

PRESIDENT OF INDIA GRACES THE VALEDICTORY FUNCTION OF 75TH YEAR CELEBRATIONS OF HIGH COURT OF ORISSA

LEGAL PROFESSIONALS SHOULD WORK TOWARDS EXPEDITIOUS TRIAL AND QUICK JUSTICE: PRESIDENT MURMU



Cuttack, (KCN): The President of India, Smt Droupadi Murmu graced and addressed the valedictory function of 75th year celebrations of the High Court of Orissa at Cuttack today (July 26, 2023).

The President commenced her address by paying tributes to the brave soldiers who sacrificed their lives in the Kargil War. She noted that many soldiers from Odisha are among those who sacrificed their lives in the service of Mother India. Major Padmapani Acharya was honoured with Maha Vir

Chakra for his contribution. She said that the bravery of these soldiers will always remain a source of inspiration for our citizens.

Speaking about the 75th year celebrations of the High Court of Orissa, the President said that the High Court of Orissa has set many high standards in its glorious journey of 75 years. The luminaries of this High Court include a long list of Justices like Babu Jagannath Das, Ranganath Misra, Radha Charan Patnaik, Deba Priya Mohapatra, Gopala

Ballav Patnaik, Arijit Pasayat, Ananga Kumar Patnaik and Dipak Misra who became Judges of the Supreme Court and some of them also served as the Chief Justice of India. She stated that behind the reputation of this Court is the contribution, loyalty, dedication towards work and vast amount of knowledge of the past and present Chief Justices, Judges, advocates and staff of this High Court. The President said that any institution which doesn't change with the change of time, lags behind. She noted that the High Court of Orissa has endeavoured

to incorporate the technological advancements in the justice delivery system. She appreciated the High Court of Orissa for streamlining and accelerating the justice delivery system through several modern, innovative and technology-driven changes.

The President said that the legal profession in India has earned the trust and respect of the citizens. It stands strong as one of the important pillars of the world's largest democracy. She urged legal professionals to work towards expeditious trial and quick justice. She said that it can set free those innocents who are languishing in jail on trivial charges. The President said that there are instances of people imprisoned for periods longer than the punishment stipulated for the crimes of which they were accused. Due to this, innocent persons lose their important period of life. On the other side, victims also lose the hope for not

seeing the guilty facing the legal consequences. Such delays are a major concern. She urged all associated with the High Court of Orissa to work towards speedy dispensation of justice and set an example for the entire country.

The President said that our Constitution-makers have given priority to the delivery of justice to the socially and economically underprivileged sections of the society. People from the deprived sections of the society neither have much knowledge nor have resources to access the justice. Therefore, it is a question before us 'how would they get justice?' There is a need for deep churning on this question.

The President said that natural calamities pose a challenge to humanity. Adaptation to nature is the need of the hour. She said that along with the Executive and Legislature, the Judiciary should also give top priority to environment and wildlife protection.

President Murmu Addresses Convocation Of National Law University Odisha



Cuttack, (KCN): The President of India, Smt Droupadi Murmu graced and addressed the convocation of National Law University Odisha at Cuttack today (July 26, 2023).

Speaking on the occasion, the President said that India's freedom struggle was led by qualified lawyers. It shows that a large number of lawyers from those generations were filled with the spirit of sacrifice for the nation. Remembering Utkal Gaurav Madhusudan Das, popularly referred to as Madhu-Barister, she said that his birth anniversary is celebrated as 'Lawyers Day' in Odisha. She said that for the people of Odisha, 'Mahatma Gandhi' and 'Madhu-Barister' are the two most respected icons of India's freedom struggle. Great freedom fighters and lawyers like them also upheld the ideals of Justice,

Liberty, Equality and Fraternity in order to build a progressive and cohesive society. The President urged students to remain steadfast in observing the Constitutional ideals. She advised them to be sensitive to the priorities of the nation. She said that they should also make conscious efforts to contribute to those national priorities.

Referring to the motto 'Satye Sthito Dharmah' of the National Law University Odisha, which means 'Dharma is firmly rooted in Satya or Truth', the President said that in ancient India the two words frequently used to describe courts were 'Dharmasabha' and 'Dharmadhikarana'. For today's modern India, our Dharma is contained in the Constitution of India, which is the supreme law of the land. She said that the entire legal fraternity, including the young students passing out today,

must abide by the Constitution as their sacred text. The President said that giving equal opportunity and respect to the vulnerable segments of our population, including women, should be the highest priority for every Indian who is in a position to help fellow citizens. A very large number of our under-privileged and vulnerable fellow citizens don't even know about their rights and entitlements, nor do they have the means to move the courts to seek relief or justice. She told students that it is their duty to dedicate some part of their professional time to serving the unserved or underprivileged. She urged them to devote at least a small part of their professional activities to helping the poor and the weak with a sense of genuine compassion. It is rightly said that law is not just a career, it is a calling, she added.

Odisha Govt Sanctions More Than 900 Teaching, Non-Teaching Posts; 325 PGT Teachers Join Higher Secondary Schools

Bhubaneswar (KCN): As many as 325 Post-Graduate Trained (PGT) teachers joined the Higher Secondary Schools of the State today under School & Mass Education (S&ME) department at Nijukti Parva organised at Lok Seva Bhawan in Bhubaneswar. They will teach 21 subjects. This is the first batch of teachers specifically appointed for higher secondary schools. Speaking on the occasion, Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik told the teachers that they are the first batch of Post-Graduate Teachers at the Higher Secondary level, a crucial stepping stone in a student's career. From here onwards, the students can have a whole world of opportunities for them. As teachers, they should try to understand their students, their potential, and their passion, the CM added. "If students are encouraged to pursue their own dreams, not of parents or dreams guided by conventional wisdom, then I believe, there will be no stopping in their path to success," the CM stated.

Saying that Education is a top priority of the Government, the CM said that under 5T

programme, more than 6,800 High Schools have undergone a significant transformation, and it has created great enthusiasm among students, teachers and parents.

In order to provide more access to higher secondary education, the Chief Minister further said that his Government has recently upgraded 110 High Schools to Higher Secondary Schools. More than 900 teaching and non-teaching posts have been sanctioned for these schools.

Patnaik hoped the teachers to keep themselves updated on the latest pedagogical skills. "Your in-depth knowledge, use of technology tools, and expertise will certainly transform the learning ecosystem. The 5T principles will be helpful in enhancing the teaching experience," he asserted. The CM expressed confidence that the new teachers will endeavour to deliver their very best in the service of our State. Congratulating the toppers of the Annual Higher Secondary Examination 2023, the CM said that the topper students are jewels of our state. He hoped they will continue to excel in their

careers in life and contribute immensely to society. In total, 17 toppers in different streams were felicitated.

CM advised the students to remember that the ultimate objective of education is to make our society a better place to live in. "We must consciously contribute to society for the common good," he added. Speaking on the occasion, S&ME Minister Sudam Marndi outlined the efforts of his department in opening new higher secondary schools. He said that more posts will be filled up soon. He also appreciated the topper students and asked them to work hard for further success. Two teachers Priyanka Pati and Siba Prasad Mishra, sharing their experiences, said that the recruitment process was open, transparent and fast. They appreciated the leadership of the CM in transforming Odisha, and committed themselves to inspiring students with quality education. Chief Secretary PK Jena spoke on the transformation taking place in the education sector and said the teachers can accelerate this process with quality education. S&ME Commissioner-cum-Secretary Aswathi S gave the welcome address.

Former British PM Calls On Odisha CM In Bhubaneswar

Bhubaneswar (KCN): Former British Prime Minister Tony Blair today met Odisha Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik at the latter's residence in the capital city here.

The two leaders held discussions for around an hour at Naveen Niwas, the residence of Odisha Chief Minister in the state capital here, sources said. The former British PM and Patnaik held discussions on economic development and growth of Odisha and the future perspectives, said an official.

Notably, a MoU was signed between Odisha government and Tony Blair Institute of Global Change (TBI) on July 21.

As per the agreement, the institute will provide advisory support to the state government to realize its overall economic agenda. The Chief Minister appreciated the preliminary suggestions of TBI and expected that the cooperation will help in securing a balanced industrial growth and resultant inclusive benefit to citizens. Blair also praised Patnaik for the state's



success in different sectors. He appreciated the 5T initiative for bringing transformative changes in governance in Odisha, sources said. The London-based institute is now providing advisory support to 45 countries across the Globe to help the governments turn ideas

into reality, sources said. The institute assists governments to frame appropriate strategies to realize their economic agenda, they added. The institute has specialization in governance, foreign policy, investment, urban infrastructure, climate, energy and human

capital. According to sources, the project team of TBI will undertake a range of activities such as current-state analysis, external benchmarking, roadmap design, capacity development, effective communication of core reforms to enhance adoption in Odisha. Prioritization of emerging industries, development of a multimodal transport logistics will be the main agenda to supercharge growth, said the official. It is worth mentioning here that Tony Blair was the Prime Minister of United Kingdom (UK) from 1997 to 2007.

Odisha: Class-X Boy Dies By Suicide After Being Scolded For Stealing Rs 60 From Dad's Pocket

Bhubaneswar (KCN): A Class-X boy of Jagatsinghpur district in Odisha reportedly died by suicide after he was scolded by his father for stealing Rs 60 from the latter's pocket a few days ago. The incident took place at Galupada under Jagatsinghpur Sadar police limits yesterday. The 15-year-old boy was the only child of his parents, who work as teachers in government schools. The boy's parents had left their ancestral house at Mulagaon under Balikuda block and moved to Jagatsinghpur district headquarters town to ensure better education for him, sources said. The boy had reportedly stolen Rs 60 from his father's pocket a few days ago. Subsequently, he was scolded by his father, sources added. "The boy did not go to school by citing some reasons yesterday. He hanged himself from the ceiling of their rented house at Galupada with the help of a cotton towel while his parents were away in their places of work," said a local. The boy reportedly left a suicide note before ending his life. "No one is responsible for my death. I am taking this extreme step at my own will. I have left the unspent money in our house," read the suicide note.

IMD Predicts Heavy Rains In These Odisha Districts For Next Five Days

Bhubaneswar (KCN): Due to the prevalent monsoon trough, heavy to very heavy rainfall is very likely to occur at one or two places over two districts of Odisha during next 24 hours. India Meteorological Department (IMD) regional centre today issued Yellow Warning in several districts till July 31.

In its evening bulletin, the IMD regional centre mentioned, "The Well Marked Low Pressure Area over Westcentral and adjoining Northwest Bay of Bengal off north Andhra Pradesh-south Odisha coasts with the associated cyclonic circulation extending up to 7.6 Km above mean sea level persists. It is likely to move slowly northwestwards across north Andhra Pradesh-south Odisha coasts." The Monsoon Trough at mean sea

level now passes through Jaisalmer, Kota, Raisen, Mandla, Durg, centre of Well Marked Low Pressure Area over Westcentral and adjoining Northwest Bay of Bengal off north Andhra Pradesh-south Odisha coasts and thence

east-southeastwards to Eastcentral Bay of Bengal and extends up to 1.5 km above mean sea level, the IMD regional centre said.

Light to moderate rain or thundershower is very likely to occur at most places over the districts of South Odisha, North Interior Odisha and at many places over the districts of North Coastal Odisha.

The highest maximum (day) temperature of 35.0oC was recorded at Sambalpur and the lowest minimum (night) temperature of 22.0oC was recorded at Nuapada in the plains of Odisha.



Naga Log Drums and The Stories They Tell

Music is an inherent part of a tribal community and constitutes the essence of their society. The role of didactic performances and folk music are not limited to producing melodious sounds, but are also a way to communicate with their ancestors, and surroundings, and to transmit knowledge to future generations. It is not just the musical instruments themselves, but everything they incorporate that makes it an indispensable part of our tangible and intangible cultural heritage. One such instrument is the Naga log drum.

A Naga log drum can be categorised as an idiophone, an instrument that creates sound primarily by vibrations. It is called by different names depending on the tribe and region it belongs to. Though its primary function is that of a drum, it is also venerated like an idol. This tradition of making a log drum is practised in Naga tribes like the Konyak, Ao, Yimchunger, Sangtam, Phom, Khamniungan and Chang of Nagaland and Wanchos of Arunachal Pradesh. Traditionally, a log drum may be installed in the Morung (youth dormitory) or at a vantage point. Villages of these tribes could have one or two log drums, with the size of the village reflected in the size of the drums. The larger the village, the larger the drums.

Myths and beliefs associated

Each tribe has certain beliefs and myths associated with the making and beating of the log drum. The log drum of the Konyaks, Kham, is associated with the tribe's origin myth. Konyaks of Nagaland regard it a chief duty to serve their elders and to

keep the memory of their ancestors alive. They believe that their ancestors used canoes carved out of single tree trunks to cross a mystical river and reach their present settlement. Hence, in memory of this journey they carve the log drum to be of similar shape to the fateful canoe used by their ancestors. In a Konyak village, a new log drum may be carved every few decades depending on the village's needs.

A log drum cannot be made for individual purposes and must be for and by the community. This custom of carving log drums also created an environment that birthed Naga wood craftsmen and blacksmiths, further aiding in the preservation and development of their heritage.

A log drum is considered to be a female entity and given a name by the village elder, believed to have been revealed to him in a dream. The whole process of making and installing a log drum could take three weeks or a month, and is all the while accompanied by rituals, prayers and feasts. This community feast is primarily prepared by the women folk and is an important part of the process. It is considered to be a bad omen if any community member were to miss out on this feast, as it is believed that they would have missed out on blessings.

Preparation and carving of the log drum

An extraordinary skill is required to make a log drum. A typical log drum consists of the head, chest, wing, neck, body, tail and drum sticks or beaters. Some may also have steps carved on the sides, which help in climbing the drum. Before the process of making a log drum starts, all disputes within the

community members are settled. Compromises and negotiations are made, and debts and interests paid to ensure that a strong spirit of harmony and community prevails.

The dense rainforests of Nagaland and Arunachal Pradesh make it ideal for sourcing the raw materials required in making a log drum. Once the tree is selected, it is struck with precision keeping in mind the

precise measurements and markings are made and the carving begins. The carvings on the drum could vary from each tribe and each village. The whole carving is done in the forest by using traditional swords, knives and other indigenous tools. Only male members are allowed to participate in the making of the log drum. If a male is too young to help in the carving, he is required to

drum and through this the drum is made hollow. The Konyaks believe that if the right side of the drum is slightly raised, then the village will be influenced by males, and if the left side is raised then it will be more influenced by females. The head of the log drum could be simple and blank, or be carved to represent auspicious animals like the mithun or tiger with their

the Log Drum

A log drum serves numerous purposes. It was used to announce the return of the warriors after a successful raid, to call for a public meeting, to mourn the death of a community member, to sound an alarm on being attacked or when there was a fire, when a wild animal was killed, and was also beaten post harvest in praise of a good crop. Sounding of the log drum could bring a multitude of blessings or signify a bad omen. Each occasion has a unique beating pattern known to members of the community. It was a quick and efficient way of communicating as the hills echoed with the beat of the drum. In olden days, it acted like a messenger, as during an attack the drum was beaten at a fast pace to signify urgency and danger. Long slow beats would mean that all villagers were requested to gather as others were waiting for a meeting to begin. And a slow and continuous beating is usually sounded during festivals, which could be accompanied by dances. In the past, the face of the log drum also decided which direction to go for head hunting. Once successful, the hunted heads of the enemy would be placed on the neck of the log drum. One Ao recital goes, “Grandpa will put a necklace on your neck...”, as adornment for the Songkong (log drum in Ao) meant adornment for the village. It was also beaten during solar and lunar eclipses.

Although the Naga society is rapidly modernising and changing, indigenous traditions are still practised by the tribesmen living in interior villages. Their role in safeguarding heritage is truly commendable. Today, the log drum is still used by each tribe, especially, to accompany festival performances, highlighted during the famous annual Hornbill Festival. The Naga log drum is a representation and manifestation of the beliefs the age old Naga tribesmen stood for. It is a symbol of the past kept alive and incorporated into the way of the present.

This entity decides the number of days she would take to reach the village, and would not move an inch if she didn't want to. She could create obstacles that would render her immovable, or she could create a smooth pathway leading to the village. The tree owner's consent is equally vital in deciding the movement of the log drum. Members of the Morung make a clear pathway, and any person who owns property in the line of the pathway is duly compensated with cooked rice, meat, and blessings. Using the ropes, rollers and dowels, it is then pulled by employing the combined force and strength of the community members, all the while accompanied by loud cries.

To be the first man to climb the felled tree was an honour given to an experienced warrior, who was usually the one with the highest headcount. An honest man, he was also one of the few chosen men allowed to ride the drum into the village. This man must not have any in-laws residing in the village as it was considered to be a bad omen. Today, with the onset of Christianity the role of this chosen man is replaced by a pastor or church elder.

Traditionally, women did not join the men in pulling, but their contribution is noted in the preparation of feasts, and singing of songs to the spirits and their ancestors. One such

Konyak song goes, This song is sung to venerate the tree from which the log drum is carved. It shows respect and gratitude for the tree's role in bringing blessings to the village. Such practices are common in tribal settlements as the forest and all that it encompasses are considered sacred and ceremonial.

The log drum reaches its destination

Finally, on an auspicious day pre-decided by the female entity, the log drum arrives in the village. A sumptuous feast is organised on her behalf, with contributions made by the whole village. Each family's contribution is decided based on their wealth and prosperity. In preparation for this, small sticks are used to accurately count the number of people ensuring that no one is left out.

The final carvings are done once the drum reaches the village and it is welcomed with merry songs and dances. It is then formally installed in the Morung, where men grab the beaters and beat the drum in rhythmic successions. In olden days, sacrifices were also made in honour of the log drum. The arrival of the log drum would be accompanied by hoisting of the heads of enemies up on a flag post. Blood of the enemies would also be smeared on it, and in Ao villages the log drum was not beaten until it was coloured with the blood of the enemy.

Remembering Subhendu Mund

I knew Subhendu Mund from Odia Juba Lekhak Sammelan.I was active as a member and he,as an office bearer.He was a known writer too.So,when the news of his transfer came ,my heart bubbled with happiness. I was in College those days.It was probably 1978 or 1979. Subhendu Mund joined Govt Evening College,Puri as a Lecturer.I was in the Day College (As we used to call it ,it was actually the college for day scholars,it was the main college).I went to meet him.He also knew me as a writer as my writings by that time had appeared in a few major literary magazines / pages.He embraced me,took me to college canteen for a cup of tea.I don't remember if he was then used to tea,but I was. Subhendu Mund was

never our teacher,but my wife and I have always regarded him as our teacher.I had an impression that Mundas are actually Mundas (A tribal sect).But later I understood that his forefathers went as royal teachers from Puri District to Kalahandi.Since I belong to the family of royal teachers of Puri,I found a link and became friendly ,he too.I took him to our literary organisation Sanibar Sahitya Sandhya of which he later became President for many years.He organised many important and impressive programmes including an All India Poets Meet. I have fond memories of Subhas Mukhopadhyay,the legendary poet from Bengal who once came to Sanibar Sahitya Sandhya Programme with Pabitra Mukhopadhyay,another well known poet from Bengal, when Subhendu Mund was our President.I don't recall if it was the All India Poets Meet.. Both were offered 2nd AC

train tickets .There was no mobile those days,we only knew that they are travelling by Puri Express.We went in a group to Railway Station to receive them.Some of us went inside,and some waited near the Gate.One of us



besides me knew Pabitra da as he came once to Sanibar Sahitya Sandhya . But where is Subhas Da,and Pabitra Da ? They were not in the Compartment.We did not know what to do and came back to the gate.To our surprise both the poets were standing there. I asked them,'Dada,apni compartente to chhilen na...kemon aslen '(Elder brothers ,you were not in the compartment ,how you came ?) The reply was ,' Aami to janta classe chhilam'(We were in the peoples' class).Then Pabitra Da

narrated the story.They did not get reservation ,but Subhas Da insisted that since they have promised,organisers will be disheartened if they don't go.Subhas Da preferred to travel by an ordinary compartment.Such was the greatness of poet S u b h a s Mukhopadhyay.And now,our poets do not go unless they are offered air tickets/AC cars etc. Subhendu Mund and I had differences only once when he became member of Odisha Sahitya Akademi for the second time even after his transfer from Puri.He was member when he was at Puri ,but after his transfer he should have paved way for somebody else, it was my opinion.Time washed away that chapter and we remained friends.He was in the true sense a friend,philosopher and guide. Many years after I was in the Kolkata Festival of Children's Contents where I spoke about Subhendu Mund,how a teacher can be instrumental in developing literary talent

in a student..At the end of the function one young guardian of a child came and asked me,'Kaka,do you recognise me ?' 'No.'I replied . ' I am Raja,son of Subhendu Mund.We were children when you used to organise Sanibar Sahitya Sandhya.I was thrilled when you spoke about my father', he said. ' He is a great man.A great teacher is a great friend.He is a fine writer and scholar too',I uttered in soliloquy...was I remembering golden days of Sailabala and I with him in Sanibar Sahitya Sandhya ! Subhendu Mund is no more. I still remember him and his skill as an organiser. Visiting Professor of Development Communication

Kalahandi disctrict is lagging behind in Socio-Economic development for the want of Railway Infrastructure

Dear Sir
After 75 years of independence, Kalahandi district, once known as the most backward and poor districts of India, has not been able to match the progress of other parts of the state and country as well. Not that, development plans and schemes are not made for this SC/ST populous district, but those are not yielding results as expected by the inhabitants because of rampant corruption, want of political will and apathy of local administration as well as local self help governments. Railway is considered as one of the leading logistics sector which brings all round development for a greater area. As per an estimate Kalahandi population is approx. 22 lakhs, out of which around 18.2% SC and 28.5% are STs. The literacy rate in rural and urban population is 57.3% and 81.6% respectively. The road communication network is not up to mark and many villages in the remote areas are not connected with all weater roads. Next comes railway, which is cheapest and

dependable mode of transportation. But many areas of Kalahandi district are not connected with this mode and trains running through this district not connecting all prominent cities and towns of the country, which has become a barrier for the student, employees and common people of this district to travel to their destinations inside and out of the state. Kalahandi is bestowed with abundant natural resources and atleast 20 places of cultural, commercial, heritage, tourism, sanctuaries, historic importance are situated in this district. Only Junagarh and Bhawanipatna are connected with railway network, where as major part have been left aside. In this context we, on behalf of KALAHANDI VIKASH PARISHAD would like to draw your kind attention regarding few points given below, for your kind and sympathetic consideration.

1. The inhabitants of Kalahandi are demanding for a Wagon factory since since 2008. In 2020-11 budget one wagon repairing factory was proposed to be set up either at Kalahandi or Bhubaneswar. But Odisha government proposed this project at Ganjam. The people of Kalahandi opposed this move and it continued for around 2 years. After much demand and protest, an wagon repairing factory was proposed in 2013-14 budget. But that was shifted to Vizag in later stage. Again in 2017-18, an electric loco repairing factory was declared to be set up in Kalahandi, but that was not materialized.
 2. Junagarh road-Nabarangpur railway line survey is continuing since long. Raygada-Rajim-Gariabandh-Debhog-Dharmagarh-Junagarh rail line survey has got approval, but the status of the said project is not known. Langigarh road-Phulbani-Anugol (Talcher) and Bhawanipatna-Kesinga rail line projects have been stalled. Limited number of trains are running through the district, which is not at all sufficient to fulfill the demand and necessity of rail travel of the people of Kalahandi district.
 3. New rail line must be built between Kesinga and Bhawanipatna.
 4. AC First class coach must be connected in the Bhubaneswar-Junagarh Express.
 5. A train between Bhubaneswar and Junagarh must run in the morning hours.
 6. 12871/12872 Howrah-Titilagarh, Titilagarh-Ispat Express should be extended to Junagarh.
 7. A train between Raygada and Junagarh must be run for the passengers of Kalahandi district who board Samata Express at Raygads.
 8. 08503/08504 Raygada-Vizag, vice versa must be extended up to Junagarh.
 9. A new rail line should be constructed from Bhubaneswar to Kesinga via Utkela.
 10. More people will be benefited by Vizag-Junagarh rail connectivity.
 11. The demand for a new rail line connecting Jeypore and Junagarh road must be considered.
 12. People of Kalahandi are demanding for a new rail line connecting Junagarh and Ambaguda via Nabarangpur and Koksara, which must be taken care of.
 13. Bubaneswar-Bolangir Intercity must be extended up to Junagarh.
 14. One Electric Loco repairing must be established in Kalahandi district.
 15. VIP lounge arrangement must be made at Bhawanipatna and Junagarh rail stations.
 16. Bhawanipatna rail staition lounge should be extended and revamped.
 17. AC must be installed at Junagarh station First class waiting room.
 18. Refreshment stalls must be placed at Junagarh station, for want of which the rail passengers are facing many problems.
 19. 22861/22862 Howrah-Kantabanji Ispat Express must be extended to Junagarh.
 20. All trains must halt at Narla station.
 21. Ramp and other facilities must be made at Bhawanipatna and Junagarh stations for the convenience of disabled persons.
- All the above demands must be considered sympathetically for all round development of Kalahandi inhabitants, which can be materialized under your able leadership.

Tech Ready For Future

New Delhi: Principal Scientific Adviser (PSA) to the Government of India and the Chairperson of the Empowered Technology Group (ETG) Professor Ajay Kumar Sood convened the first meeting of the Technology Advisory Group (TAG) for the ETG today at Vigyan Bhawan Annexe. The meeting brought together TAG members, ETG members, key government officials, and experts from academia to discuss priority areas of scientific research and technology development particularly in carbon capture utilisation and storage, alternate

battery technologies, and Artificial Intelligence. Addressing the TAG meeting, Professor Ajay Kumar Sood said, “Empowered Technology Group is a forum to identify the most pertinent scientific challenges before the country and discuss the most suitable technologies which should be adopted. Some of the technologies might be contemporary, while some are futuristic, which would allow us to become technology ready for the future. TAG will help ETG in brainstorming and actualising ideas on how country's technology needs should be met.”

Dr. Preeti Banzal, Adviser at the Office of the Principal Scientific Adviser, gave an overview of the constitution of the ETG and the constitution of TAG as part of ETG's mandate. Since the inception of ETG in February 2020, 50 ETG meetings have taken place, in which a total of 89 R&D proposals from 26 ministries have been evaluated, and 108 subject matter experts have been consulted on these proposals. Dr. S.S.V. Ramakumar, Director (R&D), Indian Oil Corporation Limited (IOCL) delivered a presentation on



carbon capture technology and its utilization and storage in the Indian context. Dr. Ramakumar suggested to look into developing a robust policy framework for carbon trading and carbon credit because of intended decarbonisation of industries globally. The session concluded

with a productive discussion, exploring collaborative opportunities between different academic and research institutes, and industries through innovation clusters around industries from major CO2 intensive sectors like steel, cement, fertilisers, etc. Need for further studies on proper sequestration

methods was highlighted. Prof.K. Vijayamohan Pillai, Professor & Chair, Chemistry Dean (R&D), Indian Institute of Science Education and Research, Tirupati delivered a presentation on alternate battery technologies like sodium ion, metal air and solid-state batteries and their potential for

replacing lithium-ion based batteries. Cost-effective solutions for alternate battery chemistry and recycling technologies for batteries were also discussed. Debjani Ghosh, President, NASSCOM gave a presentation on Artificial Intelligence as the new frontier of economic growth. It was discussed that there should be focus on building large foundational models, creating mega AI compute infrastructure, capacity building, and data unlocking. The Chair invited the distinguished TAG members and invited experts to share their insights and recommendations to

strengthen the research and development ecosystem in the country. Developing a common governance and implementation model for providing technical support to these niche areas was also proposed. Scientific Secretary Dr. Parvinder Maini gave a succinct summary of the three technical sessions. The meeting concluded with the closing remarks by the Chair. In his closing remarks, Prof. Sood highlighted the importance of taking consolidated efforts in actualising the ideas discussed during the TAG meeting and ensuring that the mission of constituting TAG is fulfilled.

ISI, Kolkata Hosts Workshop on Aphasia in India

Kolkata, (KCN):The Linguistic Research Unit (LRU) of the Indian Statistical Institute in collaboration with the School of Psychology and Clinical Language Sciences, University of Reading, Reading, UK organised a two-day International Training Workshop on "Aphasia in South Asian Languages (ASAL)" during July 20-21, 2023. It was funded by the British Academy and held at ISI, Kolkata campus with the gracious presence of Dr. Arpita Bose, University of Reading, UK; Dr. Sunila John, MAHE, Manipal; Dr. Maya Leela, Trivandrum; Dr. Avanthi Paplikar, SRCISH, Bangalore; Dr. Manaswita Dutta, Portland State University, Oregon, USA; Dr. Mythili Menon, Wichita State University, USA; Dr. Apoorva Pauranik, Pauranik Healthcare Centre, Indore; Dr. Lakshmi Venkatesh, SRIHER, Chennai; Dr. Sakshi Bhatia, University of Delhi, New Delhi and Prof. Niladri Sekhar Dash of LRU, Indian Statistical Institute, Kolkata.



While addressing the workshop, Dr. Arpita Bose stated the workshop as a milestone in the progress on the study of Aphasia in India. She expressed that Aphasia affects 35-40% of stroke survivors and severely limits our quality of life. Inability to speak or understand impacts our social interactions, ability to perform our jobs, and interact with relations. The incidence and prevalence of stroke and aphasia are already increasing in India, and they would continue to increase exponentially due to an increase in ageing populations with known high risks for stroke (e.g., high blood pressure, obesity, aging, etc.). On explaining the

importance of this International Workshop on ASAL, Prof. Niladri Sekhar Dash said most existing tools used in aphasia assessments have been developed in English in the Western countries which hardly reflect on the challenges involved in Indian languages and people. With funding from the British Academy, Indian Statistical Institute, India and the University of Reading, UK are leading a pioneering multi-centered, interdisciplinary and international project "Aphasia in South Asian Languages" (ASAL) to research on aphasia in five languages, namely, Bengali, Hindi-Urdu, Kannada, Malayalam and

Tamil. He also informed that research and clinical scientists from Manipal, Chennai, Bengaluru, Indore, Trivandrum as well as from UK and USA have taken part to make this ambitious project a grand success. Dr. Manaswita Dutta discussed about the recent developments and emerging trends in Aphasia. Among the other distinguished speakers from the Research and Clinical Scientists, Dr. Arpita Bose and Dr. Lakshmi Venkatesh explored rationale and stimuli, ensuring the reliability of data collection, mitigating difficulties and enhancing rigour, etc. Moreover, Dr. Avanthi Paplikar, Dr.

Sunila John, Dr. Lakshmi Venkatesh, Dr. Maya Leela and prof. Niladri S. Snake Bite On Rise

Bhubaneswar(KCN): With the intensity of rainfall activities in the State, snake bite death cases have been reported in several remote areas of the State. At least four persons have been killed in snake bite cases in three districts during the last 24 hours.

According to sources, two minor brothers lost their lives due to poisonous snake bite at Jangalikuda village in Deogarh district while a one and half year-old baby lost his life due to snake bite at Katuria village in Mayurbhanj district.

In another snake bite incident, a woman from Sargiguda village under Ambapani village of Kalahandi district passed away.

Two brothers died of snake bite in Deogarh district while a toddler was killed and his mother admitted in a hospital in serious condition after a poisonous snake bit them last night. The incidents occurred when the victims were in deep sleep, the police said. The first incident took place in ward No 9 of



Deogarh municipality under Deogarh town police station limits. The two deceased brothers have been identified as Sarbeswar Dehuri's sons Gaurang Dehuri (14) and Saubhagya Dehuri (8). Last night, the siblings were sleeping on the floor of their house. In the morning a snake came and bit two of them, the locals said.

The family members immediately admitted them in Deogarh hospital, where both died during treatment in the hospital. The police registered an unnatural death case and sent the bodies for post-

mortem.

The second incident occurred at Katuria village under Sharata police limits of Mayurbhanj district. A poisonous snake bit a toddler and his mother last night. The toddler died while the mother Minati Mahakud shifted to Baripada medical college and hospital in a serious condition.

In the third incident, the woman had come to her brother's house when a poisonous snake bit me. Eventually, she succumbed to it. Due to rain, the poisonous snakes came

out from the forests and entered into the houses located in the nearby areas.

Notably, three students of a residential coaching centre, including two girls, died of a snake bite at Nischintapur village under Baria police station in Odisha's Keonjhar district last Sunday. The poisonous snake bit the students around midnight when they were sleeping. All of them were sleeping on the floor of the coaching centre because of a lack of beds.

Meanwhile, the State Public Health Directorate has issued an advisory to all the hospitals in the State to keep snake antivenom in stock.

The Department has also urged people to carry patients suffering from snakebites immediately to the nearby hospitals instead of wasting time in black magic and other superstitious activities. The School and Mass Education Department has been directed to keep school premises clean while schools have been asked to take precautionary steps to keep snakes away from their premises.

School teacher's mission to plant trees to reduce pollution

Kolkata: Fifteen years ago, a young boy in his teens had planted a banyan tree sapling in West Bengal's Contai area in East Midnapore district with a mission to reduce the increasing pollution in the air and to create awareness among people about global warming.

Today in his late thirties, Shyamal Jana, now a primary school teacher has single-handedly planted hundreds of tree saplings across the state.

After his school gives over and during weekends, Jana is often seen riding on

his two-wheeler with bags full of banyan tree sapling in search of suitable spot to plant the saplings. His slogan is Thakbo Na Ko Bodhho Ghore, Gach Lagabo Bisso Jure (will not confine myself in a room, will plant trees across the world).

Jana, working as a teacher Kulai Padama Junior Basic school in East Midnapore district, has set a goal of planting 5,000 banyan trees in Bengal, from hills to Bay of Bengal, in next five years. Apart from West Bengal, Jana also planted banyan trees in Chandaneswar in Odisha, near Kamakhya temple in

Assam, Megalaya and other parts of North East.

"From childhood, we are taught about the necessity of trees in our life. With the time, as we grow up, we forget this. Trees are uprooted for constructions of buildings, roads, bridges and flyovers. But we never replace the trees with new plantations. If this continues, we will destroy the environment around us in the near future. So, I took an oath to plant trees to save the mother earth," said Jana.

Why does he only plant banyan tree, Jana said, "Banyan is considered as holy



tree. Besides, it houses nests because of its giant size. In rural Bengal, a banyan tree in the corner of a

village offers cool shed in scorching heat and people take rest there."

His area of operation

includes Kalimpong, North Dinajpur, Bankura, Purulia, East Midnapore, West Midnapore, South 24 Parganas districts in West Bengal.

"I consider the entire state as my garden. I want to ensure that my garden always remains green. A tree is like a God to me. Some people tell me that I waste my free time and money for doing such work. I do not pay heed to them," said Jana.

He has also planted trees along seashore in his district and South 24 Parganas to avoid land erosion because of natural calamities. A few days ago, he planted 30 banyan trees in Baguran Jalpai village in the Bay of Bengal as the area

faces severe land erosion because of swollen sea frequently.

Jana spends a considerable sum of his earning for his venture. "When I travel to distant places in north Bengal, I book train tickets. I spend for lodging in hotels from my own pocket. I do not take any financial help from anyone. But I welcome if anyone comes forward to donate banyan saplings," added Jana.

A few days ago, Jana planted trees in front of the building of the Howrah police commissionerate. "The men in uniform welcomed my decision. They came forward to help me to get more saplings from people known to them. If people like these cops

come forward, it will be encouraging for me," said Jana.

Jana, whenever visits Kolkata, he goes to the parks to identify suitable places where banyan saplings can be planted. "In Kolkata only, I planted more than 50 banyan trees which are growing up. When I look at them, I feel like my children are growing up. I would like to request everyone to come forward for plantation. Because it can only save us from global warming and pollution in future," he expressed.

"My next target is to plant banyan trees in our neighbouring countries including Bangladesh, Bhutan, Nepal, Sri Lanka and Myanmar", he said.

BCCI forms subcommittees for World Cup venue supervision

New Delhi: The Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) has formed a sub-committee for each of the main aspects of the World Cup - venue supervision and the granting of infrastructure subsidies. The decision, taken by the office-bearers, has been conveyed to the state associations. The five office-bearers - president Roger Binny, secretary Jay Shah, treasurer Ashish Sehlar, vice-president Rajeev Shukla, and joint secretary Devajit Saikia -- have been assigned the responsibilities of overseeing the 12 venues, including those hosting the warm-up games. Additionally, a separate committee

has been formed to make recommendations for infrastructure subsidies. The committee for infrastructure subsidies includes IPL chairman Arun Singh Dhumal, former treasurer Anirudh Chaudhry, former Apex Council member Prabhatej Bhatia, and Karnataka State Cricket Association Secretary A Shankar, along with the five office-bearers. Roger Binny has been given the responsibility of overseeing Ahmedabad and Chennai. It is worth noting that Ahmedabad will host several significant matches, including the tournament opener, the India-Pakistan



encounter, and the summit clash on November 19, 2023. BCCI Secretary Jay Shah is in charge of the

northern venues of Delhi and Dharamsala, while treasurer Ashish Sehlar will oversee Pune, Lucknow, and

Guwahati. Vice-president Rajeev Shukla will handle the southern cities of Hyderabad and

Bengaluru, and joint secretary Devajit Saikia has been made responsible for Mumbai, Kolkata,

and Trivandrum. It may be noted that 10 cities - Ahmedabad, Mumbai, Pune, Chennai, Bengaluru, Hyderabad, Kolkata, Delhi, Lucknow, and Dharamsala - will host the main World Cup games. Guwahati and Trivandrum are the venues allocated for the warm-up games. In the communique to the state associations, Shah said, "The committees were formed by the office-bearers as per the discussions held during the Special General Meeting on May 27 in Ahmedabad. It was resolved that office-bearers would form two sub-committees for the upcoming ICC Cricket World Cup

2023 and Infrastructure & Subsidy (sic). "We anticipate that these sub-committees will work diligently towards achieving our shared goals and objectives. Together, we can make the ICC Cricket World Cup 2023 a resounding success and further elevate the standards of infrastructure and development in Indian cricket," the BCCI secretary elaborated in his mail to the state units on Tuesday (July 25). The BCCI has hired an external agency and decided to allocate Rs 50 crore each to the venues for sprucing up the stadiums, mainly the corporate boxes, dressing rooms and outfields.

Will India have a new captain for the Ireland series? India announce schedule to host Australia, Afghanistan, England



New Delhi: The planned Asia Cup preparatory camp in the last week of August has raised the possibility of a new captain for the three-match Twenty20 International series against Ireland. With Hardik Pandya, the regular T20I captain, expected to be part of

the squad for the Asia Cup, the selectors are likely to search for a new leader. The three Twenty20 Internationals are scheduled for August 18, 20, and 23, set to take place after the conclusion of the five-match series against West Indies.

Who the captain could be remains a matter of conjecture, but what seems apparent is that head coach Rahul Dravid wants all the players selected for the Asia Cup to attend the camp. The only possible exception in this case could be Jasprit Bumrah, whom the

Indian team management and the selectors want to test in the Twenty20 games, where he will have a workload of not more than four overs. Bumrah, needless to say, is coming off a long injury break of 10 months during which he even underwent surgery. Dravid has suggested the week-long camp in Bengaluru to prepare for the Asia Cup. The camp could start on August 24-25 before the team flies to Sri Lanka for the six-team intra-continental championship. India's first match of the championship, scheduled from August 30 to September 17, is against arch-rivals Pakistan on September 2. It has now emerged that Dravid and the

members of his support staff have been relieved of their duties for the August 18-23 Ireland T20I series due to this pre-planned camp. Meanwhile, the Indian team has reached Barbados, where they will play two of the three ODIs against West Indies, on July 27 and 29. The team has been joined by Pandya, Sanju Samson, Yuzvendra Chahal, Kuldeep Yadav, and Umran Malik, the players who have been picked for the ODIs. Barring Yashasvi Jaiswal, the Test specialist, R Ashwin, Ajinkya Rahane, and Navdeep Saini have left for India. Jaiswal has stayed back because he is part of the Twenty20 squad. The five-match Twenty20 series is scheduled from August 3 to August 13, 2023.

New Delhi: India will be hosting Australia, Afghanistan and England in the 2023-24 home season, the BCCI confirmed on Tuesday (July 25). In total, India are scheduled to play 16 international games comprising five Tests, three ODIs and eight T20Is at home, apart from hosting the ODI World Cup. India will first host Australia for three ODIs just before the World Cup that will help both teams to finetune their preparations for the marquee event. The three ODIs will be played on September 22, 24 and 27 in Mohali, Indore and Rajkot. Once the World Cup gets over, the series will resume with the two teams taking part in a



five-match T20I series that begins on November 23 and ends on December 3. The matches will be played in Vizag, Trivandrum, Guwahati, Nagpur and Hyderabad. Following that series, India will be playing their first bilateral series against Afghanistan, hosting them for three T20Is in January 2024. Mohali, Indore and Bengaluru will host the series that will get over on January 17.

England will then arrive in India for a marquee series that will see the two teams play five Tests. The series will kickstart on January 25 in Hyderabad and the next four Tests will be played in Vizag, Rajkot, Ranchi and Dharamsala with the final Test scheduled to conclude on March 11. The board also confirmed that the Tours, Fixtures and Technical Committee allocated the venues as per the BCCI venue rotation policy.

Harmanpreet suspended for two games after code of conduct breach

New Delhi: India Women's skipper Harmanpreet Kaur has been suspended by the ICC for the next two international games following two separate breaches of the ICC Code of Conduct during the final ODI against Bangladesh recently. Harmanpreet was first fined 50 percent of her match fee and received three demerit points for a Level 2 offence for showing dissent at an umpire's decision. The incident occurred in the 34th over of the Indian innings after the 34-year-old smashed the stumps with the bat after being adjudged out by the on-field umpire. The second breach was during the presentation ceremony after the game in which Harmanpreet criticised the umpiring in the game. She was fined 25% of her match



fee and received one demerit point for this offence. As a result, she ended up accommodating four demerit points that convert into two suspension points which result in a player getting banned for one Test or two ODIs or two T20Is, whatever comes first for the player. As revealed

by Cricbuzz earlier, this suspension means that Harmanpreet will be missing India's first two games in the Asian Games scheduled to begin in September. India has directly qualified for the quarterfinals based on their rankings and Harmanpreet will miss that clash and the semifinal if India gets that far.

India Vs West Indies ODIs: Virat Kohli And Rohit Sharma Eye Massive Record In Three-Match Series, Surpass Sachin Tendulkar

New Delhi: The road to the ICC Cricket ODI World Cup 2023 for India will begin with the three-match ODI series against West Indies starting at Kensington Oval in Barbados with the first ODI on Thursday. Both captain Rohit Sharma and former skipper Virat Kohli are on the cusp of massive records in ODI cricket ahead of the series. Team India have been dominant in Test and ODI cricket against two-time ODI World Cup champions West Indies over the last couple of decades. Indian cricket team have won 15 consecutive ODI bilateral series against the West Indies, the last time that men from Caribbean defeated India in ODI



series was back in 2006. Kohli, meanwhile, needs 102 runs in the three-match series to complete 13,000 runs in ODI cricket. Kohli will become 5th batter and the second from India after Sachin Tendulkar to reach this landmark. The Royal Challengers Bangalore batter has scored 12,898 runs in

274 ODIs at an amazing average of 57.32 with 46 hundreds and 65 fifties. Kohli also needs 4 more centuries to become the first-ever batter to score 50 centuries in ODI cricket history. Captain Rohit Sharma, on the other hand, need 175 runs to complete 10,000 runs in ODI cricket. Rohit has scored

9,825 runs at an average of 48.25 with 30 centuries and 48 fifties. Kohli will smash Tendulkar's record if and when he completes 13,000 runs in ODI cricket by becoming the fastest batter to ever achieve this feat. Tendulkar reached this landmark in 321 innings and Kohli has only played

265 innings till date. Rohit Sharma can also become the second-fastest batter after Kohli to score 10,000 runs in ODI cricket. Kohli holds the world record after reaching the landmark in 213 ODIs and 205 innings. Tendulkar is currently 2nd fastest, having achieved this in 266 ODIs and 259 innings. Indian skipper has so far played in 243 ODI and 236 innings. India will play their first ODI on Thursday but the team members arriving from Trinidad have asked for an extra day's rest. Team India flight from Trinidad to Barbados was delayed by more than 4 hours - set to take off at 11pm, it finally took off at 3am and landed in Barbados at 5am.
