. A recipe for national disaster that the political ignobility in the country has developed, injects India's veins with venom of hatred and the effect of the sedative has the power to shrink the ideological structure that we built the nation from where it began to pulsate the idea of acceptance and inclusiveness in principle and practice. By disturbing this equilibrium, the dynamism of the country's democratic values would be tyrannised. We need enough cultural backing as a country to understand the perception battle that the parties have been pitching for years. Carried away by a flash flood of controversies that the political desperation is trying to cause; every common citizen is getting entrapped in a whirlpool of chaos, unable to catch hold of the protective embankment of the democratic values which the politics in India turned slippery and feeble for the last few decades. We need tremendous intellectual involvement not emotional to understand the melodramatic impulse of politics, which often takes diplomatic somersaults in frequent intervals.

RM: You were formerly a Professor, an International Management Consultant and a Corporate Chief Executive. So How did the Biryanishk journey start?

Banerjee: BIRYANISHK, previously known as The Biryani Company, began its journey of producing the most authentic Biryani and Mughlai delicacies nearly 8 years ago, when we came back to India and gave up my corporate job to do something on my own. Being a foodie myself and coming from a foodies' family (especialy, Biryani lovers), this was like a natural choice. My vision was simple: "It should be food that my family and I would love to eat without having to worry about its effect on our health!" Thus, being the passionate epicurean that I am, I engaged Master Chefs across India to create a delectable menu gredients. RM: How does "Biryanishk" stand out from other popu-

RM: Are you sticking to any particular genre of biryani or are you experimenting with vari-



ous forms?

Banerjee: Quite significantly, the Lucknowi (Awadhi) Biryani is the footprint the Moghuls left on the eastern part of India. From Lucknow the biryani moved to Kolkata when, in 1856, Nawab Wajid Ali Shah was deposed by the British. His team of cooks moved with him and so did the biryani. In Kolkata the biryani entered poorer homes, which could not afford meat every day, so the meat was replaced by potatoes. Aurangzeb is believed to have invaded the South and installed the Nizam-ul-Mulk who later as the Asfa Jahi ruler became the Nizam of Hyderabad. That explains the movement of the Biryani down south.

But with the passage of time, Kolkata's Biryani or Awadhi cuisine has traversed a long way from New Market's cosy corner called Nizam, or Aminia, or Shiraz or Arsanal to plush fine dining joins. Experiments are still on to add fresh gastronomical delights to this time-tasted Nawabi cuisine.

Being foodies ourselves, we had thought of carrying on with this gastronomical experi"Biryanishk" brand?

Banerjee: "Biryanishk" is a complete Royal Dining Experience and the Best Biryani in town...that's how we plan to position it. In Home Delivery segment also, we want to be among the top ones, when it comes to Biryani, Kebab and other Mughlai cuisine. We serve all over Kolkata and we have our own fleet. And mind you that Kolkata is one of the fastest growing F&B market. And Bengalis' love towards Biryani and Chinese has always been on top of everything.

It is experiential dining with a regal ambience and delicious food that takes you back in time. Only superior quality meat, superfine longgrain rice, most select whole spices, real saffron, sunflower oil and desi ghee are used. Dalda and artificial colours or flavourings are strictly banned from our imperial kitchens! Russia pushes to block second city in eastern Ukraine

KYIV: Russian forces are trying to block a city in eastern Ukraine, the region's governor said Saturday, after their relentless assault on a nearby city forced Ukrainian troops to begin withdrawal after weeks of intense fight-

ing.

Russia also launched missile attacks on areas far from the heart of the eastern battles. Serhiy Haidai, governor of the Luhansk resaid gion, on Facebook that Russian forces are attempting to blockade the city of Lysychansk from the south. That city lies next to Sievierodonetsk, which has endured relentless assault and house-to-house fighting for weeks. After Haidai said Fri-

day that Ukrainian forces had begun re-

treating from Sievierodonetsk, military analyst Oleg Zhdanov said some of the troops were heading for Lysychansk. But Russian moves to cut off Lysychansk will give those retreating troops little respite.

Russian bombardment has reduced most of Sievierodonetsk to rubble and cut its population from 100,0000 to 10,000. Some Ukrainian troops are holed up in the huge Azot chemical factory on the city's edge, along with

about 500 civilians.

Sievierodonetsk and Lysychansk have been the focal point of the Russian offensive aimed at capturing all of eastern Ukraine's Donbas region and destroying the Ukrainian military four Russian rockets hit a "military object" in Yaroviv, Lviv regional governor Maksym Kozytskyy said. He did not give further details of the target, but Yaroviv has a sizable military base used for training fighters, includ-

The Lviv region, although far from the front lines, has been hit by other rockets during the war, destroying fuel storage areas. About 30 Russian rockets were fired on the Zhytomyr region in central Ukraine on Saturday morning, killing one Ukrainian soldier, regional governor Vitaliy Buchenko said.

In the north, about 20 rockets were fired from Belarus into the Chernihiv region, the Ukrainian military said.

A senior U.S. defense official, speaking in Washington on condition of anonymity, on Friday called the Ukrainians' move out of Sievierodonetsk a "tactical retrograde" to consolidate forces into positions where they can better defend themselves. This will add to Ukraine's effort to keep Russian forces pinned down longer in a small area, the official said. Following a botched attempt to capture Kyiv, Ukraine's capital, in the early stage of the invasion that started Feb. 24, Russian forces have shifted their focus to the Donbas, where the Ukrainian forces have fought Moscowbacked separatists since 2014.

After repeated Ukrainian requests to its Western allies for heavier weaponry to counter Russia's edge in firepower, four mediumrange American rocket launchers have arrived, with four more on the way.

The senior U.S. defense official said Friday that more Ukrainian forces are training outside Ukraine to use the High Mobility Artillery Rocket Systems, or HIMARS, and are expected back in their country with the weapons by mid-July. The rockets can travel about 45 miles (70 kilometers). Also to be sent are 18 U.S. coastal and river patrol boats. The official said there is no evidence Russia has been successful in intercepting any of what has been a steady flow of military aid into Ukraine from the U.S. and other nations. Russia has repeatedly threatened to strike, or actually claimed to have hit, such shipments.

### Oceans saved us, now can we return the favour?

PARIS: Humanity must heal oceans made sick by climate change, pollution and overfishing in order to rescue marine life and save ourselves, experts warned ahead of a major UN conference opening Monday in Lisbon.

By absorbing -- decade after decade -- a quarter of CO2 pollution and more than 90 percent of excess heat from global warming, oceans have kept Earth's terrestrial surface liveable.

Our species has returned the favour by dumping mountains of plastic waste into the sea, emptying the deep blue of big fish, and poisoning coastlines with toxic chemicals and agricultural runoff that create dead zones bereft of oxygen. "At least one-third of wild fish stocks are overfished and less than 10 percent of the ocean is protected," Kathryn Matthews, chief scientist for US-based NGO Oceana, told AFP.

"Destructive and illegal fishing vessels operate with impunity in many coastal waters and on the high seas.

Nearly \$35 billion in subsidies that aggravate overfishing will fall under a harsh spotlight in Lisbon, despite first steps towards a partial ban put in place by the World Trade Organization (WTO) last week.

At the same time, ocean water made acidic by CO2 along with vast marine heatwaves lasting months or longer are killing coral reefs that support a quarter of marine life and provide livelihoods for a quarter of a billion people. "We have only begun to understand the extent

to which climate change is going to wreak havoc on ocean health," said Charlotte de Fontaubert, the World Bank's global lead for the blue

Jointly hosted by Portugal and Kenya, the fiveday UN Ocean Conference -- delayed from April 2020 by the Covid-19 pandemic -- brings together thousands of government officials, businesses, scientists and NGOs in search of solutions.

While they do not all see eye-to-eye on what needs to be done, they largely agree on what

is at stake. "If we don't do the right thing, we might end up with a dead ocean," Rashid Sumaila, a fisheries expert and professor at the University of British Columbia, told AFP.

"Think about that -- Oh man, it's scary." Pollution that could,

on current trends, see as much plastic in the seas as fish by mid-century is also on the agenda, with proposals rang-ing from recycling to outright banning of plastic bags.

From East Asian factory ships prowling the high seas to artisanal fishing boats hugging tropical coastlines, how to make wild fisheries sustain-

able will be high on the Lisbon agenda. The new watchword is "blue food" -- sustenance from the sea that is both sustainable and equitable.

"Wild ocean fish can provide a climate-friendly, micro-nutrient protein source that can feed one billion people a healthy seafood meal every day -- forever," said Matthews.

Also under the microscope is the booming aquaculture industry, where issues range from the destruction of precious mangrove forests to

rampant antibiotic use.

Year-end summits The conference may report trend lines for wild fisheries -- which peaked in the 1990s -- and seafood farming for the first time, with each producing about 100 million tons per year. The Lisbon meet will see ministers and even a

few heads of state, including French President




Emmanuel Macron, but is not a formal negotiating session.

That won't stop participants, however, from pushing for a strong oceans agenda at two critical summits later this year: the COP27 UN climate talks in November, hosted by Egypt, followed by the long-delayed COP15 biodiversity negotiations, recently moved from China to Montreal.

Oceans are already at the heart of a draft biodiversity treaty tasked with halting what many scientists fear is the first "mass extinction" since a meteor wiped out terrestrial dino-saurs more than 65 million years ago.

A coalition of nearly 100 nations supports a cornerstone provision that would designate 30 percent of the planet's land and ocean as protected areas.

each day of his three-decade-long acting career, be it in films, tele-serials or jatra.

On June 10, the 58-year-old actor's latest film 'Biswanath' had hit the theatres and recently, he finished dubbing for his last film 'Om Swaha' which is being directed by Dileep Panda. Born in Keonjhar, Raimohan had no godfather in the industry. Drama was his first love. After graduating from Karanjia Mahavidyalaya, he arrived in Bhubaneswar to pursue a degree from the drama department of Utkal Sangeet Mahavidyalaya.

But it was his love for negative characters and conviction for the roles that he was offered that catapulted him to being one of the finest villains of the industry after Hara Pattnaik. Raimohan and Ashrumochan Mohanty debuted in the Odia film industry together in a film 'Sagar' which was directed by Raju Singh and released in 1989. The film was based on the Chabirani rape and murder case and Raimohan played a small negative role in it. While dubbing for the film at Kalinga Studio, Raimohan was noticed by Raju Mishra who offered him another small villian role in his film 'Chaka Akhi Sabu Dekhuchi'. After the two films, Bijay Bhaskar offered him the character of main villain in 'KotieManisha Gotiye Jaga' in 1991 which helped him establish himself in a negative role. In fact, the year 1993 came as a turning point in his career when he essayed the antagonist in three back-to-back films including 'Rana Bhoomi' and 'Pathara Khasuchi Bada Deulu' directed by Raju Mishra. "Raimohan was the villain in almost all the films directed by Mishra which brought him to the limelight. The only movie where he essayed a positive character was Mishra's 'Sata Micha' (2003) where he played the role of the heroine's brother and this film got him the Special Jury Award, his only State film award," said film historian Surya Deo. Besides, he had played the character of a transgender in 'Asibu Kebe Saji Mo Rani' (2010). Also known for his dialogue delivery, one of his dialogues that became an instant hit with the film lovers was 'Heiti Anani Jyoti Mashtrani' in the film 'Ranabhumi'. "There's an interesting story behind this dialogue. Producer of Ranabhumi had a habit of using the words 'heiti anani' and Raimohan picked it up for his dialogue which became very popular," Deo said. What also brought him fame was the negative characters that he played opposite veteran actor and his teacher at Utkal Sangeet Mahavidyalaya Bijay Mohanty. Films like 'Sindura Nuhe Khelaghara', 'Pathara Khasuchi Bada Deulu', 'Janmadata' that he did with Mohanty were well appreciated. In his over 30-years of acting career, he did over 90 films including some in Bengali language and in between, he also experimented with 'jatra' shows. In 2002, Raimohan entered the thriving 'jatra' industry and went on to do nearly 40 shows. Such was his popularity in 'jatra' that tickets were sold in his name.

#### 'Biggest cowardly attack on democracy': Parties slam Congress on **Emergency's 47th anniversary**

on this day in 1975 by former prime minister Indira Gandhi, suspended fundamental rights of citizens and brought press censorship. Several opposition leaders were arrested during the Emergency. It was lifted on March 21, 1977. Home Minister Amit Shah said the Congress declared Emergency in its lust for power "and snatched away the Constitutional rights of Indians overnight, and outdid even the foreign rule in terms of brutality".

In his tweet, he also paid tributes to those who fought this "dictatorial" mindset. BJP leader and Uttar Pradesh Deputy Chief Minister Brajesh Pathak hit out at the Congress, saying the country suffered through Emergency due to a "family greedy of power".

Addressign a seminar, titled 'Dark Phase of Democracy: Black Day', held at BJP headquarters in Lucknow, he said that during the period citizens were treated worse than they were during the British rule.

"And those who opposed it were severely tortured. In the greed of power, a family imposed Emergency in the country. The Emergency imposed by the Congress 47 years ago was the biggest cowardly attack on the country's democracy," Pathak said. Lakhs of people were imprisoned for no reason, censorship was imposed on courts and the press, he said. BJP leader and Uttarakhand Chief Minister Pushkar Singh Dhami said the Congress had "murdered democracy" by forcing the Emergency on the country and putting behind bars anyone who resisted it. ALSO READ Memories of the Emergency: A gritty rebel relives brutality of dark days Participating in a programme held virtually at the Uttarakhand BJP's Rudrapur district office in the honour of the 'soldiers of democracy' (loktantra ke senani), he said June 25, 1975, will always be remembered as a "dark chapter" in independent India's history. "Whoever stood up and came forward to protest it (emergency) was sent to jail and subjected to atrocities," he said addressing the programme virtually from Delhi. The Rajasthan BJP observed the day as 'Black Day' and held dharnas across district headquarters in the Congress-ruled state. Party workers wore black bands on their arms. BJP state president Satish Poonia addressed a seminar on 'Emergency Imposed by Congress Government on June 25, 1975' at the party office in Jaipur. In a statement issued in Hindi in Lucknow, Akhilesh Yadav said 47 years have passed since the Emergency was imposed, but the memory of June 25, 1977 "sends a chill down the spine". However, he also attacked the current BJP government, saying the "threat of an undeclared emergency looms over the country" today. "Intolerance and hatred have destroyed social harmony. Constitutional institutions are being weakened. The voices of the farmers and youth are being crushed. Unemployment is rising and women and girls are suffering humiliation," he said. Yadav alleged those in power have broken all records of abuse of power and the country stands at a crossroads. AAP leader and Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann termed the Emergency a "big blot" on the country's democracy. ....Today, there was such a day in India's history, which was a big blot on India's democracy. On this day in 1975, Emergency was imposed in the country when people's voice was suppressed," he said.

Ukraine amplified inflation by further pushing up the cost of energy and prices of fertilizer, grains and cooking oils as farmers struggle to grow and export crops in one of the world's key agricultural regions. As prices rise, inflation threatens to exacerbate inequalities and widen the gap between billions of people struggling to cover their costs and those who are able to keep spending.

"We are not all in this together," said Matt Grainger, head of inequality policy at anti-poverty organization Oxfam. "How many of the richest even know what a loaf of bread costs? They don't really, they just absorb the prices."

Oxfam is calling on the Group of 7 leading industrialized nations, which are holding their annual summit this weekend in Germany, to provide debt relief to developing economies and to tax corporations on excess profits.

"This isn't just a standalone crisis. It's coming off the back

support measures like expanded subsidies for utility bills and cuts to fuel taxes. Often, that offers little relief because energy markets are volatile. Central banks are trying to ease inflation by raising interest

rates. Meanwhile, striking workers have pressured employers to engage in talks on raising wages to keep up with rising prices. Eddie Dempsey, a senior official with Britain's Rail, Maritime and Transport Union, which brought U.K. train services to a near standstill with strikes this week, said there are going to be more demands for pay increases across other sectors.

"It's about time Britain had a pay rise. Wages have been falling for 30 years and corporate profits have been going through the roof," Dempsey said. Last week, thousands

of truckers in South Korea ended an eight-day strike that caused shipment delays as they called for minimum wage guarLanka's prime minister last month. Middle-class families say they're forced to skip meals because of the island nation's economic crisis, prompting them to contemplate leaving the country altogether.

The situation is particularly dire for refugees and the poor in conflict areas such as Afghanistan, Yemen, Myanmar and Haiti, where fighting has forced people to flee their homes and rely on aid organizations, themselves struggling to raise money. ## India vs Sri Lanka Women's T20I: 'Bowlers did a good job', says Smriti Mandhana

DAMBULLA: Star India opener Smriti Mandhana hailed her side's bowling unit for getting the job done as they clinched the three-match Women's T20 International series against Sri Lanka with a fivewicket win in the second match here on Saturday. India dished out an impressive bowling display in both spin and pace departments, choking Sri Lanka to a paltry 125/7 after the home side were 87 for no likes of Deepti Sharma, Poonam Yadav, Rajeshwari Gayakwad and Radha Yadav.

During her knock of 34-ball 39, Mandhana became the second fastest Indian woman to score 2,000 runs T20I runs. She reached the feat in her 84th innings, becoming the third Indian woman after the legendary Mithali Raj (70 innings) and current skipper Harmanpreet Kaur (88 innings) to cross the mark.



loss inside 14 overs. In reply, India overcame some early hiccups to secure the series-clinching win and take an unassailable 2-0 lead. "They (bowlers) did a really good job today and also in the last match to defend 139," Mandhana said at the post-match press conference.

The Indian bowlers struggled to get a breakthrough early on as the Sri Lankan opening duo of skipper Chamari Athapaththu (43) and Vishmi Gunaratne (45) gave them a solid start. "We didn't have to tell them much. It was just about following our game plan as a bowling unit and sticking to it. We knew one or two wickets here and there will get us back in the game. Our bowlers were really patient with it. Definitely, we leaked a few runs with some misfields here and there but I'm sure we will come back stronger," he said.

The Romesh Powar-coached team has left out the likes of Jhulan Goswami, Shikha Pandey and Sneh Rana, and fielded the likes of Pooja Vastrakar, Renuka Singh, Simran Bahadur and Meghna Singh. The Indian spin attack, on the other hand, had the

Mandhana and her opening partner Shafali Verma got off to a flier and the left-hander said it was about backing their strengths.

"Me and Shafali had a game plan going today. We knew which bowlers to target, we know each other's strengths and weaknesses, it was about our strengths. Later on after the power-play, it was more about singles and doubles and not whom to attack as we had only 126 to get. It was about rotating strike and dealing in one and twos," he said.

After the departure of Mandhana, India stuttered in the middle overs but skipper Harmanpreet Kaur anchored the chase with an unbeaten 31 from 32 deliveries. Mandhana said the wicket was difficult to bat on. "It was keeping a bit low, and of course it was on the slower side. So it wasn't an easy pitch to bat on. You had to really work hard on your runs but once you get used to the pace and bounce of the wicket, runs came in," she concluded.

The final match of the T20I series is slated on Monday, before the three-match ODI series begins at Pallekele on July 1.

The 6-foot 4-inch defender also has the experience of playing for the junior French national team before moving to Guinea to play at the senior level. Florentin Pogba has 31 international caps for Guinea after making his debut in 2010.

Indian midfielder Ashique Kuruniyan from Bengaluru FC also signed up for ATK Mohun Bagan on a five-year deal earlier this month.



WIMBLEDON: Serena Williams will begin her Wimbledon comeback by facing Harmony Tan, a 24-year-old from France who is ranked 113th and owns a 2-6 career record in Grand Slam matches.

According to The Guardian, Emma Raducanu has drawn one of the most difficult first-round opponents she could have faced at Wimbledon in the form of Alison Van Uytvanck while Andy Murray and Serena Williams were both handed favourable opening matches. The placement of Williams in the women's

bracket was the most anticipated aspect of Friday's draw at the All England Club. She is making her first appearance in singles at any tournament since she hurt her right leg and stopped playing during the first set of her first-round match at Centre Court a year ago.

Because of her lack of activity over the past 12 months, Williams — who has been No. 1 in the rankings — is outside the WTA's top 1,200 this week and so could have ended up anywhere in the field and against any opponent in the first round. She only returned to the tour this week by playing two doubles matches at a tuneup event in England and was awarded a wild-card invitation to Wimbledon.

While the 40-year-old American's track record would merit a seeding, the All England Club now adheres strictly to the rankings in determining how it seeds players.

Williams has won seven Wimbledon championships, part of her total of 23 Grand Slam singles titles, a record for the professional era. Tan, meanwhile, will be making her debut at the grass-court tournament.

If Williams gets past Tan, next up could be a match against Sara Sorribes Tormo, who is seeded 32nd but has never been past the second round at the All England Club or the third round at any major in 19 past appearances.

The third round potentially would put Williams against a tougher test: No. 6-seeded Karolina Pliskova, who was the runner-up to Ash Barty last year at Wimbledon and also reached the final of the 2016 U.S. Open — beating Williams in the semifinals there.

Barty retired at age 25 in March and so is not

defending her title when play begins on Monday. That also leaves open the question of which woman will have the honor of playing the first match at Centre Court on Tuesday, a slot traditionally reserved for the prior year's champion. The two most likely choices would seem to be No. 1 Iga Swiatek, who enters on a 35-match winning streak and is coming off a title at the French Open, or Simona Halep, who won the 2019 trophy at Wimbledon, beating Williams in the final, but did not get the chance to begin things at Centre Court in 2020, when the tournament was canceled because of the coronavirus pandemic, or in 2021, because she was injured and unable to play.

The projected women's quarterfinals based on seedings are Swiatek vs. No. 8 Jessica Pegula, Pliskova vs. No. 4 Paula Badosa, No. 2 Anett Kontaveit vs. No. 5 Maria Sakkari, and No. 3 Ons Jabeur vs. No. 7 Danielle Collins.

The potential men's quarterfinals are top-seeded Novak Djokovic vs. No. 5 Carlos Alcaraz, No. 3 Casper Ruud vs. No. 7 Hubert Hurkacz, No. 2 Rafael Nadal vs. No. 6 Felix Auger-Aliassime, and No. 4 Stefanos Tsitsipas vs. No. 8 Matteo Berrettini.

Djokovic won his third consecutive Wimbledon title — and sixth overall — by beating Berrettini in last year's final.

Djokovic will get the honor of starting play on Centre Court on Monday, when he will face 75th-ranked Kwon Soon-woo of South Korea. Although Djokovic's ranking has slid to No. 3, he leads the men's seeding because No. 1 Daniil Medvedev and No. 2 Alexander Zverev are not in the field. Medvedev is Russian, and all play-ers from that country and Belarus were banned by the All England Club because of the war in Ukraine. Zverev is recovering after tearing ligaments in his right foot during his French Open semifinal against Nadal, who went on to win his 14th championship there and men's-record 22nd overall at the majors.

Andy Murray, who won two of his three Grand Slam titles at Wimbledon, was drawn to face James Duckworth in the first round, while threetime major champion Stan Wawrinka goes up against No. 10 Jannik Sinner, and Nick Kyrgios faces British wild-card entry Paul Jubb.

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
