Before Election



Raipur(KCN): Three days before the first phase of polling in Chhattisgarh, Maoists have killed a BJP leader who was campaigning for the elections, police said. Ratan Dubey was the vice-president of the BJP's Narayanpur district unit.

The incident took place on Saturday in Kaushalnagar area of the district. Mr Dubey represented the area in the zilla panchayat.

A senior police official said a team has reached the spot to investigate the murder.

Assembly elections will be held in the state in two phases, on November 7 and 17. Narayanpur is among the 20 Assembly seats on which polls will be held on November 7.

Leopard Mauls Woman To Death In Nuapada Forest

Nuapada(KCN): A woman who was missing since last evening was found dead in the forest near Siliaribahara village in Nuapada district on Saturday. It is suspected that a leopard killed the woman.

The deceased woman, identified as Rameshree Majhi (45), from Siliaribahara village, had gone to attend the nature's call when she was attacked by the

leopard and dragged into the nearby forest. The woman's tragic death in the leopard attack has created panic among villagers who have blamed the forest department for failing to safeguard the village territories from the man-eating tiger.

On the 2nd of November, a tiger was spotted in Katingipani village under Dharambandha police

station. After that, the leopard attacked a 6-year-old girl and injured her critically. Though she was admitted to the hospital, the doctor declared her dead. After the leopard went on hunting cattle, the forest department woke

up and installed trap cameras in the area to track the leopard's movement. Forest personnel were deployed to keep a watch on the village territories.

Today, some people of the

village saw the leopard devouring the dead body of the woman in the forest.

After the leopard vanished into the forest this afternoon, the woman's severed body and head were recovered.

Bhubaneswar(KCN): Odia film producer Sanjay Nayak was arrested today for assaulting a woman journalist in full public view here yesterday.

Police here arrested Shri Nayak this afternoon for allegedly slapping and hurling filthy language at the lady scribe.

The incident took place while she was covering some issues at Sriya-Swati Talkies here around 12.50 pm on Friday afternoon.

"Based on the complaint of the woman journalist, a case (No 553/23) has been registered. A lady sub-inspector has been investigating the case and we have examined the video footage of the incident and recorded statements of all eye witnesses present there. The accused has been arrested today," Rajanikanta Mishra, inspector in-charge, Kharvelnagar PS told media persons.

The Police also recorded



the statement of the complaint under 161 of CrPC, he informed.

Till now, prima facie evidences have been collected to prove all charges framed against the producer, who will be produced before court soon.

The case has been registered against Tutu Nayak under sections

341 (wrongful restraint), 323 (voluntarily causing hurt), 294 (use of obscene words in public place) and 354 (assault or criminal force to woman with intent to outrage her modesty) of the IPC.

"Nayak slapped me on my face and hurled abuses. I was shocked and my mike and mobile phone fell off my hands. As I sat down to gather

the items, he hit me on my back. I don't know why he behaved like this," the jurno had said in her complaint.

Since the incident occurred in front of other journalists, the victim said she felt humiliated and hurt.

Earlier in the day, members of Odisha Women in Media (OWM), an association of women journalists of the state, called on Bhubaneswar DCP Prateek Singh and submitted a memorandum demanding a fair probe in this connection.

Condemning the incident, the OWM members urged the DCP cop to ensure a safe environment for the working female journalists in the city.

Meanwhile, taking suo-moto cognizance on this incident, Odisha State Commission for Women (OSCW) has sought a detailed report from the Bhubaneswar DCP by November 20.

There are two main types: type 1 and type 2. Type 1 involves sleepiness and cataplexy. Tests will show that the person is almost entirely missing a neurotransmitter known as hypocretin. This may occur after an infection triggers an autoimmune condition. Type 2 mainly involves excessive daytime sleepiness, but there is usually no sudden weakness. Secondary

sleepiness, but it may also involve cataplexy, hypnagogic hallucinations, and sleep paralysis. It can also disrupt nighttime sleep patterns. Overall, however, a person with narcolepsy usually spends the same amount of time asleep as a person without the condition.

Beauty Tips For The Perfect Diwali Look



Diwali is just around the corner! What better time than now to make sure you shine your brightest. The run-up to Diwali is just a few days away and our preparations in terms of gifts, diyas and sweets are already rolling.

The days running up to Diwali are more hectic than wedding season in terms of cleaning, shopping, house decoration etc which generally dampens your mood leaving you looking exhausted, tired and dull at the end of the day.

Diwali involves joy, celebrations, family dinner and a whole lot of excitement. As we immerse ourselves in the festivities, women and men set to sparkle brighter than the fireworks and

shine more than the diyas to look perfect this Diwali..

Most of us seek quick solutions to fix our beauty woes and tend to laden up the skin with numerous varieties of chemical laden costly cosmetics to look natural, youthful and evergreen.

As you indulge in family gatherings and step out to celebrate, it's time to get a radiant glow with organic homemade ingredients for Diwali which is an absolute favourite with most Indians. Here are simple things to shine brighter than the festive lights from the comforts of your home.

Start taking care of the skin and hair a week before. Nighttime cleansing is an absolute must, especially for city dwellers. Chemical air pollutants, dirt and grime hang in the air. They are potent skin irritants. Make up should also be removed at night. All these can cause dryness of the skin, or disrupt the normal

acid-alkaline balance of the skin, leading to rashes and other eruptive conditions, like pimples and acne.

As Diwali approaches, the weather also changes. Seasonal changes also influence the skin. The humidity becomes less and the skin loses moisture to the atmosphere. So, one needs to keep the skin moisturised and also protect it from sun exposure. For normal to dry skin, cleanse twice a day, with a cleansing gel, containing ingredients like aloe vera. Massage the cleanser lightly into the skin and remove it with moist cotton wool.

Then apply rose water or skin tonic, using cotton wool. During the day, use a sunscreen, before going out in the sun. Or, use moisturizer, if you are indoors. Moisturisers are available in cream and liquid form. For dry skin, at night, after cleansing, apply a nourishing cream and massage it on the face. Wipe off with moist cotton wool. You can

apply a serum afterwards.

Oily skins also need moisture. But, if they apply creams, they can get pimples. To moisturise oily skin, mix one teaspoon pure glycerin with 100 ml rose water. Keep it in an airtight jar in the fridge. Use a little of this lotion after cleansing. This moisturizes the skin, without making it oily. Use cleansing milk or face wash to cleanse the skin.

The use of facial scrubs helps to brighten the skin and add a glow. Use a facial scrub twice a week. Mix ground almonds (badaam) or rice powder with curd and a pinch of Haldi. You can also add dried and powdered orange and lemon peels. Apply on the face and rub gently on the skin with small circular movements. Then wash off with water. Apply a sunscreen before going out in the sun. So, you can look for a sunscreen lotion or cream, depending on your skin type. You

should also look for day creams, nourishing or night creams and serums.

As Diwali and winter approach, try some home remedies to relieve dryness. Apply honey on the face daily for 10 minutes and wash off with water. If you have an aloe vera plant at home, the gel, found in the inner portion of the leaves, can be applied on the face to moisturize it.

Grate carrots and apply on the face for 15 to 20 minutes. Carrot is rich in Vitamin A and good for nourishing the skin in winter. It suits all skin types.

Mix half a teaspoon honey, one teaspoon rose water and one teaspoon dried milk powder. Mix into a paste and apply on the face. Remove after 20 minutes with water. Suits normal to dry skin.

Apply a sunscreen before going out in the sun. So, you can look for a sunscreen lotion or cream, depending on your skin type. You

oil treatments once or twice a week. Heat olive oil and apply on the scalp and hair. Then dip a towel in hot water, squeeze out the water and wrap the hot towel around the head, like a turban. Keep it on for 5 minutes. Repeat the hot towel wrap 3 or 4 times. This helps the hair and scalp absorb the oil better.

Egg white is a wonderful natural cleanser for oily hair and its protein content helps to add body.

Mix honey with egg white and apply it on the face. Wash off with water after 20 minutes. For those with very dry skin, mix half a teaspoon honey, egg yolk or pure almond oil and one teaspoon dried milk powder. Mix into a paste and apply on the face. Leave it on for half an hour and then wash the hair. It helps to soften the hair and is very useful for hair that has suffered damage through colouring, straightening or perming.

If you have been working hard just before Diwali, a few "pick me up" tips will help. Give yourself a manicure and pedicure the day before. In fact, after soaking the hands

and feet in warm water, massage with a rich cream, so that the skin is smooth and soft. A good pick-me-up treatment for the hands is to rub them with sugar and lemon juice. Pay attention to details like waxing and threading too, at least a day in advance.

A "pick-me-up" face mask can leave your skin clean and glowing. Cleanse the skin. Mix honey with egg white and apply it on the face. Wash off with water after 20 minutes. For those with very dry skin, mix half a teaspoon honey, egg yolk or pure almond oil and one teaspoon dried milk powder. Mix into a paste and apply on the face. Leave it on for half an hour and then wash the hair. It helps to soften the hair and is very useful for hair that has suffered damage through colouring, straightening or perming.

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Mix together 3 tablespoons of rose water with one tablespoon each of glycerin and lemon juice. Apply on hands and feet and leave for half an hour. Wash off with plain water. If your hair is looking dull give it a quick conditioning treatment before your shampoo. Mix one teaspoon each of vinegar and honey with one egg. Beat them together well. Massage the mixture into the scalp. Then wrap the hair in a hot towel for twenty minutes, before washing the hair. Your hair will have more body and look shiny and manageable.

Give your hair a tea-water and lemon rinse after shampoo, to add shine. Boil used tea leaves again in enough water. After boiling, you should have about 4 cups of tea-water. Cool and strain it. Then add the juice of a lemon and use it as a last rinse after shampoo.

A Professor's Soliloquy



I have retired from my job in the government, but my journey as a Professor/Media Educator is on...

After teaching in various central universities like DU, BHU, NEHU, IGNOU, IIMC, MZU and several state as well as deemed Universities for almost four decades as a visiting faculty, I was appointed by CMR University, Bangalore as a Professor of Practice six years ago, and my friends and students therefore call me Professor. In fact, Sherry, my colleague in North Eastern Council began calling me Professor for the first time.

But, I have always refused to be called a Doctor nor have allowed any university to confer that honour on me without working full time for it in view of my official position.

Authorities, those are offering honorary Ph.D. (doctorate degree) to so called distinguished persons, and people those are acquiring or arranging such degrees by influence or money, like an ornament from some universities, should learn the lesson from Rahul Dravid, who has refused it, realising the hardship of genuine scholars in his family to get it on merit.

It's not easy to stick to a principle throughout life. My friends published their books from NBT or given assignments to their spouses, which I didn't. My successor in NBT went to the extent of not only giving a translation assignment,

but to arrange Sahitya Akademi Translation Prize for his wife!

Now, my friends say that I have done a mistake. What can I do, for I went by a principle!

Never stop doing good things for others. Sometimes those little things occupy the biggest place in their hearts. But, for God's sake, don't do for undeserving people as I did in my life.

Odisha has the largest number of Literature Dacoits in the country. The list is so big that a single page is insufficient for it. The recent story of Sarala Award is just an example. Dr Mayadhar Mansingh could not get a Sahitya Akademi award due to literary politics of Odisha which still continues.

Once upon a time I was a school headmaster at Umerkote, then in Koraput district of Odisha. I also taught in various centres of higher learning throughout the country as a visiting faculty in the last four decades. I feel nostalgic every year when Teachers' Day comes on 5 September. Many of my friends may have forgotten that once upon a time I was a visiting faculty in the Delhi University's College of Vocational Studies in their PG Course in Book Publishing for about 5 years. I used to teach Editing. My friends Dr G S Jolly was also teaching Editing and Kalyan Banerjee and Sumit Bhattacharjee on Book Production.

My assignment as a faculty came as a surprise. Sumit and I were good friends and were commuting to office together. His assignment from the University came first, he was an alumnus of the College of Vocational Studies. I used to accompany him as we were to go back home together. Prof Jolly did not

know that I am a visiting faculty in IIMC and a few centres of excellence. Urvashi Butalia was once sharing with him the job of teaching editing. One day he surprised me by offering to teach editing.

So, I started teaching Book Editing. We used to reach the college everyday by 6 pm. It was an evening course in Self Financing Mode. There were two 50 minutes periods. Our students were mostly professionals or those preparing for competitive examinations. One of them, Sakul Kundra had already completed his M Phil and was doing Ph.D in History at JNU. He was our best student and got Gold Medal in his batch. He used to send me Teachers' Day gift for many years even after the college stopped the course. Now he is a Professor.

Besides Sakul I fondly remember two girls. One was working with Sage Publications and the other with Macmillan. If I correctly recollect, Swati was with Sage. She used to come everyday at 7.30 pm and was with at least two questions which was to be instantly replied by me. And, the other girl working with Macmillan wanted notes from me for her preparation for the examination.

'But I have never prepared notes in my entire career.' I told the girl. She thought that I am probably hiding. One day she reached my office with her parents with a packet of sweet.

If you have come on a courtesy call, I accept this sweet packet and will gladly share with Sumit and other colleagues here as it is from my student. And if you want any favour, I am afraid, I may have to regret accepting your gift. Please don't misunderstand me. I

said. Then he divulged his intention. His doubt was, since I have two post graduate degrees with two decades of experience in the field, I must have prepared notes and may not be willing to share. Believe me, my daughter will use it only for her examination... he assured

I am a teacher, I never disbelieve my students', I said.

Editing is not everybody's cup of tea. I find more compilers posing as magazine editors these days. Teachers' Day is not a day for students to remember their teachers; it can be the other way round. I feel honoured that Sakul Kundra is now a Professor in Fiji University and Swati heads the Editorial Division of an international publishing house. This is a great honour for me as a teacher.

I have been thinking for the last three years after my retirement to write on my living friends. Today I have an urge to write on my friend Mrinal Chatterjee who has just got D. Litt from Brahmapur University. It will take me a day to write this memoir. Incidentally, my second anthology of short stories is due in a month. Mrinal and I befriended after publication of my story in Galpajhar, which was published from Bhadrak half a century ago and was edited by Balaram Sahu.

Bhadrak College was a major college in 1970s when I was a student in S.C.S College, Puri. Mrinal was a student in that college. He was my batchmate. The other noted friend in that college was Bijoy Nayak. We were young fiction writers those days and our stories were regularly published in Galpajhar. In 1981 I left my college studies and joined J. Mohapatra and Co as a subeditor in their English daily News of the World and monthly digest Alok as its Editor. I was staying with a friend at New PG Hostel as a paying guest. Suddenly I met Mrinal there as a boarder. He was the student editor of the English department's mouthpiece.

My days at Cuttack were not pleasant. Nabakishore Mohapatra, proprietor of J. Mohapatra and Co was a nice person. But, his Manager Rahman was not a goodman. I was invited by a Press Owner of Puri to join the press as its Manager. Chittaranjan Mishra was planning to bring his newspaper Kurukshetra from Cuttack to Puri. The press owner Balakrushna Pratihari was his classmate. Since it was running on loss, Balakrushna Pratihari rented it out to Chittaranjan Mishra for publication of Kurukshetra. One fine morning, I was

offered the job of Managing Editor of Kurukshetra with the work of Manager of the press Kalinga Industries. I was comfortable in the new assignment, but my happiness didn't last long. A full page advertisement was to be published in Kurukshetra. Raghunath Mishra, a friend of Chittaranjan Mishra was looking after the accounting job of the newspaper. He was interested to bring his brother on my post. Our newspaper was printed in letterpress those days. The advertisement text could not be adjusted in half a page. I slightly reduced the size. Ragunathan Mishra reported this lapse in such a manner that Chittaranjan Mishra got angry. In the evening Raghunath Mishra came and paid me a month's salary with the notice of my dismissal from the job.

I was on the road. My family was struggling with poverty. My elder sister was in a private college and her salary was just hand to mouth. My beloved Sailabala was in a private school. We were not in a position to marry. I took loan from a bank to support my family and went on applying for jobs, both private and government. I also took some odd assignments.

An organisation Management Advisory Services then advertised for some editorial posts and conducted an examination. I saw Mrinal there in the examination as a candidate like me. He was by that time working in a private college at Bhubaneswar as a lecturer. But, my interest to return to my original passion Journalism in a newspaper had to wait for some time. I had to marry my beloved as her father was worried. I could not take a risk of joining private sector. I had appeared in several competitive exams and got

three offers out of which I accepted one and join School Education Department as a Headmaster. From there I switched over to NCERT as an Educational Media Researcher. A job of Language Editor in Odia was advertised in newspapers in 1990. I applied for it and got a call for appearing in an interview. There I met Mrinal Chatterjee again as a candidate.

The interview board led by famous author and translator Jeevan Pani appreciated my earlier experience in a publishing house. The result was to be declared after a day. West Bengal Government launch drive to register number of migrant workers

Kolkata, (Ambar Mukherjee): The West Bengal Government has decided to launch a large-scale outreach drive in states like Gujarat, Tamil Nadu, Maharashtra, Kerala and Karnataka to get more migrant workers from Bengal registered on the state's Karmasathi portal, which was launched as part of an effort to offer better opportunity to people leaving the state in search of jobs and livelihood.

The initiative was taken after it was noticed that only about 34 per cent of the estimated migrant labourers had registered their names on the portal through the recently organised drive, titled Duare Sarkar (government at doorstep), said sources at Nabanna, the state secretariat.

"We have a record of around 41 lakh migrant labourers who had returned to Bengal during nationwide lockdown in the wake of

Covid 19 outbreak in 2020. Majority of them were brought back by the state government and rests returned on their own. But the portal through Duare Sarkar camps held between September 1 and 30, registered names of only 13.60 lakh migrant workers," said an official at Nabanna.

Citing an example, the officer said the number of migrant labourers who returned from Gujarat during lockdown was 4,69,069 but only 59,218 of them registered themselves on the portal.

"The details of the outreach drive in other states will soon be finalised. We may set up help desks in other states with migrant workers to help them get registered with the portal," the official said, adding, "The success of such a drive depends on the registration of the migrant labourers on the portal."

According to the state

secretariat, the total figure of current migrant workers might increase or decrease now since the state government initiated some measures to give jobs in Bengal and at the same time, some more people left the state in search of livelihood.

"The government's target is reducing the number of migrant workers heading for other states. For this, we need to know the present number of such workers to prepare a database so that the government can think of offering them better deals in the state," said another official of the state government.

Sources in the Trinamool Congress said the aim of the outreach drive and offer migrant workers better deal in Bengal are to blunt the opposition parties' political tool on the issue of joblessness in the state citing the figure of migrant labourers working in other states.

"Congress Leaders, Their Dialogues, Announcements Are Filmy": PM Modi

Ratlam (MP): Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday said the Congress leaders, their "dialogues" and their announcements are all "filmy" as he took a jibe at 'tear clothes' remark of Madhya Pradesh Congress chief Kamal Nath.

Speaking at a rally at Ratlam in BJP-ruled Madhya Pradesh ahead of November 17 assembly elections, he also announced that the free ration scheme for "80 crore poor persons" in the country would be extended for another five years.

"The Congress leaders are filmy, their dialogues are filmy, their announcements are filmy, their characters are too filmy, and when a character is filmy, then obviously the scene too will be filmy," he said. "A competition of tearing



clothes is going on between two Congress leaders," PM Modi said, in an apparent jibe at Nath's statement referring to veteran Congress leader Digvijaya Singh. This was only a "trailer," the prime minister added. "After the victory of the BJP on December 3 (when votes will be counted), the real picture

of Congress will be seen here, the real conflict within the Congress will unfold," he said.

If Congress leaders get an opportunity, they tear the clothes of the public, the prime minister added. "This is not a fight for the CM's chair.. This is a fight for the future of their sons who will get hold of Congress in the state....Congress is doing

dynastic politics," PM Modi said.

The prime minister also promised to extend the free ration (foodgrains under public distribution system) scheme for "80 crore poor people of the country" for five years beyond this December, and said that "fulfilling the people's dreams is Modi's resolve."

The Madhya Pradesh

government's flagship Ladli Behna and Ladli Laxmi schemes for women are being praised in the entire country, he said.

Accusing the Congress of being anti-tribal, PM Modi said it opposed the candidature of the first tribal woman president Droupadi Murmu by fielding a former BJP leader (Yashwant Sinha) against her.

The BJP would win the assembly elections in both Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh, he said.

"Be it the country or Madhya Pradesh, Congress is left with only the trumpet of false announcements... Congress does not even have a concrete roadmap for the development of Madhya Pradesh. Congress cannot even think that far," PM Modi said.

Air quality 'Severe' In Some Places In Haryana, 'Poor' In Parts Of Punjab

Chandigarh: Many parts of Haryana on Saturday reported air quality indices in the 'severe' and 'very poor' categories while it was 'poor' in parts of neighbouring Punjab.

Punjab reported 1,360 fresh stubble-burning incidents as farmers continued to burn crop residue.

According to the Central Pollution Control Board data on Saturday evening, Fatehabad recorded an air quality index (AQI) of 464, followed by Faridabad at 439, Jind at 428, Kaithal 426, Hisar 425, Sonipat 414, Sirsa 414, Gurugram 410, Bahadurgarh 369,

Kurukshetra 325, Rohtak 319 and Bhiwani 307. In Punjab, Bathinda reported an AQI of 385, followed by Ludhiana 301, Jalandhar 291, Mandi Gobindgarh 277, Amritsar 264, Khanna 265 and Patiala 247. Chandigarh, the joint capital of Punjab and Haryana, saw an AQI of 179.

An AQI between zero and 50 is considered 'good', 51 and 100 'satisfactory', 101 and 200 'moderate', 201 and 300 'poor', 301 and 400 'very poor', and 401 and 500 'severe'. Meanwhile, with 1,360 new farm fires, the total number of

stubble-burning incidents rose to 14,173 till Saturday, according to Ludhiana-based Punjab Remote Sensing Centre data.

The number of total stubble-burning incidents of 14,173 registered from September 15 till November 4 was 47 per cent less than 26,853 such cases in

Mansa, 116 in Tarn Taran and 112 in Bathinda.

On the same day in 2021 and 2022, the state had seen 3,032 and 2,437 farm fires, respectively.

Paddy straw burning in Punjab and Haryana is considered one of the major reasons behind the alarming spike in air pollution levels in the national capital in October and November. As the window for wheat -- a key Rabi crop -- is very short after paddy harvest, some farmers set their fields on fire to quickly clear off the crop residue for sowing of the next crop.

Drunk man kills wife for dancing at wedding party in Odisha

BALASORE(KCN): In a shocking incident, a man reportedly killed his wife for dancing in a wedding procession without taking his permission at Paikapada village within Oupada police limits in Balasore district on Saturday night. The accused is 43-year-old Ram Singh of Paikapada. The deceased was identified as Sharmila Singh (35). Ram is a driver by profession.

Sources said a wedding ceremony was organised by Ram's neighbour on Saturday night. During the marriage procession,

some women requested Sharmila to dance with them. Though she refused, the women forcibly dragged her to the middle of the procession and made her dance. Ram, who was also present at the spot, saw Sharmila shaking a leg and became angry. However, he did not express his displeasure and waited for the function to get over. In the meantime, he consumed alcohol with his friends and became completely drunk. After attending the wedding feast, the couple

went home. At around 11 pm, a fight broke out between them as Ram yelled at Sharmila for dancing in the procession without his permission. When the woman protested, Ram became furious and in a fit of rage, assaulted her with a digging bar. The couple's two minor kids snatched away the iron bar from Ram's hands but the latter grabbed the handle of an axe and continued to assault Sharmila. The woman bled to death. On hearing the commotion, neighbours rushed to the spot and found Sharmila lying in a pool of blood. They immediately informed the police about the incident.

The next morning, a team of Oupada police rushed to the village for investigation. Sub-divisional police officer (SDPO) of Soro Ritesh Kumar Mahapatra said the woman's body was sent for postmortem. Basing on the complaint of the deceased's parents, police registered a case under section 302 of the IPC and arrested the accused. Further investigation is underway.

Bangladesh cancel training session due to pollution in Delhi

New Delhi: Bangladesh team director Khaled Mahmud said on Friday that they have cancelled their scheduled practice session in Delhi due to polluted air. Bangladesh will take on Sri Lanka at the Arun Jaitley Cricket Stadium on November 6 but now there are concerns around the game given the air quality has reached a 'severe' level.

Bangladesh, who have been knocked out of the tournament following their six losses on a trot after their only win against Afghanistan, were scheduled to have a practice session at AJCS ahead of their game that is very crucial for them as their participation at Champions Trophy is at stake. But the team management opted to cancel it as several cricketers complained of coughing after going out on November 2 when the team decided to give the cricketers a break.

According to media reports on Friday morning the air quality in Delhi reached 'severe'

levels, with Mundka recording the highest Air Quality Index (498).

The wicket in SBNS is typically suited for spinners while the wickets in Chattogram and Sylhet are traditionally known for helping the pacers and considered to be sporting. The players were found struggling in the sporting wickets in India and according to Mahmud it would have been better if they had opted to prepare the team

in wickets similar to the ones they encountered in India. "I was not in favour of playing against New Zealand in Mirpur before the World Cup. Why did we have to play in those spinning wickets? Why did we want to win that series? We should have played in Chattogram and Sylhet. We lost the series despite New Zealand not bringing their main players. We should have been more serious, well before time, about the World Cup squad," Mahmud told reporters

while adding that he is not enjoying his role as team director and wouldn't have taken that had he known this would be his responsibility.

"I am performing the role assigned to me by the BCB. I don't have the decision-making role as I have had in previous tours as a selector. I have been given my limitations in this role. Previously, I tried to keep myself involved with the team. This time I don't have the cricketing role. I am taking care of discipline, but this is not really my work," he said.

Mahmud also revealed that it is too early to say anything regarding head coach Chandika Hathurusingha but admitted that he is expecting a 'post-

mortem' following the World Cup. Hathurusingha's tactics came under severe criticism after the batting order was changed in almost every game. "It is too early to say whether Hathurusingha will be there or not. The World Cup is still ongoing and Hathu is still our head coach so it won't send the right message to the team," said Mahmud.

"We have to trust him till the World Cup. BCB takes the decision after the tournament. There should be a post-mortem of our failure. We came here with the hopes of playing in the semifinals but we are lingering in ninth or tenth position in the points table."
